

CPM blames govt for spread of diarrhoea

Opens free food centre at New Rajarajeswari Peta

AMID the continuing diarrhoea outbreak in New Rajarajeswari Peta here, CPM former state secretary and Rajya Sabha former MP P Madhu on Sunday inaugurated a free food supply centre to support locals affected by the crisis.

With the district administration and Vijayawada Municipal Corporation (VMC) ordering the closure of shops and hotels in the area, the CPM initiative has come as a relief to residents struggling for basic needs.

After inaugurating the

food centre, Madhu visited the health camp organised by VMC at Care and Share Municipal High School. He interacted with patients, enquired about their health, and spoke to doctors about the treatment being provided.

Speaking to the media, Madhu launched a severe attack on the TDP-led NDA government, accusing it of failure in controlling the diarrhoea outbreak. "Cases are rising day by day and people are living in fear. The government has failed miserably in preventing the spread," he said.

He demanded that the dis-

trict administration immediately open four more health camps in New Rajarajeswari Peta to improve medical access. He also sought an ex-gratia of Rs 10 lakh for the families of those who died due to the outbreak. "So far, six to seven people have died, though the government has not officially confirmed the numbers," he alleged.

Madhu further demanded that the government arrange food facilities for diarrhoea victims and affected families, given the disruption of livelihoods caused by the crisis.

CPM Central Committee Secretary B Ramana Rao, Secretariat Member K Durga Rao, and other party leaders accompanied Madhu during his visit.

Heavy rain throws normal life out of gear

HEAVY rain which lashed Guntur city on Sunday evening threw normal life out of gear and several interior colonies inundated due to three feet level water stranded on the roads. Motor vehicles were seen trapped in the rainwater at several places. Several colonies located in the low-lying areas were waterlogged. Sub-way at the AT Agraharam is filled with rainwater. Several areas in Brodipet, Arundalpet, Chuttugunta, RK Puram, Pattabhipuram, GMC head office, NTR Bus Station, Swarnabharati Nagar were inundated in rainwater. Due to overflow of drains, rainwater flooded the roads and caused inconvenience to the locals. Rainwater stranded on the roads entered into autos. Several two-wheelers gave trouble at Pattabhipuram, AT

Agraharam and other areas due to flooding on roads. The road leading from subway to Syamala Nagar Railway Gate was also inundated.

Guntur Municipal Commissioner Puli Srinivasulu directed engineering officials to take emergency measures on a war-footing to bail out rainwater stagnated in various parts of the city. He instructed that if necessary, JCBs and poclains should be hired on rental basis to speed up the water removal works in a planned and effective manner. To address rain-related grievances, a 24/7 call centre (08632345103) has been set up at the GMC head office under the supervision of deputy commissioners, the commissioner added. He also appealed to the public in low-lying areas to temporarily move to GMC schools or designated relief shelters until the rains subside.

ICAR-NIRCA secures CSR project

THE ICAR-National Institute for Research on Commercial Agriculture (ICAR-NIRCA) in Rajamahendravaram has secured its first Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) project from M/s Elitecon International, New Delhi. The initiative is titled "Upliftment of Tobacco Farmer Ecosystem through IoTs and Sustainable Agricultural Practices."

The two-year project is led by Dr Maganti Sheshu Madhav, Director of ICAR-NIRCA, and Dr Korada Rajasekhara Rao, Head of the Division of Crop Management, along with a team of multidisciplinary scientists. The main goal is to develop and demonstrate Internet of Things (IoT)-enabled technologies for efficient resource management in tobacco farming. The project will use modern tools like sensors, drones, and two-way

communication platforms for real-time monitoring of crops, pests, and weather. This will provide precise agricultural advice to farmers, which is expected to lower input costs.

A demonstration will be conducted on a 10-acre plot at the ICAR-NIRCA Regional Station in Jeelugumilli, Eluru district, where around 500 farmers will be trained on the new technologies and sustainable practices. The project is expected

to reduce irrigation water usage by 40 to 50%, decrease energy costs by 30 to 40%, and improve fertilizer and nutrient use efficiency. It also aims to increase crop productivity and promote the use of drones for pest management. In the long run, the initiative will help conserve natural resources, improve soil health, and empower tobacco farmers to adopt climate-resilient technologies for long-term sustainability.

Early intervention key to preventing autism: Expert

RESPLICE Institute chairman Dr Chandrasekhar Thodupunoori emphasised that autism begins in the womb, and urged parents to "stop it before it enters your child's life."

Speaking at a free autism treatment camp held at the Icon Public School campus on Sunday, Dr Thodupunoori highlighted his institute's unique approach. The camp was inaugurated by Kondeti Rajendra, the head of Icon Educational Institutions.

According to Dr Thodupunoori, the Resplix Institute is the first treatment centre in India to offer a comprehensive approach to managing

autism and other neurological conditions. The institute specialises in Fecal Microbiota Transplantation (FMT) and multi-omics based personalised treatments for a range of issues, including autism, neurodevelopmental conditions, gastrointestinal disorders, and post-chemo gut recovery challenges.

He noted that the Resplix Institute is pioneering the use of FMT as a primary treatment to address the gut-brain axis, which is central to many modern ailments.

Dr Thodupunoori reported a positive response to the camp in Vijayawada and announced plans to hold free camps in other major cities across Andhra Pradesh in the coming days.

AS part of the efforts to control diarrhoea outbreak at New Rajarajeswari Peta in the 57th Division of Vijayawada Municipal Corporation, NTR District Collector Dr G Lakshmisha said that strict preventive measures are being implemented under a planned action strategy. He informed that mineral water is being supplied to every household in New RR Peta and that Hygiene Kits are being distributed to residents.

On Sunday, Collector Dr G Lakshmisha, along with Vijayawada Municipal Corporation Commissioner HM Dhyanaachandra visited New RR Peta and monitored the door-to-door survey conducted across 11 Ward Sachivalayams. Awareness programmes are also being organised to educate the public on diarrhoea

300 people avail free medical camp

GOVT MEDICAL COLLEGES

Coalition's 'false propaganda' questioned

GUNTUR: Former deputy speaker Kona Raghupati came down heavily on Chief Minister Chandrababu Naidu and the TDP-led coalition for spreading false propaganda on government medical colleges. Addressing the media at the YSR Congress Party central office on Sunday, he said Naidu has always thrived on lies, betraying the poor and weaker sections with false promises before elections and dashing their hopes after coming to power.

He recalled that it was YS Jagan Mohan Reddy who took

the historic decision to establish 17 new government medical colleges, guided by NITI Aayog's proposal for one college in every parliamentary constituency. "This was not a political move, but a social responsibility to ensure free healthcare for the poor and accessible medical education for students," Raghupati said.

During YS Jagan's tenure, seven colleges were fully constructed, five have already started classes, and the rest are nearing completion. In contrast, the

coalition government has halted construction for 15 months and is now shamelessly preparing to privatise these very institutions. "You rejected 50 MCI seats for Pulivendula Medical College and now you claim to care for students? This hypocrisy must be exposed," he said.

He slammed Chandrababu's claim of financial constraints. "You borrowed Rs 1.90 lakh crore in just 15 months. Can you not spend Rs 4,000 crore on essential medical colleges," he questioned.

CONTROLLING GANJA PEDDLING PRIORITY: SP
