BRS, Cong uncork plans tailored to tap JH voters

Development track record clashes with electoral sentiment in the high-voltage battle for the key seat

AHEAD of the upcoming Jubilee Hills Assembly byelection, a significant question is preoccupying the three major political parties: will the constituency's voters choose in favour of past development or be swayed by the sentiment factor? The campaign has intensely heated up, with leaders from all three parties hitting the roads to present their respective cases before the elector-

The BRS campaign is being spearheaded by the party's working president, K T Rama Rao, who is focused on two main themes. Firstly, he is aggressively targeting the Congress government, alleging that it has failed to implement its promises to the people.

Secondly, he is meticulously listing the development works achieved during the BRS's nine-and-a-halfyear tenure. He stated that the party followed tradition by giving the ticket to the family member of the deceased candidate, and promised that candidate Sunitha was not alone; he would be behind her and would personally ensure the safety of the people "even at midnight" against the "goondaism" of Congress leaders.

On the other side, all Ministers, along with the AICC in-charge Meenakshi





Natarajan, are campaigning vigorously in favour of the Congress candidate, Naveen Yadav. Ministers are relentlessly campaigning, with newly inducted Minister Md Azharuddin also participating in the electioneering.

Minister Ponnam Prabhakar asserted that the people of Jubilee Hills have a clear opportunity to "teach a lesson to the BRS." He alleged that the BRS and the BJP have colluded in this election. Prabhakar claimed that the Revanth Reddy-led government has accomplished numerous welfare and development works in the last two years, criticising the BRS for failing to give a single ration card during their ten-year rule.

He cited the Cantonment constituency, where he claimed voters ensured the Congress candidate's victory and subsequently received development works worth Rs 6,000 crore in the last two years. He called upon the people to ensure Naveen Yadav's victory, assuring them that the entire government would stand behind him to deliver development.

BRS senior leader Nagesh Mudiraj countered the Congress's claims, arguing that people will teach the Congress government a lesson for failing to implement its promises. He noted that the Congress gained power by giving "guarantees as promises" and pledging implementation within 100 days. "It has been 700 days but there is not a single guarantee they have implemented," he claimed, expressing confidence that the "victory parade of BRS would start from Jubilee Hills."

Political analysts have opined that this election is a crucial litmus test for both major political parties. One political analyst suggested that a Congress victory would provide a significant boost to the party and Revanth Reddy in particular, while being detrimental to the BRS. Conversely, if the BRS wins, it would signify that voters prioritised the sentiment factor, setting a positive tone for coming elections by showing that the "Pink party was back in busi-

POLITICAL PARTIES CAUGHT IN A BIND OVER MINORITY VOTES

DESPITE actively wooing minority communities with political incentives, the two major political parties—the Congress and the BRS—are caught in a dilemma regarding which way the crucial 1.4 lakh Muslim minority voters will lean in the upcoming Jubilee Hills byelection on November 11.

The Muslim minority vote shifted heavily towards the Congress during the 2023 Assembly election, which played a key role in the party forming the state government. However, the current situation is tricky for the Congress as city voters have historically favoured the BRS. This concern reportedly prompted the ruling party to grant Mohammed Azharuddin a cabinet berth.

The minority votes appear to be sharply divided between the ruling Congress party and the opposition BRS. Both parties are facing a dilemma as to whether they will secure a considerable number of votes from the minority, particularly the Muslim community, in the by-poll.

that following a longstanding demand for minority representation in the Cabinet, the Congress appointed Azharuddin as Minister for Minority Welfare and Public Enterprises ahead of the by-polls, projecting this as proof of its commitment to minorities. The BRS, however, accuses the Congress of political tokenism, alleging that Azharuddin's elevation was a calculated move purely for the by-election. Political analyst Mohammed Asif Hussain Sohailobserved that Chief Minister A Revanth Reddy is accompanying Azharuddin during his campaign to woo Mus-

lim community votes. Asif Hussain added that, apart from development and infrastructure, minorities require upliftment in terms of education, jobs, and employment. With Muslims constituting 1.4 lakh of the total 3.9 lakh voters, the community's vote will play a crucial role, a fact evident from the aggressive efforts by both Congress and BRS to woo these voters.

For Congress, the by-poll

is about retaining dominance in the City, while for the BRS, it is an opportunity to prove its grassroots strength after losing power. BJP Union Minister G Kishan Reddy also weighed in, criticising Revanth Reddy for allegedly becoming a slave to the Mailis Party in the state and calling him a 'Ji-Huzur' in his attempt to win in Jubilee Hills and save his party's reputation.

Meanwhile, the AIMIM is backing the Congress party nominee V Naveen Yadav and has been actively campaigning in the minority-dominant areas of Jubilee Hills. The MIM had fielded Shaikpet corporator RashedFarazuddin in the 2023 elections, who received some 7,800 votes.

BRS working president K T Rama Rao alleged that the Congress is treating minorities as a mere vote bank and accused the party of cheating the minorities by failing to implement its Minority Declaration. He stated: "Two years ago, it said it would allocate Rs 4,000 crore annually for minority

welfare and introduce a Minority Sub-Plan. But both these promises were broken. Two years have passed, and even in the next three years, they will not be able to deliver anything," he asserted.

Moreover, in an attempt to woo voters, Revanth Reddy recently met with religious leaders, who urged the Chief Minister to introduce a separate minority subplan, similar to the SC/ST sub-plan, in the state budget and also requested him to protect Wakf properties.

In the 2023 Assembly elections, Congress candidate Azharuddin received 64,212 votes. The winner, BRS's Maganti Gopinath, polled 80,549 votes, and BJP's Lankala Deepak Reddy got 25,866 votes. The MIM candidate, Rashed-Farazuddin, received 7,848

Only Cong is secular 'from Delhi to galli', avers Uttam

STATE Irrigation and Civil Supplies Minister N Uttam Kumar Reddy on Tuesday asserted that the Congress was the only party that remained truly secular "from Delhi to Gully" and the sole force capable of defeating the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) both in Telangana and across India. Addressing a minority

tunistic alliance with the BJP led directly to its political ever regional parties grow, Congress declines, and BJP gains. BRS too has been acting as a silent partner of the BJP. It never protested when the BJP reduced budgets for minorities or targeted their educational and employment opportunities."

He said that while the BRS government failed to protect minority institutions and interests, the Congress had a long and verifiable record of empowerment. The Minister alleged that nearly 80 per cent of minority colleges had closed during the BRS regime and welfare schemes for minority men were left incomplete.

"In contrast, the Congress government announced a Minority Declaration with a Rs 4,000 crore budget and a Minority Sub-Plan. Out of this, Rs 1,000 crore subsidy was earmarked for the first two years. Though not fully released yet, the process has started, and the implementation is underway," he explained.

Elaborating on the educational achievements he said that in the past 22 months of the Congress government's rule, 2,200 additional engineering seats were sanctioned for minority colleges, while one law college and one pharmacy college were approved exclusively for minority students.

BJP State unit chief calls for change in JH amid civic neglect

HYDERABAD: BJP State unit President N Ramchander Rao strongly criticised the state government's handling of civic and administrative issues during a public meeting held at Kalpataruvu Residency Club House, Multipurpose Hall in Erragadda Division on Tuesday. Addressing residents and party supporters, he called for a political shift beginning from Jubilee Hills, citing years of neglect and misgovernance by successive regimes.

Ramchander Rao condemned the recent decision to permit a private cemetery in the heart of Erragadda's residential colony, calling it "unwise and inhumane." He alleged that the government was manipulating public sentiment for electoral gains and warned against granting permissions near sensitive military lands without proper scrutiny.

He credited the NDA government led by Atal Bihari Vajpayee, along with the then Chief Minister N Chandrababu Naidu, for laying the foundation of Hyderabad's modern development. "Projects like Gachibowli Stadium and Cyber City are the result of that visionary leadership," he said, adding that it was misleading for current governments to claim full credit for continued progress. Highlighting the dire state of civic infrastructure in Erragadda and nearby colonies, Ramchander Rao pointed to the absence of basic amenities such as drainage systems, manholes, roads and street lighting. "Flooding, foul smells and uncovered manholes during rains are posing serious health risks," he said, expressing disappointment over the inaction of municipal officials and local representatives.

He also raised concerns about the violation of noise regulations, noting that DJ programmes and loud music continue beyond the permitted hours in several areas. "The police and local authorities must enforce these rules strictly," he urged.

Taking aim at both Congress and BRS, he said that despite having had opportunities to govern, both parties failed to address core public issues. He appealed to voters to give the BJP a chance, citing the party's 12-year record of corruptionfree governance under Prime Minister Narendra Modi.

He said the party's Jubilee Hills candidate, Deepak Reddy, is a responsive and experienced leader, deeply connected to the people. "Your vote is more powerful than a bullet," he declared, urging citizens to vote responsibly and strengthen democracy. "The people have seen the rule of two parties. Now it is time for change—and that change should begin in Jubilee Hills."
