Re hits fresh record low of Rs 91.14 against dollar

MUMBAI: The rupee slumped to a fresh record low of 91.14 against the US dollar on Tuesday, after weakening by 36 paise in afternoon trade. Pressured by sustained foreign institutional investor outflows and lingering uncertainty over a potential India-US trade deal, this marked the fourth consecutive session in which the rupee has touched a new all-time low. The currency has now depreciated about 1% over the past five trading sessions alone. In afternoon dealings, the rupee was quoted at 91.14 per dollar, extending its losses from the previous close amid continued pressure from global and domestic factors. **Full report: P8**

FOG-LINKED ACCIDENTS 25 killed in road crashes across UP



LUCKNOW: At least 25 people were killed and 59 injured in a series of fog-linked road accidents across Uttar Pradesh, with the worst tragedy unfolding on the Yamuna Expressway in Mathura, where a multi-vehicle pile-up turned into an inferno, police said on Tuesday. The maximum number of 13 fatalities was reported from Mathura, while four people each were killed in Basti and Unnao and two each in Meerut and Barabanki. According to officials, all the incidents were linked to poor visibility. The Mathura accident occurred around 4:30 am on the Agra-to-Noida carriageway within the Baldev police station limits. Senior Superintendent of Police (SSP) Shlok Kumar said eight buses and three smaller vehicles were involved in the pile-up due to poor visibility.

Sydney attacker had Hyd roots: TG police

SAJID Akram, one of the two terrorists who killed 15 people in a gruesome mass shooting at Bondi Beach in Sydney, Australia, recently, hailed from Hyderabad, the Telangana police said on Tuesday.

Director General of Police (DGP) B Shivadhar Reddy said in a statement that the attackers were identified as Sajid Akram (50) and his

son Naveed Akram (24). Further investigation in this regard is being carried out by Australian investigators

who described the attack as a terrorist act inspired by the Islamic State group. Sajid Akram was shot dead by

the Australian police during the attack. The assailants targeted Jewish people during Hanukkah celebrations at the beach.

The DGP said that Sajid Akram is originally from Hyderabad. He completed his B com degree in Hyderabad and migrated to Australia in search of employment, approximately 27 years ago, in November 1998. He subsequently married Venera Grosso, a European origin woman

before settling permanently in Australia.

They have one son, Naveed (one of the two attackers) and one daughter. Akram carries an Indian passport as on date and his son Naveed and daughter were born in Australia and are Australian citizens.

As per information available from his relatives in India, Sajid Akram had limited contact with his family in Hyderabad over the past 27 years. **Continued on Page 7**

IPL AUCTION Uncapped players strike gold!

KOLKATA Knight Riders (KKR) splurged a record-breaking Rs 25.20 crore to land top Australian all-rounder Cameron Green and Rs 18 crore to acquire the services of Sri Lankan pacer Matheesha Pathirana in the Indian Premier League players' auction here on Tuesday.

Uncapped Indian players were also a big hit with Uttar Pradesh's 20-year-old left-arm spinner Prashant Veer going to Chennai Super Kings for Rs 14.20 crore. He became the highest paid uncapped player in the history of IPL auction after coming in at a base price of Rs 30 lakh. Jammu and

CSK splurge Rs 14.2cr each on Prashant & Kartik

Kashmir pacer Aqib Nabi Dar also attracted a hefty sum of Rs 8.40 crore from Delhi Capitals to be among the top gainers in the mini auction. Dar's base price was also Rs 30 lakh. Indian stars Prithvi Shaw and Sarfaraz Khan, however, went unsold in the auction despite their good run of form with the bat.

Green surpassed compatriot Mitchell Starc (Rs 24.75 crore) to become the most expensive overseas player at an IPL auction. This was after Kolkata Knight Riders and Chennai Super Kings were involved in an intense bidding



war for him before the latter emerged winner.

KKR also went after Venkatesh Iyer before pulling out of the race against Royal Challengers Bengaluru, who

got the India all-rounder for Rs 7 crore. The three-time champions then entered the fray to buy Pathirana after Delhi Capitals and Lucknow Super Giants withdrew fol-

lowing an intense bidding war between the two franchises.

Entering the auction at a base price of Rs 2 crore, Pathirana became the most expensive Sri Lankan sold in an IPL auction. As far as Green is concerned, his salary for the season would still be Rs 18 crore (USD 1.9 million) as the rest of the amount will go towards the BCCI's player development programme as per the rules of the auction for foreign players.

Pathirana will get the full amount as it falls within the salary cap. Green, who previously turned up for

Mumbai Indians and Royal Challengers Bengaluru, has so far played 29 matches in the IPL to aggregate 707 runs and take 16 wickets. Shaw, however, went unsold despite his fine run of form in the domestic circuit lately, and so was the case with Sarfaraz, who smashed a 22-ball 73 in a Syed Mushtaq Ali Trophy match for Mumbai on Tuesday. Big-hitting South African batter David Miller was bought by Delhi Capitals for his base price of Rs 2 crore, but New Zealand swashbuckler Devon Conway, whose base price was also Rs 2 crore, went unsold in the auction. **Continued on Page 7**

Union Minister Shivraj Singh Chouhan, while introducing the Viksit Bharat Guarantee for Rozgar and Aajeevika Mission (Gramin) (VB-G RAM G) Bill, 2025, said the government not only believes in Mahatma Gandhi but also follows his princi-



ples. "The (Narendra) Modi govt has done more for rural development than previous governments," he said.

Four Union ministers, Revanth, Naidu to attend WEF annual meet

NEW DELHI: India is set for a power-packed presence at the World Economic Forum Annual Meeting in Swiss ski resort town of Davos next month with four Union ministers, including Ashwini Vaishnaw and Shivraj Singh Chouhan, set to join five CMs and over 100 CEOs from the country. Minister for Civil Aviation K Ram Mohan Naidu and Minister for New & Renewable Energy, Consumer Affairs, and Food & Public Distribution Pralhad Joshi will also be part of the Indian delegation at the 5-day annual meeting from January 18. The Chief Ministers include Devendra Fadnavis of Maharashtra, N Chandrababu Naidu of Andhra Pradesh, Assam's Himanta Biswa Sarma, Madhya Pradesh's Mohan Yadav and Telangana's A Revanth Reddy. While Reddy is from Congress and Naidu is from Telugu Desam Party (an ally of BJP), the other three CMs are from BJP. Among the Union ministers, Ram Mohan Naidu is from TDP while other four are from BJP.

BRS leaders minted money instead of serving people, fumes Srinivas

GOVERNMENT Whip Adi Srinivas stated that the people gave power to the BRS party for 10 years, however, the BRS leaders earned farmhouses instead of serving the public. Speaking to the media on Tuesday at the Congress Legislature Party (CLP) Media Hall, Adi Srinivas found fault with the criticism raised by BRS Working President K T Rama Rao and said that K T Rama Rao is 'daydreaming'. "In the Sarpanch elections, the Congress party won over 5,500 Sarpanch seats in two phases. The

Congress party secured 65 per cent of the seats. It is absurd that K T Rama Rao is holding a victory celebration for an election held in just one mandal in Siricilla. K T Rama Rao is resorting to gimmicks to create an impact in the other mandals," Srinivas ridiculed. "Even if I lose in Vemulawada, I will stand by the people and fight for them. In Vemulawada, I have become a voice that questions the authorities. Even though I won for the first time, I am undertaking development programmes worth hundreds of crores in Vemulawada. I brought a yarn depot to Vemulawada," he said.

TG govt sets March-end deadline for Hyd'bad Metro Rail takeover

CHIEF Secretary of Telangana K Ramakrishna Rao has directed that the process of taking over Hyderabad Metro Rail from L&T be completed by the end of the current financial year. Reviewing the status of the takeover in a high-level meeting on Tuesday with the committee of secretaries and officials from L&T, the Chief Secretary emphasised that the transfer must be carried out smoothly

and expeditiously, in line with the agreement reached between both parties. He clarified that the process should proceed without any hindrance to existing agreements and instructed that planned actions be taken systematically over the next 100 days. The transaction advisor, IDBI, has been asked to finalise its report at the earliest to facilitate the completion of the takeover. The Chief Secretary further stated that L&T must extend full cooperation in

this process. Following the takeover, Hyderabad Metro Rail Limited (HMRL) Managing Director Sarfaraz Ahmad has been directed to prepare proposals related to operations and maintenance. Advisor (Urban Transport) to the Government of Telangana NVS Reddy, Special Chief Secretary Vikas Raj, L&T Metro Rail Hyderabad Limited MD KVB Reddy, officials from IDBI, Chief Electrical Engineer, HMRL DVS Raju and senior officers of HMRL attended the meeting.



Merger of local bodies with GHMC will impose burden on citizens: BJP

PARTY ACCUSES CONGRESS OF UNILATERAL MOVE TO RAISE LOANS AND SERVE POLITICAL INTERESTS OF AIMIM

TELANGANA BJP senior leader and former MLA N V S S Prabhakar on Tuesday accused the state Congress government of imposing a heavy financial burden on the citizens of Hyderabad following the merger of 27 local bodies into the Greater Hyderabad Municipal Corporation (GHMC).



Addressing the media, Prabhakar, who also serves as convener of the GHMC delimitation monitor committee, alleged that the Congress government intends to raise thousands of crores of rupees in loans by projecting the GHMC's expanded population, which now exceeds 1.50 crore. He criticised the move as unilateral and hasty, claiming that the delimitation draft was prepared without adequate consultation with public representatives and without giving citizens sufficient time to lodge objections. Prabhakar further al-

leged that the expansion of GHMC jurisdiction was politically motivated and carried out under pressure from the AIMIM party. He charged that the Congress government was more focused on commissions and contractors than on genuine public welfare. Highlighting irregularities in the delimitation process, Prabhakar pointed out that voter distribution across divisions lacked uniformity. He noted that earlier divisions in the old city had 15,000 to 20,000 voters, while those in the new city had 35,000 to 40,000

voters. After expansion, however, new divisions now have 50,000 to 70,000 voters, raising questions of fairness. He also criticised the unequal division radius, stating that old city divisions cover two kilometres, new city divisions three kilometres, while newly created divisions extend up to 10 kilometres, which he termed unscientific. Prabhakar concluded that the expansion was politically driven and orchestrated through an understanding between the Congress party and AIMIM's headquarters, Darulsalam.

STATE Agriculture Director, Dr B Gopi, announced a major technological initiative aimed at streamlining urea distribution across Telangana. Addressing the media on Tuesday, he stressed that science and technology must support agriculture and revealed that a special mobile application developed by the National Informatics Centre (NIC) will soon be launched to ensure a transparent and efficient supply of urea to farmers. Dr Gopi explained that the app will be managed under the supervision of the

Agriculture Department and will integrate land records to prevent the diversion of urea. Farmers will be able to book urea from the comfort of their homes using just a mobile number and Pattadar Passbook. The system will also allow them to check stock availability at the district, mandal, and village levels, similar to booking movie tickets online. Currently, Telangana has 10,000 urea distribution

centres, of which 30 per cent are government-run and 70 per cent private. Plans are underway to increase the number of centres and decentralise distribution to avoid crowding at single locations. Dealers will be required to update truckload receipts on the app, ensuring real-time transparency of stock availability. The supply will be crop-based, covering paddy, cotton, maize, chilli, and other

crops. Farmers selecting crops requiring more urea than they actually cultivate may face issues during crop sales, making accurate declarations essential. Small and marginal farmers will receive their urea in a single instalment, while large farmers will be provided supplies in two or three instalments within a month to avoid logistical difficulties. Tenant farmers will also benefit from the system. By

entering Aadhaar, name, and Pattadar Passbook details, they can book urea, with landowners receiving an OTP to validate the transaction. The booking ID generated will remain valid for 24 hours, after which farmers must rebook if they fail to collect supplies. Dr Gopi noted that while only urea will be available through the app initially, other fertilisers like DAP and complex varieties will continue to be purchased through regular channels. He emphasised that agricultural officers and dealers have been instructed to assist farmers with bookings,

and women's groups will also be involved to spread awareness. Highlighting last season's shortages, he said that delays in supply from Ramagundam Fertiliser Industry and the central government had created difficulties, with farmers rushing to purchase available stocks in advance. For the October-March season, 10 lakh metric tonnes of urea are required, while 4.5 lakh metric tonnes are currently available. The new app-based system, he assured, will eliminate shortages and ensure timely supply without inconvenience to farmers.

THE third and final phase of the sarpanch elections will be held on Wednesday. The State Election Commission (SEC) has made all necessary arrangements for the polling in this final phase.



The final phase elections will be held for 4,159 villages across 182 mandals. According to the SEC, the notified numbers of wards are 36,452, and there are 36,483 polling stations. The total number of voters is 53,06,402, comprising 26,01,861 male voters, 27,04,394 female voters and 140 others. In 11 villages and 116 wards, nominations were not filed due to various reasons.

However, elections were declared unanimous in 394 villages, and the elections were stayed in two villages

The number of candidates contesting for sarpanch posts in the final phase stands at 12,652, and the number of candidates contesting for ward members is 75,725.

The SEC has appointed 4,502 Returning Officers (ROs) for these elections and 77,618 polling personnel. The number of Micro Observers appointed is 2,489 (for all three phases), and 3,547 polling stations have been identified for webcasting. A total of 43,856 ballot boxes will be utilised.

The polling will be held from 7 am to 1 pm, and the counting of votes will commence immediately after, from 2 pm.

THE Hyderabad Central Crime Station (CCS) has registered a case against Dhanwantari Foundation International Trust (DFIT) for allegedly cheating more than 4,000 victims by luring them in the name of the Brahmin community and promising high returns on deposits within a fixed period. The accused are said to have collected about Rs 516 crore.

Based on a complaint lodged by Susrala Narsimha

Murthy on December 23, 2023, a case was registered at CCS under Sections 406 and 420 read with 34 of the IPC and Section 5 of the Telangana State Protection of Depositors of Financial Establishments (TSPDFE) Act against the trust, represented by its director Dr P Kamalakhar Sharma, and others. The victims include a large number of senior citizens.

During the investigation, police identified properties allegedly acquired by the trust and its associated companies, including nearly 450 acres of land in Telangana and Andhra Pradesh and about 3,000 square yards of commercial space in prime areas of Hyderabad.

The Deputy Commissioner of Police, Detective Department, Hyderabad, who is the competent authority under the Depositors Act, submitted proposals to the

government for ad-interim attachment of the properties, following which eight Government Orders were issued. Petitions were subsequently filed before the Sessions Court, which confirmed the ad-interim attachments and made them absolute.

Challenging these orders, the accused filed criminal appeals before the High Court. However, after considering the counters filed by the competent authority, the High Court upheld the attachments and passed orders appointing a committee comprising a retired district judge as chairperson, the DCP (competent authority), and a senior chartered accountant.

The committee has been directed to proceed with the auction of the attached properties and ensure early disbursement of the recovered amounts to the victims.

GHMC forms panel to review ward delimitation objections

TO examine all the objections and suggestions for the delimitation of wards in the Greater Hyderabad Municipal Corporation (GHMC), Mayor Gadwal Vijayalakshmi informed that a five-member committee has been formed. She said the delimitation of wards was notified based on a comprehensive study by the Centre for Good Governance (CGG).

The Mayor said that the GHMC expansion marks a new era for Greater Hyderabad, bringing more areas under unified governance, ensuring equitable development, better infrastructure, and improved civic services for residents. She urged the corporators and ex officio members to submit their suggestions and objections and assured them that the same would be addressed. She stated that the effort was aimed at making Hyderabad



a more inclusive and vibrant metropolis.

On Tuesday, cutting across party lines, MLAs, MLCs, and corporators raised their objections over the delimitation of wards and demanded voting on the process, a physical survey of each ward, and the fixing of clear boundaries. The government has sought suggestions and objections from the public, and the final notification will be published after they are fully received and reviewed.

Speaking at a council meeting at the GHMC head office, GHMC Commissioner R V Karnan said over 3,000 objections and sugges-

tion. He stated that the area will be increased from 650 square kilometres to 2,050 square kilometres, and the population will rise from 1.12 crore to 1.34 crore. The Commissioner added that the committee, chaired by the Chief City Planner and ACPs of town planning, was formed to prepare division-wise maps. "As per the central government decision to conduct the population Census for 2026-27, the delimitation process had to be completed by 31 December," said Karnan.

BRS MLA Talasani Srinivas Yadav demanded voting on the delimitation, a physical survey of each ward, and the fixing of boundaries. The MLA said the process was taken up without consulting political parties and corporators and claimed that even the Mayor was not informed. AIMIM Malakpet MLA Ahmed Bin Abdullah Balala said the delimitation was done to politically damage

AIMIM. He sought clarifications over the criteria followed for delimitation and demanded that the Commissioner provide the details, including data. Ahmed Balala asked: "The commissioner had previously said that we will not cross the boundaries of other assembly constituencies. On what basis have these wards been divided? The last population census was held in 2011, and there is no data after that. If you have divided it based on voters, then how many voters have been designated to each ward?"

Trade unions vent ire against Centre over MGNREGA; protests on Dec 22

Demonstrations across the country to highlight inadequate funding, payment delays, and weakening of workers' rights

TRADE unions and workers' organisations across the country have announced nationwide protests on 22 December 2025, to defend the Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employment Guarantee Act (MGNREGA) and safeguard workers' rights. The call for action comes amid growing concerns over the weakening of social security measures and the need to protect the livelihood of millions of rural and urban workers.

According to organisers, the protests will highlight issues such as inadequate budgetary allocations for MGNREGA, delays in wage payments, and attempts to dilute the scheme's provisions. They argue that MGN-



REGA has been a lifeline for rural households, ensuring guaranteed employment and providing economic stability, particularly during times of distress. The demonstrations will also focus on broader workers' rights, including demands for fair wages, social security, and protection against precarious employment.

Leaders of the movement stated that the protests would be held in all states, with participation from farmers' groups, rural workers, and urban labour unions. They emphasised that the Central Government must recognise the importance of MGNREGA not only as a poverty alleviation programme but also as a tool for strengthening grassroots democracy and empowering marginalised

communities.

The unions have urged the government to increase funding for the scheme, ensure timely disbursement of wages, and expand its scope to meet the rising demand for employment. They also called for stronger enforcement of labour laws to safeguard workers in both the organised and unorganised sectors.

Organisers expressed confidence that the 22 December protests would send a strong message to policymakers about the need to prioritise workers' welfare and uphold the constitutional commitment to social justice. They reiterated that defending MGNREGA is essential for protecting the rights and dignity of millions of working people across India.

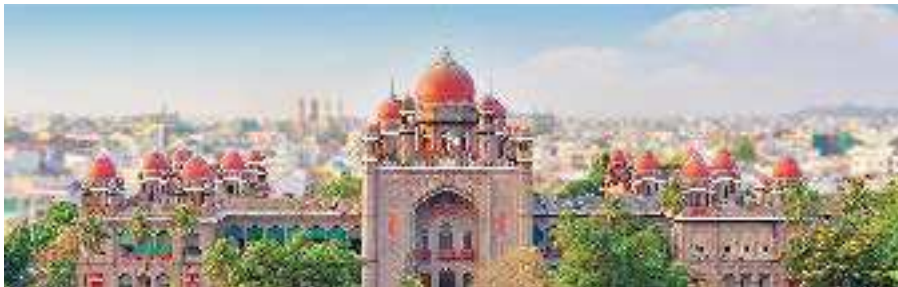

HC disposes writ challenging GHMC delimitation preliminary notification

THE Telangana High Court on Tuesday disposed of a writ challenging the delimitation preliminary notification, dated December 9, issued by the GHMC commissioner, while directing authorities to consider the objections raised by the petitioner, in accordance with law.

The writ, filed by C Vinay Kumar of Chikkadpally, was



heard by a single bench of Justice Bollam Vijaysen Reddy. The petitioner questioned the delimitation exercise on

the ground that the objections submitted by him to the preliminary notification had not been objectively consid-

ered by the GHMC before proceeding to finalisation.

The petitioner sought a direction to the GHMC com-

missioner, to consider his objections--dated December 12--before issuance of the final delimitation notification. He contended that the proposed changes in ward names and boundaries were creating widespread confusion among voters. Drawing the court's attention to the proposed re-naming of the erstwhile Ramnagar division No.87, earlier known as Chikkadpally, as Bagh Lingampally division

No.164, he submitted that the division had retained the name Ramnagar for decades, including during the GHMC elections in 2009, 2016 and 2020. Any further change, he argued, would lead to administrative and public inconvenience.

Kumar apprehended that the delimitation process could result in diversion of development funds originally allocated to specific divisions, following the merger of wards, thereby depriving residents of colonies and blocks of benefits of sanctioned development works. He contended that the proposed merger of ward 164 of Ramnagar into division 163 would cause serious hardship to the public, including changes in door

numbers, which would be time-consuming and cumbersome.

He further argued that permanent geographical features such as a 30-foot nala and a 100-foot public road constituted natural boundaries between the areas and should have been respected during delimitation. Relying on Rule 4 of the Telangana Municipal Corporations (Delimitation of Wards) Rules, 1996, the petitioner submitted that delimitation must take into account natural boundaries, geographical features and contiguity; such statutory requirements had not been followed.

The court heard submissions from petitioner's counsel CH Jayakrishna and

the GHMC standing counsel G Madhusudhan Reddy that the objections raised by the petitioner had not been rejected and were yet to be examined, contending that the writ was premature.

Taking note of the petitioner's apprehension that the preliminary notification might be finalised without granting him an opportunity of hearing, the court disposed of the writ with a direction to the GHMC commissioner to consider the objections raised with reference to Rule 4, by affording an opportunity of hearing and to pass appropriate orders, in accordance with law. It made no order as to costs and closed all pending miscellaneous petitions connected with the case.

Gig workers' union calls for end to porter drivers' woes

THE Telangana Gig and Platform Workers Union (TGPWU) raised serious concerns over the deteriorating working conditions of Porter drivers. Despite repeated complaints, Porter management has failed to address critical issues, pushing drivers into severe financial distress, mental stress, and job insecurity. TGPWU has submitted a formal representation to the Commissioner of Labour and Additional Commissioner of Labour, Government of Telangana, demanding urgent intervention and accountability from Porter management. TGPWU has formally requested a meeting within the next seven days with Porter management and concerned government officials to resolve these issues.

"Porter's growth and profits are built on the hard work of drivers. The current system is pushing drivers into debt and insecurity. This exploitation cannot continue," said Shaik Salauddin, Founder President, TGPWU. The union demands the resolution of key issues, including Fair and Transparent Pricing. TGPWU demands restoration of fair base fares and per-kilometre rates aligned with rising fuel, vehicle maintenance, and living costs; pricing policies must be transparent, with no sudden unilateral changes. They also demand Mandatory Cancellation Charges for Drivers, as frequent customer cancellations waste drivers' time and fuel; cancellation charges must be credited directly to drivers without exceptions, and repeat offenders should face penalties. Furthermore, they demand an

End to Arbitrary Account Blocking and Penalties, as drivers' accounts are being suspended without due process; a transparent grievance redress mechanism must be established, ensuring notice, evidence disclosure, and an opportunity for drivers to respond before any action is taken.

The union demands Fuel Cost Adjustment and Toll Reimbursement, including the introduction of a Fuel Cost Adjustment (FCA), as practised by other logistics platforms, and immediate in-app



reimbursement of toll charges. Additionally, the union seeks proper Waiting Time Charges, Driver Safety and Customer Verification, No Forced Trip Acceptance and Unfair Ratings, and Stakeholder Consultation and Policy Transparency. As part of its ongoing struggle, TGPWU has also raised these concerns during the Praja Palana programme, submitting representations to G Chinnna Reddy, Vice-Chairman, State Planning Board, and Divya Devarajan, Nodal Officer. TGPWU warns that if immediate corrective steps are not taken, the union will be compelled to intensify protests across Telangana in defence of Porter drivers' rights, livelihoods, and dignity, said Salauddin.

Lawyers protest after unhygienic food found at HC canteen

THE HC Advocates' Association canteen came under serious scrutiny following repeated complaints of unhygienic food, triggering strong protest and outrage among lawyers on Tuesday.

The issue escalated after advocates reportedly found cockroaches and other objects, including safety pins and stapler pins, in the food served at the canteen, raising grave concerns over food safety and health risks.

According to advocates, the quality of food at the canteen had been substandard for some time, but the frequent discovery of contaminants led to an immediate and spontaneous reaction from the legal fraternity. Following the latest incident, lawyers informed the HC Bar Association, seeking urgent intervention.

Acting swiftly, members of the Bar Association's executive committee visited the canteen during the lunch hour. Many advocates accompanied the inspection team, which included associate president Anumula Jagan, secretaries Khaja Vizarath Ali and Indrasena Reddy and senior advocate Chikkudu Prabhakar, Mohd. Habeeb Ali Khan, Mohd Azhar and P Shankar. The team inspected the kitchen and food preparation amid mounting anger among advocates present.

Speaking after the inspection, Jagan confirmed that the complaints were found to be genuine. He stated that the association had received information that prepared food items contained cockroaches and other extraneous objects; the inspection was carried out immediately after advocates raised the issue.

The association formally brought the issue to the notice of contractor Venkat Rao and issued a stern warning. The contractor was directed to take immediate and comprehensive steps to ensure strict hygienic conditions within two days. The association said failure to comply with the directive would result in termination of the canteen contract and allotment of the facility to new contractors.



The association reiterated it would not compromise on the health and safety of advocates. It assured members of strict action to ensure hygienic food standards at the canteen.

Young India the driving force of nation-building, says Kishan Reddy

UNION Minister G Kishan Reddy emphasised the pivotal role of India's youth in national development, outlining a series of initiatives launched under the leadership of Prime Minister Narendra Modi to empower young people and strengthen the country's sports ecosystem.

Addressing the media on Tuesday, in the national capital, the Minister noted that India has the world's largest youth population, and the Central Government has introduced multiple schemes to involve them in shaping the nation's future. From school-level fitness programmes to preparing athletes for the Olympic Games, the government is working to nurture talent and instil fitness habits among the younger generation.

He highlighted the Fit India Movement, which has seen over five lakh schools



register, with Fit India Week celebrated in 3.57 lakh schools. The initiative also extends to society at large, with the 'Sunday on Cycle' programme witnessing participation from 15.84 lakh people across 1.4 lakh locations. Prime Minister Modi himself praised the programme in his 128th Mann Ki Baat address.

Kishan Reddy underscored the government's efforts to promote traditional sports through the Khelo India programme, now active in 792 districts. Rural athletes are being identified and trained under the Athlete Development Programme, which provides an eight-year structured training plan with financial support of Rs 6.28 lakh per athlete annually.

The minister also pointed to the Target Olympic Podium Scheme (TOPS), introduced in 2014, which has boosted India's medal tally in global competitions. He recalled Neeraj Chopra's historic medal at the 2020 Tokyo Olympics and India's impressive haul of 29 medals at the 2024 Paris Paralympic Games. He added that preparations are underway for India's ambitious bid to host the Olympic Games in 2036.

On infrastructure, Kishan Reddy said that since 2014,

the government has undertaken 350 projects with an investment of Rs 3,181 crore to strengthen sports facilities nationwide. He also mentioned the introduction of the National Sports Governance Act in 2025, aimed at ensuring transparency and accountability in sports administration.

The minister highlighted the new draft of the National Youth Policy, designed to develop youth as innovators and leaders, and the 'One Corporate One Sport' CSR model, which encourages private sector participation in nurturing talent.

He also referred to the launch of the Mera Yuva Bharat platform on National Unity Day, which has already registered 2.06 crore young people.

Through the National Service Scheme (NSS), nearly four million volunteers from 19,000 schools and 11,000 colleges are engaged in awareness and development activities across the country.

Kishan Reddy reiterated Prime Minister Modi's vision that national development can only be achieved by uplifting all sections of society—youth, farmers, women, and the poor—ensuring India's progress towards becoming a developed nation.

Telangana moves SC against AP's Polavaram-Nallamala link project

ALLEGES UNILATERAL DIVERSION OF GODAVARI FLOODWATERS

IN a fresh intensified water dispute between Telangana and Andhra Pradesh, the Telangana government filed a petition in the Supreme Court challenging the Polavaram-Nallamala Sagar Link Project (PNLP), formerly known as the Polavaram-Banakacherla Link Project (PBLP) on Tuesday.

The writ petition, filed under Article 32 of the Constitution, seeks a mandamus to restrain Andhra Pradesh from proceeding with the project, which aims to divert surplus floodwaters from the Godavari River to the Krishna and Gundlakamma basins.

The petition accuses Andhra Pradesh of unilaterally advancing the project in violation of the Godavari Water Disputes Tribunal (GWDT) Award of 1980, the



Andhra Pradesh Reorganisation Act (APRA) of 2014, and Central Water Commission (CWC) guidelines.

It specifically requests an interim stay on ongoing expansion works of the Polavaram project's Right Main Canal (RMC) and a recent e-procurement tender for preparing the Detailed Project Report (DPR), floated on November 21 and modified on November 24.

The PNLP, estimated at

around Rs 58,000 crore, is designed to divert 2 TMC of water per day from the under-construction Polavaram dam on the Godavari.

The project comprises three segments: first, enhancing the capacity of the Polavaram RMC from 17,500 cusecs to over 35,000 cusecs or building a parallel canal to feed into the Krishna River; second, constructing the Bollapalli reservoir with a potential storage capacity

of up to 400 TMC; and third, lifting water through tunnels in the Nallamala hill range to the Nallamala Sagar reservoir in Prakasam district. It will benefit the Rayalaseema and south coastal regions in Andhra Pradesh.

Telangana contends that the project relies on "flood waters" not apportioned by the GWDT, which allocated dependable flows but left surplus waters undistributed.

The petition highlights that Andhra Pradesh has proceeded despite lacking in-principle clearance for the Pre-Feasibility Report (PFR), submitted to the CWC in May 2025 and still under scrutiny.

Key concerns raised include inter-state implications, potential submergence risks in Telangana due to Polavaram backwaters, and environmental violations.

The petition notes that the Expert Appraisal Commit-

tee (EAC) of the Ministry of Environment, Forest and Climate Change returned the proposal in June 2025, directing Andhra Pradesh to first resolve interstate issues with the CWC.

Objections have also come from Karnataka and Maharashtra, with the former claiming compensation for Krishna basin diversions and the latter seeking clarity on flood-based project guidelines.

Despite these, Andhra Pradesh formed a Special Purpose Vehicle, Jala Harathi Corporation, in April 2025 for execution and issued tenders for the DPR even as the PFR appraisal continues.

The CWC, in its letter on December 4, reportedly directed Andhra Pradesh not to proceed with DPR preparation without clearance, yet bids were received, and an award is imminent, according to the petition.

Govt orders vigilance probe into IDPL land encroachment

THE State Government has ordered a vigilance inquiry into the IDPL (Indian Drugs and Pharmaceuticals Limited) lands in Survey Number 376 in Kukatpally, Hyderabad.

Following political accu-

sations against each other by Telangana Jagruthi President K Kavitha and BRS MLA Madhavaram Krishna Rao on the alleged encroachment of lands worth Rs 4,000 crore, the government ordered the probe.

Kavitha made serious allegations that Krishna Rao had encroached upon the

lands and committed numerous irregularities and acts of corruption. Responding to this, the Telangana government decided to conduct a comprehensive inquiry into the allegations of encroachment of the valuable IDPL lands. The Telangana government has thus ordered an inquiry into the IDPL lands in Kukatpally, which are valued at Rs 4,000 crore.

The BRS Kukatpally MLA Krishna Rao welcomed the probe. He said that the inquiry would bring out the facts of who committed the irregularities and encroachments on the IDPL lands.



Domestic help theft cases cracked; gold, silver worth ₹31 lakh seized

THE Hyderabad city police have detected two theft cases and arrested three accused and recovered stolen gold and silver ornaments worth approximately Rs 31 lakh from their possession.

In the first case under Karkhana Police Station, police arrested Uragadda Madhavi (35), who works as a maid and her husband Uragadda Krishnaiah (40), a driver, both residents of Lakkapalli Village, Narayanpet district.

According to police, the complainant Gajawada Sridhar, a jewellery businessman, of Bowenpally, reported that gold ornaments and gold biscuits were missing from his house over a period of time. Based on suspicion, the maid servant working in his house and her husband were examined.

During the investigation,

it was revealed that they had committed repeated thefts of gold ornaments and gold biscuits and melted a portion of the stolen gold to prepare ornaments for their personal use.

On December 15, both accused were arrested. They confessed to the offence and led the police to the recovery of stolen gold ornaments and melted gold pieces weighing a total of 24.2 tolas, said S Rashmi Perumal, DCP North Zone.

Both the accused were arrested and produced before the court and remanded to judicial custody.

In another case under Bolaram Police Station, police arrested Jajala Sindhu Chinari of Kowdipally, Medak, Telangana. According to Bolaram police, on December 13, the complainant Yellu Sujatha reported that gold and silver ornaments kept in her almirah were missing.

She had employed a maid

servant Sindhu Jah in July 2025. Upon checking her valuables before travelling, she noticed that, valuable gold ornaments and silver articles were missing from her house.

Based on the complaint, a case was registered U/s 306 BNS, and during the course of investigation, the accused was examined, and the stolen ornaments were recovered.

One gold necklace weighing 5.1 tolas, another gold melted piece weighing two tolas and silver articles weighing 61 tolas were seized from the accused, said the DCP.

The Hyderabad City Police urge all citizens to remain vigilant by thoroughly verifying the background of domestic servants before employment, ensuring that valuables are kept securely locked at all times, and promptly reporting any suspicious activities to Dial-100 to help prevent thefts and ensure public safety.

Three held for Tolichowki murder, one still at large

his family members came to his house and alleged that his son, Adnan, had spread rumours about Bilal's wife.

G Chandra Mohan DCP, South West zone, said that Bilal, his brother-in-law Naveed, his wife Sana Begum, and his cousin sister Ruhi then went to an auto stand at Marwa Dental Hospital and inquired about Adnan.

Suspecting their intention, Irfan along with his two friends followed them and had arguments. Following the confrontation, Bilal stabbed Irfan on the chest with a knife. Soon after, Irfan's friends shifted him to Olive Hospital, where a duty doctor examined him and declared him dead.

On Tuesday, the accused persons Bilal, Sana, and Ruhi were arrested at Afsar Khan Colony, Golconda, Hyderabad, and were subsequently produced before the Honourable Court.

armed forces, noting that their dedication and patriotism form the backbone of

India's unity and strength.

Major General Ajay Misra reaffirmed the Indian Army's unwavering commitment to safeguarding national security and unity. He highlighted that Vijay Diwas is not only a day of remembrance but also a reaffirmation of the Army's pledge to protect the nation against all threats.

The ceremony included floral tributes, moments of silence, and interactions with veterans and families of the Bravehearts. The presence of families underscored the deep emotional connection between the armed forces and the citizens they protect. The commemoration served as a reminder of the valour displayed during the 1971 war, which led to the liberation of Bangladesh and stands as one of the most decisive victories in India's military history.

Employment guarantee scheme must be free from political interferences

Revamping welfare schemes is a good idea, so changes in the Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employment Guarantee Scheme, per se, are not objectionable. However, the way it is being done smacks of a desire to score political points. It begins with the name. The Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employment Guarantee Act (MGNREGA) is proposed to be replaced with the Viksit Bharat Guarantee for Rozgar and Ajeevika Mission (Grameen), or VB G RAM Priyanka Gandhi Vadra reacted with “Why are they removing Mahatma Gandhi’s name? He is considered the biggest Indian leader. Whenever such a name changes, a lot of expenditure happens in stationery and

paperwork.” More than that it makes the government a target for its detractors, which is increasingly coming under the influence of Gandhi haters. This does no good to the government under the Sangh Parivar, many of whose members have expressed admiration for Nathuram Godse. Enacted by the Congress-led United Progressive Alliance (UPA) government in 2005, the MGNREGA guarantees 100 days of work in villages. The Act has a provision for an unemployment allowance. “MGNREGA is bottom-up, people-centred, demand-driven, self-selecting and rights-based programme. It provides a legal guarantee for wage employment by providing allowances and compensation both in

cases of failure to provide work on demand and delays in payment of wages for work undertaken,” an official document says. The new Bill proposes several changes. It raises the 100-day guarantee to 125. Also, the scheme will no longer be demand-driven. Further, states will bear the financial burden partially. At present, the Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employment Guarantee Scheme is entirely a Centrally-sponsored scheme—that is, the Centre provides 100 per cent of wages, while states take care of a small part of the expenses in hiring skilled labour and arranging materials. Under G Ram G, the Centre’s contribution will be limited to 60 per cent, whereas most states will have to spend 40 per cent. For

Northeastern and Himalayan states, this ratio will be 90:10. The new legislation proposes that work under the revamped scheme will not be available during the peak agricultural season. The government will rely on biometrics and geo-tagging for transparency. Non-availability of work during the peak agricultural season will be vehemently protested by the Left and civil society organisations. Communist leaders are no longer as powerful or influential as they were when the MNREGA came into being but Left-leaning NGOs and public intellectuals are still a force to reckon with.

The government will have a tough time tackling their resistance. At any rate, this provision privileges the interests of farmers over labour-

ers; it will be interesting to see how the BJP will face the criticism of being anti-poor. Besides, states, especially those under non-BJP parties, will be loath to share the burden of the rural employment guarantee scheme.

There are also states like Kerala, West Bengal, Andhra Pradesh, and Punjab, which face tremendous fiscal challenges, and it will be extremely difficult for them to finance the revamped scheme. Therefore, all stakeholders must try to sort out the matter in a spirit of cooperative federalism. The Centre should be willing to accept reasonable amendments to the proposed legislation, and states should rise above party and parochial interests to make the scheme better.

Manekshaw was one of a kind

Name change or a game changer?

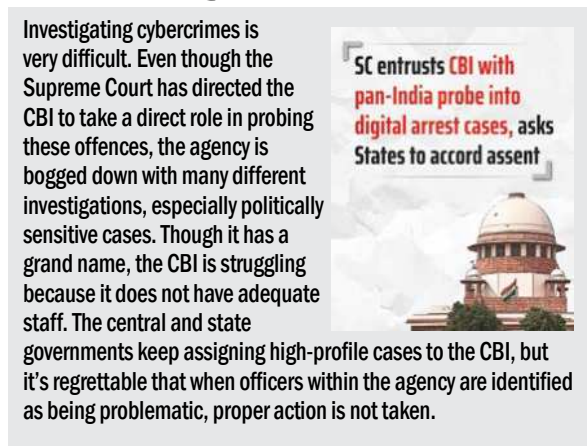
THE Supreme Court’s decision comes as a whiff of fresh air to the countless victims of cyber frauds. It is heartening that courts, when necessary, take responsible and appropriate decisions on key public issues — decisions that governments and police should be making — and even provide guidelines for their implementation. This is a wake-up call for those who uphold democracy and the separation of powers of the duty.

With “digital arrest scams” proliferating across the country, the Supreme Court’s directions to the Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI) for carrying out a comprehensive probe into such crimes and criminals — including seeking Interpol’s cooperation and tracing the origins — should be seen as a positive development in criminal justice prudence. The

Court also issued notices to the Reserve Bank of India (RBI), directing it to use artificial intelligence (AI) and machine learning to investigate deep-rooted patterns of funds being moved through various banks in these crimes, so that proper inquiries can be conducted and perpetrators cannot escape. Referring to the Information Technology (Intermediary Guidelines and Digital Media Ethics Code) Rules, 2021, the Supreme Court ordered online intermediaries to cooperate with the CBI and asked them to collect and hand over data and information related to digital arrests to investigative agencies.

The court suggested that states and Union Territories not only set up coordination centers to thoroughly investigate cybercrime but also adopt plans to proactively prevent such offenses. The apex court also directed that the cyber-crime coordination centres be linked with law enforcement agencies so that cybercrimes can be taken up for investigation.

A few days ago, under the leadership of Chief Justice Suryakant, the Supreme Court gave the CBI detailed guidelines on cybercrime—particularly digital arrests—sending a strong signal that tackling



these crimes is being treated as a high priority. The court identified three types of cyber scams. One involves online “digital arrests” where perpetrators, often targeting retired officers, pose as investigative agencies and extort their hard earned money and cause severe psychological distress. Although media reports show these offences are occurring across the country, they have not stopped and gullible people continue to fall prey. The Supreme Court specifically entrusted the CBI with the responsibility of apprehending those who run such scams and carrying out investigations.

Scammers are running another kind of cybercrime: luring victims with attractive-sounding investments, getting them to deposit large sums, and defrauding them under the guise of “advance tax” or other pretexts. Another widespread cyber-scam involves flooding WhatsApp with ads for supposed part-time jobs, using YouTube to offer “free tasks” for small payments to gain trust, then convincing victims to pay large amounts for “premium” tasks. Many people have encountered these scams. Victims often suffer in silence, not reporting to the police, and some become so distressed that they end their lives. The central government informed the Supreme Court in a note that cybercriminals have already swindled nearly Rs 30 billion. These fraudsters, posing as digital authorities, are extorting hard-earned

Saluting VNVK Sastry, a selfless supporter of adivasis

LITTLE boys and girls of a primary school in Nalgonda district once cried inconsolably when their beloved teacher, V N V K Sastry, was transferred. Refusing to accept the loss quietly, they walked nearly ten kilometres to the national highway and staged a protest until their voices were heard. Blessed indeed is the teacher who wins such young hearts.

That instinctive affection followed Dr Sastry wherever he went. A retired senior officer, social anthropologist, and lifelong fieldworker, he habitually won hearts through devotion to duty and an unshakeable concern for the people he served. Recalling their nearly five-decade-long association around 2020, senior journalist and former editor of The Hindu (Hyderabad), Dasu Keshav Rao, summed him up in simple terms: a man who never worked for files alone, but for people.

A full moon night in Srisaalam:

One incident narrated by Keshav Rao captures the essence of Dr Sastry’s life. On a full-moon night in December 1988, when he was heading the Chenchu Project, they were in the core area of the Srisaalam Tiger Sanctuary, where they were treated to welcome festivities that were organised by the Chenchu community. Earlier that day, they had visited

an ashram school where conditions were appalling. The warden was absent, as usual; children were being served rotten rice and tamarind water in the name of sambar. The fine rice meant for the children never reached the school.

Dr Sastry suspended the absentee warden on the spot and immediately arranged a proper meal—rice, curries, sambar and milk—something the children rarely got to toast. The following morning, as they were driving away, a group of men suddenly intercepted their vehicle, running and panting from a distant hamlet located beyond a hill.

Alarmed, they asked if something was wrong.

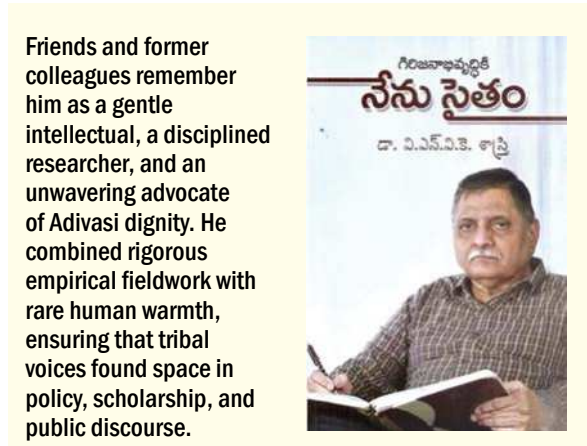
“Pani emi ledu saar. Meeru maa penta vachaaru. Memu adiviki poyaamu. Choodaadaniki vachaamu. Anthe saar.”

Nothing was wrong, they explained. They had only come to see and thank the officer who had visited their village.

A life dedicated to adivasi communities:

The humble friend of adivasis he passed away in the early hours of December 8, at the age of 78. His demise marks the end of a remarkable five-decade journey that was dedicated to understanding, documenting, and empowering adivasi communities in Telangana and Andhra Pradesh.

A Ph.D. in Social Anthropology from Andhra University (1980), he spent 52 years in research, fieldwork, institutional building, and training. He emerged as one of South India’s most respected scholars of tribal societies. He authored ten major books and over a hundred research papers and articles in English and Telugu, covering tribal women, forest rights, cultural change, development models, and the everyday lives of remote communi-



ties. Reflecting on the physical price of such commitment, he once remarked with characteristic humour:

“I earned malaria as a recurring deposit and amoebiasis as a fixed deposit—no regrets.”

Asked what “VNVK” stood for, he smiled and said, “I don’t know—perhaps Very Nice, Very Kind.”

20 years of service post-retirement:

Joining government service in the early 1970s, Dr Sastry served for 34 years in the Tribal Welfare Department of the Government of Andhra Pradesh, retiring in 2005 as Director of Tribal Cultural Research and Training Institute (TCR&TI), Hyderabad.

His postings took him deep into the tribal belts of Warangal, Adilabad, Kurnool, and the erstwhile Khammam district, where he implemented complex welfare, education, forest rights, and rehabilitation programmes.

He held key positions across ITDAs, TCR&TI, TWREIS, and EPTRI Hyderabad.

Colleagues remember him as a deeply field-oriented officer whose work consistently placed tribal communities—not bureaucratic convenience—at the centre of administration.

lives of tribal communities. Equally vivid are memories of Prof Christoph von Fürer-Haimendorf’s visit to Marlawai to perform the last rites of his wife, Betty, and the vibrant Kelsapur Jatra.

Indervelli killings:

Three officers from Hyderabad were among the first to reach Indervelli, where police had opened fire on protesting Gonds the previous evening, killing many and injuring several others. The administration was dazed and uncertain about the actual casualty figures. The three officers trekked through forests and hill-top habitations, braving scorching summer heat and humidity, to meet the injured and the families of the deceased.

Later, when the Collector, AK Goel, informed forest officials at Mancherla that the Indervelli toll was far higher than the officially stated figure—he did mention the actual number to Keshav Rao—it became clear how deeply the truth had been suppressed.

A pioneering anthropologist

Dr Sastry’s scholarliness traversed anthropology, ecology, tribal history, and literature. His works, published in academic journals and government reports, and available on public platforms, remain foundational texts for students, administrators, and young researchers.

His notable publications are: Andhra Pradesh Tribal Women and Children – An Overview, Changing Patterns in Tribal Societies, Komaram Bheem (Telugu), Sanchara Sravanthi (Telugu), Reports for the Ministry of Tribal Affairs, and Training manuals and textbooks, including contributions to undergraduate curricula

GITAM University seeks HC stay on Rs 118-cr TGPDCCL dues

Court summons SE

THE Telangana High Court on Tuesday came down heavily on the Southern Power Distribution Company Ltd (TGPDCCL) for its prolonged inaction in recovering massive electricity arrears from the GITAM Institute of Technology and Management (GITAM) University, Sangareddy, which has defaulted on payment of dues of Rs.118.13 crores accumulated over nearly two decades.

Hearing a writ filed by the university seeking a stay on the demand notice issued by TGPDCCL in September 2025, the single bench of Justice Nagesh Bheemapaka expressed strong dismay and concern over the "lethargic and inexplicable attitude" of officials in allowing such a huge default to persist without taking coercive action.

The court noted that, as

per established practice, electricity connections of ordinary consumers are disconnected if payments are delayed even by a month. In stark contrast, the university allegedly failed to clear dues since 2008-09, with arrears continuing to pile up for almost 20 years. Questioning the apparent preferential treatment extended to the institution, the court observed that it was necessary to ascertain why stringent action, including disconnection of supply, had not been initiated against the university, despite its long-standing default.

Taking serious note of the issue, Justice Bheemapaka directed the SE of TGPDCCL, to appear before the court on December 22. He has been asked to explain reasons for permitting the continued power supply despite non-payment of substantial

dues; to clarify why power should not be disconnected and action initiated in accordance with law.

N Sreedhar Reddy, counsel for TGPDCCL, informed the court that the university had consistently evaded payment of bills by resorting to repeated litigation. He pointed out that the university had filed a similar writ in 2020 challenging demand notices issued in September, obtained an interim stay; subsequently withdrew the petition without settling the dues. The present case, he submitted, amounted to a second round of litigation aimed at delaying payment once again. After hearing the submissions, the court adjourned the case to December 22 for consideration, directing the presence of the concerned senior official to ensure accountability in handling of the dues.

G RAM G Bill introduced in LS amid Oppn uproar

Opposition members strongly opposed the proposed legislation at the introduction stage and pressed for sending the Bill to a Parliamentary panel for greater scrutiny. The MPs, including Priyanka Gandhi of the Congress, strongly objected to the "removal" of Mahatma Gandhi's name.

Opposing the Bill at the introduction stage, T R Baalu of DMK said Mahatma Gandhi lived in villages and worked for the welfare of the poor there. He said then prime minister Manmohan Singh brought the "noble bill" (MNREGA), which helped the poorest of the poor get 100 days of employment. The Father of the Nation is being "ridiculed" by the present government, he charged.

Priyanka Gandhi Vadra registered her "strong objection" to the draft law, saying MNREGA was a revolutionary Act which was supported by all members of the House when it was passed. "Under

this, the poorest of the poor get 100 days of employment. This (present) Bill is weakening the employment rights of the poor. It is against the Constitution," she claimed. The MP from Kerala's Wayanad said the MGNREG Act has ensured the Centre provides 90 per cent of the funds for the works undertaken under the law. "It will be reduced to 60 per cent now. This will hit the finances of the state governments, especially those waiting for GST compensation, she pointed out.

"Under this bill, the Centre's control over the scheme will increase, but its responsibility will come down." Responding to certain remarks by some ruling party MPs, Priyanka said Mahatma Gandhi was not from her family, but he was from every family in the country. She proposed sending the Bill to a Parliamentary panel.

Congress' Shashi Tharoor took a sharp dig

at the government while opposing the VB-G RAM G Bill, recalling the 1971 hit Bollywood number -- "Dekho o deewano (tum) ye kaam na karo, Ram ka naam badnaam na karo (don't sully Lord Ram's name)". Tharoor asserted that the Bill is not merely an administrative tweak but an "assault on the very spirit and philosophical foundation of this crucial programme".

The Opposition members also came to the Well of the House, holding up photographs of Mahatma Gandhi, expressing their disapproval of the "removal" of the name of the Father of the Nation.

According to a copy of the Bill, it will provide a statutory guarantee of 125 days of wage employment in a financial year to every rural household whose adult members volunteer to undertake unskilled manual work. Within six months from the date of commencement of the VB-G RAM G Act,

states will have to make a scheme consistent with the provisions of the new law.

In a statement, the Rural Development Ministry said the proposed legislation will establish a modern statutory framework aligned with the goal of 'Viksit Bharat 2047'. It said the Bill aims to create both employment and durable rural infrastructure through four priority verticals -- water security through water-related works, core rural infrastructure, livelihood-related infrastructure, and special works to mitigate extreme weather events.

All assets created are aggregated into the Viksit Bharat National Rural Infrastructure Stack, ensuring a unified, coordinated national development strategy, the statement said. The ministry termed it a "major upgrade" over MGNREGA, fixing structural weaknesses while enhancing employment, transparency, planning, and accountability.

Trump sues BBC for \$10bn

But the publicly funded BBC rejected claims it had defamed him, after Trump threatened legal action.

BBC chairman Samir Shah had called it an "error of judgment," which triggered the resignations of the BBC's top executive and its head of news. The speech took place before some of Trump's support-

ers stormed the US Capitol as Congress was poised to certify President-elect Joe Biden's victory in the 2020 election that Trump falsely alleged was stolen from him.

The BBC had broadcast the hourlong documentary -- titled "Trump: A Second Chance?" -- days before the 2024 US presidential election. It spliced together

three quotes from two sections of the 2021 speech, delivered almost an hour apart, into what appeared to be one quote in which Trump urged supporters to march with him and "fight like hell." Among the parts cut out was a section where Trump said he wanted supporters to demonstrate peacefully.

Approximately 2.70 lakh students will directly get admission and avail quality education through these 105 schools. Each such school will serve as educational hubs for the nearby government schools, indirectly benefiting lakhs of students.

The Chief Minister briefed the Union Minister that construction of 105 such schools, equipped with state-of-the-art facilities, labs, and stadiums, would require Rs 21,000 crore. Another Rs 9,000 crore would be spent on providing modern labs and other infrastructure in junior, degree and technical colleges, apart from other higher education institutions in the state. Around Rs 30,000 crore are required for a comprehensive development of the education sector, he explained. In view of the huge requirement of funds, Revanth Reddy said that Centre's support was the need of the hour as it would help strengthen the state's education sector.

Later, Nirmala Sitharaman praised the initiatives being undertaken by the Telangana government in developing the education sector, particularly the establishment of YIIRS.

The Union Minister urged the Chief Minister to provide SPV details to her.

58 LAKH NAMES DELETED IN WEST BENGAL DRAFT SIR

NEW DELHI

IN a development likely to raise a political storm in poll-bound West Bengal, a total of 58 lakh names have been deleted from the state's draft voter list after the Special Intensive Revision (SIR) to weed out duplication and errors.

Out of these 58 lakh names, 24 lakh have been marked as "dead", 19 lakh as "relocated", 12 lakh as "missing", and 1.3 lakh as "duplicate".

The publication of the draft list marks the end of the first phase of the Special Intensive Revision. Those whose names have been incorrectly excluded from the draft list can now raise objections and request corrections.

After addressing these objections, the final list will be published in February next year. The announcement of the Assembly polls in Bengal

is expected after the publication of the final list. SIR was last conducted in Bengal in 2002.

Trinamool MP Saugata Roy termed the deletion of 58 lakh names "injustice". "This is the BJP's conspiracy to remove legitimate voters from Bengal's list. We have set up voter assistance booths and we will help them submit forms to include their names in the

voter list," he said.

The publication of the draft list is likely to intensify the political uproar in Bengal over SIR.

Chief Minister and Trinamool Congress chief Mamata Banerjee has opposed the exercise and accused the Centre and the Election Commission of using SIR to delete the names of lakhs of eligible voters ahead of the election.

NEW DELHI

THE row over the renaming of MNREGA has highlighted the Centre's new practice of naming Bills in Hindi, deviating from the tradition of providing a Hindi and an English name for each Bill.

A slew of Bills in recent months have come with just Hindi names -- packing in an acronym -- which many have claimed is another attempt at homogenization through language.

The practice has resonated especially in the south, where leaders have equated it with another attempt at Hindi imposition.

The Congress is already seeing red over naming MNREGA -- a homage to Mahatma Gandhi -- after Lord Ram. While the BJP is jeering that it is another evidence of the party's aversion to Hindu religion and ethos, the use of Hindi names appears to be about to widen the north-south divide.

Many MPs and political leaders, meanwhile, have contended that the names in

Hindi are difficult to understand.

On Monday, as Union Education Minister Dharmendra Pradhan presented the Viksit Bharat Shiksha Adhishthan Bill in the Lok Sabha, RSP(A) leader NK Premachandran said it was difficult for him to pronounce the name. He contended that this practice of using Hindi names violates Article 348(B) of the Constitution, which says new laws should have names in English.

Congress member Jothimani and DMK member T M Selvaganapathi also made their reservations clear. "I see this as an imposition of Hindi. Already, Tamil Nadu has been deprived of SSA funds just because we have opposed the three-language policy in the National Education Policy-2020," Jothimani said.

DMK leader T R Baalu also spoke against "imposition" of Hindi on southern states.

Congress's P Chidambaram said the change "is an affront to non-Hindi speaking

Hindi names so far

THE G Ram G -- which could replace the MNREGA, stands for Viksit Bharat Guarantee for Employment and Livelihood Mission (Rural) Bill.

A Bill for reforms in higher education is called Viksit Bharat Shiksha Adhishthan Bill.

There is also Sabka Bima, Sabki Raksha Bill to amend insurance laws.

A Bill for allowing the entry of private sector into the field of atomic energy flips the system -- an English name that produces a Hindi

acronym. The "Sustainable Harnessing and Advancement of Nuclear Energy for Transforming India" has the short name of SHANTI, meaning peace.

Earlier, the laws that replaced the Indian Penal Code, the Code of Criminal Procedure and the Indian Evidence Act were called Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita, Bharatiya Nagarik Suraksha Sanhita, and Bharatiya Sakshya Bill.

The Bhartiya Vayuyan Vidheyak law has replaced the Aircraft Act of 1934.

In a post on X, he said so far, the practice was to "write the title of the Bill in English words in the Hindi version and in Hindi words in the Hindi version of the Bill. When no one pointed out any difficulty in the 75-year practice, why should (the) government make a change?" What the Constitution says

Article 348(1)(b) of the Constitution says until Parliament decides otherwise, texts of all Bills, Acts, Ordinances, orders, rules, regulations, and by-laws at the Central and state levels, as well as all proceedings in the Supreme Court and High Courts, must be in English.

The English version should prevail in case of conflict with any other translation.

Rupee falls 23 paise to settle at fresh record low of 91.01/\$

The rupee has fallen from 90 a dollar to 91 in the last 10 trading sessions

MUMBAI

THE rupee fell 23 paise against the greenback to settle at a new all-time low of 91.01 (provisional) on Tuesday, as the government in the Rajya Sabha attributed the sliding value of domestic currency to widening trade deficit and the ongoing developments related to the India-US trade agreement.

During the session, the local unit lost 36 paise from its previous close against the greenback to hit its lowest-ever level of 91.14, but regained some ground later in the day. Even a weaker greenback and a sharp decline in global crude oil prices could not prevent the slide in the local unit, forex traders said.

The rupee has fallen from 90 a dollar to 91 in the last 10 trading sessions. The unit has slipped 1 per cent against the greenback in the past five sessions alone.

The issue was brought up in the Rajya Sabha on Tuesday, and Minister of State for Finance Pankaj Chaudhary said, "During the current



financial year, the depreciation of the Rupee has been influenced by the increase in trade deficit and likely prospects arising from the ongoing developments in India's trade agreement with the US, amid relatively weak support from the capital account."

"The depreciation of currency is likely to enhance export competitiveness, which in turn impacts the economy positively. On the other hand, depreciation may raise the prices of imported goods. However, the overall impact of exchange rate depreciation on domestic prices depends on the extent of the pass-through of international

commodity prices to the domestic market," he said.

Citing data, Chaudhary said that this year the rupee opened at 90.87 against the greenback and traded in the range of 90.76 to 91.14 before settling at 91.01 (provisional), down 23 paise from its previous close.

On Monday, the local unit settled at 90.78 against the US dollar, registering a loss of 29 paise from its previous close. "Rupee made a new lifetime low as dollar buying continued with news that (US President) Donald Trump has not agreed to the new trade proposals from India.

"The value of the INR is market-determined, with no target or specific level or band. The Reserve Bank of India (RBI) regularly monitors the foreign exchange market and intervenes in situations of excess volatility. Further, the RBI monitors key developments across the globe which may have an impact on USD-rupee exchange rate," the minister said.

According to forex traders, the rupee might even cross the 92 per dollar-mark this month. At the interbank foreign exchange, the rupee opened at 90.87 against the greenback and traded in the range of 90.76 to 91.14 before settling at 91.01 (provisional), down 23 paise from its previous close.

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Gold snaps 4-day record rally, drops ₹1,700

NEW DELHI: Snapping the four-day record rally, gold prices declined by Rs 1,700 to Rs 1,35,900 per 10 grams in the national capital on Tuesday as investors booked profits amid weak global cues, according to the All India Sarafa Association.

The precious metal of 99.9 per cent purity had surged by Rs 4,000 to touch an all-time high of Rs 1,37,600 per 10 grams on Monday. The metal rose by Rs 6,000 over the previous four days, trading at record highs. "Gold prices witnessed profit booking and remained volatile, with the yellow metal slipping towards the \$ 4,275 level in global markets and staying under pressure," Jateen Trivedi, VP Research Analyst - Commodity and Currency, LKP Securities, said. Echoing sentiments, Dilip Parmar, Research Analyst, HDFC Securities, said, "Domestic gold prices also softened, curtailing a four-day advance. These losses were, however, notably mitigated by the persistent weakness in the Indian Rupee which quoted at a record low level".

In the local bullion markets, silver prices also depreciated by Rs 1,000 to Rs 1,98,500 per kilogram (inclusive of all taxes).

Better regulatory oversight, ease of compliance via reforms: FM

Says FDI limit in insurance sector was increased from 26% to 49% in 2015, 74% in 2021 and now to 100%

NEW DELHI: FINANCE Minister Nirmala Sitharaman on Tuesday said the insurance reforms brought in through a bill in Parliament will grant greater access to insurance for the people, have better regulatory oversight and ensure ease of compliance. Moving the "The Sabka Bima Sabki Raksha (Amendment of Insurance Laws) Bill, 2025" for consideration of the Lok Sabha, Sitharaman said the draft legislation was aimed at bringing transparency, ease of compliance mandates and increasing foreign direct investment (FDI) in the sector.

The minister said that the FDI limit in the insurance sector was increased from 26 per cent to 49 per cent in 2015, 74 per cent in 2021 and now proposed to 100 per cent.

"These have brought in a greater push for the insurance sector. The number of insurers has risen from 53 in 2014 to 74 now," Sitharaman said. She said insurance penetration has improved from 3.3 per cent in 2014-15 to 3.8 per cent now and insurance density or the average insurance premium paid per



person in a year has jumped from \$55 in 2014 to \$97 now.

The minister said the total insurance premium paid has risen from Rs 4.15 lakh crore in 2014-15 to Rs 11.93 lakh crore and assets under management increased from Rs 24.2 lakh crore to Rs 74.4 lakh crore. "We are now looking for greater penetration, better regulatory oversight, easier compliance and more FDI," Sitharaman said. The minister said over the year, an ecosystem has developed in the country for providing greater access for people to insurance.

Sitharaman said that various government schemes such as the PM Fasal Bima Yojana and the Jana Arogya Yojana have brought poor people under the insurance umbrella, a move that has helped immensely during the Covid pandemic.

GDP growth set to accelerate to 7.5% in FY27: Report

MUMBAI

INDIA'S economic growth is expected to pick up pace and remain strong in the coming years, with GDP likely to expand at 7.5 per cent in FY27, even as inflation stays under control, according to Axis Bank's Economic Outlook 2026 on Tuesday.

The report, authored by Neelkanth Mishra, Chief Economist at Axis Bank and Head of Global Research at Axis Capital, says India can grow faster than its long-term trend without triggering inflationary pressures.

This is because the economy still has enough unused capacity, or slack, which allows growth to rise smoothly. Axis Bank expects India to grow faster than most global peers and even above market expectations, making it the world's fastest-growing large economy.

The strong outlook is supported by easing pressure from government finances, lower borrowing costs, and supportive monetary policy.

The report also highlights that ongoing structural reforms and regulatory easing will help sustain growth over



the medium term.

A key driver of this growth will be a fresh rise in investment activity. With company balance sheets in better shape, the cost of capital remaining low, and factories running at high capacity, businesses are likely to increase capital expenditure in FY27. This new investment cycle is expected to further strengthen economic momentum.

The bank's economists also see steady gains in productivity and a revival in capital formation, which together support a long-term trend growth rate of around 7 per cent.

Even with growth moving above this trend, inflation is expected to remain well behaved.

Axis Bank forecasts headline inflation at around 4 per cent in FY27. While food prices may see some rebound, underlying price pressures remain muted.

Established in 1984 at Lalkuan (Nainital, Uttarakhand), pulp and paper undertaking Century Pulp and Paper (CPP) of ABREL is a well-established player in the Indian paper industry with an installed capacity of 4.8 lakh metric tonnes per annum. In March, ABREL said, "The transfer of the business will be for a lump-sum cash consideration of Rs 3,498 crore, to be paid by ITC to ABREL."

India's long-term outlook remains positive, indices to remain near all-time high in 2025

Valuations are stretched across large parts of the market, smaller stocks are under pressure, and investors are becoming increasingly selective about where they deploy capital

NEW DELHI: India's long-term outlook remains firmly positive, underpinned by favourable demographics, policy continuity, rapid urbanisation and sustained productivity gains, a report said on Tuesday. As 2025 draws to a close, Indian equity markets are sending mixed signals. Benchmark indices remain close to record highs, but beneath the surface, the picture is far more nuanced.

Smallcase Managers, in its report, said that valuations are stretched across large parts of the market, smaller stocks are under pressure, and investors are becoming increasingly selective about where they deploy capital. The managers noted that as US growth moderates and the Federal Reserve eventually pivots, interest-rate differentials should increasingly favour Emerging Markets, with India standing out as the most attractive destination.

Dhiren Shah, smallcase manager, Co-Founder, Kamayakya, said: "We re-



main bullish on Indian equities in 2026, with a clear focus on stock selection rather than index levels. While public capex has driven growth so far, the next phase will come from a revival in private capex as corporate balance sheets strengthen and capacity utilisation rises, setting up the next leg of India's structural growth."

India's macro backdrop remains constructive, aided by moderating inflation, the beginning of a rate-cut cycle and continued policy focus on manufacturing, infrastructure and exports. The report expects the economy to

grow at a steady 6-7 per cent in real terms, with inflation anchored closer to 4 per cent, implying a phase of more stable, though slightly lower, nominal growth compared to the previous decade.

"Tariff-related noise from the US, particularly around a potential Trump return, is more of a sentiment and liquidity risk for India than a structural one. It can tighten global liquidity, lift volatility and lead to temporary FII outflows, but it does not change India's core growth story," said Vivek Sharma, smallcase manager, Investment Head, Estee Advisors.

Markets remain in red amid weak cues

MUMBAI: Benchmark Sensex tumbled 533.50 points and the broader Nifty declined to the 25,860 level on Tuesday as persistent foreign fund outflows, a weak rupee and sluggish global market trends dented investor sentiment.

The 30-share BSE Sensex tanked 533.50 points or 0.63 per cent to settle at 84,679.86. During the day, it dived 592.75 points or 0.69 per cent to 84,620.61. The 50-share NSE Nifty dropped 167.20 points or 0.64 per cent to a week's low of 25,860.10.

Among Sensex firms, Axis Bank tanked the most by 5.03 per cent. Eternal, HCL Tech, Bajaj Finserv, Tata Steel, UltraTech Cement and Bajaj Finance were also among the laggards. However, Titan, Bharti Airtel, Mahindra & Mahindra and Asian Paints were among the gainers.

"Continued INR weakness to fresh record lows, driven by persistent FII outflows and subdued global sentiments, dragged domestic markets into negative territory," Vinod Nair, Head of Research, Geojit Investments

Limited, said.

The rupee breached the record low level of 91 against the US dollar and hit 91.14 in intra-day trade due to foreign fund outflows on Tuesday. The BSE midcap gauge dropped 0.78 per cent, and the smallcap index dipped 0.69 per cent. Among sectoral indices, realty tanked 1.36 per cent, followed by bankex (1.03 per cent), commodities (0.91 per cent), IT (0.90 per cent), BSE Focused IT (0.86 per cent), financial services (0.83 per cent) and metal (0.82 per cent). Telecommu-

nication and consumer durables were the only gainers. A total of 2,519 stocks declined while 1,651 advanced and 158 remained unchanged on the BSE.

"A risk-averse mood dominated trading as the rupee's breach of the 91 level against the US dollar raised macro concerns, while weakness across Asian markets added to global uncertainty. This combination prompted investors to reduce risk, triggering broad-based profit-booking, particularly across realty, financial services, metal and IT names," Ponmudi R, CEO of Enrich Money, an online trading and wealth tech firm, said.

Foreign Institutional Investors (FIIs) offloaded equities worth Rs 1,468.32 crore on Monday, while domestic institutional investors (DII's) bought stocks worth Rs 1,792.25 crore, according to exchange data. 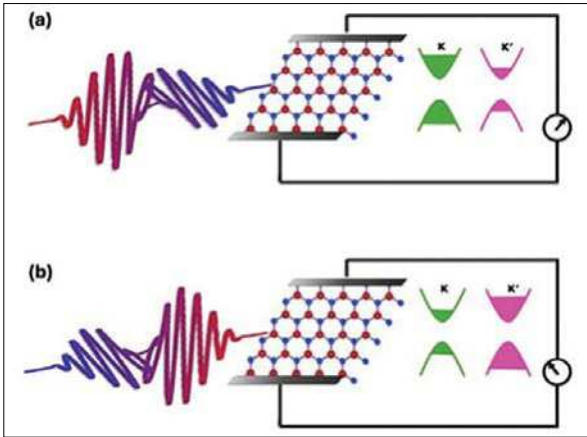
Single light pulse can control quantum states in 2D materials: IIT Bombay

Scientists at the Indian Institute of Technology (IIT) Bombay announced that they have discovered a simple new way to use light to control quantum states inside ultra-thin materials, a breakthrough that could lead to computers that are far faster and more energy-efficient than today’s electronic devices.

The research focuses on two-dimensional semiconductors, materials that are only one atom thick and thousands of times thinner than a human hair. Inside these materials, electrons can exist in two distinct quantum states known as valleys, labelled K and K’.

These two states can be compared to the 0 and 1 used in digital computing, forming the basis of a growing research area called valleytronics.

Until now, controlling these valley states has been



difficult. Earlier techniques required complex laser setups using circularly polarised light and multiple laser pulses, and even then, the control was often incomplete or hard to measure.

As a result, reliable and reversible switching between the two valley states remained a major challenge.

The IIT Bombay team has now shown that this com-

plex setup is not necessary. In a study published in the journal ‘Advanced Optical Materials’, the researchers demonstrated that a single linearly polarised laser pulse can both control and read the valley state of electrons.

The key lies in introducing a small, controlled skew in the laser pulse’s polarisation.

According to Prof. Gopal Dixit from IIT Bombay, this

slight asymmetry in the laser pulse is enough to push electrons into either the K or K’ valley.

By reversing the skew in the pulse, the electrons can be switched back to the other valley. This makes the process fully reversible, with the two valley states effectively acting as quantum versions of 0 and 1.

What makes the discovery even more significant is that the same laser pulse also generates a tiny electric current.

This current acts as a built-in signal that reveals which valley state the electrons have moved into. In simple terms, the system can be controlled and read at the same time, without the need for extra lasers or measuring devices.

The researchers also found that the method works across a wide range of laser wavelengths and does not need to be finely tuned to the material’s energy levels.

India maul Malaysia by 315 runs

Abhigyan Kundo's historic unbeaten double ton and Deepesh Devendran's 5/22 set up massive win

DUBAI

ABHIGYAN Kundo's record 209 not out and an excellent return of 5/22 from Deepesh Devendran set up a massive 315-run victory for India against Malaysia in their U-19 Asia Cup match here on Tuesday.

India's margin of win is now their second biggest in terms of runs in Youth ODIs, after a 326-run triumph over Uganda in 2022.

Kundo etched his name in record books with a first-ever double century for any Indian in Youth ODIs, scoring his runs off 125 balls with 17 fours and nine sixes to fire India to a mammoth 408 for seven.

In reply, right-arm medium pacer Devendran ran through the Malaysian middle-order after Kishan Singh and Udhav Mohan struck once each to rock the opposition, and despite a late resistance from Hamzah Panggi (35), Malaysia were bowled out for 93 in 32.1 overs.

It was a perfect outing for the Indian colts who put together a robust batting show, in which the tone was set by Vaibhav Sooryavanshi who notched up a quickfire 50 off 26 balls (5 fours and 3 sixes). While Sooryavanshi could not convert his start into another big score, having scored 171 a few days ago against UAE, India were unperturbed even as they lost Vihaan Malhotra (7) and Ayush Mhatre (14) cheaply.

No 4. Vedant Trivedi teamed up with Kundo as the two added 209 runs for the fourth wicket to consolidate, in which the latter was the dominant of the two with his aggressive stroke play particularly on the leg side.

The 17-year-old Kundo's rotation of the strike was top notch as he collected 55 singles during his innings while hitting 17 fours and nine sixes in his superlative knock.

Kundo's double ton is also only the second instance of a batter at U-19 level crossing the 200-run mark, with South Africa's Jorich Van Schalkwyk's 215 against Zimbabwe earlier this year being the first.

The 18-year-old Trivedi looked set for a triple-figure score but ended up giving a return catch to Jaashwin Krishnamurthy, walking back for 90 of 106 balls (7 fours). Kundo was the aggressor in his 87-run stand for the fifth wicket with Kanishk Chouhan while he brought up his double hundred.

Asian Youth Para Games: Indian shuttlers win 8 gold

INDIAN youngsters delivered a remarkable performance at the Dubai 2025 Asian Youth Para Games, winning 8 gold medals in the Para badminton events. The Indian team proved to be a formidable force, securing an impressive 17 medals – 8 gold, 3 silver, and 6 bronze.

At the core of India's success was Jatin Azad, whose composed and confident performances defined the team's spirit. Azad achieved double gold in the SU5 category; first capturing the men's singles title before returning to the court with Shivam Yadav to win gold in men's doubles. Their partnership, founded on trust and communication, remained strong under the pressure of finals day.

Speaking after his victories, Azad looked beyond Dubai with quiet determination, as he said, "I want to play in all championships, gain more experience and exposure. With more exposure, I will achieve more – and I know I will be selected for the LA28 Paralympics," he said.

India's successful streak was also driven by mental toughness. Harshit Choudhary, another gold medalist, emphasised the mindset that helped the team navigate the most challenging moments of the

IPL 2026 to be held from March 26 to May 31

MUMBAI: The 19th Indian Premier League will be held from March 26 to May 31 but it remains to be seen if defending champions Royal Challengers Bengaluru's home base gets a game after a deadly stampede halted all big-ticket cricket at the M Chinnaswamy Stadium. As per established norms, the Chinnaswamy should host the tournament opener given the home side, RCB, won the IPL 2025 title but that is unlikely to be clear till the time BCCI comes out with the full-scale schedule.

The venue was witness to chaos and a stampede, which left 11 dead, after RCB's trophy celebrations drew lakhs on the streets, that was well over the state machinery's capacity to handle at a short notice in June this year.

While the venue has received conditional clearance from the Karnataka government, it also needs to meet the necessary safety and security standards following the deaths.

TELANGANA swimmer Shivani Karra continued her impressive run at the 69th SGFi National Swimming Championship for Girls 2025–26, winning a silver medal in the U-14 girls' 100m backstroke on Day 5 at the Shyama Prasad Mukherjee Swimming Stadium here on Tuesday.

Shivani clocked 1:09.97 to finish second, narrowly behind CISCE's Shreya Binil, who took gold with a timing of 1:09.14. This silver marked Shivani's third medal of the championship, adding to her earlier gold in the 200m backstroke and silver in the 50m backstroke, underlining her dominance in backstroke events.

In another notable performance for Telangana, Sudhiksha Krishna secured the bronze



medal in the U-19 girls' 50m freestyle, clocking 28.24 seconds. Karnataka's Shalini R. Dixit won the gold with a timing of 27.75 seconds, while Shubhnoor Kaur of Chandigarh claimed silver in 28.01 seconds.

The championship is being held from December 12 to 17 in New Delhi.

Spotlight on SKY as India eye series win over SA

LUCKNOW: Shubman Gill's lean patch has been the talking point but an equally "out of runs" skipper Suryakumar Yadav is also under intense scrutiny as India look to find the right balance and seal the five-match series against South Africa in the fourth T20I here on Wednesday.

The third game was an ideal opportunity for Suryakumar to rediscover his touch while India chased a modest 118-run target, but the ease that once made him the top ranked batter in the world was noticeably missing.

Shots that defined his dominance have been producing erratic results and the match in Dharamsala was no different as he fell to his trademark pick-up stroke, highlighting a continued struggle.

But he was defiant when it



came to self-assessment. "The thing is, I've been batting beautifully in the nets. I'm trying everything that's in my control. When the runs have to come, they'll definitely come. I'm not out of form, but definitely out of runs," Suryakumar confidently said at the post-match presentation ceremony after India's win in Dharamsala on Sunday.

However, the numbers tell a worrying story. The Indian captain has been searching for fluency for over a year, averaging under 15 in the format this season. Additionally, he's still without a half-century in 2025, the longest such phase of his career.

Only twice during this period has he managed to bat beyond 20 balls.

Modi govt's illegality exposed: Cong on relief to Gandhis

NEW DELHI

THE Congress on Tuesday claimed the "illegality" of the Narendra Modi government and its "politically motivated prosecution stands fully exposed" after a court here refused to take cognisance of the Enforcement Directorate's National Herald money laundering case against Rahul Gandhi, Sonia Gandhi and others.

In a statement, Congress spokesperson Supriya Shrinate said the ED's proceedings against Congress leadership -- Sonia Gandhi and Rahul Gandhi -- in the case have been found to be "completely illegal and mala fide" by the court.

"The mala fide and illegality of the Modi government stands fully exposed. The court has ruled that the ED case is without jurisdiction;



it has no FIR, without which there is no case. This politically motivated prosecution by the Modi government over the last decade of the principal opposition party stands exposed before the people of India," she said.

"No case of money laundering, no proceeds of crime and no movement of property; all baseless charges that have been a part of a politi-

cal witch hunt, propaganda, reputation assassination and campaign which stands defeated today," Shrinate said.

She said the Congress party and its leadership are committed to fighting for the truth and for the rights of every Indian. "We cannot, and will not ever be intimidated, because we fight for the truth," she added.

Party general secretary K

C Venugopal said, "Through this judgment, the court has exposed the illegal and mala fide political targeting by the Narendra Modi government."

"From day one, the opposition, especially Sonia Gandhi and Rahul Gandhi, has been targeted without any legal basis or wrongdoing. This judgment clearly vindicates our stand," he added.

Refusing to take cognisance of the federal probe agency's money laundering charge against Congress leaders Rahul Gandhi, Sonia Gandhi, and five others in the National Herald case, the court noted that the chargesheet filed is based on a probe into a complaint by a private person and not on an FIR of a predicate offence.

Its cognisance is impermissible in law, the judge said. (PTI)

Goa nightclub fire case Luthra brothers deported, taken into police custody

GAURAV Luthra and Saurabh Luthra, co-owners of the Birch by Romeo Lane nightclub in Goa where a massive fire killed 25 people, were deported from Thailand on Tuesday and taken into custody by Delhi and Goa police as soon as they landed in Delhi. The brothers arrived in the Indian capital in an Indigo flight and were immediately handed over to authorities for further legal proceedings, 10 days after a blaze tore through the Birch by Romeo Lane nightclub in Arpora in North Goa.

Gaurav, 44 and Saurabh, 40, will be produced before a Delhi court where the Goa police will seek their transit remand.

A TV reporter tracking the brothers from Bangkok attempted to shoot inside the aircraft, prompting the airlines and accompanying security officials to summon additional force to whisk away the two



men.

The Luthra brothers are facing a case of culpable homicide and negligence following the December 6 tragedy, which investigators allege was compounded by the nightclub operating in violation of mandatory fire safety norms. The incident raised serious questions over alleged fire safety violations and lapses by the management. Gaurav and Saurabh fled to Phuket in the early hours of December 7, hours after the fire at their nightclub, prompting the authorities to issue an Interpol

Blue Corner Notice and cancel their passports.

The duo was detained by Thai authorities at Phuket on December 11 following a request from the Indian government which later coordinated with officials in Thailand to deport them under legal treaties between the two nations.

On December 11, a Delhi court rejected the transit anticipatory bail pleas. Additional Sessions Judge Vandana termed the allegations against the brothers "prima facie grave and serious" and severely criticised their "conduct."

The court took note of the police investigation that the brothers had booked tickets to Phuket one hour after the fire, a fact their counsel had initially "concealed" while seeking protection from immediate arrest.

The judge said that leaving immediately after the tragedy was a clear attempt to "evade the legal process".



Security forces hunt for terrorists holed up in Udhampur village

JAMMU: Security forces searched for terrorists in Udhampur on Tuesday, a day after a policeman was killed in a gunfight there, a police officer said.

During the encounter on Monday, one terrorist was believed to have been injured, while two policemen suffered minor bullet wounds.

"The operation has been resumed in the area to track down the holed-up terrorists. The cordon has been further strengthened," the officer told PTI.

A joint team of the Special Operations Group (SOG) of police, along with the army and the CRPF, is on the job with sniffer dogs, the officer said.

On Monday, forces got locked in a gunfight with terrorists in Soan village of the Majalta area in Udhampur. The village was raided by the police on a tip-off about the presence of three terrorists, believed to be affiliated with the Pakistan-based Jaish-e-Mohammad (JeM) outfit.

The encounter took place in the besieged village around 6 pm and continued for some time, resulting in injuries to one SOG jawan, Amjad Pathan, son of Bashrat Khan. Pathan, a resident of Salva, Mendhar in Poonch district, later succumbed.

"A very small SOG team engaged the terrorists. Combing of the forest has been impeded due to darkness and treacherous terrain," IGP Jammu Bhim Sen Tutti said in a social media post.

34 Maoist cadres surrender in Bijapur

RAIPUR/BIJAPUR (CHHATTISGARH)

IN a significant victory for anti-Naxal operations, 34 Maoist cadres, including 7 women, surrendered before senior police and CRPF officials in Bijapur district on Tuesday, carrying a combined bounty of Rs 84 lakh.

The surrendered cadres, primarily from the South Sub-Zonal Bureau, also include members linked to the Dandakaranya Special Zonal Committee (DKSZC), Telangana State Committee, and Andhra-Odisha Border (AOB) Division.

Key figures include a Divisional Committee Member (DVCM) from the Keralapal

Area Committee with a Rs 8 lakh bounty, several PLGA (People's Liberation Guerrilla Army) members, Area Committee Members (ACMs), platoon leaders, militia commanders, and frontal organisation office-bearers like DAKMS and CNM presidents.

Disillusioned with Maoist ideology, they pledged allegiance to the Indian Constitution, vowing a peaceful life. Each received Rs 50,000 immediate incentive under the state's rehabilitation policy, Police officials said.

The surrender occurred amid joint efforts by District Reserve Guard (DRG), Bastar Fighters, Special Task Force (STF), CoBRA, and CRPF battalions, influenced by the



Chhattisgarh government's "Puna Margam: Rehabilitation to Rejuvenation" campaign—a reintegration drive—and the "Niyad Nellanar" scheme delivering development to remote villages.

Police Superintendent of Bijapur Jitendra Kumar Yadav appealed to the remaining Maoists, "abandon violence without fear. The government's policies ensure a secure, respectable future."

He highlighted family de-

sires for normal lives.

Since January 2024, Bijapur has seen over 824 surrenders (per local claims, aligning with reports of 790+ by late 2025), alongside arrests and encounters, reflecting intensified operations.

Statewide, thousands have surrendered in 2025, weakening Maoist structures in Bastar. Officials credit proactive security, trust-building, and welfare initiatives for transforming fear into dialogue and development in South Bastar.

Rehabilitation processes, including legal formalities and reintegration support, are underway. This marks another step toward Chhattisgarh's goal of lasting peace in Naxal-affected regions.

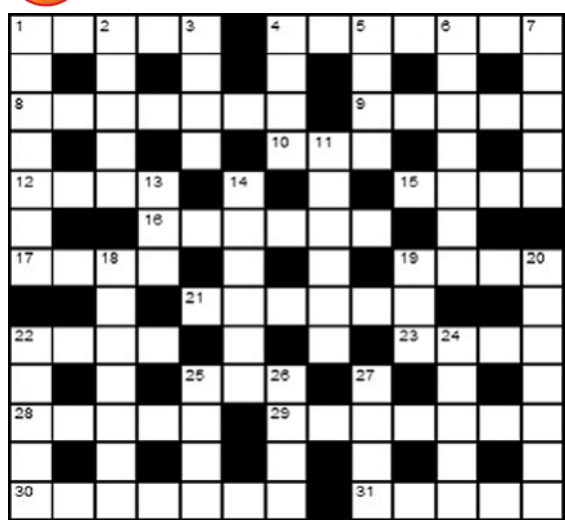

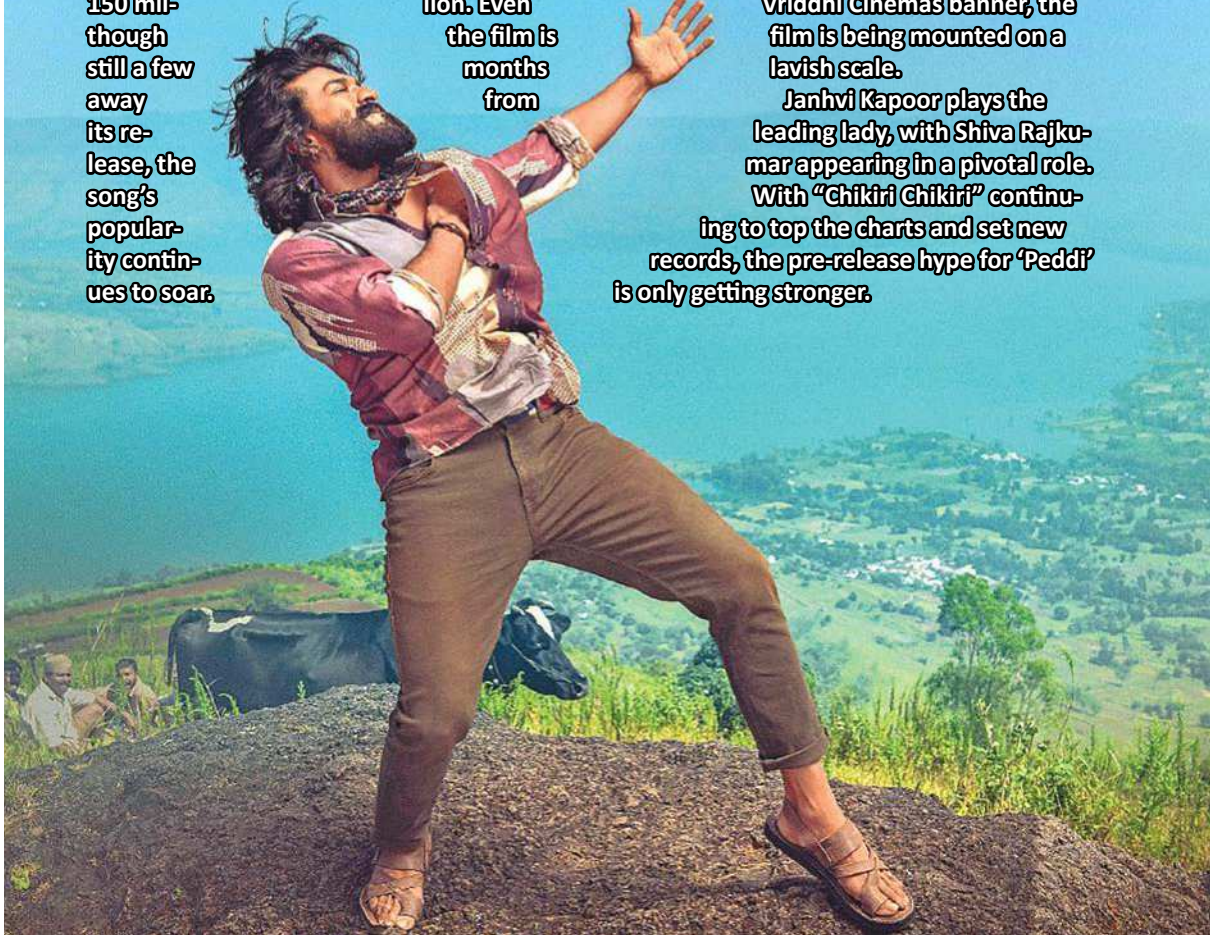
