Assembly passes Bill to regulate hoardings, levy advertisement fee

BENGALURU: The Karnataka Assembly on Monday passed an amendment Bill aimed at regulating outdoor advertisements and enabling municipal bodies to levy and collect fees on hoardings and billboards across the state.

The Karnataka Legislative Assembly adopted the Karnataka Municipalities and Certain Other Laws (Amendment) Bill, 2026, after it was moved by Urban Development and Town Planning Minister B S Suresha.

The legislation empowers municipal councils and corporations to levy an advertisement fee on any person who erects, exhibits, fixes or displays an advertisement on land, buildings, walls, hoardings or other structures within municipal limits. The fee will be determined by local bodies through a resolution, subject to minimum and maximum rates prescribed by the state government. However, the Bill provides exemptions for advertisements related to public meetings of municipalities or corporations, elections to legislative bodies and candidature in such elections. It also mandates the display of advertisements in any municipal area by obtaining written permission from the concerned municipal council or corporation commissioner after payment of the prescribed fee.

Permission will not be granted if the advertisement violates municipal by-laws or if the applicable fee has not been paid. The amendment further authorises municipal authorities to remove or demolish unauthorised advertisements erected in violation of the provisions. Officials may issue a notice directing the owner or occupier of the land or structure to remove such advertisements, failing which authorities can enter the premises and remove them. According to the provisions, unauthorised advertisements will attract penalties and fines. Those who delay payment of advertisement fees or penalties will also be liable to pay interest at 18 per cent per annum from the date the payment becomes due until it is cleared.

CHINA on Monday called on all sides to immediately stop military operations in West Asia in response to US President Donald Trump's call to join other countries, including Beijing, to help keep the Strait of Hormuz open for international transport. The effective closure of the vital waterway by Iran in retaliation for airstrikes by the US and Israel has proved catastrophic for global energy and trade flows, causing the largest oil supply disruption and soaring global oil prices.

China also said it is in talks with the US about Trump's planned visit to Beijing later this month. About Trump's call to China and other countries to deploy warships to keep the strait "open and safe," Chinese Foreign Ministry spokesperson Lin Jian told a media briefing here that the recent tensions in Strait of Hormuz and adjacent waters impacted the flow of the

US Federal Communications Commission chairman Brendan Carr has warned American news television networks of revocation of broadcast licenses over their coverage of the Iran war, remarks that drew sharp political backlash. After US President Donald Trump lashed out at the media coverage of the Iran war, Carr asked news broadcasters to "correct course" and "operate in public interest", failing which they risk losing their licenses.

Gujarat hikes LPG supply by 20 pc

GANDHINAGAR: The Gujarat government on Monday said it has ramped up LPG supplies by 20 per cent over normal weekly distribution to ensure an uninterrupted supply, while prioritising Piped Natural Gas (PNG) connections in areas with availability of network. The state has an adequate stock of liquefied petroleum gas (LPG), and the supply chain remains uninterrupted, said Mona Khandhar, Additional Chief Secretary of the Food, Civil Supplies and Consumer Affairs Department. The senior official stated that the government has not imposed any restrictions on domestic or commercial use and is taking steps to ensure smooth availability of fuel across sectors.

Speaker adjourns Assembly, walks out

UPSET over the insufficient number of written replies from government departments to MLAs' questions, Karnataka Assembly Speaker U T Khader on Monday adjourned the House and walked out, stating that he would not run the House until concerned ministers and secretaries provide an explanation.

The Speaker's move, considered "unprecedented" by many legislators, came after Home Minister G Parameshwara tabled 84 written replies against 230 'unstarred' questions submitted by MLAs. Following the developments, Parameshwara later in the day informed the House that the government has taken the matter very seriously and will ensure things are set right.

He also said that Chief Minister Siddaramaiah directed the chief secretary to issue notices to department secretaries and even suspend the secretary in whose department many questions are pending replies.

Khader, on Friday, had admonished the government, stating that his "gentleness" should not be mistaken for "weakness," as he took strong explanation. He had repeatedly, though mildly, asked the government to ensure replies to the questions asked by legislators.

As soon as Parameshwara tabled the written replies on Monday, opposition BJP members, including Leader of Opposition R Ashoka, pointed out to the Chair that the situation had not



improved despite repeated warnings, even as the home minister claimed there was a "bit of improvement."

"Not even 50 per cent of questions were replied to. You (Speaker) have warned them (government) four times already, do it for the fifth time. Let it become a record. This government is

dead... Despite warnings, they have not improved. Officials come like Gods, they go home like Gods," Ashoka said, demanding that the Speaker take action.

Khader expressed displeasure, stating that he had issued "clear orders" from his chair four times. "This House is not for ministers. The

session is held for legislators, and it is for them to meet once in three months to discuss issues in their constituencies. Legislators from all parties ask questions. Out of them, only 15 questions become 'starred' (questions to be answered on the floor of the House) daily. If the remaining (unstarred) questions go unanswered, why should they (MLAs) come to this House," he asked.

Pointing out a lack of proper replies to questions asked, the Speaker said, "How can we continue like this? Despite clear orders from the Chair four times, there are no signs of improvement. How do we run this House?"

"So, until the concerned ministers and secretaries give a proper explanation, I won't run this House," he said, before adjourning the

House and walking out.

Later, when the House resumed, the Speaker announced a meeting involving the Chief Minister, Leader of Opposition, senior ministers, chief secretary and other senior officials. During this meeting, they decided that answers would be provided to the MLAs' questions and that appropriate action had been taken.

The government will give its reply on this issue later in the day, he said, as he adjourned the House for lunch. After the House resumed post-lunch, Parameshwara, on behalf of the government, said that CM Siddaramaiah directed the chief secretary, during a meeting in the Speaker's chamber, to issue notices to the secretaries and suspend those under whose departments the most questions are pending.

'LPG scarcity forcing workers to leave for native places'

AUTO component manufacturers are staring at workforce migration to their native places due to LPG cylinder shortage, which could impact production, a situation not as difficult as the COVID pandemic, but could escalate if not resolved, ACMA said on Monday. The Automotive Component Manufacturers Association of India (ACMA) represents over 1,064 manufacturers, contributing more than 90 per cent of the auto component industry's turnover in the organised sector. "Workers shifted to small gas-enabled burners for cooking purposes as usage of wood was discouraged due to air pollution. Now, with LPG cylinder shortage, they are finding it difficult to cook at home, and also some of the factory canteens are shut, forcing them to leave for their native places," ACMA Director General Vinnie Mehta told PTI.

Ranas prepares to say adieu to '12-yr dead' Harish

MEDITATIVE chants in the background, a loving hand on his forehead and the calm of words telling him 'theek hai'... with that, the family of Harish Rana, in a coma for more than 12 years, prepared for his final journey from their home in Ghaziabad to a Delhi hospital where he will breathe his last. The 31-year-old is the first person in India to be allowed passive euthanasia.

still unclear, Rana's family is getting ready to say adieu to the young man who fell from a fourth floor balcony in 2013 and suffered severe

head injuries. He has been in a coma since. A video from the Rana home in Ghaziabad shows relatives offering prayers as a member of the Brahma Kumaris puts a 'tilak' on Harish's forehead and says softly, "Sabko maaf karte hue, sabse maafi mangte hue, so jao theek hai..." (Forgiving everyone and asking forgiveness from everyone). Now sleep. It's ok." The Brahma Kumari in the heartbreaking video is Sister Lovely from the

Mohan Nagar Seva Kendra in Ghaziabad, Komal, a member of the Brahma Kumaris based at Mount Abu, told PTI over phone.

"She is following a ritual with the words that mean he (Harish) leaves the world in a happy state, seeking and giving forgiveness... it is part of a meditative chant that comforts the soul and eases the entire process of the soul merging with the sublime," Komal said. She added that the family has been deeply

spiritually inclined, which helped them endure the difficult 13-year period of caring for Harish.

"Although the couple has another son, advancing age had begun to worry them about who would look after Harish in the future once they were no longer able to," he said, adding that members of the organisation counselled the family during this phase. The family is reluctant to talk. Harish's father Ashok Rana could not be reached for comment.

Two zebra foals born at Bannerghatta Biological Park

BENGALURU: Bannerghatta Biological Park has welcomed two new additions to its zebra family with the birth of two female foals in January this year. They have been released into the enclosures only on Monday for Public viewing.

According to zoo authorities, zebra Kokila, aged two-and-a-half years, delivered a foal on January 17, while another zebra, Kaveri, aged 12 years, gave birth to a foal on January 28. Both the newborn foals are females and have been sired by a male zebra named Bharath.

Officials said the foals are currently housed along with the other zebras and are under constant monitoring by the park's veterinary team and animal keepers to ensure their well-being. With the birth of the two foals, the total number of zebras at the zoo has increased to 10.

Zoo authorities said zebras usually have a gestation period of about 12 to 13 months. The newborn foals initially have brown stripes, which gradually turn black as they grow. Visitors to the park can catch a glimpse of the newborn zebras during their visit to the zoo, officials added.

Indians' global travel plans revealed

LPG tanker overturns near Katapady, traffic disrupted on NH-66

AN LPG tanker overturned near Katapady on National Highway-66 in Udupi district on Monday morning, creating panic among commuters and residents in the vicinity. The tanker, which was

transporting liquefied petroleum gas from Mangaluru towards Udupi, reportedly lost control while negotiating a stretch of road where highway work is underway. The vehicle toppled on its side, raising concerns about a potential gas leak. Fire and emergency services

personnel rushed to the spot immediately after the incident. As a precautionary measure, water was sprayed on the tanker and safety checks were carried out to ensure that there was no leakage.

The accident led to a temporary disruption of vehicular movement on the

highway. Police diverted traffic and warned motorists to avoid the area until the situation was stabilised. Officials later confirmed that no injuries were reported. Arrangements were being made to transfer the gas from the tanker before it could be safely removed from the spot.



Sudha Murty urges Centre to establish AIIMS in Raichur

Expresses concern over lack of institute in north Karnataka

SUDHA Murty, Member of Parliament in the Rajya Sabha, expressed disappointment in Parliament over the absence of an All India Institute of Medical Sciences (AIIMS) in Karnataka and strongly urged the Union Government to establish one in the backward district of Raichur.

Raising the issue during the Zero Hour in the ongoing Parliament session in New Delhi, Murty pointed out that several states across the country have been allotted AIIMS institutions, but Karnataka is yet to receive even one such premier medical institute. She said the state deserves better healthcare infrastructure considering its population and growing medical needs.

Murty specifically appealed to the Centre to consider Raichur district for the new AIIMS facility. She clarified that she was not requesting the institute to be set up in developed cities like Bengaluru or Hubballi, but rather in Raichur, which needs it the most due to its backward status and lack of advanced healthcare facilities. She noted that Raichur



is among the most backward districts identified by NITI Aayog. Murty recalled that while southern Karnataka witnessed significant development during the rule of the Wodeyar dynasty, large parts of northern Karnataka remained neglected for decades. Establishing an AIIMS in Raichur would help correct this historical imbalance, she said.

Highlighting the healthcare challenges faced by residents, Murty stated that the district lacks well-equipped hospitals. As a result, patients are forced to travel long distances to cities like Hyderabad or Bengaluru for treatment. This situation causes immense financial strain on poor families who already struggle to afford healthcare.

She also pointed out that the district's literacy levels remain relatively low. Ac-

ording to available data, female literacy in Raichur is around 48 percent, while male literacy is about 60 percent. Establishing a premier medical institution like AIIMS could significantly improve education and employment opportunities in the region.

Murty further explained that such a major healthcare project would not only provide advanced medical treatment to people in northern Karnataka but also create thousands of jobs and encourage students to pursue medical education locally.

She concluded by urging the Union Government to consider the long-term benefits of establishing AIIMS in Raichur, stating that the move would greatly strengthen healthcare access and regional development in Karnataka.

Chinnaswamy Stadium gets nod for hosting IPL 2026 matches

BENGALURU: The Karnataka government on Monday gave formal approval to the Karnataka State Cricket Association (KSCA) and Royal Challengers Bengaluru (RCB) to host the 2026 Indian Premier League matches at the M. Chinnaswamy Stadium, ending months of uncertainty following the stampede after the team's maiden title win.

The 19th edition of the world's biggest T20 league begins on March 28 with defending champions Royal Challengers Bengaluru set to face Sunrisers Hyderabad in their first match here at the M Chinnaswamy Stadium in the tournament opener, as per the schedule. The formal approval comes after a meeting chaired by Karnataka home minister Parameashwar with the Expert Committee, which was constituted by the state government, and representatives from the KSCA, RCB and their event management firm DNA.

"During the meeting, the Expert Committee presented its report outlining the preparedness and compliance meas-

ures undertaken at the M. Chinnaswamy Stadium," KSCA's official spokesperson Vinay Mruthyunjaya informed in a statement. "Based on the recommendations of the Expert Committee and after reviewing the arrangements in detail, the Hon'ble Home Minister has formally accorded approval for the conduct of the upcoming IPL matches at the iconic M. Chinnaswamy Stadium, Bengaluru." "The Karnataka State Cricket Association (KSCA) places on record its sincere gratitude to the Hon'ble Home Minister, Dr. G. Parameashwar, for his leadership, guidance and support in facilitating this approval," he added. Apart from the opening fixture of the upcoming season, the M Chinnaswamy Stadium is also slated to host the RCB Unboxing event as well as the tournament's opening ceremony. RCB had earlier announced that it would play five of their seven home matches in Bengaluru, while two will be played at Raipur's Shaheed Veer Narayan Singh International Cricket Stadium.

The KSCA also expressed its gratitude towards the members of the Expert Committee.

"Our special thanks are also due to Shri Sreemant Kumar Singh, Member Secretary of the Expert Committee and Commissioner of Police, Bengaluru, for his proactive coordination and for ensuring that all safety, security and operational aspects were comprehensively evaluated," the release said.

"KSCA further expresses its sincere appreciation to all the distinguished members of the Expert Committee and the officials associated with the Expert Committee and its sub-committees, whose careful assessment and constructive recommendations have been instrumental in enabling this important decision."

BJP likely to field new face Vinay Kumar for Davanagere South bypoll

THE Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) is reportedly considering a new candidate for the upcoming by-election to the Davanagere South Assembly Constituency. Party sources indicate that the leadership may field young leader G.B. Vinay Kumar in an attempt to overcome factionalism within the local unit and strengthen his chances in the crucial bypoll. The by-election was necessitated following the demise of senior Congress leader Shamanur Shivashankarappa, who had represented the constituency. The BJP is determined to win the seat this time and is carefully weighing its options amid internal differences between local leaders.

Factional politics has reportedly intensified within the Davanagere BJP unit since the last Lok Sabha election. Former MP G.M. Siddeshwar and former



MLA S.A. Ravindranath are said to be backing different aspirants for the party ticket. Sources said the Siddeshwar faction has been lobbying strongly for party ticket to his close associate Yashwanth Rao Jadhav. However, the Ravindranath camp has reportedly opposed the proposal, leading to a stalemate within the party's local leadership.

Initially, the BJP high command was said to be considering giving the ticket to B.G. Ajay Kumar, who had contested the previous election but lost. However, lack of support from certain factions has made the party

leadership reconsider its options. Amid these developments, the name of G.B. Vinay Kumar has emerged as a strong contender. Party insiders say his name has been discussed at the national level, and the leadership is evaluating his candidature as a strategy to bring a fresh face into the contest and avoid internal factional disputes.

Vinay Kumar had contested the last Lok Sabha election as an independent candidate after reportedly being denied a ticket by the Indian National Congress. Despite contesting independently, he managed to

secure nearly 40,000 votes, demonstrating his local influence.

Political observers believe that Vinay Kumar's candidature could help the BJP attract young voters in the constituency. He is known as a young leader and runs an IAS training academy, which has helped him build connections among students and youth.

Another factor that may work in his favour is the party's social engineering strategy. While the BJP is likely to field Veeranna Charantimath, a Lingayat leader, in the Bagalkot by-election, the party may opt for a candidate from the Kuruba community in Davanagere South to balance caste equations.

If the BJP finally decides to field Vinay Kumar, it could signal the high command's determination to end factional politics in the district and project a new leadership face ahead of the by-election.

Film producer's grandson sets triple record in Rubik's Cube challenge

FOURTEEN-year-old Shivateja Y, grandson of noted Kannada film producer Rockline Venkatesh, has created a remarkable achievement by setting a triple record in solving Megaminx Rubik's Cubes, earning recognition from the India Book of Records, Asia Book of Records and International Book of Records. To celebrate the rare achievement, a press conference was held at Conrad Bengaluru. Members of the family, including Shivateja's father Yatheesh Venkatesh, were present at the event and expressed pride over the young achiever's success. Speaking at the event, Rockline Venkatesh said their family is usually associated with film-related events, but this occasion was special as it celebrated an achievement outside the film industry. He said it was a matter of immense pride that the younger generation in their family had accomplished something unique. Rockline also observed that many children today spend most of their time on television and mobile phones, but achievements like this show how youngsters can use their time to develop



extraordinary skills.

Shivateja's father Yatheesh Venkatesh said parents must first identify the talents of their children and support them accordingly. He added that Shivateja's mother was the first to recognise his interest and talent in solving Rubik's cubes, while he ensured that his son received the encouragement and facilities needed to pursue the skill.

Shivateja's mother said that this was the first time anyone in their family had achieved recognition in the Rubik's cube field. She added that Shivateja had been practicing continuously for the past three years and had mastered the complex stages of solving the cube before setting the record.

Record-breaking performance

Shivateja, a student from Bengaluru, created the record by solving multiple mixed Megaminx Rubik's Cubes. At the age of 14 years and 9 months, he successfully solved 21 Megaminx cubes in 1 hour, 27 minutes, 12 seconds and 30 milliseconds, securing the record in multiple record books.

Interestingly, Shivateja is also the grandson of Karnataka MLA Munirathna. His achievement has drawn attention across the state and the country, bringing pride to his family and highlighting the growing interest of young Indians in mind sports and puzzle solving.

112: Centralised ambulance management system to be in place for effective service

BENGALURU: The government is set to implement a centralised ambulance management system under the unified emergency helpline number '112; Medical Education & Skill Development Minister Sharanprakash Patil announced in the Legislative Council on Monday.

The minister said the new system is expected to be fully operational within three months, with technical integration currently in progress. He said the government would directly take over the centralised management of all state ambulances under the '112' platform to ensure faster and more effective emergency healthcare delivery. Patil said this in response to a question raised by MLC T N Javarayi Gowda during the question hour.

Further stating that recruitment of supporting staff for ambulance services would also be undertaken shortly, he assured the House that Karnataka's ambulance fleet meets the standards prescribed by the Central Government and that there is no shortage of ambulances in the state. Noting that 1,715 ambulances are currently operational across the state, including 715 operated under the Arogya Kavacha programme and 1,000 managed directly by the state government, the minister said 262 additional ambulances will be procured to further strengthen emergency response capacity.

Govt facing shortage of land even to provide for burial grounds: Minister

BENGALURU

REVENUE Minister Krishna Byre Gowda told the Legislative Assembly on Monday that the government faces a land shortage, even for burial grounds and is forced to purchase land for this purpose in some cases.

Minority communities are angry with the government for not providing sufficient space for cemeteries, he said, as he highlighted difficulties faced in allocating land for schools and playgrounds. The minister was replying to a question by Aurd BJP MLA Prabhu Chavan during Question Hour.

"Over the last 10 years,

all governments have tried to ensure that all villages have burial grounds based on their needs. Even the High Court has pursued this. Still, we have not been able to provide space in some places," Gowda said. He said that after providing all available land to farmers and for various other purposes, the government is now left with no land for burial grounds. "For burial grounds, the government had to purchase land at a cost of Rs 58 crore in the last three years. By giving lands for various purposes, we have now reached a situation where we must purchase land for burials," he added.



Having given away lands for various purposes, the administration has to go around with a "begging

bowl", asking for land, the minister further said. Among Hindus, some bury and some burn the

dead. In areas surrounding Bengaluru, those who used to bury have started to burn the dead because

there is no space for burial. "But, in the two minority communities (Muslims and Christians) there is no opportunity to burn the dead bodies. We have to give them land. They are now angry with us for not providing land. Nobody understands when we say there's no land. How long can we provide?" he said.

Gowda, however, asserted that the department would work towards reserving space for public amenities like schools and burial grounds. "In villages, we must provide youngsters with playgrounds, parks, and schools," he added.

Earlier, intervening, Leader of the Opposition

R Ashoka said that after giving away lands for various purposes all these years, the government has today reached a position where it has to "beg".

Stating that people are not ready to give even one acre for schools and hospitals, let alone burial grounds, he said that when he was revenue minister during the BJP government, he had asked district deputy commissioners to reserve space for schools, anganwadis and burial grounds before granting lands. "This is important keeping the next generation and the next 25-30 years in mind," he said.



Govt honours entrepreneur Bobby Chemmanur

Chemmanur recently completed an 812-kilometre run aimed at spreading the message of world peace, a feat that earned him both a Unique World Record and a Guinness World Record. The initiative attracted wide public attention and further strengthened his popularity among followers.

A fourth-generation leader of a business group with a legacy spanning over 163 years, Chemmanur has established himself as a visionary entrepreneur, philanthropist, sportsperson, motivational speaker and entertainer. He also enjoys a significant presence on social media with over 5.1 million followers and supporters.

Chemmanur had earlier made headlines by bringing legendary footballer Diego Maradona to Kerala for the first time as a brand ambassador and close associate.

In another widely recognised humanitarian initiative, Chemmanur helped mobilise ₹34 crore as "blood money" to secure the release of Abdul Rahim, an Indian facing a death sentence in a Saudi Arabian prison. Chemmanur personally contributed ₹1 crore towards the effort.

Bengaluru-Kannur train extended to Kozhikode

MANGALURU: The South Western Railway has extended the daily Bengaluru-Kannur Express service up to Kozhikode in Kerala, offering improved connectivity between Karnataka and the northern parts of Kerala.

A notification issued by the railway headquarters in Hubballi stated that Train No. 16511/16512, which earlier operated between KSR Bengaluru City and Kannur, will now run up to Kozhikode with the approval of the Railway Board.

The extended service came into effect from March 15, with Train No. 16511 departing from Bengaluru City continuing its journey up to Kozhikode. The return service, Train No. 16512, will begin operating from Kozhikode to Bengaluru from March 16.

On the extended route, the train will stop at Thalassery, Vadakara and Quilandi stations after leaving Kannur. The train is scheduled to reach Kozhikode at about 12.40 pm and depart at 3.30 pm for the return journey.

Railway officials said the timetable between Bengaluru City and Payyannur remains unchanged and the same rake will continue to be used for the service. In addition, a special train will be operated between Yesvantpur and Hosapete to ease passenger congestion during the Ugadi festival.

The Yesvantpur-Hosapete Special Express will depart at 6.15 pm on March 18 and reach Hosapete at 4 am the next day, while the return train will leave Hosapete at 9 am on March 19 and arrive in Yesvantpur at 7.20 pm. The train will have halts at several stations including Tumakuru, Arasikere, Kadur, Chikkajajur, Chitradurga, Rayadurga, Ballari Cantonment and Toranagallu, officials said.

Principals from 220 engineering colleges participate in VTU meet

"ENGINEERING colleges must prepare students for the job market by providing practical education," said Dr. S. Vidyashankar, Vice-Chancellor of Visvesvaraya Technological University (VTU). Speaking after inaugurating the Principals' Meeting organized on Monday at a private hotel by Visvesvaraya

Most of the students who enroll with us come from poor

backgrounds. We must stand as guides to help fulfill their dreams."

Dr. Prashanth Mishra, Head of the IEEE Bengaluru Section, said, "IEEE chapters should be opened at the college level because we emphasize practical education for students. We also provide financial assistance for seminars and workshops. Additionally, we organize workshops for professors to help them achieve

progress in their respective departments. Scholarships are also provided to students. Since there are many such benefits, I request institutions to make the best use of them." VTU Registrar Prof. Prasad Rumpure, member of the VTU Academic Council Chengappa, and Director of the VTU Regional Office Dr. H. R. Sudarshan Reddy, among others, were present at the program.



MLA slams NICE Road management, demands takeover by govt

Somashekhar wants immediate redressal of poor maintenance and safety concerns

BJP MLA S T Somashekhar strongly criticised the management of the NICE Road during the ongoing budget session of the Karnataka Assembly, alleging that despite collecting nearly ₹10 crore in toll revenue daily, the company has failed to provide proper road maintenance and infrastructure.

Raising the issue in the Assembly, Somashekhar urged the state government to immediately take over the NICE Road stretch from Hosur Road to Magadi Road, citing poor maintenance and safety concerns. The MLA expressed dissatisfaction that even though an inquiry had been ordered earlier when the issue was raised, no concrete action has been taken regarding the deteriorating condition of several bridges along the corridor. He also highlighted that landowners who had given their land nearly 30-35 years ago for the road project are yet to



receive compensation sites. According to him, the conduct and functioning of the NICE company have been unsatisfactory, prompting him to raise the matter again in the Assembly. Somashekhar said that despite the company generating substantial toll revenue, road maintenance has been neglected. He noted that several bridges built 25-30 years ago are now in poor condition and not even safe for two-wheelers. In his constituency alone, eight bridges are reportedly in a dangerous state, he added.

The MLA said he had repeatedly submitted representations to the NICE company and officials of the Public

Works Department, but no effective action has been taken.

He also recalled that during the tenure of former PWD minister HC Mahadevappa, a House committee was constituted to examine the issue. The committee, which included MLA DK Jayachandra and other members, had conducted inspections and identified several problems. However, Somashekhar alleged that the NICE company has failed to comply with the recommendations of the government and the Assembly.

The MLA further pointed out that around 1,700 acres of land along the road were earmarked for layout development,

a matter that is currently pending before the court. Even after 35 years, the landowners have neither received payment nor seen development of the layout, leaving farmers in distress for decades, he said. Somashekhar also expressed disappointment that no decisive action has been taken against the company during either the previous BJP government or the current Congress government. He insisted that cancelling the 30-year concession agreement and bringing the road under government control would help address the maintenance issues and repair unsafe bridges.

Responding to the concerns, Karnataka Public Works Department Minister Satish Jarkiholi said that a letter has already been sent to the NICE company, but the government has not received any response so far. He added that the matter has been discussed in a cabinet sub-committee, and a final decision will be taken once the committee submits its report.

Lack of growth strategy impedes globally popular Mysuru silk industry

MYSORE Silk Saree is not just a garment but a symbol of pride for Mysuru and the entire state of Karnataka. Known for its elegance, purity and rich heritage, the saree enjoys enormous demand not only within India but also among buyers abroad. Yet, despite its popularity and economic potential, the industry continues to struggle due to traditional administrative approaches and lack of a progressive growth strategy.

Industry observers say the demand for authentic Mysore silk sarees is so high that influential people in Mysuru often receive calls from customers in other cities and even overseas requesting help in purchasing the premium saree. However, the inability to scale production and modernise the sector has prevented the industry from tapping its full potential. Ironically, while most businesses are embracing digital platforms, the Mysore silk industry has reportedly withdrawn online sales services due to pressure caused by overwhelming demand. Instead of expanding production capacity and improving supply



chains, the system has reverted to conventional sales methods. Experts believe that shortage of raw materials and limited production capacity are the primary reasons behind the decision. The industry currently produces only about 400 sarees per day — far below the actual demand, which runs into thousands. Around 300 to 350 sarees are produced in Mysuru, while another 100 to 120 are manufactured at the factory in Channarayana. Over the past three years, about 3.10 lakh sarees have been produced, of which more than 3.09 lakh were sold, clearly demonstrating the high market demand.

Another challenge is the declining interest among farmers in silk cultivation. Many farmers are moving away from sericulture due to price uncertainty and unstable market conditions. As a result, young people from rural areas are

migrating to cities in search of livelihood, often ending up in low-paying and labour-intensive jobs.

Experts argue that the industry requires a fresh approach. Encouraging startups in areas such as cocoon production, silk thread manufacturing, dyeing and marketing could revitalise the sector. By integrating modern technology and entrepreneurial thinking, Mysore silk could reach international markets more effectively. In addition to sarees, there is also growing potential for other silk-based products such as scarves, bags, suits and home décor items that could appeal to younger generations and global buyers. If supported with better policies, stable prices for farmers and modern management systems, the Mysore silk sector could generate thousands of jobs and contribute significantly to the state economy.

ED conducts raid on Mantri Developers

OFFICIALS from the Enforcement Directorate conducted raids on the premises of Mantri Developers in Bengaluru on allegations of illegal money laundering. The ED teams carried out searches at the company's office as well as the residence of its founder Sunil Mantri as part of an ongoing investigation under the Prevention of Money Laundering Act. Founded in 1999, Mantri Developers is a well-known real estate firm headquartered in Bengaluru and operates in cities such as Chennai, Hyderabad and Pune. The

company has undertaken several residential, commercial and retail projects across these cities.

According to sources, more than 10 ED officials arrived from the agency's Delhi office in around six vehicles early in the morning and began searching the company's office located on Vittal Mallya Road as well as other related premises. Officials are currently examining financial documents and records linked to the firm's transactions.

The agency has registered a case under the Prevention of Money Laundering Act and is reportedly scrutinising financial dealings connected to the company.

GOVT FOCUSED ON WOMEN EMPOWERMENT: CM

Taking kidney health warning to city's busiest junctions

ON World Kidney Day, teams from Kauvery Hospitals, Bangalore stood at two of the city's busiest traffic junctions, the Electronic City highway on Hosur Road and the Marathahalli Bridge stretch on the Outer Ring Road, holding awareness placards and handing kidney health screening cards to over 2,000 commuters stopped at red lights.

The message on those cards was direct: Diabetes, high BP, and frequent supplements can silently damage your kidneys. Get checked before symptoms appear. The activation was backed by findings from a large-scale health screening that Kauvery Hospitals conducted across Bangalore and its surrounding areas. Of those screened, more

than 6,600 participants, over 27 percent of the total, were found to have some form of elevated blood pressure. A significant number among them had no prior diagnosis.

In Electronic City alone, 552 of 1,980 participants screened showed elevated blood pressure readings. In Chandapura, Anekal, and Kammasandra, the pattern held. Across the board, the majority of those found to be hypertensive had walked into the camp unaware.

India is home to over 77 million people with diabetes, a large proportion of them undiagnosed, according to the Indian Council of Medical Research. The National Family Health Survey found that only 30 percent of hypertensive men and 38 percent of hypertensive women in India are on treatment.



Diabetes and hypertension together account for the majority of end-stage kidney disease cases in the country. The kidney absorbs the consequences of both conditions without

producing a single symptom until the damage is well advanced. Dr. Rammohan Sripath Bhat, Director of the Institute of Nephrology at Kauvery Hospitals Electronic City, and a nephrologist with

over 15 years of experience trained across institutions in India and the United Kingdom, said: "Together, over time, these things accelerate damage that could have been caught with a simple blood and

urine test. By the time kidneys make themselves heard, the window for early action has often already closed." BRS slams Guv's speech, says govt 'forced false claims'

BRS leaders on Monday strongly criticised the Governor's address at the start of the Telangana Assembly Budget session, alleging the Congress government forced the Governor to present misleading claims.

Former minister Vemula Prashanth Reddy said the speech delivered by Governor Shiv Pratap Shukla was "hollow" and failed to reflect the realities in the state.

Addressing the media at the Assembly, he alleged that the Congress government compelled the Governor to present falsehoods while ignoring key election promises such as the party's "Six Guar-



antees" and "420 promises". Prashanth Reddy said the Governor's address contained no reference to welfare promises, including the Rs.2,500 monthly financial

assistance pledged to women. He also claimed that issues concerning farmers, unemployed youth, the elderly, widows and persons with disabilities were completely

absent from the speech.

The BRS leader further accused the government of misleading the public about employment, alleging that while it claimed to have

provided 60,000 jobs, only around 12,000 posts had actually been filled.

Echoing the criticism, BRS MLA Padi Kaushik Reddy said the Governor's speech did not mention the Six Guarantees even though the Congress government was presenting its third budget since coming to power under Chief Minister A Revanth Reddy.

He alleged that the promised Rs.15,000 assistance under the Rythu Bharosa scheme had not yet been disbursed to farmers.

BRS leaders said they would continue to raise the issue in the Assembly until the Congress government fulfils all the promises made to the people.

Tribal pregnant woman murdered in Kagaznagar

A 25-year-old tribal woman, who was seven months pregnant, was found murdered in a forest area between Kondapalli and Sulugupalli villages in Penchikalpet mandal, allegedly by a man after she insisted that he marry her.

Police said Athram Sammakka, daughter of Shankar from Kondapalli, was bludgeoned to death by K Jalapathi from Jahindpur hamlet in the forest area between the two villages on Saturday.

Her body was traced in the forest after Jalapathi's brother alerted the local police about the incident.

According to the police, Jalapathi, who is already married, informed his brother over the phone after murdering Sammakka, stating that he

killed her because she was pestering him to marry her.

Despite being married, he had reportedly maintained a close relationship with the woman for around four years. Sammakka was seven months pregnant and had asked him to marry her. Jalapathi allegedly asked Sammakka to

meet him in Jahindpur and took her into the forest area, where he killed her. Based on a complaint lodged by the victim's family members, a case was registered against Jalapathi under the SC, ST Prevention of Atrocities Act and for murder under the Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita (BNS).

Gas cylinder stolen in broad daylight

CCTV footage puts Kodad on alert

A daylight theft incident in Kodad town of Suryapet district has raised concerns among local residents and shop owners.

An unidentified person

allegedly stole a gas cylinder from a tractor repair shop, highlighting growing worries about petty thefts in the town. The incident reportedly took place on Sunday afternoon at a tractor repair shop located near the main road in Kodad.

According to local sources, the area had very little public movement at the time. Taking advantage of the situation, an unidentified man entered the premises and quietly lifted a gas cylinder that had been kept outside the shop.

He then left the spot without attracting attention.

The shop owner later noticed that the cylinder was missing and searched the surrounding area, but could not find any trace of it.

Suspecting theft, he checked the CCTV cameras installed at the shop. The footage reportedly showed a man carrying away the gas cylinder, confirming that it had been stolen.

After receiving information about the incident, police initiated an investigation.

Officials said they are examining the CCTV footage to identify the suspect and trace his whereabouts.

The theft has sparked concern among local residents, especially in the backdrop of reported gas shortages.

Police have advised shop owners and residents to be cautious and ensure that gas cylinders are stored safely to prevent such incidents.

Locals say that small-scale thefts have been increasing in Kodad in recent times.

They expressed worry that such crimes are occurring not only at night but also during daytime, creating a sense of insecurity among residents and traders in the town.


ACB check exposes malpractices in Kamareddy municipality

OFFICIALS of the Anti-Corruption Bureau (ACB), Nizamabad Range, conducted a surprise check at the Office of the Municipal Commissioner, Kamareddy Municipality on Monday and detected several administrative and financial irregularities during inspection of records and functioning of the office.

During the inspection, ACB officials found that 47 complaints of unauthorized constructions were received during 2025-26 and notices were issued in most cases. However, no further action was taken even after the stipulated time period lapsed.

The inspection also revealed that over 400 commercial establishments failed



to renew their trade licences during 2025-26, leading to pending dues of around Rs.1 crore to the municipality.

Field verification by ACB officials also detected variations in property tax as-

proper documentation and records, warranting further verification.

In another irregularity, ACB found that some outsourcing employees marked absent for certain days were still shown as having received full-month salaries in payment records.

Officials also noted delays in processing building permissions. Since December 2025, 169 applications were received, of which 18 exceeded the prescribed 21-day processing period.

ACB officials said a detailed report will be submitted to the Government recommending appropriate action against the concerned municipal officials.

The ACB urged the citizens to report corruption by calling its toll-free helpline 1064.

HPV Vaccine can prevent 90% of cervical cancer: Awareness drive for girls in Hyderabad

ON the occasion of National Vaccination Day, the Press Information Bureau (PIB) Hyderabad organised a 'VARTA' awareness programme to educate adolescent girls about the importance of the Human Papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine in preventing cervical cancer.

State to be developed as East-West cargo corridor

- CM orders faster cargo operations at Mulapeta, Machilipatnam, and Ramayapatnam ports, targeting hinterland cargo from six neighbouring states
- Machilipatnam and Ramayapatnam ports slated for completion by December; Ramayapatnam to gain prominence with BPCL refinery and dedicated rail link to Kadapa Steel Plant
- Port townships, industrial corridors, and fishing harbour expansions planned to position Andhra Pradesh as a logistics hub on India's east coast amid global shipping disruptions

CHIEF Minister N Chandrababu Naidu has directed officials to develop the state as a major East-West cargo corridor by strengthening cargo handling operations at ports across the state.

During a review meeting held at the Secretariat on ports and fishing harbours, the Chief Minister stressed the need to expedite cargo operations at the newly constructed ports of Mulapeta, Machilipatnam and Ramayapatnam. He instructed officials to take necessary steps to ensure cargo movement

from the hinterland regions of neighbouring states such as Odisha, Chhattisgarh, Madhya Pradesh, Maharashtra, Telangana and Karnataka through these ports.

Officials informed the Chief Minister that construction of Machilipatnam and Ramayapatnam ports is expected to be completed by December 2026. Naidu said that once the refinery of Bharat Petroleum Corporation Limited is established, Ramayapatnam will emerge as a major container and bulk cargo port.

The Chief Minister also revealed that the Railway Ministry has approved a dedicat-

ed rail connectivity project from Ramayapatnam to the Kadapa Steel Plant, which will significantly improve cargo transportation.

Naidu suggested developing port townships near the three ports to boost commercial activity and said industrial corridors are also likely to emerge in these regions due to improved infrastructure.

He further directed officials to accelerate the second phase of fishing harbour construction at Budagatlapa-

lem Fishing Harbour, Pudidamadaka Fishing Harbour and Kothapatnam Fishing Harbour. Highlighting the state's strategic location, the Chief Minister said Andhra Pradesh is poised to become a logistics hub on India's east coast, with ports and fishing harbours planned roughly every 50 kilometres along the coastline. He emphasized that the state's ports should emerge as game changers in cargo handling.

Naidu also pointed out that due to the ongoing glob-

al conflicts affecting ports in Dubai and Gulf countries, there is a growing perception that ports on India's east coast are safer. He urged officials to take advantage of this opportunity to strengthen Andhra Pradesh's maritime infrastructure and attract greater cargo traffic. The review meeting was attended by Special Chief Secretary for Investments and Infrastructure M. T. Krishna Babu and Maritime Board CEO Abhishek Kumar, among other officials.

AP fixes Rs 2.39 lakh unit cost for PMAY-Gramin 2.0 houses

- Interest subsidy on SHG loans to be reimbursed from 2026-27 to 2028-29
- State housing corporation directed to implement scheme across the state

THE Andhra Pradesh government has fixed the unit cost at Rs.2.39 lakh for construction of houses under the Pradhan Mantri Awaas Yojana Gramin 2.0 (PMAY-G 2.0). Housing special chief secretary Ajay Jain issued GO Rt No 20 to this effect on Monday.

According to the government order, the revised unit cost includes convergence funds and Self-Help Group (SHG) loans. The order also provides for reimbursement of interest subsidy on SHG loans by the state government for the financial years from 2026-27 to 2028-29.

Officials said the decision was taken after examining proposals submitted by the managing director of the Andhra Pradesh State Housing Corporation Limited (APSHCL). The proposal



was prepared in accordance with guidelines issued by the ministry of rural development, Government of India, for the implementation of PMAY-Gramin 2.0. Under the scheme, the Centre provides assistance of Rs 1.2 lakh per house, which includes a central share of Rs.72,000 (60 per cent) and a state share of Rs 48,000 (40 per cent). In addition, beneficiaries will be eligible for an SHG loan of Rs 80,000 at an interest rate of 3 per cent, with the state government reimbursing the interest component.

The funding structure also includes convergence components such as wage support under the Viksit Bharat-Guarantee for Rozgar and Ajevika Mis-

sion - Gramin (VB-G-RAM-G) Scheme and the National Rural Livelihood Mission, amounting to Rs 27,000, and Rs 12,000 for sanitation support for construction of Individual Household Toilets (IHHLT) under the Swachh Bharat Mission. With these components, the total unit cost per house has been fixed at Rs 2,39,000.

The government has directed the managing director of APSHCL to take necessary steps for implementation of the scheme across the state. Officials said the revised unit cost would enable beneficiaries to construct better quality houses with additional financial support through convergence schemes and SHG loans.

MLC Anantha Babu's wife appears before SIT

- Lakshmi Durga was questioned by SIT in Kakinada after High Court directive, linked as second accused in 2022 Dalit youth murder
- MLC Anantha Uday Bhaskar, first accused, allegedly staged driver Subrahmanyam's death as a road accident; later released on default bail

STATE Legislative Council member Anantha Uday Bhaskar's wife Lakshmi Durga, on Monday appeared before the Special Investigation Team (SIT), probing the murder of his former driver.

She appeared before the investigating officer in Kakinada at the direction of the Andhra Pradesh High Court. Anantha Uday Bhaskar dropped her at the office of Sub-Divisional Police Officer (SDPO), where investigating officer Manish Patil Devraj questioned her.

The High Court had directed her to appear before SIT between March 16 and March 30 from 10 am to 5 pm. The order was passed on her petition seeking cancellation of a non-bailable war-

rant against her issued by the Special SC/ST Court in Rajamahendravaram. The SIT, in the supplementary charge sheet filed last month, had stated that Lakshmi Durga had a role in the 2022 murder of Dalit youth Veedhi Subrahmanyam. Following this, she was named a second accused in the case and a non-bailable warrant was issued a week ago.

MLC Anantha Uday Bhaskar, also known as Anantha Babu, is the first accused in the case. He is accused of killing his former driver, Subrahmanyam, and later delivering the body to the victim's house. Sub-

rahmanyam (34) was found dead under suspicious circumstances in Kakinada on May 19, 2022. The MLC of the then-ruling YSR Congress Party had personally transported the body to the victim's parents' residence around 2 a.m. in his own car, claiming it was a road accident.

The family, however, suspected foul play and refused to accept the body. The murder had sparked protests by the victim's relatives and Dalit organisations.

Anantha Babu had allegedly pushed the deceased during an argument, resulting in his fall and death. The

legislator allegedly inflicted additional injuries on the body to make it appear as though the death resulted from a road accident.

The MLC was subsequently arrested, and the YSRCP suspended him from the party.

With the investigating officer unable to submit the charge sheet within 90 days, Anantha Babu was released on default bail in December 2022.

After coming to power in June 2024, the TDP-led coalition government decided to re-investigate the case. Indian Police Service (IPS) officer and incumbent Kakinada DSP Manish Devraj Patil was appointed as the investigation officer. In July 2025, the SC/ST Special Court ordered a re-investigation into the case. The MLC had challenged the order in the High Court, but it granted a stay on a lower court's order, which had also directed that a supplementary chargesheet be filed within 90 days.

Last month, the Supreme Court observed that there was a clear "nexus between police and power" in the case and that the police had attempted to help Anantha Uday Bhaskar secure bail.

Following this, the state government suspended four police officers over the lapses in the investigation that led to the release of the MLC.

THE historic Sri Varasiddhi Vinayaka Swamy temple at Kanipakam is set to witness a major transformation with temple authorities launching a series of development initiatives aimed at improving pilgrim amenities and ensuring the smooth conduct of religious rituals and festivals. The plans form part of a comprehensive master development programme being implemented for the temple town.

A key highlight of the initiative is the construction of a new Pushkarini near the Supatha Mandapam at an estimated cost of Rs 3.40 crore. The existing temple tank located in front of the shrine

has been creating difficulties during major processions, particularly Vahana Sevams conducted as part of the annual Brahmotsavams, as it restricts the movement of temple chariots and vehicles despite the presence of Mada streets on three sides.

Devaasthanam Chairman V Surendra Babu popularly known as Mani Naidu said permissions for the project had already been secured from the Endowments Department and the temple administration was moving ahead with the execution schedule.

He told The Hans India that, land transfer process from a private hotel owner will be completed in the next 10-15 days after which tenders will be called for. The target is to complete the new

Pushkarini before the Brahmotsavams this year.

Officials stated that the new Pushkarini would be constructed with the same dimensions as the existing one, measuring about 140 feet in length and width and 12 feet in depth. Stones from the present tank will be re-used, preserving traditional elements while introducing improved facilities.

The structure will feature stone pillars sourced from older temple architecture, along with a centrally located stone Neerajana Mandapam housing an idol of Lord Vinayaka. Steps for devotees, barricades, water purification systems and modern lighting arrangements will also be installed.

The redesign will effectively shift the Pushkarini for-

ward by nearly 80 to 90 feet, creating a spacious open area in front of the temple.

According to the Chairman, this change will significantly improve the movement of the Lord's Utsava Murthy idols during festivals and provide better convenience for devotees visiting the shrine in large numbers.

As part of the expansion, the Devasthanam is also planning to establish an Akhilandam in front of the temple on the lines of Tirumala, enabling devotees to break coconuts and light lamps as part of fulfilling their vows. The existing TTD building and a nearby police station will be relocated, and alternative locations have already been identified. Meanwhile, the Tirumala Tirupati Devasthanams has sanctioned Rs 25 crore for the overall development of the temple town. With this, two air-conditioned Kalyana Mandapams will be constructed at an estimated cost of Rs 16 crore, including one dedicated to conducting mass weddings, the Chairman revealed.

A guest house costing around Rs 9 crore will also be built by TTD. These facilities will be maintained by the Kanipakam Devasthanam, and the revenue generated from them will accrue to the temple administration.

SSC exams begin smoothly across state

- Over 6.22 lakh students appear on Day 1; attendance recorded at 98.90%
- Authorities conduct 1,753 inspections to ensure fair conduct of exams

THE Secondary School Certificate (SSC) public examinations began smoothly across the state on Monday, with authorities reporting peaceful conduct of the examinations at all centres.

According to the Board of Secondary Education (BSE), a total of 6,29,109 regular candidates had registered for the examinations. Of them, 6,22,217 students appeared for the first-day examination, while 6,852 candidates were absent. The exams were conducted at 3,415 centres across the state. Officials said the overall attendance on the first day stood at 98.90 per cent, reflecting a high turnout of candidates.

To ensure smooth and transparent conduct of the examinations, the Board of Secondary Education put in place a comprehensive monitoring mechanism.

As part of these arrangements, various authorities conducted 1,753 inspection visits to examination centres across the state. The inspections were carried out by

district collectors, district-level observers, district educational officers, assistant commissioners of government examinations, district monitoring coordinators, flying squads and other officials.

Director of Government Examinations KV Srinivasulu Reddy said that four invigilators were found negligent in discharging their duties during the examination. Two invigilators in YSR Kadapa district, one in Anantapur district, and another in Palnadu district were reported

for lapses. He said the matter was taken seriously and strict action would be initiated against the concerned invigilators as per the rules governing the conduct of examinations.

He also instructed district educational officers, chief superintendents, departmental officers and invigilators to maintain strict vigilance and adhere to examination protocols to ensure the smooth conduct of the remaining SSC examinations.

APA India launches tele-counselling for Class 10 students during exams

Students or psychologists facing any issues related to tele-counselling can contact the organisers at 9985428261, the association said. Association leaders including honorary president of the AP Committee Dr. Puli Srinivas appealed to Class 10 students across Andhra Pradesh to make use of the free counselling facility to manage stress and approach their examinations with confidence.

TG govt should curb drug menace with iron fist

In a shocking incident, Putta Mahesh Kumar and 'Pilot' Rohith Reddy tested positive for drugs. They are not ordinary men on the street. One of them is a lawmaker in Parliament while the other is a former lawmaker from Telangana. And they are nouveau riche as well. Mahesh Kumar is a member of Lok Sabha from Eluru in Andhra Pradesh. Representing Telugu Desam Party (TDP), he became an MP in 2024, at the young age of 36 years. His father Putta Sudhakar Yadav is a legislator from Mydukur in YSR Kadapa district. Sudhakar Yadav also served as the chairman of Tirumala Tirupati Devasthanam (TTD) between April 28, 2018, and June 19, 2019. As an MP, Mahesh Kumar's primary role is to take part in enacting laws that govern the

country. Rohith Reddy, who calls himself 'Pilot' Rohith Reddy, was also a lawmaker in the past, albeit at the state-level. In 2018, he won on a Congress ticket as an MLA from Tandur, now in Vikarabad district, but shifted loyalties to Bharat Rashtra Samithi (BRS) which was in power then. However, he lost elections from the same Assembly segment in 2023 on the BRS ticket.

Today, the two have been found consuming drugs! Does this incident show the callous attitude of these two politicians? Or are they not afraid of law enforcement agencies in Telangana?

Incidentally, the duo was allegedly caught red-handed when a team from Elite Action Group for Drug Law Enforcement (EAGLE), on a tip-off, raided a farm-

house owned by Rohith Reddy in Moinabad area. While a liquor party was underway, one of the accused even opened fire at the police team when it entered the farmhouse. A drug test was conducted on 11 people and five of them, including the MP and the ex-MLA, tested positive. Surprisingly, the MP was given a station bail, a police action which is likely to kick up a row nationally, while Rohith Reddy and others were remanded to judicial custody. This incident clearly indicates how fast drug menace is spreading in and around Hyderabad. Drug usage has reached menacing proportions, primarily due to ever-growing pub culture and widespread growth of farmhouses. It is said that there are over 2,000 farmhouses around Aziznagar in

Moinabad mandal alone. Incidentally, the same Rohith Reddy's farmhouse was the place where a plot to buy four BRS MLAs was uncovered in 2022. That incident also rocked Telangana politics as did the Sunday's drug bust.

Nevertheless, strict vigilance on pubs, farmhouses and colleges will reduce the drug threat significantly. Besides, stringent punishment for both drug peddlers and consumers can be a strong deterrent. Coming back to the latest drug bust, it is good that TDP, which is in power in Andhra Pradesh, acted swiftly, served a notice on Mahesh Kumar seeking his explanation, and decided to keep him away from party activities till he comes clean on the allegations. AP Chief Minister Nara Chandrababu Naidu

also condemned the irresponsible behaviour of the young MP, while ordering for an immediate action. But BRS has remained silent on Rohith Reddy! A few months back, Telangana Chief Minister A Revanth Reddy directed the police to act tough against drug peddlers and consumers. He called for zero-tolerance towards drug usage. He was also instrumental in setting up EAGLE for eliminating the drug menace from the state. The name looks menacing, but EAGLE's action on the ground seems to be lackadaisical. Will this latest sensational drug case spur it into action? Unless the Telangana government acts tough and deals with the narcotics issue with an iron hand, the state will continue to face drug threats day in and day out.

Go for a contingency fund

The recent Rs 19,230 crore additional fertiliser outlay exposes this reality. Subsidising manufacturers rather than farmers encourages waste, leakages, and soil damage from imbalanced urea use. Genuine fiscal prudence demands shifting to direct benefit transfers, promoting sustainable farming, and diversifying import sources. A contingency fund should address genuine emergencies, not mask the absence of long-overdue reforms. Creating new corpus without tackling inefficiencies is not consolidation, it is cosmetic comfort.

TG Speaker's order on anti-defection petitions is a tricky constitutional test

It seems like the Anti-Defection Law is a defective law or a totally defective conclusion on the judgment of the Speaker of Telangana, Gaddam Prasad Kumar, on March 11. This has intensified a debate on whether the Speaker's decision was based on a strictly legal interpretation or influenced by political considerations.

The controversy surrounding the alleged defection of ten Members of the Legislative Assembly (MLAs) in Telangana has once again placed India's anti-defection law, legislative ethics, and constitutional accountability under intense public scrutiny. What began as a political dispute has now evolved into a significant constitutional question involving the powers of the Speaker, the limits of judicial review, and the integrity of representative democracy. The recent (March 13) directions of the Supreme Court of India in the matter have not decided the merits of the dispute but have highlighted a critical issue: transparency and procedural fairness in the Speaker's adjudication of disqualification petitions. The matter was heard by a two-judge bench, comprising Justice Sanjay Karol and Justice

Augustine George Masih.

During the proceedings, senior advocates appearing for the Speaker's office and the State government submitted that the Speaker had already completed the inquiry and had passed the final orders in all the disqualification petitions.

The controversy arose after ten MLAs, who were elected to the Telangana Legislative Assembly on the Bharat Rashtra Samithi (BRS) ticket, were accused of joining the ruling Congress party. Alleging that these MLAs had voluntarily given up their party membership, BRS leaders, including its working president K T Rama Rao (KTR) and Padi Kaushik Reddy, along with BJP MLA Yeleeti Maheshwar Reddy, approached the Supreme Court seeking directions regarding the disqualification petitions.

The petitions challenged the delay and the Speaker's alleged inaction in deciding the disqualification complaints under the anti-defection law.

According to the Speaker's decision, the 10 MLAs had not defected from the BRS, and hence the disqualification petitions were dismissed. However, the petitioners raised a serious objection before the Court: copies of the Speaker's orders and records of the proceedings were not furnished to them.

SC's directions:

Taking note of these concerns, the Supreme Court questioned why the Speaker's office had not supplied the relevant documents to the petitioners, especially when they were parties to the proceedings. The court directed that certified copies of the

Speaker's orders must be provided within 24 hours, while the depositions, statements, and other documents recorded during the proceedings had to be furnished within four days. At the same time, the court closed the present batch of petitions, observing that since the Speaker had already delivered his decisions, the appropriate remedy available to the petitioners would be to challenge those decisions through judicial review before the High Court. Thus, while the Supreme Court did not examine the correctness of the Speaker's verdict, it ensured that the petitioners would have access to the necessary documents to pursue further legal remedies.

The controversial findings:

The Speaker's ruling that the 10 MLAs had not defected triggered widespread criticism from political opponents and constitutional commentators. Several facts cited in the public domain have raised doubts about this conclusion. For instance, Khairatabad MLA Danam Nagender reportedly contested the Lok

Sabha elections from Secunderabad as a Congress candidate. Meanwhile, records on the Election Commission's website list him as a Congress nominee.

Similarly, Station Ghanpur MLA Kadiyam Srihari had been seen participating in Congress meetings and public programmes. His daughter contested the Warangal Lok Sabha seat as a Congress candidate and won. Given these developments, critics argue that it is difficult to reconcile the Speaker's finding that these MLAs continue to remain members of the BRS.

Constitutional Framework

The issue of defections in India is governed by the Tenth Schedule of the Constitution, introduced by the 52nd Constitutional Amendment in 1985. Under the Tenth Schedule, a legislator may be disqualified if:

1. They voluntarily give up membership of the political party on whose ticket they were elected;
2. They vote or abstain from voting against the party whip without permission;

3. An independent member joins a political party after being elected;
4. The authority to decide disqualification petitions rests with the Speaker (or Chairman) of the legislature.

Judicial review of the decisions:

The question of whether the Speaker's decisions can be reviewed by courts was settled in the landmark case of Kihoto Hollohan v. Zachillu. In that judgment, the Supreme Court upheld the validity of the anti-defection law but ruled that the Speaker's decisions are subject to judicial review. The court held that judicial intervention may be justified if the Speaker's decision:

- a. Violates constitutional provisions;
- b. Breaches the principles of natural justice;
- c. Is vitiated by mala fides or perversity.

Thus, the Speaker's decision is not beyond scrutiny. This principle is likely to be central if the Telangana matter reaches the High Court. Another recurring problem in anti-defection cases is the delay in deciding disqualification petitions. In the Telangana case, critics argue that not only was there a delay in deciding the petitions, but there was also a reluctance to provide certified copies of the orders, which further obstructed judicial review.

Natural justice:

At the heart of the controversy lies the issue of natural justice. Two core principles govern fair adjudication: Audi alteram partem, both sides must be heard, and reasoned decisions, the par-

ties must know the basis on which a decision has been made.

Democratic mandate:

Beyond legal technicalities, the issue of defections raises deeper questions about democratic morality. The Supreme Court's latest order does not conclude the controversy. Instead, it marks the beginning of the next phase of legal scrutiny. Once the Speaker's orders and related records are obtained, the petitioners are likely to approach the Telangana High Court seeking judicial review.

The High Court may examine several crucial questions:

1. Whether the MLAs had effectively given up their party membership;
2. Whether the Speaker's inquiry was fair and impartial;
3. Whether the decision is consistent with the constitutional principles governing defections.

Depending on the outcome, the matter could eventually return to the Supreme Court.

The Telangana episode also revives a broader institutional debate: Should the power to decide defection cases remain with the Speaker? Several constitutional scholars have suggested that this responsibility should instead be entrusted to an independent tribunal or the Election Commission of India to ensure impartiality. Until such reforms are undertaken, controversies like the present one are likely to recur.

The silent thunder: When Vajpayee, the poet-PM, recalibrated the global order

We have the capacity for a big blast. Ours is not a cry of despair; it is a challenge to the world - Atal Bihari Vajpayee


In the blistering, white-hot heat of the Thar Desert on May 11, 1998, the very sands of Pokhran didn't just shift; they shook the foundations of a geopolitical hierarchy that had long sought to keep India in a state of perpetual "strategic restraint." As the ground buckled and the sensors registered a seismic tremor of 5.3 on the Richter scale, a coded message flashed across the high-security corridors of New Delhi: "The Buddha has smiled again."

It was a moment of supreme audacity, orchestrated by a man who was as much a master of silence as he was of the spoken word. Bharat Ratna Atal Bihari Vajpayee, the poet-statesman, had just led India across the nuclear Rubicon, transforming a "post-colonial entity" into a "formidable power."

Anatomy of a secret: Defying the eye in the sky:

The 1998 Pokhran-II tests, codenamed 'Operation Shakti', were not merely a scientific achievement; they were a masterclass in clandestine leadership and psychological warfare. Vajpayee understood a chilling reality: the world's superpowers—armed with billion-dollar KH-11 "Keyhole" spy satellites—were watching India's every move from the heavens. The CIA had successfully blocked previous attempts by detecting heat signatures and soil movement. To succeed, Vajpayee knew he didn't just need scientists; he needed shadows.

Under his unwavering direction, the mission was shrouded in a "cloak of invisibility." He empowered the duo of Dr APJ Abdul Kalam and Dr R Chidambaram to operate with total autonomy, bypassing the traditional, leak-prone bureaucracy. Scientists wore army fatigues to blend in with the local units, worked only during the brief "black



spots" when satellites were positioned elsewhere, and moved heavy equipment under the cover of swirling sandstorms.

Vajpayee's leadership was the steady, invisible hand on the tiller. He took the ultimate gamble with India's economy, knowing that the fallout—draconian economic sanctions and diplomatic isolation—would be immediate. Yet he remained resolute. While the West slept, a poet was preparing a symphony of fire. He chose the nation's long-term dignity over the world's short-term approval, proving that true sovereignty cannot be requested—it must be taken.

The nuclear paradox-Iron fist, a velvet heart:

Vajpayee was a walking paradox, a leader who authorized the creation of world-ending weapons while penning verses about the fragility of a dewdrop. His decision to "go nuclear" was not born of warmongering or a thirst for conquest, but of a deep-seated, civilisational desire for peace through strength. He famously remarked that weapons are not for war, but to ensure that war never happens.

He believed that a weak India could never be a truly peaceful India but a vulnerable one. By declaring India a nuclear-weapon state, he wasn't seeking a tool for ag-

gression; he was building a "Minimum Credible Deterrent." His strategic foresight was prophetic. He anticipated the two-front threat from neighbours long before it became a staple of modern defense journals.

The "poet's resolve" was visible even as he faced the wrath of the Clinton administration. He remained unfazed in the face of global condemnation, famously stating in Parliament that India would never use these weapons against non-nuclear states—the No First Use (NFU) policy. This was his hallmark: the heart of a poet who wept for the fallen soldier, but the spine of a warrior who ensured that no mother would ever have to weep because her country was defenseless against nuclear blackmail.

From 1998 to a global power:

Estimates are that India possesses an arsenal of approximately 180 nuclear warheads. Vajpayee transformed India from a "suppliant" state, constantly asking for

permission, into a "deciding" power. He proved that India could withstand global sanctions and emerge stronger, eventually forcing the world to sign the Civil Nuclear Deal and recognize India as a responsible nuclear state.

He led with a smile that carried the weight of a thousand suns and a voice that could silence a storm. He showed that you could be a man of peace while holding the ultimate deterrent, and that a poet's vision is often clearer than a politician's calculation.

As we look back at the 1998 explosions, we remember not just the fire in the sky, but the calm in the heart of the man who ignited it. He was Bharat's true Ratna—a bridge between the ancient wisdom of the Buddha and the modern necessity of the missile.

My poetry is a declaration of war against defeat, not a song of surrender - Atal Bihari Vajpayee.

Claiming that revenue from 19 commercial complexes attached to the party office had been properly deposited during the 11 months when there was no DCC president, the leaders demanded that the party high command immediately intervene and take action over the alleged financial irregularities.

WHY LETTING CHILDREN FACE SMALL FAILURES BUILDS LIFELONG RESILIENCE

The present world which emphasizes achievement brings about protection for children against disappointment and frustration and failure. The protective measures which parents use to protect their children arise from their love for their children yet these measures create an unintended result which weakens the emotional strength of the children. Children develop emotional bravery through real-life experiences which include facing their first small failures. The process of brain development requires failure as an essential factor which also supports emotional development. Children learn to persevere through difficult challenges when their brains adapt to difficult situations which they cannot immediately solve. The process enhances neural connections which are essential for solving problems and managing emotions and maintaining determination.


Children learn to recognize discomfort as a temporary condition which they can handle. They develop a mindset which psychologists refer to as growth mindset because they believe that effort leads to skill development. Students who develop this mindset achieve academic success throughout their educational journey which extends into their professional life and mental health. The term emotionally brave describes children who experience fear and embarrassment and calmly perform the tasks and maintain their courage.

Children develop emotional strength through learning that these feelings represent



standard reactions which people experience. Children experience sadness and frustration and self-doubt when they lose a game or face school challenges or forget performance lines or fail to join a team. The moments which people experience teach them how to manage their emotions. The child recognizes that challenging emotions will emerge reach their highest point and then disappear. Building emotional endurance enables people to face their future life challenges which include academic pressure and workplace stress and relationship difficulties.

The emotional weakness develops through excessive protection from parental care. The presence of adults who solve problems and handle disputes and shield children from failure hinders their development of coping mechanisms. The unknown experience of failure makes them develop intense fear of failure. Children with this condition avoid new experiences and they show quick abandonments of tasks and they need to receive approval from others. The condition develops into anxiety issues and low self-esteem and an inability to handle rejection and criticism in both teenage years and adult life. Minor



In a world that prizes constant achievement, many children are shielded from failure in the name of love—often at the cost of their emotional resilience. Experts say that small setbacks are essential for building confidence, problem-solving ability and lifelong mental strength

ing of failure through their actions. The goal is not to create harsh or stressful situations but to create situations that match the natural development needs of children. The adult response matters more than the actual failure when children experience their first unsuccessful attempts. Children need calm reassurance and empathy together with encouragement to attempt again because these elements help them develop constructive ways to handle their situations. Resilience gets strengthened through statements which recognize persistence and courage because those statements direct focus towards effort instead of final results.

Children need to develop their ability to solve problems through independent thinking because this skill holds equal value with their need to solve problems through independent thinking. The process of solving problems without assistance helps individuals build their confidence when they face challenges with friends or work on tough tasks or ac-

quire new abilities. The ability to handle difficulties enhances emotional security for children because they understand their own capacity to deal with problems.

Children who display emotional courage develop into adults who possess strong mental abilities and adaptable nature and self-assuredness. The methods enable them to take safe risks and try out fresh possibilities while using their previous failures to guide them toward success. The practice of avoiding all failures leads people to develop fear-based behaviors which result in emotional weakness.

People develop resilience through their challenges instead of their comfortable experiences. The process of developing resilience requires people to go through various life situations which include their temporary periods of rest and their self-evaluation time.



13-year-old Hyderabad student develops multi-system AI architecture

Raja Dharma Tej Maddala develops a unique artificial intelligence framework designed for multi-perspective reasoning and collaborative decision-making


IN an unusual example of young innovation, a 13-year-old student from Hyderabad has designed an artificial intelligence ecosystem that is attracting attention in technology and research circles. Raja Dharma Tej Maddala, a Grade 7 student, has developed an original AI framework called Raja MagRex AI™, which has been recognised as an innovation initiative by the Government of India's Department for Promotion of Industry and Internal Trade (DPIIT). At an age when most students are just beginning to explore coding and basic digital tools, Raja is attempting to rethink how artificial intelligence systems can be structured and coordinated.

Raja, who studies in the IB Middle Years Programme at Oakridge International School,

Gachibowli, describes himself as a technology enthusiast with a deep interest in artificial intelligence, science and complex systems. His curiosity about how mathematics, computing and scientific ideas connect with each other gradually led him to explore artificial intelligence more seriously.

This interest eventually resulted in the creation of Raja MagRex AI™, an AI ecosystem designed around a structured architecture rather than a single model. According to Raja, the system is built on 22 cognitive systems, 87 modules and more than 100 functional features. The aim is to allow the system to examine problems from multiple analytical perspectives before producing a final response.

The project introduces a concept he calls "Artificial Civilisation Intelligence."



The idea is inspired by how human societies solve complex problems. In the real world, experts from different fields such as science, engineering, economics and policy often collaborate to reach better decisions. Raja's framework attempts to replicate this model within an AI environment, where multiple reasoning systems analyse an issue simultaneously and contribute to a unified conclusion.

At the centre of the architecture is a

coordination system called NEURA, which manages how the different cognitive modules interact with each other. When a problem or prompt is introduced, NEURA analyses it and determines which reasoning systems should be activated. These systems may focus on areas such as logical reasoning, contextual understanding, analytical evaluation or creative exploration. Their outputs are then combined through a structured synthesis process to produce a final response.

Unlike many current AI tools that rely on a single large model to generate answers directly from prompts, Raja's framework emphasises structured reasoning and collaborative analysis. The architecture allows different reasoning pathways to examine the same problem before arriving at a conclusion, which he believes could make AI systems more transparent and easier to interpret.

Building the system while continuing regular school responsibilities was one of the biggest challenges, Raja said. Balancing classes, assignments and examinations while working on research and system design required careful time management and discipline.

Much of the work involved not just coding but also conceptual thinking about how

different systems should interact and how reasoning should flow across the architecture.

Despite the challenges, Raja continued refining the concept and developing the structure of the AI ecosystem. He is currently working on Version 1 of Raja MagRex AI™, focusing on integrating the core systems and modules and preparing the framework for real-world testing.

The next stage will involve deploying the system to observe how different cognitive modules collaborate in practical scenarios. This phase will help improve the orchestration logic and refine the coordination between different reasoning systems.

In the long term, Raja hopes to expand the architecture by adding more advanced modules and exploring applications in research,

Examples of how it helps solve problems

For example, if a city wants to reduce air pollution, the system can study pollution sources, traffic patterns, weather conditions and policy options before suggesting balanced solutions such as improving public transport or regulating emissions.

In education, if a student faces a difficult scientific question, the AI can break the problem into smaller steps, examine different theories and explain possible solutions.

By combining these viewpoints, the system helps users understand the problem better and arrive at more thoughtful and practical solutions.

Tips to crack the class XII Economics board exam

Preparing for the Class XII Economics board examination requires a clear strategy, regular practice and strong conceptual understanding. Many students study hard but still lose marks due to avoidable mistakes, poor time management or lack of structured revision. Analysing mistakes, practising sample papers consistently and following a clear revision plan can help improve both accuracy and confidence. The following practical tips can help students prepare effectively and perform well in the Economics board examination.

General Tips

1. By now, most students would have attempted two pre-board examinations. Carefully evaluate your mistakes, identify recurring errors and clearly mark the chapters or topics where you are weak. Begin your revision with these weaker areas and practise related questions alongside.
2. While revising the syllabus, do not stop solving sample papers thinking you will attempt them after completing revision. Over the next two months, try to solve one sample paper every two days. For Economics, analyse your mistakes in each paper and maintain a separate

notebook to record them. Revisiting these errors regularly will help you avoid repeating them.

4. Go through at least the last five years of official sample papers and previous year questions. Read each question carefully, frame answers mentally and verify them using the marking scheme. Solve all MCQs and numericals thoroughly and keep a

record of your mistakes.

5. Practise case-study based questions from the official question bank as they are often included in the board examination pattern.
6. Plan your revision by working backwards from the exam dates. Decide how many days you will dedicate to each subject and set a target number of sample papers to practise before the exam.

Macroeconomics Tips

1. Conceptual clarity is essential in Macroeconomics. First revise each chapter thoroughly and then

practise all related questions, especially numericals.

2. Maintain a separate list of graphs chapter-wise with proper labelling and practise drawing them. Use graphs wherever applicable, even in short-answer questions.
3. Many students find it difficult to identify items included in national income or domestic income. Maintain a separate list of such questions along with explanations to understand the logic behind inclusion and exclusion.
4. While solving numericals,

clearly write "Given" and "To Find," mention the formula and show all steps. Avoid shortcuts during practice as writing complete steps helps reduce errors in the exam.

Indian Economy Tips

1. The NCERT textbook is the most important source for Indian Economy. Read it carefully as questions are often directly based on it.
2. Prepare short notes for quick revision before the exam.
3. Follow a structured revision flow: read the chapter carefully, revise the recap section, practise

questions based on the chapter and solve objective questions for reinforcement.

4. Maintain a list of important dates, data points and policy-related developments. Using accurate data in answers can improve the quality of your responses.
5. After completing your first revision, cross-check the official syllabus and ensure that every topic has been covered.

Answer Writing Tips

1. Manage time carefully. You may spend around one hour on Macroeconomics and about one and a half hours on Indian Economy. Keep at least twenty minutes at the end to revise the entire paper.
2. In Macroeconomics, use tables and graphs wherever required. Write full formulas in numericals and avoid abbreviations.
3. Begin answers with definitions wherever possible and conclude with a short line. Present answers in clear points.
4. You may start with either section depending on your comfort, but complete one section fully before moving to the other.

India has depth to field several T20 teams: SKY

'Batting a mix of instinct and reaction and team effort behind 80 per cent win rate'

NEW DELHI

INDIA'S T20 World Cup-winning captain Suryakumar Yadav believes the country's talent pool in the shortest format has grown so vast that it could comfortably field two or even three international-quality teams at the same time, underlining the depth created by a thriving domestic structure and franchise ecosystem.

The flamboyant batter, who has overseen a period of remarkable consistency since taking over the leadership after the ICC Men's T20 World Cup 2024, credited the steady pipeline of players emerging from domestic competitions and the Indian Premier League for strengthening India's dominance in T20 cricket.

Since Suryakumar took over the captaincy in 2024 -- right after Rohit Sharma stepped down following the World Cup victory in Barbados -- the Indian team has won 42 of the 52 matches played, reflecting team's domi-



nance in a fickle format.

In a podcast interview with PTI Videos on Sunday, Suryakumar called the current group "the best T20 team India has produced", adding that India's depth in T20 cricket is now too evident to be downplayed.

"If you talk about talent, I feel you can find talent regularly. There is IPL cricket, franchise cricket, then there is domestic cricket. You can see how many players come every year. So you can make as many teams as you want in T20 when I am talking about T20," Suryakumar said.

"So I feel talent is unlimited. If you can make two-three

playing XIs, our base is so strong, of the Indian team. So this is not a modest and diplomatic reply. But now it is so strong, so there is no shame in telling the truth," he said.

Suryakumar credited the team's success coming into the World Cup to a collective approach in the dressing room, saying a shared vision among players and support staff helped produce an impressive 80 per cent win rate in a notoriously unpredictable format.

Even with that success rate, the World Cup was not going to be a cake-walk because as Suryakumar noted, "we played bilateral matches one way, and in ICC tournament something

else happened."

For this reason, he needed to motivate the team to maintain the winning streak in the Feb 7 to March 8 tournament.

"I don't pay too much attention to statistics but I hate losing any game. If everyone in the dressing room moves in the same direction, only then can you achieve such a percentage," he said.

Known for his 360-degree strokeplay, Suryakumar described batting in T20 cricket as largely a reactive sport, with preparation accounting for only part of the process. "I feel batting is about 70-75 per cent reaction. The remaining 25 per cent is instinct, what you decide to do in the moment. Once you enter the ground, you are almost in autopilot mode. You try to bat with rhythm and according to the situation," he said. He also traced the origins of his unconventional range of shots to childhood rubber-ball games in Mumbai, where uneven boundary sizes forced him to improvise.

Indian women's team to feature in FIH Hockey Nation Cup

LAUSANNE (SWITZERLAND): The Indian women's team will feature in the FIH Hockey Nations Cup to be held in Auckland, New Zealand from June 15 to 21.

The Hockey Nations Cup was launched in 2021 to offer a top-level competition to the best-ranked teams not participating in the Hockey Pro League, and give the winning team an option to be promoted in it the following season. The Indian women's hockey team was relegated from the Pro League 2024-25 after finishing at the bottom of the nine-team standings.

Apart from India, hosts New Zealand, USA, Japan, Korea, Chile, Scotland and France, who were promoted via the Hockey Nations Cup 2, will take part in the event.

The men's event will be held in Cape Town and will involve South Africa, New Zealand, France, Korea, Japan, Wales, Malaysia, along with Scotland, who were promoted via the Hockey Nations Cup 2, as well as Ireland, who were relegated from the 2024-25 season of the Hockey Pro League.

ORLEANS MASTERS SUPER 300

Ayush, Tanvi to lead Indian challenge; Injured Prannoy pulls out

ORLEANS (FRANCE): Youngsters Ayush Shetty and Tanvi Sharma will lead India's challenge at the USD 250,000 Orleans Masters Super 300 badminton tournament beginning here on Tuesday after senior shuttler HS Prannoy pulled out due to a shoulder injury.

Prannoy, who was originally slated to face top seed Chou Tien Chen of Chinese Taipei in the opening round, was forced to withdraw after experiencing shoulder pain during the Swiss Open in Basel last week. While the cause of his discomfort was unclear initially, the Indian had decided to pull out of his match against Japan's Koki Watanabe to avoid aggravating the injury.

"The shoulder pain developed after travelling to the Swiss Open. We didn't know the reason then, so I decided to withdraw and fly back," Prannoy told PTI. "After a scan it showed a slight tear. It is a minor thing and hopefully I should be okay soon," added the seasoned pro, who is targeting a return at the Asian Championships to be held from April 7 to 12 in Ningbo, China.

All eyes will be on eighth seed world No. 25 Ayush Shetty, who won the US Open Super 300 last year, as he opens his campaign against Lee Chia Hao of Chinese Taipei.

Former world No. 1 and currently ranked 30th, Kidambi Srikanth will face Denmark's Magnus Johannesen.

Tharun Mannepilli, fresh from a quarterfinal finish at last week's Swiss Open, takes on



Chinese Taipei's Wang Tzu Wei in his opening game. World No. 42 Kiran George will face third seed Kenta Nishimoto of Japan.

In women's singles, Tanvi Sharma, the silver medalist at last year's BWF Junior World Championships, will take on Thailand's Supanida Katethong, while Malvika Bansod will continue her quest for glory after returning to action from a major injury when she faces Sung Shuo Yun of Chinese Taipei.

Rakshitha Sree Santhosh Ramraj will meet Japan's Manami Suizu, while Anmol Kharb will be up against Turkey's Neslihan Arin.

In women's doubles, Devika Sihag and Isharani Baruah will take on a pair coming through the qualifiers. The men's doubles pair of Hariharan Amsakarunan and M R Arjun will face the Chinese Taipei duo of Lai Po Yu and Tsai Fu Cheng.

In women's doubles, Ashwini Bhat K and Shikha Gautam will be up against the fourth-seeded Japanese pair of Rui Hirokami and Sayaka Hobara.

Bumrah creates an impact in every game: Aakash Chopra

NEW DELHI

FORMER India opener Aakash Chopra says pace ace Jasprit Bumrah is guaranteed to deliver in every match for the Mumbai Indians (MI) in IPL 2026, but warned that the five-time Indian Premier League (IPL) champions face a complex puzzle to solve to fit their array of overseas talent into their playing eleven.

Bumrah picked 18 wickets in 12 games at an average of 17.56 and an economy rate of 6.68 in IPL 2025. MI will kick-

start their campaign at home against three-time champions Kolkata Knight Riders (KKR) on March 29 at the Wankhede Stadium in Mumbai. The side had reached Qualifier 2 in IPL 2025 before losing to eventual runners-up Punjab Kings.

BJP MP's remarks on namaz draw flak from Oppn

ALIGARH (UP)

THE remarks of a BJP MP that he does not know what Eid or Ramzan is while opposing namaz in this Uttar Pradesh district have gone viral on social media, drawing criticism from opposition politicians, even as community leaders have

appealed for calm.

When reporters asked BJP MP Satish Gautam on Sunday about a local AIMIM leader's demand for permission to hold Eid prayers at the exhibition grounds here, he said he is not interested in such festivals and does not even know their names. "I do not

know what Eid or Ramzan is. I am least interested in them," Gautam said.

He also accused Muslims of "illegally occupying huge tracts of land during the Samajwadi Party's rule" in Uttar Pradesh and questioned the need for additional space for prayers. "There is no need to give

them the ground. They have the Eidgah for prayers," the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) leader said.

He further said that Muslims are among the major beneficiaries of the present BJP-led government's welfare schemes. "They are getting more than their due share, so what else

do they want from us now?" he asked.

Reacting to the MP's remarks, former Aligarh Muslim University Students' Union president Salman Imtiaz said Gautam is known for frequently making "senseless and provocative statements" and that both Hindus and Muslims

ignore such comments in the interest of peace.

Imtiaz, now associated with the Congress and a former contestant for the Aligarh City Assembly seat, alleged that Gautam's remarks were intended at diverting attention from internal disputes within the city unit of the BJP.



Man kills 2 in-laws during Panchayat; wife critical

BAREILLY (UP)

A man on Monday allegedly stabbed his mother-in-law and brother-in-law to death and seriously injured his wife during a panchayat in Rahrura Chaudhary village in Bareilly district, police said.

The accused, identified as Afsar Khan, fled after the attack and police teams have been deployed to trace him, Bareilly Additional SP Manush Pareek said.

"Raids are being conducted at several locations and the accused will be arrested soon," he added.

According to the police, the victims have been identified as 19-year-old Adil and his 45-year-old mother Asma, while the accused's wife Saima sustained serious stab injuries and is undergoing treatment in a hospital where her condition is stated to be critical. Family members said Afsar Khan had a violent temperament and frequently quarrelled with his wife over minor issues, forc-



ing her to repeatedly return to her parental home. Saima had reportedly refused to go back with him due to his aggressive behaviour.

They said the accused had earlier been arrested in 2022 for allegedly killing his maternal uncle in the Bithri Chainpur police station area and had recently returned to the village after securing bail from a court.

The police said Saima had submitted a written complaint at Izzatnagar police station on Sunday alleging that her husband was threatening to kill her and her family members. On Monday, villagers convened a panchayat to resolve the dispute when the accused allegedly attacked the family members with a knife before fleeing, the police said.

'Embezzlement' of Rs 11.4-cr scholarship funds

CBI registers FIR against govt officials in 5 states

NEW DELHI

The CBI has registered a case into the alleged siphoning of more than Rs 11.4 crore from scholarship funds intended for students with disabilities by "non-existent" institutes and students, officials said Monday.

The Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI) has filed an FIR against unidentified public servants and nodal officers in Delhi, Uttar Pradesh, Tamil Nadu, Karnataka, and Jammu and Kashmir for allegedly embezzling funds from the Umbrella Scholarship Scheme, launched in 2018 after six scholarship schemes including the Post-matric Scholarship for Students with



Disabilities were merged, the agency said.

Scholarships under this scheme were available to students of classes 11 and 12, as well as in post-matriculation diploma and certificate courses. Bachelor's degree and diploma and master's degree and diploma from any university recognised by UGC/AICTE were also funded under

these scholarships.

"The objective and allowances of the scheme for the post-metric scholarship, including the details of maintenance allowance, disability allowance, reimbursement of compulsory non-refundable fees and book allowance, are referred to in the scheme book (scholarship scheme for students with disabilities)," the

CBI said.

The central agency had launched a preliminary enquiry last year on a complaint from the secretary of the Union Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment, Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities, alleging that Rs 11.41 crore in scholarships had been paid to 926 students related to 28 institutes, which were either fake or showed serious malpractices during an inspection by the ministry.

During the enquiry, it surfaced that many of these institutions were non-existent or were closed while still claiming funds from the National Scholarship Portal, according to the FIR.

Hoax cyanide gas email threat alarms Bhopal office


BHOPAL

AN email threatening to "blow up" the premises of a Madhya Pradesh government office here using cyanide gas cylinders on Monday prompted precautionary evacuation, officials said.

The threat turned out to be a hoax after police personnel searched the office of the Weights and Measures Department in the MP Nagar area.

"While checking mails, I came across a message at 10:20 AM stating that 16 cylinders filled with cyanide gas had been placed inside the department office and would go off around 1 pm," office superintendent Shyam Solanki told PTI.

He contacted his seniors, and the police were informed. Bomb disposal squad personnel and police teams with sniffer dogs rushed to the spot and searched the premises, he said, adding that the office



was evacuated as a precaution.

Solanki said the police did not find any cylinders or explosives in the office. Officials said similar threatening emails had earlier targeted People's University and AIIMS in Bhopal, but those alerts also proved false.

Bhopal City Zone 2 Deputy Commissioner of Police (DCP) Vivek Singh stated that the investigation is underway to identify the sender of the email. He suspected that a gang was behind such emails nationwide, using fake names. Department officers and workers' leader Umashankar Tiwari said staffers resumed work at 1:10 PM.



Venugopal urges LS Speaker to revoke 8 MPs' suspension

NEW DELHI: Congress leader K C Venugopal urged Lok Sabha Speaker Om Birla on Monday to revoke the suspension of eight opposition members, saying they were suspended "unfairly".

Raising the issue during the Zero Hour, Venugopal said Parliament has seen countless protests but suspending MPs is a "disturbing new trend" that cannot be allowed to continue.

Birla said a decision of the Lok Sabha cannot be discussed on the floor of the House and disallowed Venugopal to speak further. Later, in a post on X, the Congress leader said he had raised concern over the "unfair suspension of 8 Opposition MPs for this Session". Exports dip marginally in Feb

NEW DELHI

INDIA'S merchandise exports dipped marginally in February while the trade deficit narrowed sequentially as imports moderated compared with the previous month, according to data released by the Ministry of Commerce and Industry on Monday.

Exports in February

stood at \$36.61 billion, registering a slight 0.81 per cent decline year-on-year. Imports, however, rose sharply by 24.11 per cent to \$63.71 billion, pushing the trade deficit to \$27.1 billion during the month.

On a month-on-month basis, the deficit narrowed from \$34.68 billion in January, as imports fell from \$71.24 billion while exports were almost unchanged.

Commerce Secretary Rajesh Agrawal said exports have remained resilient despite global challenges, though shipments may see a downward trend in March due to logistical disruptions arising from tensions in West Asia.

For the April-February period of FY26, India's merchandise exports grew 1.84 per cent to \$402.93 billion, compared with \$395.66 bil-

lion in the same period last year. Imports during the period increased 8.53 per cent to \$713.53 billion.

The data comes amid escalating tensions in West Asia following military action by the US and Israel against Iran on February 28. The crisis has disrupted key trade routes, particularly the Strait of Hormuz, through which nearly 20 per cent of global oil and gas shipments pass.

Officials said India has strengthened its resilience to global energy shocks through diversification of imports across about 40 supplier countries and by building strategic petroleum reserves. Government officials added that India is also in contact with Iran to ensure safe passage for merchant ships through the region.

Sebi mulls light-touch penalty structure for IAs

The regulator aims to promote compliance while ensuring transparency and fairness

NEW DELHI: With an aim to strengthen the investment advisory ecosystem, markets regulator Sebi is working on a raft of measures, including a standardised light-touch penalty structure, a digital regulatory guidance platform, and a common advertisement code, its chairman Tuhin Kanta Pandey said. Speaking at an event organised by the Association of Registered Investment Advisers (ARIA), Pandey said the investment advisory ecosystem in India is currently at an important stage of transition.

At present, there are around 1,000 registered investment advisers (IAs) in the country -- about 470 individuals and 530 non-individual entities. He said the regulator is working on a standardised light-touch penalty structure aimed at encouraging compliance



while ensuring transparency and fairness. "A standardised light-touch penalty structure for IAs is being worked out. This should promote compliance while ensuring transparency and fairness," he said.

The regulator is also developing a digital platform -- SEBI SETU -- to provide simple, end-to-end regulatory guidance for investment advisers, covering the entire lifecycle from registration to ongoing compliance, he added.

In addition, the regulator is preparing a common advertisement code for all intermediaries to reduce

operational challenges and improve consistency in communication. Among other initiatives, a working group has been constituted to review the existing regulatory framework for Mutual Fund Distributors (MFDs) and examine overlaps, if any, between MFDs and investment advisers.

Pandey said a simplified certification module is also being developed by National Institute of Securities Markets (NISM) for individuals associated with investment advice who are engaged in sales and other non-core functions. However, he expressed concern over the declining number of registered investment advisers despite a rapidly expanding investor base.

"It is a matter of concern that the number of registered investment advisers has declined since 2021.

Vedanta eyes ₹2,575-cr via NCDs

NEW DELHI: Vedanta Ltd said its committee of directors has approved raising up to Rs 2,575 crore through issuance of debentures. The fundraising is part of Vedanta's efforts to diversify funding sources and strengthen its balance sheet as it continues to refinance debt and reduce borrowing costs. The committee has approved the allotment of 2,57,500 unsecured, redeemable, rated, listed, non-convertible debentures of face value of Rs 1,00,000 each, aggregating to Rs 2,575 crore on a private placement basis, a BSE filing said. Vedanta has seen strong investor interest in recent debt issuances. In October 2025, its \$500 million bond issue was oversubscribed three times, while an NCD offering in June last year saw nearly 60 per cent oversubscription. The company has been gradually deleveraging its balance sheet. Vedanta Resources Ltd, the parent of Vedanta Ltd, has reduced net debt to about \$4.8 billion as of December 2025 from about \$8.9 billion in March 2022.

Inflation: Rising crude prices push WPI to 11-month high of 2.13% in Feb

NEW DELHI: Wholesale price inflation rose to a 11-month high of 2.13 per cent in February, driven by an uptick in prices of food and non-food articles, even though vegetable prices eased on a month-on-month basis, government data showed on Monday.

This is the fourth straight month of rise in Wholesale Price Index (WPI)-based inflation. It was 1.81 per cent in January and 2.45 per cent in February last year.

Economists said the WPI inflation is likely to pick up pace further if the oil price

rise persists, and spills over to other goods (fertilisers, aluminium) given it tracks international prices more closely relative to the CPI basket.

According to WPI data, inflation in food articles was 2.19 per cent in February, as against 1.55 per cent in the previous month. Although in vegetables, inflation eased to 4.73 per cent in February against 6.78 per cent in Janu-

ary, pulses, potato and egg, meat and fish saw an uptick in inflation in February.

"Positive rate of inflation in February 2026 is primarily due to an increase in prices of other manufacturing, manufacture of basic metals, non-food articles, food articles and textiles, etc.," the industry ministry said in a statement. Negative inflation, or deflation, in the fuel and power basket narrowed

to 3.78 per cent in February, vis-a-vis 4.01 per cent in January. Global oil prices averaged \$68/bbl in February from \$63/bbl in January.

Barclays in a research note said the passthrough of the rise in crude oil prices from the Middle East conflict will reflect more in WPI inflation vs retail CPI inflation, as retail fuel prices are unchanged in the latter.

"With a sharp jump in crude oil prices crossing \$100/bbl as of 16 March, the corresponding WPI will likely reflect this in the March print," Barclays said.

India Ratings and Research the rising crude oil prices since the US-Iran war will have a strong impact on wholesale inflation from March 2026, till the supply side issues are resolved.

The average price of Indian crude basket March 2026 (up to March 12) touched a 44-month high of \$101.25/bbl.

Nifty likely to reach 35,000 in 3 yrs: Report

NEW DELHI: India's benchmark index Nifty 50 is likely to touch 34,000-35,000 levels over the next three years due to earnings growth, stronger consumption and banking credit expansion, a report claimed on Monday.

From these factors and continued investment in infrastructure and manufacturing, Nifty earnings per share may rise to Rs 1,281 in FY27, Rs 1,463 in FY28 and Rs 1,650-1,700 by FY29, the report from investment platform smallcase said. Mid-caps led market returns, outperforming large caps during the past four years when global markets experienced shocks from multiple geopolitical conflicts, the report said.

Indian markets delivered about 12.7 per cent CAGR demonstrated notable resilience, with most geopolitical shocks triggering short-term corrections of



around 2-8 per cent, followed by swift recoveries within weeks, during times of conflict in last 4 years.

This performance has been supported by the strength of the domestic economy, improving corporate earnings, and rising retail participation in the stock market, the firm said. Assuming the index maintains its current valuation multiple of about 20.9x earnings, the trend could translate into approximately 12.8-14 per cent compound annual growth rate (CAGR), the report added.

The firm highlighted mid-caps delivered CAGRs of about 18.4 per cent dur-

ing this period versus 13.4 per cent for small caps and 9.8 per cent for large caps. Defence and aerospace companies have emerged as key beneficiaries of heightened geopolitical tensions, supported by rising global defence spending and stronger domestic procurement initiatives, it said.

Oil and gas producers have also historically performed well during geopolitical crises due to supply disruptions and rising crude oil prices. Commodity-linked sectors such as metals and mining have similarly witnessed phases of outperformance during periods of supply constraints and commodity price rallies, it added. Meanwhile, manufacturing and capital goods companies are gaining prominence as global supply chains undergo structural shifts, the firm suggested.

"The moment I heard it was Pawan Kalyan Garu's film, I said yes immediately — even before listening to the story. Since my first film, I've heard so much about his stardom and the phenomenon people call 'Pawanism.' I always wished to work with him at least once. With this film, that dream finally came true."

In the film, Raashii plays Shloka, a contemporary young woman written with depth and presence. She describes the role as both stylish and substantial. "Every character in the story has importance, and Shloka has a strong arc with solid characterization. There's good emotional range in the role." She adds with a smile, "I also have a proper

Raashii is equally appreciative of director Harish Shankar's filmmaking intensity. "He's extremely sharp and understands the pulse of the mass audience perfectly. What amazed me most was his speed — a schedule that usually takes 120 days was completed in just 40. He worked tirelessly, often sacrificing sleep." She recalls how his creativity

flowed even on set. "He would write punch dialogues on the spot. His patience and dedication to cinema taught me so much."

Despite sharing screen space with another leading lady, Raashii says the narrative gives each character room to shine. "We don't have scenes together, so there was never a concern. Each role has its own space, and mine comes with good variations."

Managing schedules around the star's commitments required flexibility and stamina. "I was told in advance that dates could be unpredictable, and I was prepared. There were days we worked 24-hour shifts without knowing whether it was day or night."

She also credits the producers for fostering a creative environment. "They put their heart and soul into films, never compromise on scale, and give directors complete freedom. The working atmosphere is wonderful."

For audiences, Raashii promises a wholesome entertainer. "Like 'Gabbar Singh', this film is packed with entertainment. It's a complete family film everyone can enjoy together in theatres. Releasing during Ugadi makes it even more special. Most importantly, you'll get to see vintage Pawan Kalyan Garu on screen."



Kiran Abbavaram unveils Thimmarajupalli TV's 'Ooru Song'


