SKM announces nationwide stir from May 27

NEW DELHI: The Samyukt Kisan Morcha (SKM) on Friday announced a nationwide agitation beginning May 27, calling upon farmer unions and agricultural workers to burn copies of the Centre's recent minimum support price (MSP) order and the Commission for Agricultural Costs and Prices (CACP) report on price policy for the 2026-27 Kharif season. The CACP is an expert advisory body under the Ministry of Agriculture and Farmers Welfare, and is responsible for recommending MSPs for notified crops during Kharif and Rabi seasons. The farmers' body, that had led the 2021-22 farmers' agitation at Delhi's borders, said it would intensify protests against the Union government over the announced MSP structure for the 2026-27 Kharif season, the recent increase in fuel prices, and the worsening fertiliser situation.

2 Indians die while descending from Everest

KATHMANDU: Two Indian mountaineers who summited Everest have died while descending, an official said on Friday. The climbers, identified as Arun Kumar Tiwari and Sandeep Are, were exhausted while they were coming down from the peak and could not be saved despite the best efforts of their guides, said Rishi Bhandari, secretary general of the Expedition Operators Association of Nepal. It appears that Are summited on Wednesday and Tiwari on Thursday around 5.30 pm, Bhandari told PTI. The guides "worked really hard" but were not able to save them, he said.

IUML, VCK join Vijay govt

THE NDA is likely to lose one Rajya Sabha seat in the biennial elections for 26 seats in 12 states across the country, while the Congress-led opposition is

set to gain three. The Election Commission on Friday announced elections for 26 Rajya Sabha seats on June 18 following the retirement of incumbents, including former prime minister HD Deve Gowda, Congress president Mallikarjun

Kharge and party leader Digvijaya Singh, besides two Union ministers Ravneet

Singh and George Kurian. In a statement, the EC said the elections for the Rajya

Sabha seats will be held in 10 states where 24 incumbents are retiring on different dates beginning June 21 to July 19. Of the total 26 seats where elections are being held, the NDA currently has 18 and the Congress four while one seat is with the JMM and three are with the YSRCP. The NDA is likely to get 17 seats in these elections, while the Congress will get five, the JMM two and the TVK one. The NDA currently has 149 MPs in the upper house while the opposition has 78 and non-aligned regional

parties have 17 MPs in the 244-member house. The Rajya Sabha elections will be held in four seats each in Andhra Pradesh, Gujarat and Karnataka, three seats each in Madhya Pradesh and Rajasthan, two seats in Jharkhand and one seat each in Manipur, Meghalaya, Arunachal Pradesh and Mizoram. Besides, one seat each in Maharashtra and Tamil Nadu will also go to the polls on June 18. The last date for filing of nominations is June 8,

according to the EC. In a separate notification, the EC also announced by-elections to fill the vacancies created by the NCP's Sunetra Pawar in Maharashtra and the AI-ADMK's C Ve Shanmugam in Tamil Nadu following their resignations after they were elected to the state assemblies. While the NDA is set to bag Pawar's seat, going by its strength in the state assembly, the TVK is likely to get the lone Rajya Sabha seat from Tamil Nadu going for a bypoll.

RBI's Rs 2.87L crore gift to Centre amid austerity

THE Reserve Bank on Friday announced a record dividend of Rs 2.87 lakh crore to the government for the year-ended March 2025, providing a financial boost for the exchequer amid rising import bills and supply chain disruptions due to the West Asia conflict.

The dividend is 6.7 per cent higher than Rs 2.69 lakh crore for the 2024-25 fiscal year. In a statement, the RBI said its net income, before risk provision and transfer to statutory funds, aggregated Rs 3.96 lakh crore in FY26 as against Rs 3.13 lakh crore in FY25. "The balance sheet of the Bank expanded by 20.61 per cent to Rs 91,97,121.08 crore as on March 31, 2026,"

According to the statement, the revised Economic Capital Framework (ECF) provides flexibility to maintain the Contingent Risk Buffer (CRB) between the range of 4.5 per cent and 7.5 per cent of the size of the balance sheet. "Taking into consideration the current macro-economic factors, financial performance of the Bank and maintenance of appropriate risk buffers, the Central Board decided to transfer Rs 1,09,379.64 crore towards the CRB for FY 2025-26 as against Rs 44,861.70 crore in the previous year," it said. The CRB at 6.5 per cent of the size of the RBI balance sheet, compared to 7.5 per cent for 2024-25.

100 'oxygen parks' soon to improve city climate

CHIEF Minister Rekha Gupta announced on Friday that the Delhi government plans to develop 100 "oxygen parks" featuring dense tree cover to improve the city's climate and address pollution issues. Laying the foundation stone of the park to be developed on 3-acre land in Mukhmelpur village in north Delhi's Buzurg, Gupta stated that this will be the first such park in the city.

"Delhi was turned into a gas chamber for years, but nobody was concerned to take steps to address pollution in Delhi," the chief minister said and announced that her government has set a target of planting more than 70 lakh trees, shrubs and hedges across the city this year. She



noted that her government has been actively working for the past year to combat pollution, and the establishment of these parks is part of that initiative. The chief minister said the parks will have dense fruit-bearing trees to provide shelter to birds and provide oxygen. "These parks with dense trees are a requirement of Delhi," she said. The park in

Mukhmelpur designed with both public convenience and environmental sustainability in mind, will feature walking tracks, energy-efficient lighting, huts for seating and relaxation, a landscaped pond and a variety of shade-giving tree species. Large green lawns and open spaces will also be developed as part of the project, said a CMO statement.

Centre to bring back some persons deported to B'desh

THE Centre on Friday told the Supreme Court that it has decided to bring back some people, who were earlier deported to Bangladesh, to India and would then verify their claim of Indian citizenship.

Solicitor General Tushar Mehta, appearing for the Centre, told a bench headed by Chief Justice Surya Kant that keeping in view the peculiar facts and circumstances of the case and by not treating it as a precedent to be followed in other matters, the government has decided to bring them back. "The government would bring them back and thereafter examine their status. Depending upon the outcome, we will take steps accordingly," Mehta



told the bench, which also comprised Justices Joymalya Bagchi and Vipul M Pancholi.

The top law officer said that it may take 8-10 days to bring these persons back to India.

The bench posted the matter for hearing in July. The top court was hearing a plea of the Centre challenging a September 26, 2025 order of the Calcutta High Court by which it had set aside the central government's decision to deport Sunali Khatun and others to Bangladesh and termed it as "illegal".

Uber airport share service launched

IN a fresh push towards cleaner and smarter urban transport, the Delhi Government on Thursday rolled out a large-scale airport ride-sharing initiative aimed at cutting traffic congestion, reducing vehicular pollution and lowering travel costs for commuters.

Chief Minister Rekha Gupta formally flagged off the Uber Airport Share service at the Delhi Secretariat in the presence of Environment, Forest and Wildlife Minister Manjinder Singh Sirsa. The service has been launched at Indira Gandhi International (IGI) Airport, one of the country's busiest travel hubs, and is expected to transform the way passengers commute to and from the airport. The



shared mobility initiative will allow travellers heading in the same direction to pool rides through the Uber app, offering a cheaper and more efficient travel option while reducing the number of vehicles on the roads. The Delhi Government said nearly seven lakh airport passengers stand to benefit from the affordable, technology-enabled and seamless ride-sharing

system. The service will operate through the Multi-Level Car Parking (MLCP) facility at the airport, where passengers can conveniently access shared rides. Officials said the initiative could bring nearly one lakh app-based and airport-connected vehicles into Delhi's growing shared mobility ecosystem with support from multiple operators and stakeholders.

'Cockroach Janata Party' demands Pradhan's resignation

BACK with the tagline "Cockroaches Never Die" after its original X handle was withheld in India, the "Cockroach Janata Party" (CJP), a satirical social-media account, launched a campaign on Friday demanding the resignation of Education Minister Dharmendra Pradhan.

The campaign, spearheaded through CJP's new X handle -- "Cockroach Is Back" -- and its Instagram platform, centres on alleged systemic failures in the education sector, particularly concerns surrounding the NEET-UG 2026 "paper-leak" controversy.

CJP founder Abhijeet Dipke urged followers to



support an online petition demanding Pradhan's resignation. "How are you, cockroaches? Everyone is saying you are doing great on the internet, but I think now it is time to do some real work. Today, we are starting a petition demanding the resignation of the education minister," Dipke said. Calling for accountability, he said failures in the education system have adversely affected students.

Delhi govt eases DJB policy to reduce water charges

IN a major policy shift aimed at reducing the financial burden on property owners, the Delhi Government has revised the Delhi Jal Board's infrastructure charge system, announcing that water and sewer charges will now be based on actual water demand instead of total plot size. The decision is expected to benefit thousands of residents, particularly those with partially constructed properties, smaller housing

units and buildings located in lower-category colonies. Announcing the reform, Chief Minister Rekha Gupta said the government has been continuously working to strengthen water supply and sewer infrastructure across the capital while ensuring that citizens receive fair and practical services. She said that under the earlier system, infrastructure charges were imposed according to the entire premises area, regardless of how much of the property was actually constructed



or how much water was required. The revised mechanism, however, will levy

charges strictly according to water demand generated by the built-up area.

Chief Minister Rekha Gupta says her government has been continuously working to strengthen water supply and sewer infrastructure across the capital while ensuring that citizens receive fair and practical services

Gupta explained that if additional construction or new development increases water consumption needs, only then will infrastructure charges rise. Open spaces within plots will no longer

be included while calculating charges. She cited an example, saying that if a 200-square metre plot has construction on only 50 square metres, charges will now be calculated solely

on the basis of the water requirement of the constructed portion rather than the entire land parcel. "This will provide major relief to Delhi residents. Earlier, even open areas were included while calculating infrastructure charges despite having no water requirement," she said. The Delhi Government also announced a series of detailed relaxations and concessions under the revised Infrastructure Fund Charges (IFC) policy for water and sewer connections.

Govt funds advanced graph theory workshop at NIT

MANGALURU: From May 18 to 22, the Department of Mathematical and Computational Sciences at National Institute of Technology Karnataka (NITK) Surathkal ran a specialised five-day workshop named "Emerging Directions in Graph Theory and Graph Neural Networks".

The entire programme received funding through the Anusandhan National Research Foundation (ANRF) and Council of Scientific and Industrial Research (CSIR) of the Government of India.

On the first day of 18 May 2026, the inaugural event welcomed Prof. Pratima Panigrahi, Professor in the Department of Mathematics at IIT Kharagpur, as Chief Guest while Prof. Udaya Bhat, Dean (Research & Innovation) at NITK Surathkal, presided over the gathering.

Participants received comprehensive exposure to the mathematical underpinnings and applied dimensions of graph theory and Graph Neural Networks (GNNs). The workshop format specifically aimed to link traditional graph theory with up-to-date computational strategies, welcoming experts and learners from mathematics, computer science, data science, and associated disciplines. Attendance reached 52 individuals consisting of faculty members and research scholars representing multiple institutions.

First government IVF facility set for launch at Hubballi

The hospital administration has already completed most of the infrastructure development work and is awaiting the final licence approval from authorities

KARNATAKA is preparing to launch its first IVF treatment centre under a government medical college setup at the Karnataka Medical College and Research Institute (KMC-RI) in Hubballi. The project, which is nearing completion, is expected to make fertility treatment affordable and accessible to common people, especially couples from financially weaker backgrounds.

The IVF facility is being developed within the Department of Obstetrics and Gynaecology at KMC-RI. Though the project was originally planned under a Public-Private Partnership (PPP) model, the state government later decided to operate the centre directly under government supervision to ensure wider public benefit.

Officials said delays in implementation were caused due to lack of clarity regarding operational guidelines and administrative structure. However, the government has now sanctioned funds



and provided necessary approvals to run the centre under the ABRK healthcare scheme.

KMC-RI Director Dr. Eshwar Hosamani said the government has fixed the IVF treatment cost at ₹1.34 lakh per patient. Importantly, if treatment fails in the first attempt, beneficiaries can undergo up to three cycles within the same approved package, offering significant financial relief to couples struggling with infertility.

The hospital administration has already completed most of the infrastructure development work and is awaiting the final licence approval from authorities. Officials said more than 90 per cent of the preparations have

been completed.

To make the centre fully functional, KMC-RI is in the process of appointing two highly specialised professionals — an Embryologist and an Artificial Reproductive Technologist. Since such positions are not available in the existing government recruitment structure, they will be hired through contractual service agreements via tender.

Authorities said these appointments are mandatory to secure operational licensing for the IVF centre. The government has also approved procurement of medicines and advanced laboratory support through the tender process. The cost of medicines required for a single

IVF cycle is estimated to be around ₹50,000.

Medical Education Minister Sharan Prakash Patil had reportedly advised officials to avoid the PPP model and instead establish the facility entirely within the government system so that patients could receive affordable treatment without dependence on private operators.

The Hubballi centre is expected to become a benchmark project for the state. Encouraged by the progress at KMC-RI, the Karnataka government has also initiated plans to establish similar IVF facilities in medical colleges located in Bengaluru, Mysuru and Kalaburagi.

Experts say the government-run IVF centre could significantly reduce the financial burden on infertile couples, as private IVF treatment often costs several lakhs of rupees. Once operational, the facility is likely to benefit patients not only from North Karnataka but also from neighbouring districts and rural regions lacking advanced fertility care services.

Rs 414-cr investment to transform NH-66 port corridor

Captain Chowta hails flyover approval for economic growth

DAKSHINA Kannada MP Captain Brijesh Chowta shared positive updates regarding the Union government's nod for a Rs. 414.16-crore project that will construct an elevated flyover and service roads on National Highway 66 from Baikampady to KIOCL Junction. The National Highways Authority of India has taken the next step by launching the tender process.

Covering a 3.075-kilometre corridor, the development prioritises seamless connectivity with the New Mangalore Port. Plans detail a 1.520-kilometre six-lane elevated flyover executed through the EPC model, complemented by 5.825 kilometres of service roads positioned on both flanks of the highway. The New Mangalore Port Authority stands ready to offer required extra land along with financial



backing.

The MP noted the strategic importance of this NH-66 portion as a primary route for cargo linked to the port's export and import activities. The upcoming structures will isolate highway traffic from local vehicles, delivering improved flow and heightened safety.

This modernisation will particularly strengthen the Baikampady industrial belt and KIOCL vicinity, catalysing broader industrial output, economic momentum in Dakshina Kannada, and reliable coastal connectivity

while preparing for future transport needs.

Challenges in the past stemmed from the port-area road falling under National Highway Logistics Management Limited's purview, resulting in agency and logistical difficulties. Consistent engagement successfully addressed these barriers and facilitated handover to NHAI. Parallel efforts have secured approval for underpasses at Baikampady and Kuloor Junction costing Rs. 11.63 crore, and related activities have already commenced.

Captain Brijesh Chowta stressed that persistent work on this front will enhance port connectivity and encourage port-driven progress across the district. He expressed appreciation to Prime Minister Narendra Modi and Union Minister Nitin Gadkari for greenlighting the project, which supports Dakshina Kannada's contribution to the Viksit Bharat objective.

Denial of preferred official quarters; LoP stops accepting rent allowance

LEADER of the Opposition in the Karnataka Legislative Assembly R Ashoka has written to the Chief Secretary stating that he has stopped accepting rent allowance from April 2026, as a mark of protest, because the state government has not yet allotted him an official quarters of his preference.

He even said that he had raised the issue four times. The development comes as the Congress government in Karnataka led by Chief Minister Siddaramaiah completed three years in office on May 20.

"As soon as I took office as the Leader of the Opposition in the Karnataka Legis-



lative Assembly, letters were written to allot government quarters as per my preference request. But till now, my preferred government quarters have not been allotted," Ashoka said in a letter to Chief Secretary Shalini Rajneesh, dated May 21.

Stating that he had in-

formed the government that if his preferred government housing is not allotted, he will not even receive house rent allowance in the future, he said, "Since the request of the Leader of the Opposition in the Legislative Assembly has not been responded to, I am protesting without taking

house rent allowance from April 2026."

Sharing details of his preferred government quarters, Ashoka further said, "I hereby strongly request that any of the mentioned government quarters of my preference be allotted as designated quarters to the Leader of the Opposition in the Karnataka Legislative Assembly."

He had sought any one of three quarters -- 1 Kumara Park East, 1 Race View Cottage or 2 Race View Cottage -- as his preference for official residence. According to reports, Ashoka even raised this issue and expressed displeasure before CM Siddaramaiah and his senior ministerial colleagues recently.

BJP MLA G Janardhan Reddy has endorsed a reported statement by former party leader and MLA Basangouda Patil Yatnal, calling on students to respond with 'Jai Sri Ram' instead of 'Yes Sir' when teachers call their names during attendance in classrooms.

The recent statement by Reddy, a former minister, is circulating on social media. "Though he has nothing to do with our party now, Yatnal has said a big thing; that during attendance at schools, when their name is called by the teacher, students should respond by saying Jai Sri Ram instead of Yes Sir. I extend one hundred per cent support to this call," Reddy said.

Speaking to reporters in Koppal recently, he said, "Whenever I go to any school or college, I will also give a



similar call...let the students go wearing saffron shawls and saffron turbans; we are Bharateeyas, it is a matter of Hindutva, our country, our Sanatana Dharma."

The remarks seem to be a reaction to the government's decision allowing students to wear hijabs and other faith symbols in schools. The Congress government last week

withdrew a 2022 order banning the hijab in classrooms.

It issued an order allowing students to wear limited traditional and faith-based symbols such as Hijab/headscarf, turban, 'Janeu' (sacred thread), Shivadhara and Rudraksha along with prescribed uniforms in schools and pre-university colleges across the state.

Demo at Town Hall

Police caution against Cockroach Janata Party's call

THE Bengaluru police on Friday cautioned the public against participating in or circulating social media messages related to a proposed "peaceful human chain" programme allegedly called by a group -- "Cockroach Janata Party Karnataka" -- near Town Hall here on May 24, saying no permission had been granted for such an event.

In a press note, the Bengaluru City Police said a viral social media post had invited people to gather in large numbers in front of Town Hall for a peaceful human chain demonstration on Sunday.

Police clarified that no application had been submitted by any individual, organisation or political party seeking permission to hold the programme and that no approval had been granted either by the police or by the GBA authorities for use of the venue.

"It has come to notice that a post has been circulated on social media under the heading 'Cockroach Janata Party, Karnataka,' in which an invitation has been given to gather in large numbers in front of Town Hall on May 24 for the purpose of forming a peaceful human chain," the police said.

According to the police statement, protests, sit-in



demonstrations and rallies are not permitted at locations other than Freedom Park in accordance with the Karnataka High Court's August 1, 2022 order.

The police said any gather-

ing in front of Town Hall in violation of the order would amount to a breach of the court's directions.

The department advised the public not to knowingly or unknowingly forward

or share the viral message through platforms including Facebook, WhatsApp, Instagram and Twitter, and urged people not to assemble near Town Hall.

The viral poster, translated

from Kannada, called upon supporters to show "The strength of cockroaches not just online but also on the streets" by participating in a peaceful human chain at Town Hall in Bengaluru at 11 am on May 24.

The poster appealed to "all cockroaches and fans of the Cockroach Janata Party" to come and demonstrate strength and send a message to the self-serving administration.

It listed grievances, including "youth have no future," "students are burdened with the NEET examination," "life has become difficult because of price rise," "our votes are being stolen," and allegations that money collected

from people was being sent abroad.

The message further stated: "There are no leaders here, we ourselves are the leaders. There is no organisation here; people joining hands itself is the organisation."

Police said the advisory had been issued in the public interest to create awareness about the law.

The 'X' account of Cockroach Janata Party, a satirical digital outfit that came up last week and took social media by storm, was withheld in India on Thursday. Soon after, came another handle -- 'Cockroach is Back' with the tagline 'Cockroaches Don't Die'

Conspiracy through SIR to remove votes: DKS

BENGALURU: Dy CM D K Shivakumar on Friday alleged that there is a conspiracy to remove the votes of poor people through the SIR process and said Congress workers have been instructed to remain highly vigilant.

Speaking to reporters near his residence in Sadashivanagar, Bengaluru, the Deputy Chief Minister said the party has begun creating awareness among legislators and Booth Level Agents (BLAs) regarding the Special Intensive Revision (SIR) process.

"We have convened meetings to educate our MLAs and BLAs about SIR because the dates have already been announced. Every eligible person must submit the necessary application; otherwise, citizens may lose their voting rights," he said.

He warned that similar situations had occurred in other states and stressed the importance of protecting voter rights. "If people lose their voting rights, they may also face difficulties in accessing welfare benefits such as pension schemes and the Gruha Lakshmi Scheme. Hence, we are focusing on public awareness," he added.

Responding to questions regarding the government's decision to withdraw cases filed against members of the Muslim community, Shivakumar clarified that only politically motivated cases were being withdrawn. "Cases filed against farmers and Kannada activists have also been withdrawn earlier. There is nothing wrong in withdrawing politically motivated cases," he stated.

New intl cricket stadium near Anekal soon

BENGALURU: Chief Minister Siddaramaiah will lay the foundation stone tomorrow (May 23) for a new international cricket stadium coming up near Anekal on the outskirts of Bengaluru. With a seating capacity of 80,000, the proposed venue is set to become India's second-largest cricket stadium after the Narendra Modi Stadium in Ahmedabad.

The mega project, estimated to cost around Rs 943 crore, is expected to be completed within the next three years. The stadium will be constructed at Surya Nagar Phase 4 in Indlawadi village of Anekal taluk under the 'KHB Surya Kreedha Grama' initiative of the Karnataka Housing Board (KHB).

Designed as a world-class sporting venue, the stadium will feature modern amenities including hospitality lounges, VIP boxes, advanced media facilities, and enhanced spectator services. Comprehensive security and crowd-management systems are also planned to handle large gatherings during international matches and major events.

Currently, Bengaluru's iconic M. Chinnaswamy Stadium has a seating capacity of only around 32,000, which many believe is inadequate for the growing demand during international cricket fixtures and IPL matches. The new stadium, spread across 75 acres, is expected to significantly boost Bengaluru's capacity to host large-scale sporting events. Apart from international cricket, the project is expected to play a major role in promoting sports and nurturing young talent in Karnataka. The facility will host cricket academies, youth training programmes, school and college tournaments, and state-level sporting events. The stadium is also being envisioned as a multi-purpose venue capable of hosting concerts, conferences, public gatherings, corporate events, and exhibitions, making it one of the largest entertainment and sporting hubs in the region.

Flight services from Bengaluru to Bidar and Kalaburagi to resume: MB Patil

INFRASTRUCTURE Development Minister M B Patil on Friday announced that flight services from Bengaluru to Bidar and Kalaburagi, the district headquarters of the Kalyana Karnataka region, will resume from June 1 and June 10 respectively.

Speaking on the occasion, he said that Star Air (Ghodawat Enterprises Limited) will operate flights

on the Bengaluru-Bidar-Bengaluru and Bengaluru-Kalaburagi-Bengaluru sectors. The Government is extending viability gap funding of Rs 28.47 crore to support the operations. Advance booking for flights on both routes has already commenced, he added.

Patil said the flight service to Kalaburagi had earlier been suspended due to financial losses. In the case of Bidar, services were being operated with special



support from the Kalyana Karnataka Regional Development Board. Taking into account the growth of industries, education, tourism, agriculture and commercial activities in the Kalyana Karnataka region, the Government has decided to revive the services under the regional air connectivity initiative, he said.

The Minister said the Government is committed to enhancing air connectivity to Tier-2 and Tier-3 cities

across the State. Such initiatives will not only accelerate regional economic growth but also contribute to infrastructure development, he noted.

It may be recalled that Patil had recently held several rounds of discussions with ministerial colleagues from the Kalyana Karnataka region and representatives of various airline companies regarding the resumption of flight services to Bidar and Kalaburagi.

Govt urges NCERT to introduce dedicated chapter on groundwater

THE government has called on the Centre and the NCERT to include a dedicated chapter on groundwater conservation and management in the national school curriculum. Minor Irrigation, Science and Technology Minister N S Boseraju on Friday said the state has formally written to the Central Government seeking the inclusion of a comprehensive "groundwater" chapter in National Council of Educational Research and Training textbooks under the upcoming curriculum revisions aligned with the National Education Policy 2020.

The minister noted that while the existing NCERT Class 10 Social Science textbook, Contemporary India-II, contains a chapter on "water resources," the current curriculum largely focuses on surface water, with limited attention given to groundwater, despite it being India's most critical freshwater resource.

"Nearly 97 per cent of the liquid freshwater available on Earth exists as groundwater. Around 50 per cent of domestic water usage and nearly 25 per cent of agricultural needs in India rely directly on groundwater sources," Boseraju said, according to a



release issued by his office. He warned that climate change, declining surface water availability, and increasing water consumption are intensifying pressure on groundwater reserves across the country. The state highlighted in its communication that over-exploited, critical, and semi-critical groundwater zones have increased sharply over the past two decades, while groundwater quality continues to deteriorate because of contamination and unsustainable extraction, he added. The Karnataka government argued that groundwater awareness must begin at the school level if India is to effectively address future water insecurity.

Drawing comparisons with international education models, the state pointed out that school curricula in countries such as the United States already include de-

tailed lessons on groundwater systems, aquifer behaviour, permeability, porosity, groundwater flow, and contamination, the release said. Karnataka has urged NCERT to include similar scientific and practical learning modules in the revised curriculum being prepared for the academic year 2027-28 under the National Curriculum Framework for School Education 2023. The state government recommended that the proposed groundwater chapter should include rainwater harvesting and managed aquifer recharge technologies, along with nature-based solutions such as constructed wetlands and green roofs.

It also suggested including lessons on aquifer mapping and groundwater modelling, as well as the use of advanced monitoring systems, including IoT and remote sensing.

In addition, the chapter should cover national water conservation programmes implemented by the Ministry of Jal Shakti, Central Ground Water Board, and NITI Aayog.

"Addressing future water scarcity cannot be achieved through infrastructure projects alone. The next generation must understand the real importance of water conservation at the school level itself," Boseraju said.

"Climate change is steadily reducing surface water availability, making groundwater increasingly critical for survival," he said, adding that "introducing a dedicated and comprehensive chapter on groundwater in the NCERT curriculum is now an urgent national necessity. We are confident that the Central Government will respond positively to this forward-looking proposal."

Rado watch stolen from deceased patient at city hospital

A disturbing incident highlighting alleged negligence and insensitivity at a private hospital in Bengaluru has come to light after an expensive wristwatch belonging to a deceased patient reportedly went missing from the hospital premises. A complaint has been registered at the Govindarajanaagar Police Station regarding the theft of a Rado watch worth nearly Rs 2 lakh.

According to the complaint, Ramayya, an elderly man suffering from serious health complications, had been admitted to a private hospital in Bengaluru for treatment. Despite medical efforts, he passed away during treatment. However, the family alleges that during the course of treatment, his branded Rado watch and even the shirt he was wearing mysteriously disappeared from the hospital.

The issue reportedly came to light after Ramayya's daughter enquired about her father's belongings following his death. Family members alleged that hospital staff failed to provide clear answers regarding the missing valuables and behaved irresponsibly when questioned.

Adding to the suspicion, the family claimed that when they demanded ac-



cess to CCTV footage from the hospital to verify what had happened, staff members allegedly informed them that the footage had been deleted. This response has now raised serious concerns over the handling of patient belongings and security measures inside the hospital.

The daughter of the deceased reportedly told police that the watch was not merely an expensive accessory, but one of the last personal memories connected to her father.

Hurt by the hospital's response and the disappearance of the valuables, she approached Govindarajanaagar police seeking legal action.

Based on the complaint, police have registered an FIR and initiated an investigation into the incident. Officers are expected to question hospital staff, re-

view available records and examine whether there was any deliberate attempt to destroy evidence or conceal information related to the missing watch.

The incident has triggered outrage among the public, with many questioning the safety of patients and their belongings inside private hospitals.

Concerns are also being raised about accountability and transparency in hospitals when dealing with valuables belonging to patients, particularly senior citizens undergoing critical treatment.

Police sources said further investigation is underway and action will be taken based on the findings. Authorities are also likely to examine whether the hospital violated any protocols related to patient property management and CCTV data retention.

HIDDEN THYROID DISORDERS

Major cause of infertility and miscarriages, caution medics

THYROID imbalance is increasingly emerging as a hidden but treatable cause behind infertility, irregular menstrual cycles, failed conception attempts, and recurrent miscarriages among urban women, according to Bengaluru-based gynaecologist and IVF specialist Dr. Vidya V Bhat.

Dr. Bhat, who serves as the Medical Director of Radhakrishna Multispeciality Hospital, said a growing number of women in their late 20s and 30s are being diagnosed with thyroid-related reproductive complications, particularly in metropolitan cities like Bengaluru.

With over 35 years of experience in women's health and fertility care, she noted that changing lifestyles, stress, lack of sleep, poor dietary habits, obesity, and sedentary routines are contributing significantly to hormonal imbal-



ances among urban women. "Many women undergo years of fertility struggles without realising that an underlying thyroid disorder could be the reason," Dr. Vidya V Bhat said. "Though small in size, the thyroid gland plays a critical role in regulating hormones, ovulation, menstrual cycles, pregnancy health, and fetal development."

According to her, both hypothyroidism and hyperthyroidism can negatively impact fertility by affecting ovulation, egg quality, implantation, and menstrual regularity. If left untreated, thyroid dysfunction can also increase the risk of pregnancy complications.

Fake doctor profile on matrimonial sites

Bengaluru, Mysuru women cheated of lakhs

A shocking matrimonial fraud case has surfaced in Karnataka where a man allegedly posed as a PhD holder and doctor on matrimonial websites and cheated more than ten women from Bengaluru and Mysuru by promising marriage and collecting lakhs of rupees from them. A case has now been registered at the Aduvodi Police Station against the accused, identified as Pradeep

Solomon, and his mother Kalavathi. The duo is currently absconding fearing arrest.

According to police sources, Pradeep Solomon allegedly created fake high-profile accounts on matrimonial platforms under the name "Dr. Pradeep Solomon," claiming to be highly educated and financially well settled. Investigators said his mother actively supported the fraud by helping create a false image of wealth and social status before pro-



spective brides and their families.

The accused reportedly rented a luxurious bungalow



in Mysuru and projected themselves as a rich and influential family. Police said the lavish lifestyle and ex-

pensive setup helped them gain the confidence of women and their parents who approached them for marriage alliances.

After establishing trust, the accused allegedly began demanding money from the victims citing urgent financial issues.

He reportedly told families that a huge amount of his money was "stuck" in the bank due to technical reasons and requested temporary financial assistance, assuring them the amount

would soon be returned. Believing his claims, several families transferred large sums of money to him. In one recent case, a wealthy Bengaluru-based family allegedly lost lakhs of rupees after trusting the accused.

Soon after receiving the money, Pradeep Solomon and his mother reportedly disappeared and stopped all communication.

As news of the fraud spread, multiple women and their family members from Mysuru and Bengaluru

gathered near the rented bungalow in Mysuru claiming their too had been cheated in a similar manner.

Police said a detailed investigation is underway and special teams have been formed to trace the mother-son duo. Officers suspect that more victims could come forward as the probe progresses.

Authorities have also appealed to the public to verify matrimonial profiles carefully before sharing personal or financial information.

THE Kaleshwaram Trilinga Kshetram, popularly known as the Sri Kaleshwara Mukteswara Swamy Temple, is a major pilgrimage site in Jayashankar Bhupapalli district. Also known as "South Kashi", it represents Triveni Sangamam of the south. It stands as a symbol of spiritual grandeur and historical significance as the shrine sits at the confluence of the Godavari, Pranahita, and the subterranean Saraswati rivers. This centuries-old holy temple is situated amid densely forested terrain.

Believed to be the confluence of the Godavari, Pranahita, and the subterranean Saraswati rivers, this holy site is honored by devotees as Dakshina Kashi.

The temple's glory is described in the Skanda Purana under the section called "Kaleshwara Khanda." According to the Puranas, Lord Rama visited this region during his exile in the Dandaka forest in the Treta Yuga. Ancient Rama temples in the



surrounding area reinforce this belief.

The principal shrine is the Sri Kaleshwara Mukteswara Swamy Temple, located on the left bank of the Godavari.

Puranic accounts say that Yama Dharma Raja performed severe penance here worshipping Lord Shiva. Pleased by Yama's devotion, Lord Shiva blessed him and granted boons to those who dwell here. Consequently, the temple uniquely houses two Shiva lingas on the same pedestal — Kaleshwara and Mukteswara.

Devotees believe this is the only temple in the Telugu States where Yama Dharma Raja is worshiped alongside Lord Shiva in linga form. Two small holes visible on one of the lingas are regarded as the deity's nasal apertures by devotees. Local belief holds that water or milk poured into these holes flows into the Godavari.

Kaleshwaram is also famous for its sacred bath-

ing ghats on the Godavari's southern bank, known collectively as the Ashta Tirthas (eight sacred baths). These include Brahma Tirtha, Pichuka Tirtha, Jnana Tirtha, Vayasa Tirtha, Sangama Tirtha, Narasimha Tirtha, Hanumat Tirtha, and Vyasa Tirtha.

On major festival days, thousands of pilgrims gather here to perform holy baths.

The temple's history records significant patronage from the Kakatiyas, Rashtrakutas, Vemulavada Chalukyas, Kalyani Chalukyas, and Vijayanagara rulers. Inscriptions of the Vijayanagara empire's Devaraya kings mention victory celebrations held at Kaleshwaram.

The Andhra Pradesh government carried out extensive restoration of the temple in 1976, and in 1982 the Kanchi Kamakoti Peethadhipati Jagadguru Shankaracharya performed the reconsecration. Kaleshwaram is renowned for its distinctive sculptural heritage: sculp-



tures of Vishnu's Dashavatara, Matsya-Kurma avatars, Annapurna Devi, Shaiva door-guardians, a four-faced linga, and carvings depicting Arjuna's fish-machine attract devotees and tourists alike.

These stone works, carved from red sandstone, granite, and basalt, are displayed in a museum near the temple. Several historic and spiritual sites along the Godavari's southern bank are also close to Kaleshwaram.

Uttam hits back at KTR, warns procurement politics will 'backfire'

HYDERABAD: In response to BRS working president KT Rama Rao's criticism of the current Rabi paddy procurement efforts, Irrigation and Civil Supplies Minister N. Uttam Kumar Reddy launched a pointed counterattack on Friday, accusing the BRS leader of deceiving farmers with false information to conceal the party's own procurement shortcomings.

The Minister alleged that BRS working president KT Rama Rao's sole agenda is to create a politically manufactured chaos among the farmers. But it will "backfire", he asserted.

Uttam Kumar Reddy, in a statement issued here, said the Congress government was executing the largest paddy procurement operation in Telangana's history despite severe manpower shortages, massive logistical challenges and an unprecedented scale of arrivals. While the BRS is busy spreading confusion, the Congress government is ensuring that every grain brought by farmers is procured and every rupee reaches farmers' accounts," he said.

Uttam Kumar Reddy completely rejected KTR's allegations and said official figures had exposed the hollowness of the BRS campaign. He said that by May 21, Telangana had already recorded 54.29 lakh metric tonnes (LMT) of paddy arrivals, out of which 46.21 LMT had been procured, accounting for nearly 85 per cent procurement completion.

He said procurement transactions of more than 6.32 lakh farmers had already been completed and payments worth Rs 7,841 crore had been directly credited into farmers' bank accounts.

Responding strongly to allegations of gunny bag shortages, Uttam Kumar Reddy termed the accusations "completely fabricated and irresponsible."

He said the government had already positioned nearly 20 crore gunny bags across procurement centres and adequate stocks were available to handle the entire procurement process smoothly.

He said the government was conducting daily reviews, deploying more than 13,000 trucks and lorries every day, and continuously monitoring logistics, lifting and transportation. More than 43 LMT of paddy had already been shifted to rice mills, while additional stocks were being transported to storage facilities without interruption.

Uttam Kumar Reddy also slammed attempts by the opposition to politically exploit farmer deaths by linking them to procurement delays.

"Using farmers' for political drama is shameful and insensitive. The BRS leadership is resorting to desperation politics because it has lost public trust," he said. The Minister said the Congress government had ensured "a fair deal, better support and faster payments" for farmers while the BRS leadership was only interested in "manufacturing headlines through false propaganda."

"We believed in and built a farmer-first ecosystem. Facts tell the real story. The Congress government is way ahead in MSP operations, procurement efficiency and farmer payments," Uttam Kumar Reddy asserted.

happening on a war footing across Telangana," he declared.

Taking dig at the BRS regime, Uttam Kumar Reddy said the Congress government had already outperformed multiple Rabi procurement seasons handled by the previous government.

He pointed out that during the BRS regime, procurement stood at only 26.78 LMT in Rabi 2021-22 and 36.63 LMT in Rabi 2022-23, whereas the Congress government had already crossed 48.21 LMT procurement this season with procurement operations still continuing.

He also highlighted the "historic benchmark" achieved during the previous Rabi season under Congress rule in 2024-25. (As on May 22, 2025) when Telangana recorded an all-time high procurement of 60.44 LMT, with MSP payments touching Rs 10,882 crore.

"Those who failed farmers for years are now unable to digest the scale and transparency of the Congress government's farmer-first procurement model," the Minister said.

Zoo rolls out heat protection for wildlife

NEHRU Zoological Park has implemented various temperature-control measures to protect animals from dehydration and heat stress during the ongoing summer season. The facilities are benefiting around 2,100 animals belonging to 196 species. To shield animals from extreme heat, zoo authorities have installed sprinklers, foggers and small rain guns in key enclosures, particularly in herbivore zones, the Reptile House, macaw enclosures, pheasantry and aviaries. Temporary shaded shelters, thunga roofing and kashkash thattis have also been arranged to reduce direct exposure to sunlight.

Coolers have been installed in monkey and carnivore sections, while the Nocturnal Animal House has been equipped with air-conditioners and exhaust fans. To help animals stay hy-

drated, keepers are serving seasonal fruits such as watermelon, musk melon and citrus fruits. Continuous supply of cold drinking water with electrolyte and vitamin supplements, including Glucon-D, Electral, vitamin C, B-complex, Stresswell and Thermo Care liquids, is being provided to reduce summer stress, said J Vasantha, Curator of Nehru Zoological Park.

Park supervisors said teams are regularly wetting the thattis and thunga coverings three to four times a day and closely moni-



toring the animals' condition throughout the heatwave.

With a large number of people visiting the zoo during the summer holidays, staff have also arranged additional

drinking water points, shaded resting areas and misting facilities at selected locations across the park to help visitors cope with the heat while exploring the zoo.

Four TG students set off for Japan for SAKURA Science prog

Coconuts & canes: The summer lifeline on city streets

ON a hot summer afternoon, it feels like the only thing that can cool the body is a glass of coconut water or fresh sugarcane juice. These drinks are the ultimate sources of hydration, rich in minerals, and easy on the stomach.

Sugarcane juice is sourced from 10-15 canes, costing around Rs 200 to Rs 300, yielding about 100 glasses. There is generally a shortage of canes in summer, and profits may vary slightly. A single glass of juice sells between Rs 20 and Rs 40.

In busy traffic areas, vendors sell 150 to 250 glasses daily, generating Rs 3,000 to Rs 6,000 in revenue. Profit margins are slightly higher, netting operators Rs 1,500 to Rs 4,000 on peak summer days.

The retail price ranges from Rs 40 to Rs 60, depending on the size of the coconut and the stall's location. On average, vendors earn a profit of about Rs 15,000 to Rs 60,000 per month, depending on the season and daily sales.

FOOD and civil supplies minister Nadendra Manohar directed officials and PNG companies to accelerate efforts to shift people from LPG usage to Piped Natural Gas (PNG) across the state.

He assured that the government machinery would fully support PNG companies in expanding infrastructure and creating public awareness about the benefits of PNG usage.

The minister conducted a special review meeting at the Secretariat here on Friday with representatives of PNG companies and senior officials from various departments. Transport minister B C Janardhan Reddy participated in the meeting through video conference.

Speaking on the occasion, Manohar said the coalition

government is committed to providing alternative gas solutions to the public quickly and efficiently. He stated that the government aims to ensure uninterrupted cooking gas supply to households and urged the five PNG companies operating in the state to be fully prepared for rapid expansion. He noted that people are increasingly turning towards PNG gas in line with changing times and asked companies to strengthen infrastructure and intensify promotional campaigns.

The minister assured that the government is granting approvals for gas expansion works in cities and towns at a faster pace and promised immediate resolution of any issues faced by companies. He also said the government would facilitate land allotment on lease basis for setting up PNG filling stations. Highlighting the need

for skilled manpower, the Minister said youth should be trained in PNG technical skills through ITIs, polytechnic colleges and other skill institutions.

Under the supervision of AP Skill Development and district collectors, batches of 100 youth from each district would be trained every 15 days with free accommodation, food and stipend support. He said linking trained youth with PNG companies would create employment opportunities while addressing manpower shortages in the sector.

Manohar also stressed the need for extensive awareness campaigns through women self-help groups, SERP and MEPMA net-

works to educate people about the convenience, cost savings and safety benefits of PNG usage. He instructed gas companies to coordinate with women's groups and offer incentives for their participation in expansion activities.

The minister announced that PNG connections would be made mandatory for major temples where Annadanam is conducted. He said the government would resolve pending issues in temples like Kanaka Durga temple and Srikanthasthewara temple to speed up PNG implementation, following directions from Chief Minister N. Chandrababu Naidu. He also stated that simplified guidelines

would soon be introduced for tenants using PNG connections and availing LPG subsidy benefits.

He said the government is preparing regulations to ensure PNG users also receive the Rs 2,400 Deepam-2 scheme subsidy annually, as directed by the Chief Minister.

Special focus would be given to expanding PNG connections in apartments, group housing complexes and villas in urban areas.

He warned that another review on the performance of PNG companies would be conducted within 15 days and made it clear that visible progress in expansion activities must be achieved by then.

AP plans gold mining expansion to boost jobs, economy

MINISTER for mines and geology and excise Kollu Ravindra on Friday said the state government is focusing on expanding the mining sector to generate employment, increase industrial growth and strengthen the economy.

The minister, accompanied by Pattikonda MLA K E Shyam Babu visited the Jonnagiri gold mine operated by Geo Mysore Services India Private Limited near Jonnagiri village in Tuggali mandal and reviewed mining and mineral processing operations.

During the inspection, the minister examined underground mining activities, ore extraction systems, and gold refining processes being carried out with advanced technology.

He said mining operations are currently being conducted at a depth of nearly 300 metres and may be expanded further in the coming years. According to officials, the mine is producing around one kilogram of gold every

day, while the monthly production has reached nearly 30 kilograms.

Ravindra said geological assessments indicate the presence of nearly 13,000 tonnes of mineral reserves in and around the Jonnagiri belt, making it one of the most significant private gold mining projects in the country.

Highlighting the state government's mining policy, the minister said Andhra Pradesh possesses vast mineral resources with strong industrial potential. He noted that efforts are underway to identify and develop additional gold mining zones in the Ramagiri region of Anantapur district.

He also pointed out that rare earth minerals available along the state's coastline

have immense international demand and said the government is accelerating the tendering process for mineral blocks near Visakhapatnam.

The minister added that value-added industries based on quartz and granite resources are also being promoted to encourage manufacturing activity and create large-scale employment opportunities.

Speaking on the occasion, MLA Shyam Babu said the Jonnagiri gold mine has brought fresh economic activity to the region by providing direct and indirect employment to local youth. He said nearly 300 to 400 people from nearby villages have already secured jobs through the project, reducing seasonal migration in drought-prone areas.

State welcomes ECLGS 5.0 for MSME relief

MINISTER for micro, small and medium enterprises (MSMEs) Kondapalli Srinivas welcomed the Centre's launch of the Emergency Credit Line Guarantee Scheme (ECLGS) 5.0, describing it as a crucial relief measure for industries affected by the ongoing political and economic instability in West Asia.

The minister said the scheme would help businesses secure additional working capital through government-backed credit guarantees at a time of rising global uncertainty and supply-chain disruptions. He stated that the Central government would provide guarantee coverage on additional loans extended by scheduled banks and financial institutions under the scheme.

Explaining the framework of ECLGS 5.0, the minister said MSMEs would receive 100 per cent credit guarantee coverage in the event of loan default, while non-MSME sectors would be eligible for guarantee protection of up to

90 per cent.

Eligible businesses can avail additional credit of up to 20 per cent of the highest outstanding working capital utilised during the fourth quarter of the 2025-26 financial year, he said. The scheme allows each eligible borrower to access additional credit support of up to Rs 100 crore.

According to the minister, the facility will apply only to loans sanctioned before March 31, 2027, and disbursed by June 30, 2027. He clarified that only borrowers maintaining regular repayment records with banks and financial institutions would qualify for the scheme. The scheme will be adminis-

tered and monitored by the National Credit Guarantee Trustee Company Limited (NCGTC).

Highlighting Andhra Pradesh's MSME ecosystem, Srinivas said the state currently has nearly 20.77 lakh MSME units, including 4.98 lakh manufacturing enterprises, around 10 lakh service-sector units and 5.74 lakh trading establishments.

The minister urged MSMEs impacted by the West Asia crisis to utilise the scheme to strengthen liquidity and sustain operations. He also thanked the Central Government for introducing ECLGS 5.0 at a critical time for domestic industries.

Atchanna hits back at Jagan's charges on deaths

AGRICULTURE minister K Atchanna on Friday strongly criticised YSRCP chief Y S Jagan Mohan Reddy for linking family deaths to the TDP and Chief Minister N Chandrababu Naidu.

Speaking in Amaravati, Atchanna said people were well aware of the circumstances surrounding the murder of Jagan's grandfather, Y S Raja Reddy. He alleged that victims of that era had spoken of a "reign of oppression and anarchy" under the Y S family. While most accused in the Raja Reddy case had since died, he claimed one accused remained in the YSRCP, exposing the party's "double standards." Rejecting Jagan's claims about former CM Y S Rajasekhara Reddy's helicopter crash, Atchanna said Chandrababu's Assembly remarks only referred to faith in Lord Venkateswara and had no link to YSR's death. He accused Jagan of twisting the statement for political gain.

On the murder of Y S Vivekananda Reddy, Atchanna alleged the YSRCP initially portrayed it as a heart attack before evidence proved otherwise.

Smart drug tracking soon in state hosps

- AP plans major reforms to the e-Aushadhi platform with QR code access, real-time stock monitoring and automated alerts to improve transparency and efficiency in medicine supply.
- Patients will soon be able to check medicine availability in state hospitals directly, while officials will receive advance alerts on medicines nearing expiry to reduce wastage
- The state is developing a live dashboard covering medicine stocks from Ayushman Arogya Mandirs to teaching hospitals

THE state government is set to introduce sweeping reforms in the medicine supply and utilisation system in government hospitals by strengthening the existing 'e-Aushadhi' software platform with advanced technology-driven features aimed at ensuring transparency, efficiency and public accessibility.

As part of the proposed reforms, people will soon be able to directly check the availability of medicines in government hospitals through QR code-based access. The government is also planning to introduce an automated alert system to monitor medicine utilisation, expiry timelines and

supply chain management in real time.

A high-level review meeting on the proposed reforms was held on Friday at the headquarters of the Andhra Pradesh State Medical Infrastructure Development Corporation (APSMIDC) in Mangalagiri.

Senior officials from the Centre for Development of Advanced Computing (C-DAC), who arrived from Delhi at the request of Health Minister Satya Kumar Yadav, participated in the discussions.

At present, medicine procurement and supply to government hospitals in Andhra Pradesh are being managed through the e-Aushadhi application. The government spends nearly Rs 800 crore annually on medicines and

surgical supplies, of which around Rs.600 crore worth of medicines are supplied free of cost to poor patients through primary health centres, community health centres, district hospitals, teaching hospitals and specialty institutions.

Based on indents raised by pharmacists, medical officers and hospital superintendents, proposals are generated through the e-Aushadhi system and medicines are procured through tenders before being distributed to Central Drug Stores and subsequently to hospitals across districts.

However, officials observed several operational challenges in areas such as stock monitoring, expiry tracking and supply management.

To address these issues,

the Health Department has proposed several key changes. A public-facing QR code system will allow citizens to directly verify medicine availability at hospitals. A special alert mechanism will notify officials in advance about medicines nearing expiry, especially within six months of the expiry date to minimise wastage.

The government also plans to introduce a state-wide dashboard displaying real-time medicine stock positions from Ayushman Arogya Mandirs to teaching hospitals.

Officials are considering bringing AYUSH medicine supply systems under the e-Aushadhi network as well. In addition, the "Mana Mitra" app will soon provide information on medicine stocks to the public.

AP powers through record summer demand

AMID severe summer conditions and intense heatwave temperatures across the state, the Andhra Pradesh State power utilities successfully ensured uninterrupted and quality power supply while handling the highest-ever electricity demand in the State's history.

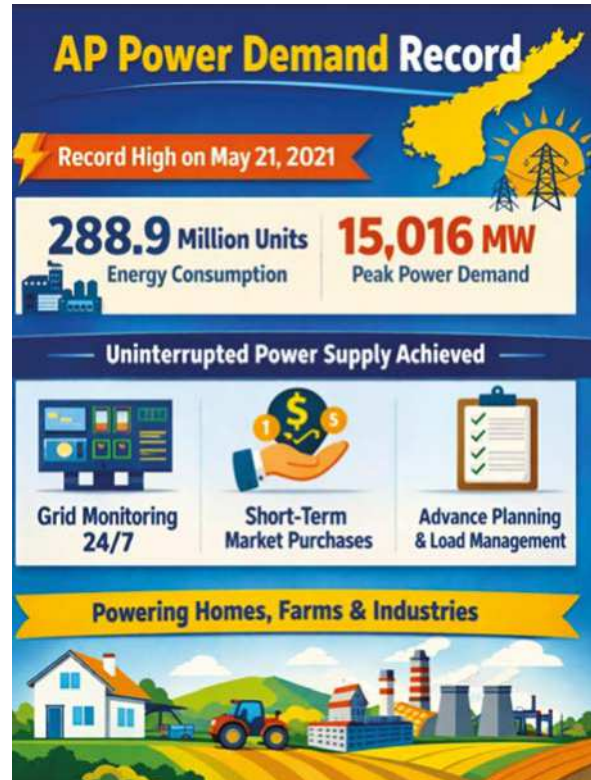
The Andhra Pradesh State Grid recorded an all-time high energy consumption of 288.9 million units (MU) on May 21, along with a record day peak demand of 15,016 MW and an evening peak demand of 12,474 mw.

According to officials,

the unprecedented surge in electricity demand was mainly due to soaring temperatures, high humidity levels and increased usage of air-conditioners, cooling appliances, drinking water systems and agricultural pump sets across the State. Temperatures in several districts reportedly touched nearly 46 degrees Celsius.

Despite the extraordinary demand, APTransco, in coordination with APGenco and the discoms, maintained continuous and stable power supply without any disruption.

Officials attributed the achievement to advance planning, round-the-clock grid monitoring, effective load management and opti-



mum utilisation of available power resources.

Special chief secretary

to the Chief Minister K Vijayanand said that the milestone was achieved in

line with the vision of Chief Minister N Chandrababu Naidu and energy minister Gottipati Ravi Kumar to provide reliable and uninterrupted power supply to consumers across the State.

He said additional power was procured through short-term market purchases whenever necessary to maintain grid stability and ensure uninterrupted supply to domestic consumers, farmers, industries, commercial establishments and essential services during peak demand periods.

Vijayanand appreciated the dedicated services of APTransco, APGenco and discom personnel, including engineers, field staff, system operators and maintenance teams, for successfully managing the historic demand. He reiterated that the State government remains committed to strengthening power infrastructure and ensuring quality electricity services to all consumers.

Cockroach Janta Party: When satire becomes a threat

IT began as a joke but got taken seriously—so seriously that the government acted against it. That is the story of the Cockroach Janta Party (CJP), which is merely a week old. On May 16, an activist, who reportedly was earlier associated with the Aam Aadmi Party (AAP), Abhijeet Dipke, launched CJP, a satirical take on Chief Justice of India (CJI) Surya Kant's comment on the unemployable youth with fake degrees who eventually become "parasites" and "cockroaches," attacking the system. The CJI's remarks were not very elegant; these were especially hurtful as the young have been the victims rather than tormentors of the system. Among other things, they suffer because of a dearth of quality jobs and

a conducive environment in which they can become wealth creators. And now, they are also hit by the incompetence and corruption in the bodies that carry out exams for coveted seats in higher education and jobs. The remarks were deeply resented by not just youth but also others. This was the reason that the CJI later issued a clarification, stating he was misquoted and his remarks were directed specifically at individuals entering the legal profession through "fake and bogus degrees." This, however, didn't stop the usage of the term 'cockroaches' online and the party espousing their cause; in fact, the party received wide support from various politicians, activists, artists, and millions of other users across

social media platforms. It is said that the CJP was able to get more followers than the ruling BJP and Congress, though the figures have not been verified. The government overreacted by reportedly directing X to withhold the account following inputs from the Intelligence Bureau (IB), which flagged "national security concerns." Apparently, the Ministry of Electronics & Information Technology (MeitY) invoked Section 69A of the Information Technology Act, 2000, to demand action against the CJP account. Senior Congress leader Shashi Tharoor pointed out that the episode "confirms to us the extent to which there is frustration and dissatisfaction that the public can express through being able to tap into

an initiative like this." In the meanwhile, Trinamool Congress MP Mahua Moitra accused the government of stifling dissent. The government should have avoided action against the CJP, because it was quite clearly a joke. Which serious political party would claim to be the "voice of the lazy"? Or claim that the "eligibility criteria" to join the CJP was to be "unemployed, lazy, and chronically online" with the "ability to rant professionally"? More than anyone else, the government took the joke seriously. By moving to block the account, the government ended up validating the very criticism the satire sought to make. A parody page that may otherwise have remained a passing internet joke suddenly acquired

political significance because of official intervention. In trying to suppress ridicule, the authorities amplified it. The episode also raises troubling questions about the increasing tendency to invoke sweeping powers such as Section 69A against online expression that is inconvenient or embarrassing rather than genuinely dangerous. Democracies are expected to tolerate mockery, even harsh mockery, because satire is often a barometer of public sentiment. What makes the CJP episode particularly revealing is that the government appeared more offended by the language of protest than by the underlying anger that produced it. A confident government would have laughed away the joke.

What is more worrisome is the singular importance we have attached to just one examination. Schools and parents must actively normalise alternative career paths, not as consolation but as genuine choices. Counselling should be embedded in the academic calendar, not offered after a crisis strikes. Systemic reforms matter, but the cultural shift around success and failure is equally urgent.

Students must focus on GCC space

With reference to the article "Bright story of growth in GCC space awaits us beyond layoffs" (THI May 22), the increasing wave of layoffs in global technology companies has become a major concern for employees, students and parents across the country. In recent months, leading multinational firms have laid off thousands of workers worldwide. However, the changing situation should not alarm our IT professionals given that India is the preferred destination for GCCs because of its skilled workforce and growing digital ecosystem. More global firms are setting up technology centres in the country, which is expected to open fresh employment opportunities. Employees must adapt themselves to this transformation. Those who fail to keep pace with emerging technologies may find it difficult to survive in the changing market. Workers should also branch out into communication skills, teamwork and problem-solving abilities. Educational institutions should step in and update their syllabus according to industry requirements. Youngsters must understand that the IT industry now opens opportunities not only in coding but also in analytics, robotics, AI systems and digital transformation. Companies should invest in reskilling and upskilling programmes rather than simply laying off workers. Internal training sessions and mentorship initiatives can help employees move into new domains. Governments and industry bodies can bolster employees through skill development schemes. Skilled professionals who adapt themselves to the changing demands are likely to secure rewarding careers in the future. India's GCC ecosystem is expected to create large-scale employment opportunities in the long run. Employees, students and educational institutions must work together to prepare for the changing technological landscape instead of getting discouraged by temporary setbacks.

Reskilling is the need of the hour

As beyond layoffs," (THI, May 22). The anxiety around layoffs is understandable, but the bigger concern is whether India's IT workforce is preparing itself for what comes next. GCCs are expanding, and that is genuinely good news. But expansion does not automatically translate into opportunity if skills remain static. Many mid-level professionals are still anchored to roles that AI is steadily absorbing. Reskilling cannot remain a talking point in corporate presentations. Universities, employers, and industry bodies must together create credible, accessible pathways for professionals to transition into AI-adjacent roles. India has the scale and the talent base to lead this shift. The question is whether we move with enough urgency before the window narrows.

Flight services from Bengaluru to Bidar and Kalaburagi to resume: MB Patil

BENGALURU: Infrastructure Development Minister M B Patil on Friday announced that flight services from Bengaluru to Bidar and Kalaburagi, the district headquarters of the Kalyana Karnataka region, will resume from June 1 and June 10 respectively.

Speaking on the occasion, he said that Star Air (Ghodawat Enterprises Limited) will operate flights on the Bengaluru-Bidar-Bengaluru and Bengaluru-Kalaburagi-Bengaluru sectors. The Government is extending viability gap funding of ₹28.47 crore to support the operations. Advance booking for flights on both routes has already commenced, he added.

Patil said the flight service to Kalaburagi had earlier been suspended due to financial losses. In the case of Bidar, services were being operated with special support from the Kalyana Karnataka Regional Development Board. Taking into account the growth of industries, education, tourism, agriculture and commercial activities in the Kalyana Karnataka region, the Government has decided to revive the services under the regional air connectivity initiative, he said.

The Minister said the Government is committed to enhancing air connectivity to Tier-2 and Tier-3 cities across the State. Such initiatives will not only accelerate regional economic growth but also contribute to infrastructure development, he noted.

Hashtags, hate and half-truths: The dark side of India's digital politics



When outrage becomes currency and truth becomes irrelevant, democracy pays the price

THE rise of social media in India was once hailed as a democratic revolution. It promised to dismantle the monopoly of traditional media, amplify unheard voices, deepen citizen participation, and establish a direct connection between political leaders and the public. In many ways, it succeeded. Political communication became immediate, interactive, and accessible on an unprecedented scale.

But now the same platforms have steadily polluted the country's political ecosystem. What began as an instrument of participation has, in many instances, degenerated into an unregulated arena of misinformation, abuse, manufactured outrage, and character assassination. The consequences extend far beyond politics; they strike at the very culture of democracy.

Indian politics has always been intensely competitive and emotionally charged. But social media transformed both the speed and scale of political confrontation. Earlier, allegations against political rivals passed through editorial scrutiny, legal checks, and institutional filters before reaching the public domain. Newspapers and television channels, despite their flaws and biases, still functioned within identifiable structures of accountability. Social media erased those barriers overnight.

Today, anonymous handles with no credibility or accountability can circulate fabricated claims, morphed videos, edited speeches, fake documents, and defamatory accusations to millions within minutes. Once amplified through coordinated digital networks, repetition itself

creates the illusion of truth. The political ecosystem has consequently shifted from ideological contestation to perpetual digital warfare. Truth is no longer merely the first casualty of political conflict; it is increasingly treated as irrelevant.

Perhaps the gravest danger posed by social media is the near-total absence of accountability. Traditional journalism, at least in principle, carried institutional responsibility. Publications could face defamation suits, public scrutiny, legal consequences, and professional censure for unethical reporting. Editors and publishers were answerable for what they printed. Of course, it is a different matter that these days even journalists seem to be getting increasingly influenced by social media and are vying to belittle the views expressed by fellow journalists acting more like activists.

Political operatives, ideological influencers, troll networks, and anonymous accounts routinely spread allegations without evidence. Many posts are cleverly framed as "questions," "sources suggest," or "reports indicate," enabling users to evade direct liability while successfully planting suspicion in the public mind. The damage, however, is immediate and often irreversible. A false allegation may trend nationally for a day, dominate television debates, influence public perception, and quietly disappear later without apology, correction, or consequence. By the time fact-checkers intervene, the political narrative has already hardened.

This has created a dangerous incentive structure where outrage is rewarded, restraint ignored, and sensationalism travels faster than truth. In a healthy democracy, political rivalry should revolve around governance, policy, ide-

ology, and public performance. Increasingly, however, Indian political discourse online revolves around the destruction of individuals rather than debate over ideas.

Political opponents are routinely portrayed not merely as rivals but as enemies, traitors, criminals, dictators, communal agents, or anti-national conspirators — often without substantiated evidence. Families are dragged into political battles. Private lives are scrutinized. Old videos are selectively edited. Rumours are packaged as "exposés." The objective is not persuasion but delegitimation.

Almost every major political formation now possesses an aggressive digital ecosystem dedicated less to defending its own ideas and more to attacking opponents relentlessly. The tragedy is that civil disagreement — the cornerstone of parliamentary democracy — is steadily disappearing.

Social media algorithms are designed not to promote truth or balance, but engagement.



The digital public square has become a theatre of political hostility, where anonymous allegations, viral half-truths and manufactured narratives often overpower evidence. This article examines how social media polluted India's political ecosystem and asks whether democratic discourse can still recover civility, accountability and respect for truth

Anger, outrage, fear, and polarization generate more clicks than reasoned analysis. Consequently, users increasingly inhabit ideological echo chambers where they consume only information that reinforces pre-existing beliefs.

Supporters of one political camp accept every allegation against rivals unquestioningly while dismissing all criticism of their preferred leaders as propaganda. Facts themselves become partisan.

A democracy cannot function effectively when citizens no longer agree even on basic facts. Nuance disappears. Complexity is reduced to hashtags. Serious policy discussions are drowned out by viral abuse and performative outrage.

Another disturbing feature of India's social media is that political messaging today is systematically engineered through coordinated hashtag campaigns, bot amplification, influencer networks, edited clips, selective leaks, meme factories, and targeted disinformation operations. Public percep-

tion itself can now be artificially manufactured. Visibility is mistaken for legitimacy.

The loudest voices online are often not the most credible — merely the most aggressively amplified.

The pollution generated by social media extends beyond political parties and leaders. Institutions themselves have become targets of sustained digital delegitimation.

The judiciary, Election Commission, investigative agencies, armed forces, universities, journalists, economists, and even constitutional authorities are routinely attacked whenever their actions conflict with partisan expectations.

Social media toxicity is not accidental; it is deeply tied to the economics of digital platforms which interests most of those who own these digital channels. These platforms profit from engagement, not civility. Outrage sustains attention. Polarisation increases interaction. Conflict keeps users online longer. As a result, inflammatory political content is often algorithmically rewarded.

Political actors exploit this structure ruthlessly because digital aggression delivers immediate visibility. Falsehood spreads not only because it is politically useful, but because it is commercially incentivised. The ultimate casualty is informed citizenship.

The answer, however, cannot lie in censorship alone. Excessive state control over digital speech carries dangers of its own and can easily become an instrument of political suppression. What India urgently needs is a culture of balanced accountability.

Political parties must discourage anonymous abuse and misinformation instead of covertly benefiting from it. Social media platforms must evolve

A historic step towards social justice

THE national debate on caste enumeration has once again moved to the centre of India's political and social discourse. Recent observations by the Supreme Court emphasizing the importance of caste data in the Census have added renewed urgency to a long-pending issue. For communities that have consistently demanded equitable representation, welfare, and social justice, the development carries both symbolic and policy significance.

Our Constitution guarantees equality to every citizen. Yet, the realities of social and economic inequality continue to shape access to education, employment, political representation, and public resources. Despite decades of affirmative action and welfare policies, the absence of comprehensive and updated caste-based data has remained a major policy gap. Governments continue to frame reservation policies and welfare interventions largely on estimates and outdated assumptions rather than contemporary evidence.

The last comprehensive caste census in India was conducted in 1931. After Independence, official Census exercises have largely restricted caste enumeration to Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes. Consequently, there is no reliable nationwide data on the population, educational status, economic conditions, or



representation of Other Backward Classes and several marginalized communities. These paradoxical policies meant to advance social justice are being implemented without a precise understanding of the social realities they seek to address.

Caste enumeration:

In this context, the Supreme Court's observations assume considerable importance. The underlying principle is simple, yet profound: meaningful equality cannot be achieved without understanding the actual structure of inequality. In a democracy committed to inclusive governance, representation and opportunity must be informed by evidence, not speculation. Policymakers across the world increasingly recognise that data-driven governance is indispensable for effective welfare planning and equitable distribution of resources. The demand for caste enumera-

tion has been consistently raised by several political and social movements over the years. Their argument is rooted in a fundamental democratic question: who has access to the nation's wealth, institutions, education, and decision-making structures, and in what proportion? Without credible data, these debates remain confined to rhetoric. The Court's intervention has now provided institutional legitimacy to a conversation that many believe was delayed for far too long.

The Telangana caste survey:
Telangana's recent caste survey has emerged as an important example in this regard. Conducted with administrative coordination and public participation, the exercise attempted to systematically gather socio-economic and educational data across communities. While debates on methodology and implementation may continue, the broader sig-

nificance of the initiative lies in its attempt to shift governance toward evidence-based policymaking. In an era where governments worldwide rely on data to frame targeted welfare measures, India too must strengthen its statistical foundations.

Globally, countries routinely collect demographic and social indicators to address disparities in health-care, education, employment, and income distribution. In diverse societies, such exercises are not viewed as instruments of division but as tools for inclusion. India, with its layered social realities, arguably has an even greater need for accurate and transparent data systems.

Critics of caste enumeration, however, raise concerns that such exercises could deepen social divisions or intensify caste-based politics. These concerns cannot be dismissed lightly. Yet, acknowledging inequality is not the same as perpetuating it. Democracies cannot correct structural disadvantages without first identifying them. Just as a physician cannot prescribe treatment without diagnosis, governments cannot meaningfully address social inequities without reliable evidence.

Data privacy and public trust:
Another critical dimension is data privacy and public trust. In the digital age, the collection of personal information naturally raises concerns about misuse and surveillance.

Police also deployed security personnel in the village as a precautionary measure to maintain law and order in the wake of the shocking incident.

Minister Satya orders immediate removal of canal encroachments

SATYA Kumar Yadav visited several rain-affected areas in Dharmavaram on Friday to review sanitation, drainage and civic conditions following overnight rainfall that caused water stagnation and mud accumulation across the town.

Accompanied by Municipal Commissioner Venkataramanayya, municipal staff and local NDA alliance leaders, the Minister inspected key areas including SLV Market, KPT Street, Sridevi Hall Road, Thogata Street, Anjuman Circle and Jatka Stand.

He expressed concern over the deteriorating condition of drainage canals, particularly a major irrigation canal near

Sridevi Hall, which he said had significantly narrowed due to encroachments.

He directed officials to conduct an immediate survey and mark encroached portions to ensure the free flow of rainwater during the monsoon season.

He also instructed municipal authorities to strengthen waste management systems, install dustbins where necessary and intensify regular cleaning operations to maintain sanitation standards in the town.

During the inspection, Satya reviewed pothole-ridden roads near Anjuman Circle and ordered immediate patchwork repairs to prevent inconvenience to residents. He warned that even minor negligence during the rainy season could lead to larger

civic problems and stressed the need for prompt preventive measures.

Later, Satya Kumar Yadav interacted with street vendors around Anjuman Circle and NTR Circle and assured them that the government remained committed to urban development, sanitation and public welfare.

In a separate programme held at the NDA office in Dharmavaram, the minister distributed Chief Minister's Relief Fund (CMRF) cheques worth ₹46.14 lakh to 70 beneficiaries from the constituency. He said the assistance was aimed at supporting financially distressed families facing medical emergencies and serious illnesses.

He stated that over the past two years, financial assistance amounting to ₹9.65 crore

had been provided to 913 beneficiaries in the constituency through the CMRF and Letters of Credit schemes.

He added that the government was prioritising healthcare services and ensuring that deserving families received timely support for expensive medical treatment.

The Minister also chaired a review meeting with APTIDCO officials regarding the construction of 1,440 housing units at Regatipalli in Dharmavaram.

Officials informed the meeting that construction works had reached advanced stages and that the houses, along with supporting infrastructure such as roads, drainage systems and water supply facilities, were targeted for completion by August 2026.

Foundation laid for permanent drinking water project in Puttaparthi

SRI Sathya Sai District Collector Shyam Prasad and Puttaparthi MLA Palle Sindhura Reddy on Friday laid the foundation stone for a permanent integrated drinking water project worth ₹136.26 crore, aiming to permanently resolve the long-term water scarcity of the Puttaparthi constituency.

The mega-infrastructure project, sanctioned for Puttaparthi Municipality, will be built near the Bukkapatnam tank with financial backing from the Asian Infrastructure Investment Bank (AIIB) and executed under the supervision of Jindal Water Works.

Former minister Palle Raghunatha Reddy attended the event as the chief guest.

Speaking at the launch, Collector Shyam Prasad emphasized that the project is designed with a future-ready vision to meet the drinking water needs of an estimated population of nearly two lakh people up to the year 2055.

The scheme will feature a massive storage capacity of 90 lakh litres and is expected to be fully completed

by May 2028, delivering safe drinking water to local households through 11,700 new tap connections.

The Collector further revealed that the state government has sanctioned nearly ₹1,000 crore for various municipal water projects across the district, alongside a ₹1.50-crore sewage treatment plant to protect the Chitravathi River from pollution.

MLA Palle Sindhura Reddy stated that the coalition government revived the long-pending project immediately after assuming office.

She added that major industrial projects, including a proposed ₹51,400-crore Reliance solar power plant in Amadagur mandal and a fighter aircraft manufacturing unit in Puttaparthi, would soon create large-scale employment opportunities for local youth.

Following the ceremony, the officials held a public grievance redressal drive at Nallamada, focusing on land disputes. Out of 115 petitions received from Nallamada and Puttaparthi mandals, 42 long-pending grievances were resolved on the spot by a high-level administrative team.

Medicover expert outlines 3 gold rules to keep chronic diabetes at bay

NELLORE: DR Ravindra Reddy, a leading diabetologist at Medicover Hospital, Nellore, has warned of a sharp surge in pre-diabetes cases among the youth, specifically within the 25 to 40 age demographic.

Speaking at an awareness programme on Friday, he emphasized that if identified during the pre-diabetes stage, the onset of full-blown diabetes can be completely prevented. Dr Reddy urged individuals not to ignore classic warning indicators, including excessive thirst, frequent urination,

persistent fatigue, increased appetite, and slow-healing wounds.

He advised that the disease can be easily kept at bay through simple habits: undergoing a blood sugar test once a year, engaging in at least 30 minutes of daily physical exercise, and maintaining a healthy body weight.

He concluded that by prioritizing metabolic health and making timely lifestyle modifications, the younger generation can comfortably avoid severe long-term health complications.

Air conditioning: How does it affect the skin?

Air conditioners have seen a significant surge in use in recent years, particularly in hot-climate countries like India. In today's increasingly climate-controlled world, air conditioning has evolved from a luxury into a near necessity. During scorching summers and relentless heatwaves that can break even the strongest admirers of the season, air conditioning feels like a blessing.

When temperatures become unbearable, often exceeding 40°C, the easiest solution is to switch on the AC and relax in cool air. High temperatures combined with humidity can be dangerous, leading to dehydration, heat exhaustion, and even heatstroke. As a re-

sult, people now spend much of their lives indoors under controlled cooling, moving from air-conditioned homes to cars, offices, malls, shopping centres, and gyms.

Across cities, from Delhi to Dubai, air conditioners have become less of a luxury and more of a survival tool. While AC systems provide comfort and safety, constant exposure to artificial cooling can also lead to dry skin, fine lines, dull complexion, brittle hair, and fatigue. The very machines protecting us from the heat may quietly be reshaping our wellness in ways we rarely question.

Prolonged reliance on artificial cooling can cause fatigue, lethargy, and chronic headaches, often linked to poor air circulation and low indoor humidity. Unlike sunburn or direct heat exposure, AC-related dehy-

dration develops gradually. Many people spend extended hours in offices, cars, shopping malls, and air-conditioned bedrooms without noticing the slow loss of moisture. Symptoms usually become noticeable only after persistent dryness, itching, or changes in skin and hair texture begin to appear over time.

1. Immunity Reduction Due to Artificial Cooling

Constant dependence on air conditioning can weaken the body's natural ability to adapt to temperature changes. Drastic shifts between cold indoor environments and hot outdoor temperatures may cause "summer chills," muscle stiffness, and reduced immunity.

AC systems reduce humidity and create cold environments that draw moisture from the body, resulting in significant dryness, irritation, and brittleness. This damages the skin barrier, leading to flaking, itching, and cracked skin, while also causing dull hair and brittle nails.

Air conditioners do not simply cool the air — they strip it of moisture, and this

has biological consequences. When the skin loses water, it becomes rough, tight, and flaky. Constant exposure to dry indoor air accelerates trans-epidermal water loss, a process in which moisture escapes directly from the skin and hair. This leaves the skin looking dull, tired, and dehydrated, especially after cleansing.

Dry air also causes the skin to contract, making fine lines and wrinkles appear more prominent.

2. AC Acne

Air conditioning can contribute to acne by dehydrating the skin and triggering sebaceous glands to produce excess oil. This overproduction of sebum can clog pores, leading to inflammation, breakouts, blackheads, and whiteheads, particularly in people with combination skin.

This imbalance often creates a frustrating cycle in which the skin feels dry and oily at the same time, making skincare difficult to manage. Dermatologists commonly refer to this condition as "AC acne."

3. Accelerated Ageing

Spending nearly 10 to 12 hours daily in air-conditioned environments can accelerate premature skin ageing. Cold, dry air reduces skin elasticity and may cause the skin to shrink, sag, and develop fine lines. Over time, continuous moisture loss reduces the skin's natural plumpness and

elasticity, making wrinkles and signs of ageing more noticeable. Premature sagging and dullness often become visible much earlier in people who spend most of their day in heavily air-conditioned spaces.

4. Chapped Lips

Air conditioners are a major cause of dry and chapped lips because they lower indoor humidity and strip moisture from the air. The skin on the lips is thinner and more delicate than facial skin and lacks oil glands, making it especially vulnerable to dryness.

Unlike the rest of the skin, lips cannot produce natural oils to lock in moisture. As a result, prolonged exposure to dry AC environments often leads to cracking, peeling, and irritation. Moisture escapes from the lips much faster than from other areas of the face in climate-controlled spaces.

How to Protect Your Skin in Air-Conditioned Environments

By understanding how AC affects the skin, hair, and body, and by making small but consistent lifestyle changes, it is possible to maintain healthy, glowing skin despite extreme summer conditions.

One of the most important steps is staying hydrated. Drink plenty of water, soups, fresh juices, and other fluids throughout the day. Adding a pinch of salt to a litre of water may help improve cellular absorption, while occasional electrolyte supplements can



support hydration further.

A diet rich in water-based foods such as cucumber, lettuce, celery, watermelon, strawberries, and oranges also helps maintain moisture levels in the body. Foods high in antioxidants — including berries, green tea, dark chocolate, and leafy greens — can protect the skin from environmental stress caused by prolonged AC exposure.

Maintaining indoor temperatures between 23°C and 25°C is considered ideal for balancing comfort and skin health. This range supports the body's natural thermoregulation while reducing excessive dryness.

Using a humidifier is another effective solution. Humidifiers release moisture back into the air-conditioned

room, helping maintain healthy humidity levels and counteracting the drying effects of AC. Using a humidifier at night can significantly improve skin texture over time.

Regular application of moisturiser, lip balm, and hand cream is equally important. Reapplying these products every few hours helps restore the skin barrier and prevent moisture loss.

Keeping AC systems clean also plays a vital role in maintaining indoor air quality. Clean air filters trap dust, pollen, and other pollutants more effectively. Filters should ideally be cleaned every three months.

Older air-conditioning units may also release chlorofluorocarbons (CFCs), refriger-

erants that are harmful to the ozone layer and contribute to environmental warming.

In addition, taking regular breaks from air-conditioned environments allows the body to adjust naturally to outdoor temperatures. This helps improve thermoregulation and reduces dependence on artificial cooling.

The key lies in maintaining hydration, protecting the skin barrier, balancing indoor humidity, and practising mindful indoor living. When these factors are addressed, comfort and healthy, youthful skin can coexist — even in a world dominated by air conditioning.

Self-discipline is not limited to academics; it also impacts physical and mental well-being.

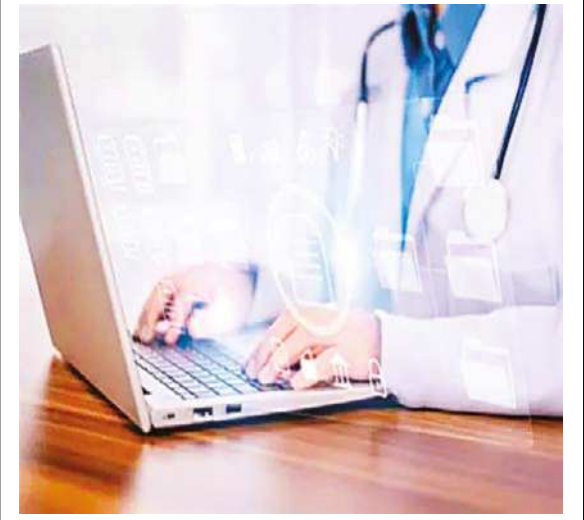
Disciplined students are more likely to:

School study highlights growth in student self-management and collaboration skills

Experiment conducted among students from Grades 1 to 9 reveals increasing focus on behavioural learning beyond academics

- 84% of students demonstrated independent self-management skills
- 80% showed initiative and proactive behaviour
- 80% prioritised collaboration and teamwork
- 79% managed tasks without reminders
- 65% demonstrated empathetic listening abilities



A recent school-based social experiment has highlighted the growing importance of behavioural and life skills among students, suggesting that qualities such as self-management, collaboration, initiative, and emotional awareness are becoming increasingly visible within school environments.

The study, conducted among students from Grades 1 to 9 at Glendale International School, examined how students perceive their own learning experiences beyond textbooks, examinations, and academic scores. According

to observations and behavioural assessments carried out as part of the initiative, 84% of students demonstrated independent self-management skills, indicating an ability to organise and regulate their work without constant supervision.

The findings further showed that 80% of students displayed proactive behaviour and initiative in classroom and school-related activities. Another 80% prioritised teamwork and collaborative thinking over individual participation, while

79% were able to manage and complete tasks without repeated reminders from teachers or parents.

In addition, 65% of students demonstrated empathetic listening skills during classroom interactions and group activities. The study also found that 52% of students showed the ability to independently plan tasks and schedules ahead of time, reflecting the development of organisational and leadership habits at an early stage.

As part of the experiment, both parents and students

were independently asked the same question: "What is your child learning well in school?" While most parents focused primarily on academic performance and subject knowledge, students highlighted behavioural and personal development areas such as responsibility, listening, collaboration, initiative, and self-management.

Education experts say the findings reflect a broader shift in school education, where behavioural learning and social-emotional development are increasingly

being viewed as important alongside academic achievement.

The assessments were conducted using structured behavioural rubrics integrated into the school's learning framework. The initiative aimed to better understand how habits related to accountability, communication, teamwork, and leadership are developing among students in day-to-day school environments.

School officials noted that behavioural competencies are gradually becoming part of classroom learning and student engagement processes rather than being treated separately as extracurricular skills. Educators also believe that qualities such as adaptability, emotional intelligence, collaboration, and self-discipline are becoming increasingly important for long-term academic and professional success.

The findings contribute to a wider conversation in education about measuring student growth beyond marks and examinations, particularly as schools explore more holistic approaches to learning and development.

UoH & IIIT-H sign MoU, focuses on advanced technology and research innovation



Two leading Hyderabad-based academic institutions — University of Hyderabad and International Institute of Information Technology Hyderabad — have signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) aimed at strengthening collaboration in higher education, advanced research, and deep-tech innovation.

The agreement was formally signed in the presence of senior academic and administrative officials from both institutions, including Prof. J. Anuradha, Vice-Chancellor In-Charge of UoH, and Prof. Sandeep K. Shukla, Director of IIIT-H.

According to officials, the partnership is expected to encourage greater cooperation between the academic departments and specialised research groups of the two institutions. The collaboration will allow reciprocal access to laboratories, high-performance computing (HPC) facilities, and library

resources, enabling students and researchers to work across institutional boundaries. The MoU focuses on promoting interdisciplinary research, joint academic activities, and collaborative innovation in emerging technology sectors. Experts believe such partnerships are becoming increasingly important as universities attempt to strengthen research ecosystems and build industry-relevant skills among students.

Under the agreement, faculty members from both institutions will be able to participate in co-teaching, collaborative research projects, and joint supervision of postgraduate and PhD scholars within the framework of AICTE and UGC regulations.

The collaboration is also expected to support joint publications, intellectual property development, research events, and competitive extramural funding proposals in advanced tech-

nology areas.

One of the major focus areas of the partnership will be semiconductor science and technology, including research in VLSI and embedded systems. Officials stated that the MoU also envisions the possibility of future collaborative or joint degree programmes in specialised technology domains.

Academic representatives from both institutions noted that the initiative aims to create stronger institutional synergy while supporting the development of highly trained and industry-ready professionals in areas of national importance.

To coordinate the implementation of the partnership, faculty members from the Centre for Advanced Studies in Electronics Science and Technology (CAS-EST) at UoH and the Centre for VLSI and Embedded Systems Technology (CVEST) at IIIT-H have been designated as official coordinators for the programme.

HC pulls up WFI over decision to declare Vinesh Phogat ineligible

NEW DELHI

THE Delhi High Court on Friday pulled up the Wrestling Federation of India (WFI) for its decision to declare celebrated grappler Vinesh Phogat "ineligible" from participation in domestic events and asked the

Centre to constitute an expert panel to evaluate her.

A bench of Chief Justice D K Upadhyaya and Justice Tejas Karia observed that the WFI's departure from the earlier practice of permitting the participation of reputed athletes "speaks volumes," and asked the Centre to ensure that Phogat, who is seeking

her return from a maternity break, is allowed to participate in the upcoming Asian Games selection trials.

The bench emphasised that motherhood is celebrated in the country, and the federation should not act with "vengeance." It asked the Centre to constitute an expert panel to evaluate Phogat

after the government counsel submitted that the framework provided by the Sports Authority of India permits relaxation of eligibility criteria in certain cases. "Ask the experts to evaluate her chances. Ensure that she participates," the court orally said, as it clarified it would take up the matter at 2:30 pm again to enable the

government counsel to come back with further details with respect to the constitution of the team of expert. The court was hearing Phogat's appeal against a single-judge's order of May 18 refusing her immediate relief on the issue of her participation in the selection trials on May 30-31 for this year's Asian Games despite be-

ing declared "ineligible" by the WFI. Phogat's senior counsel urged the bench to grant her the opportunity to participate in the trials, contending that the show-cause notice issued to her on May 9, a day before her participation in a domestic event in Gonda, showed that "somebody is clutching at straws" to oust her.



J&K's Aaquib Nabi ignored Scrap Ranji if it doesn't matter: Vengsarkar blasts selectors

Nabi was the primary catalyst in Jammu and Kashmir's Ranji Trophy triumph in the 2025-2026 season with 60 wickets to his name

MUMBAI

CRICKET legend Dilip Vengsarkar has slammed the Ajit Agarkar-led selection committee for ignoring Ranji Trophy star Aaquib Nabi for the Afghanistan Test, calling the decision 'absurd' and questioning the value of domestic cricket performances.

The Board of Control for Cricket in India selection committee, led by Ajit Agarkar, has come under scathing attack for the shocking selection calls for the one-off Test against Afghanistan.

Gurnoor Brar, who has done well for India A and in the Vijay Hazare Trophy, was picked ahead of the Ranji Trophy's top wicket-taker, Aaquib Nabi, in the Test squad. Nabi was the primary catalyst in Jammu and Kashmir's Ranji Trophy triumph in the 2025-2026 season with 60 wickets to his name. A consistent performer in red-ball cricket, he also took 44 wickets at an average of 13.27 in the 2024-2025 Ranji season. Cricket legend Dilip Vengsarkar has slammed Agarkar for ignoring a proven performer, asking the BCCI to do away with the Ranji Trophy



if performances in India's premier domestic red-ball event are not even considered.

"The selectors' decision to ignore him is absolutely absurd and baffling. What kind of selection is this? It is just not acceptable. It is an injustice," Vengsarkar told The Times of India newspaper on Thursday. "Can you imagine Nabi's plight right now? He took 60 wickets in the Ranji Trophy. He has worked hard for it and deserves a place ahead of everybody else."

PBKS seek dramatic turnaround to keep playoff hopes alive

LUCKNOW: Punjab Kings will need something spectacular to arrest a disastrous slide and keep their fading playoff hopes alive when they take on already-eliminated Lucknow Super Giants, in their IPL clash, here on Saturday. Punjab's campaign has unravelled dramatically since their record

265-run chase against Delhi Capitals on April 25. From remaining unbeaten till the midway stage and looking like genuine title contenders with six wins in seven matches, the last season's runners-up have crashed to six successive defeats, leaving their playoff hopes hanging by a thread. Now placed fifth, Punjab not only need to beat LSG in their final league game here on Saturday but also depend on Sunday's double headers (MI vs RR and KKR vs DC) to earn a place in the playoff. The Shreyas Iyer-led side would hope both Mumbai Indians and Kolkata Knight Riders lose their respective matches. A Rajasthan Royals win over Mumbai would officially end Punjab's hopes, while a KKR victory over Delhi Capitals could bring net run rate into play. At present, PBKS hold a slight edge in NRR over KKR. But before permutations come into the picture, Punjab first need to rediscover their form after a prolonged slump that has exposed flaws across departments. Their aggressive top order of Priyansh Arya, Prabhsimran Singh and Cooper Connolly has failed to provide the explosive starts that defined the first half of their season. Priyansh has managed just one fifty in his last seven innings and was dismissed for a duck in the previous game, while Prabhsimran too has struggled for consistency with only one fifty in his last five innings. Connolly has shown glimpses but has not converted starts into substantial scores.



Chaliha's impressive run ends in quarters

KUALA LUMPUR: India's Ashmita Chaliha produced a spirited performance before going down narrowly to world No. 23 Line Hojmark Kjaersfeldt of Denmark in the women's singles quarterfinals of the Malaysia Masters Super 500 badminton tournament here on Friday.

Returning after an eight-month rehabilitation following a medial meniscus tear in her right knee, the 71st-ranked Indian squandered a hard-fought opening game advantage to lose 23-21 18-21 11-21 to the eighth seed in a contest lasting a little over an hour at the Axiata Arena.

Chaliha started brightly, opening up an 11-6 lead at the interval in the opening game. Line clawed her way back after the break to narrow the gap to 13-12 and later moved ahead 19-18, but the Indian held her nerve in a gruelling battle to pocket the game. The second game followed a similar pattern as Chaliha again surged ahead 10-5 before the Dane restored parity at 13-13. Line then broke away from 15-15 to force the match into a decider.

The final game, however, was largely one-way traffic as Line stamped her authority early with an 8-4 lead and never allowed Chaliha a route back, comfortably sealing the contest to enter the semifinals.

Pak hockey players complain about pending dues, daily allowance

KARACHI: Pakistani hockey players' financial woes continued as they are yet to receive pending dues from the national federation (PHF) and their daily training camp allowance has also been reduced ahead of the FIH World Cup to be held in the Netherlands and Belgium in August this year. The Pakistan Hockey Federation's (PHF) interim set-up announced that players and officials of the national team will now receive a daily allowance of USD 110 on foreign tours. But the players have complained that their training camp allowance has been reduced from USD 11 (3000 rupees) to USD 3.5 (1000 rupees).

According to a reliable source close to the PHF, the senior players had asked the PHF to confirm about how much allowance they would get for the training camp duration. Pakistan on Thursday named their 20-member squad for next month's FIH Pro League matches in Belgium and England but didn't name the captain, a move that didn't go down well with the players.

Shakeel Ammad Butt has been leading Pakistan since early last year. "They have announced we will get USD 110 daily allowance for foreign tours, including the World Cup qualifying event we had played in Egypt but we will only believe it unless we are paid that amount," one player said on condition of anonymity. He said in the past also the PHF officials had made similar promises but never fulfilled that. "Right now we just want to know whether it is true they will pay us just 1000 rupees daily for the camp duration."

Ebola surveillance stepped up at Kochi airport after emergency meet

Thermal screening, 21-day travel history verification, and self-declaration forms have been made mandatory for international passengers

KOCHI

AUTHORITIES stepped up Ebola surveillance and precautionary measures at Cochin International Air-

port Limited (CIAL) on Friday following an emergency preparedness meeting between management and the Airport Health Organisation.

A CIAL spokesperson said a 24-hour monitoring system has now been activated at the airport as part of efforts to detect possible symptoms early and strengthen coordinated public health response measures.

"Thermal screening, 21-

day travel history verification, and self-declaration forms have been made mandatory for international passengers," he said in a statement after the meeting.

Passengers arriving from countries including the Democratic Republic of the Congo, Uganda, and South Sudan will be placed under special health surveillance in view of global alerts over Ebola outbreaks, authorities

said. The meeting was attended by Airport Director Manu G, Airport Health Officer Dr Raphael Teddy, Senior Medical Officer Dr Aysha Manika K A, and representatives from CISE, Immigration, airlines, the Airports Authority, and CIAL.

APHO Public Health Specialist Dr Anna presented the preparedness and response plan covering Ebola prevention, case identification, and

infection control measures.

Officials noted that there is currently no widely approved vaccine or specific treatment for the Bundibugyo Ebola virus (BDBV), one of the five known Ebola virus species.

"The disease can spread from animals to humans and also through direct contact with bodily fluids of infected persons," officials said.

Authorities said the incubation period ranges from 2

to 21 days, while fever, sore throat, headache, and flu-like symptoms are among the early signs of infection.

"Mortality rates can range between 30 and 50 per cent," officials added.

Isolation wards have been arranged at Ernakulam General Hospital, Government Hospital Kalamassery, and District Hospital Aluva as part of the preparedness plan.

A doctor at a private hospital here was accused of raping a female student after administering her a sedative injection during treatment, police said on Friday. In the wake of the allegation, the state health minister directed that the hospital be sealed and the doctor's degree be confiscated. The student had been admitted to Tejas Hospital on May 18 after suffering a health episode, officials said.

"According to the complaint, the doctor allegedly called the patient alone into the operation theatre dur-

ing treatment and asked the female staff and the victim's father to step outside.

The victim alleged that the doctor administered an intoxicating injection and sexually assaulted her," Deputy Commissioner of Police (North) Twinkle Jain told reporters. The student told the police that she realised what had happened after the effect of the injection subsided, following which her family lodged a complaint.

The doctor, a resident of the Tambera area in Sitapur district, was detained for questioning, and the alleged victim sent for medical ex-

amination. A case has been registered in connection with the matter, the officer said. Uttar Pradesh Deputy Chief Minister Brajesh Pathak, who also holds the health portfolio, said on X that directions had been issued to seal Tejas Hospital in the Bakshi Ka Talab area here and suspend the medical licence of the accused doctor, Vijay Giri.

Pathak said instructions had also been given to the Ayurveda department to confiscate the doctor's Ayurvedic medical degree so that he "can never discharge any kind of medical responsibility in future."

Bengal govt notifies free bus travel for women from June 1

KOLKATA: The West Bengal government has notified free bus travel for women in all state government-run buses from June 1 as part of a scheme aimed at enhancing women's empowerment and improving access to public transport.

According to a notification issued by the state Transport Department on May 21, women commuters will be eligible for free travel in both short-route and long-route state-run buses operating in West Bengal.

The Transport department notification said a smart card with QR code, photograph and beneficiary details will be issued to all eligible women upon application through the BDO or SDO offices concerned.

It said that the smart card shall be issued to women of the state on the basis of supporting documents like

Aadhaar card, elector's photo identity card (EPIC), VB-G RAMG job card, Ayushman Bharat health card, driving license, Pan card, passport, pension document with photograph, identity card of central/state government/psus, identity cards issued by schools/colleges/universities.

Till issuance of the smart cards, women passengers will be allowed to avail the facility on production of valid photo identity documents such as Aadhaar card, voter identity card, driving licence, PAN card, passport and government-issued service identity cards, among others, the notification said.

Conductors will issue 'zero value tickets' to women passengers after verification of identity documents, it said.

The scheme will come into effect from June 1, 2026, the notification added. -- PTI



Lecturer held for leaking NEET UG physics paper

NEW DELHI: The CBI has arrested a Pune-based lecturer for allegedly leaking the physics paper of NEET UG 2026 to a select group of aspirants, officials said on Friday. The CBI has arrested Manisha Sanjay Havaladar, presently employed with the Seth Hiralal Saraf Prashala in Pune, terming her another "source" for the paper leak. "The CBI has identified another key accused who was the source for the leak of NEET-UG 2026 physics questions," a CBI spokesperson said in a statement.

The agency alleged that Havaladar was involved in the NEET UG process after being appointed an expert by the Na-



tional Testing Agency (NTA). "She had complete access to the physics question paper."

In April, she shared some of the questions with co-accused Manisha Mandhare," the statement said. The CBI arrested Mandhare, a botany teacher from Pune, in connection with the NEET paper leak on May

16. The agency found that the questions Havaladar shared with the aspirants tallied with the physics paper of NEET UG 2026. "The CBI conducted searches at various locations across the country and seized several incriminating documents, laptops, bank statements and mobile phones. A detailed analysis of the seized items is underway," the agency said.

On May 12, the NTA cancelled the National Eligibility cum Entrance Test (Undergraduate), or NEET, held on May 3 for medical admissions amid allegations of paper leak. A re-examination has been scheduled for June 21.

DMK's 'bent coconut tree' jibe draws retort from VCK

CHENNAI: The DMK on Friday made a sarcastic "coconut tree bending towards a neighbour" remark targeting the VCK and IUML after they joined the TVK government, prompting the VCK to retort that it "did not grow at the mercy of other parties." Aiming to assuage the feelings, DMK chief M K Stalin appealed to party members not to use harsh words as to hurt anyone.

Both Viduthalai Chiruthaigal Katchi and IUML, allies of the DMK till the 2026 Assembly election, announced support to the TVK government which fell short of a simple majority of 118 in the Assembly. VCK leader Vanni Arasu, who emerged victorious from Tindivanam Assembly constituency and A M Shahjahan who was elected from Papanasam were sworn in as ministers by Governor Rajendra Viswanath

India's residential market matures; Hyd joins growth surge in Q1 2026

ALONG WITH BENGALURU AND DELHI-NCR, HYDERABAD POSTED ROBUST DOUBLE-DIGIT SALES GROWTH IN Q1 2026 AMID RISING PREMIUM HOUSING DEMAND AND STEADY PRICE APPRECIATION

NEW DELHI

INDIA'S residential real estate market has transitioned into a "structurally mature, demand-anchored growth phase", with Q1 2026 recording 93,065 new unit launches and 95,973 unit sales across the top eight cities, a report said on Saturday. The report from PropTiger said the supply rose 1.1 per cent sequentially and sales improved 1 per cent quarter-on-quarter.

The weighted average price reached a record high of Rs 10,050 per sq ft -- crossing the five-digit benchmark for the first time -- "signalling that value creation now drives market health rather than transaction volume."

"The Indian residential market has transitioned into a structurally more disciplined phase. Growth today is increasingly being driven by demand quality, inventory discipline, and

buyer confidence rather than speculative expansion," said Prakash Tejwani, CEO, PropTiger.

The supply remained flat at -0.1 per cent on a YoY basis, while sales moderated to -2.2 per cent, reflecting healthy normalisation rather than structural weakness, the report noted.

Bengaluru emerged as the standout performer, recording sales of 15,603 units, up 33 per cent year-on-year and 12 per cent sequentially. The city also maintained near-parity between new supply and sales absorption, indicating a well-balanced market. The GCC and startup employment engine continues to prove more durable than conventional IT hiring cycles, providing Bengaluru with a structurally differentiated demand base.

Mumbai Metropolitan Region remained the largest market by volume and value with 26,116 sales units in Q1

2026. Though the performance moderated on YoY basis, it reflected base-effect normalisation against an exceptional 2025, rather than a loss of demand momentum, the report noted.

Chennai, Hyderabad and Delhi-NCR also posted robust gains in sales from 11 per cent to 43 per cent, while Pune, Kolkata and Ahmedabad showed mixed trends.

A disproportionate share of new launches in Q1 2026 -- particularly in Mumbai MMR, Bengaluru, and Delhi NCR -- remained concentrated in the premium and upper mid-income segments, driving the average property prices higher. The outlook for Q2 2026 is constructive, the firm said, predicting a steady sequential growth of 2-4 per cent and sustained year-on-year price appreciation of 4-8 per cent across major metros driven by limited mid-segment supply.

India emerges as Asia Pacific's top real estate yield market

Office, logistics, retail and student housing assets in India outperformed regional peers on returns, while Q1 investment inflows crossed \$2.29 billion

NEW DELHI

INDIA offers the highest real estate yields across every major asset class in the Asia Pacific region and recorded an 189 per cent year-on-year jump in investment volumes in the Q1 CY 2026, a report said on Thursday.

The report from CBRE said that cap rates in India consistently outpace every other market in the region across office, retail, logistics, hotels, and student housing sectors, in some cases by as much as 320 basis points. India's Q1 2026 investment volume rose to \$2,295.19 million from \$839.85 million a year earlier, second to only Singapore that led the region in investment volumes with a 364 per cent year-on-year increase. "We are seeing genuine, broad-based demand across sectors driven by India's economic fundamentals, its growing corporate base, and a young, consumption-led population," said Anshuman Magazine, Chairman & CEO, India, South-East Asia, Middle East & Africa, CBRE.



"Global investors who have been cautious till now are actively looking to deploy capital here, and we expect this momentum to strengthen further as more institutional-grade products come to market," he added. The report highlighted sustained interest from domestic institutions, family offices, and global capital markets players as they increasingly allocate to Indian real estate through direct acquisitions, REITs, and structured debt instruments. India is one of the top markets for real estate debt interest in Asia Pacific, signalling maturing capital markets, the report noted.

The report noted India's Grade A office cap rates range from 7.50 per cent to

8.40 per cent in core central business district locations, compared to 3.25 per cent to 3.80 per cent in Singapore and 2 per cent to 3 per cent in Tokyo.

India is named among the top three preferred markets for Grade A office investment enquiries in Asia Pacific, alongside Singapore and Japan. Student housing yields in India stood at 8.50 per cent-9 per cent, around 320 basis points higher than the next-highest market, Australia. The institutional-grade logistics cap rates in India stand at 7.15 per cent-7.75 per cent, around 115 basis points more than the second-ranked market, Vietnam with the rates of 6 per cent-7 per cent.

UPRERA bars builders from using homebuyers' money for assured return schemes

LUCKNOW: Uttar Pradesh Real Estate Regulatory Authority has barred builders from using homebuyers' money for "assured return" schemes and made it mandatory for all registered projects to operate through three separate bank accounts, officials said on Thursday. The new framework, aimed at tightening financial discipline



and preventing diversion of project funds, was discussed at a meeting convened by

UP RERA with bankers and financial institutions. Uttar Pradesh Real Estate Regulatory Authority (UP RERA) Chairman Sanjay Bhoosredy chaired the meeting, which was attended by senior officials of nationalised banks, financial institutions and the State Level Bankers' Committee.

Shardad, further added: "South India has consistently demonstrated resilience across market cycles. The region continues to benefit from manufacturing-led growth, infrastructure development, and sustained residential demand, which continue to support long-term investor confidence."

Domestic demand cushions India against global uncertainty: RBI

Financial conditions, crude oil prices challenges for external sector outlook

NEW DELHI

INDIA'S economic activity exhibited resilience in April, with industrial and services sectors maintaining strength across several segments even as the global economy continued to be shadowed by uncertainties in West Asia, according to the RBI's monthly bulletin released on Friday. Industrial and services activity stayed strong in many segments. Early results of listed private non-financial companies for Q4:2025-26 also showed an improvement in business performance over the previous quarter, with aggregate sales and operating profit recording a double-digit growth, the bulletin stated.

It highlighted that in the agriculture sector, rapid progress of summer sowing was



supported by above normal pre-monsoon rainfall and sufficient reservoir storage levels. However, a higher probability of above-normal minimum temperatures and unseasonal rains in some parts of the country could pose risks to the harvesting of remaining rabi crops. The current public foodgrain

stocks remain well above the buffer norms ensuring domestic food security.

The financial conditions, crude oil prices and capital flows continue to pose challenges to the external sector outlook. Nevertheless, robust services exports, positive net FDI flows, foreign exchange reserve buffers and a number

of proactive policy measures undertaken by the Government and the Reserve Bank are likely to cushion the Indian economy against external headwinds.

In March, net foreign direct investment remained positive for the second consecutive month. Foreign portfolio investors continued to remain net sellers in April and May, though the pace of outflows moderated, the bulletin observed.

CPI inflation rose to 3.5 per cent in April, driven mainly by food inflation, while core inflation remained steady indicating limited pass-through of higher input cost conditions. Although headline inflation remains firmly within the tolerance band, the pass through to domestic prices needs to be monitored, it pointed out.

Institutional buyers bid ₹2,380 crore in Central Bank of India OFS

MUMBAI

INSTITUTIONAL investors on Friday put in over Rs 2,380 crore worth bids in the Offer For Sale (OFS) of Central Bank of India shares, which got over-subscribed more than two times.

The government is selling up to 8 per cent stake in the Central Bank of India at a floor price of Rs 31 per share. If fully subscribed, the stake sale would fetch Rs 2,456 crore to the government.

Till the close of trading hours on Friday, institutional investors put in bids for over 76.86 crore shares, which is about 2.36 times of the 32.58 crore shares on offer.



At the indicated price of Rs 31.01 a share, non-retail investors put in over Rs 2,380 crore worth bids for Central Bank OFS. The OFS offer includes a 4 per cent green shoe option, taking the total stake that the government intends to offload to 8 per cent. This is the first OFS by the government in the current fiscal. Retail investors will be able to bid in the share sale offer on Monday. The floor price

of Rs 31 a share is 8.58 per cent lower than the stock's Thursday's closing price of Rs 33.91 on the BSE. Shares of Central Bank of India slipped 7.90 per cent to close at Rs 31.23 on BSE on Friday. The OFS will help the government inch towards meeting the Securities and Exchange Board of India's minimum public shareholding norm. According to SEBI, all listed companies must maintain public shareholding of 25 per cent. The government currently holds 89.27 per cent stake. If the government exercises the green shoe option, its total stake in the state-owned bank will come down to 81.27 per cent.

FLIPKART PARTNERS WITH INDIA POST TO BOOST LAST MILE PARCEL DELIVERY

NEW DELHI: E-commerce major Flipkart has signed an agreement with the Department of Posts for efficient last mile parcel delivery, an official statement said on Friday. The partnership aims to leverage the delivery network of the Department of Posts along with Flipkart's strong presence in India's e-commerce sector to provide efficient, reliable and customer-centric parcel delivery solutions across the country, the statement said. "The Department of Posts (DoP), Ministry of Communications, and Flipkart India Private Limited have signed an agreement for last mile parcel delivery services.

Higher gold import duty could cut demand by 50-60 tonnes this year, says WGC

MUMBAI

INDIA'S gold demand is expected to contract by 50-60 tonnes this calendar year, around 10 per cent lower than the previous year, following the import duty hike, according to the World Gold Council (WGC). "Looking at 2026 as a whole, we estimate that combined jewellery and bar and coin demand could decline by around 50-60 tonnes, around 10 per cent lower than the previous year, due to the impact of the import duty hike," WGC said in its India gold market update. The gold import duty was raised sharply from 6 per cent to 15 per cent, making it the single-largest increase on record and fully reversing the duty cut of July 2024. The Prime Minister has also appealed to consumers to avoid



buying gold for a year. Other factors, such as the gold price, changes to income levels, inflation, or effects from the monsoon, would further influence annual demand, it added. "Our econometric models suggest that changes in import duties tend to impact gold demand in both the short and long term, although the impact differs across jewellery and investment products such as bars and coins. Investment demand appears more sensitive to duty changes, while jewellery demand has shown greater resilience," said WGC.

Dalmia Bharat to acquire JAL Cement assets in ₹2,850 cr deal

NEW DELHI: Dalmia Bharat on Friday said it will acquire the cement assets of debt-ridden Jaiprakash Associates, which has been acquired by billionaire Gautam Adani-led Adani Enterprises through insolvency proceedings. Dalmia Cement (Bharat) Ltd (DCBL), a wholly-owned subsidiary of Dalmia Bharat, has already executed a Business Transfer Agreement (BTA) with Jaiprakash Associates Ltd for the transaction, which is expected to complete within two weeks, a statement said.

Following the takeover, Dalmia Bharat's cement capacity will increase to 54.7 million tonnes per annum (MTPA). The BTA has been signed for acquisition of cement plants at Rewa (Madhya Pradesh), Churk, Chunar and Sadwa (Uttar Pradesh), with 5.2 MTPA cement capacity and 3.3 MTPA clinker capacity, at an enterprise value of Rs 2,850 crore, Dalmia Bharat said.



Indian OTT platforms ignoring NRIs

Becomes a serious problem for Telugu cinema

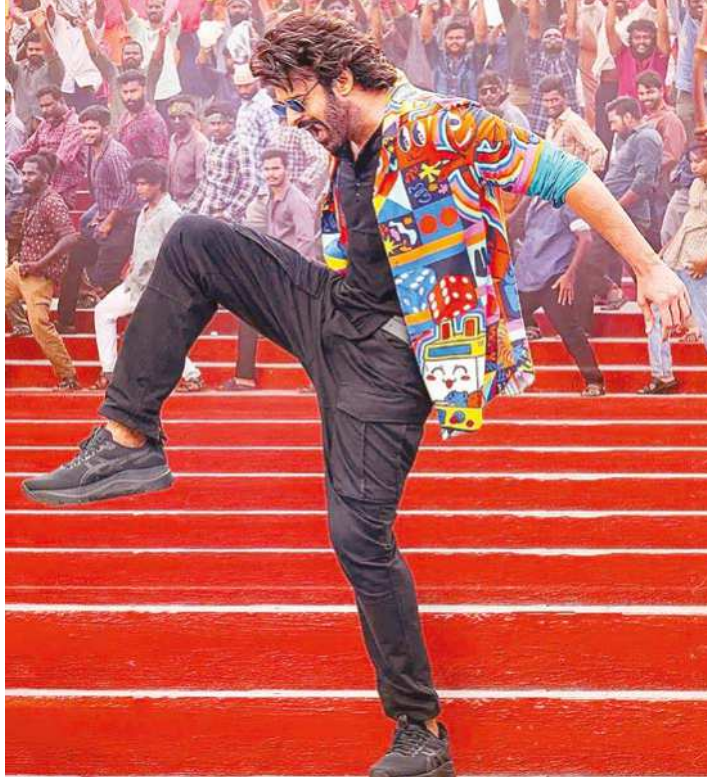
The growing frustration among overseas Telugu audiences is exposing a major flaw in the Indian OTT streaming ecosystem. While Indian viewers are enjoying instant digital premieres of new Telugu films, Non-Resident Indians (NRIs), especially in the United States, are increasingly being left without legal access to the same content. This repeated issue is now turning into a serious concern for the future of Indian OTT platforms and their global credibility.

Recent Telugu OTT releases like *Bad Boy Karthik*, *Sathi Leelavathi*, and *The Raja Saab* have highlighted the problem once again. Though these films premiered on major streaming giants like

Amazon Prime Video and JioHotstar in India, many subscribers in the United States discovered that the movies were either unavailable or significantly delayed on the same platforms overseas.

For Telugu cinema, the overseas market — particularly the U.S. — has played a crucial role in building global recognition. From theatrical collections to social media promotions, NRIs have consistently supported Telugu films and helped expand their international reach. Yet, despite paying premium subscription charges across multiple OTT services, many overseas audiences are unable to legally stream newly released Indian films on release day.

The larger issue lies in how Indian OTT platforms continue marketing films with aggressive "streaming now



worldwide" campaigns while quietly restricting access in international territories. This lack of transparency is slowly damaging audience trust. Many viewers abroad now feel sidelined, even though they represent one of the most loyal and financially strong consumer bases for Indian entertainment.

Industry experts believe poor international OTT planning can have long-term consequences. When legal viewing options disappear, piracy naturally becomes the easiest alterna-

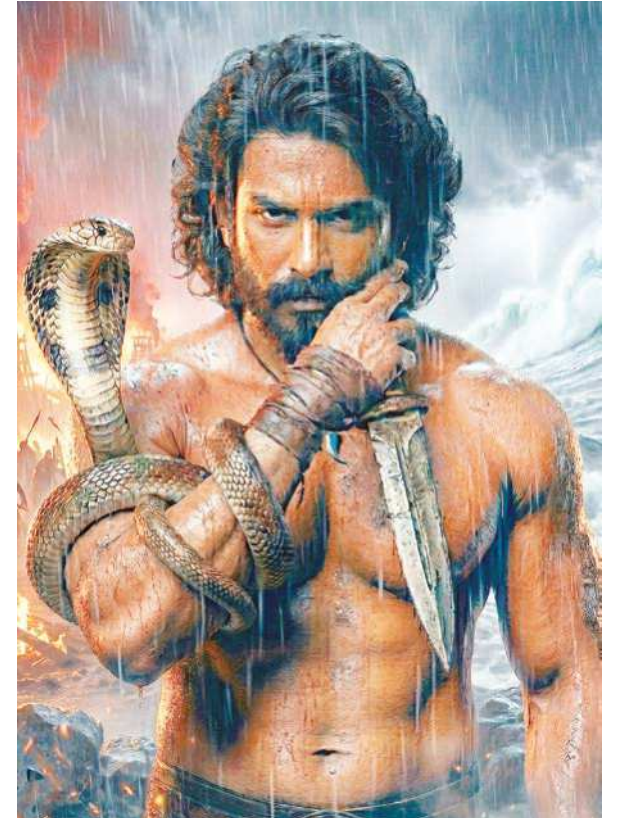
tive for frustrated audiences. This not only affects the streaming platforms but also impacts producers, distributors, and actors who depend heavily on overseas popularity and engagement. If Indian OTT services continue ignoring the overseas audience, they risk weakening one of the strongest global markets that has supported Telugu cinema for years. The demand clearly exists — what is missing is proper global streaming planning and equal access for audiences everywhere.
