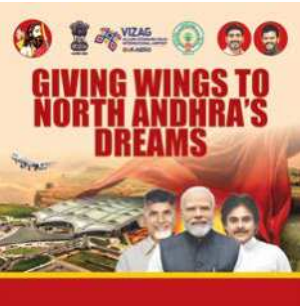
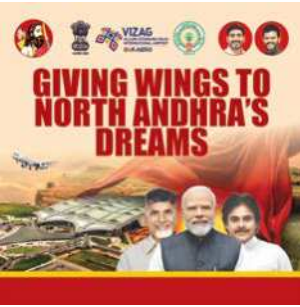

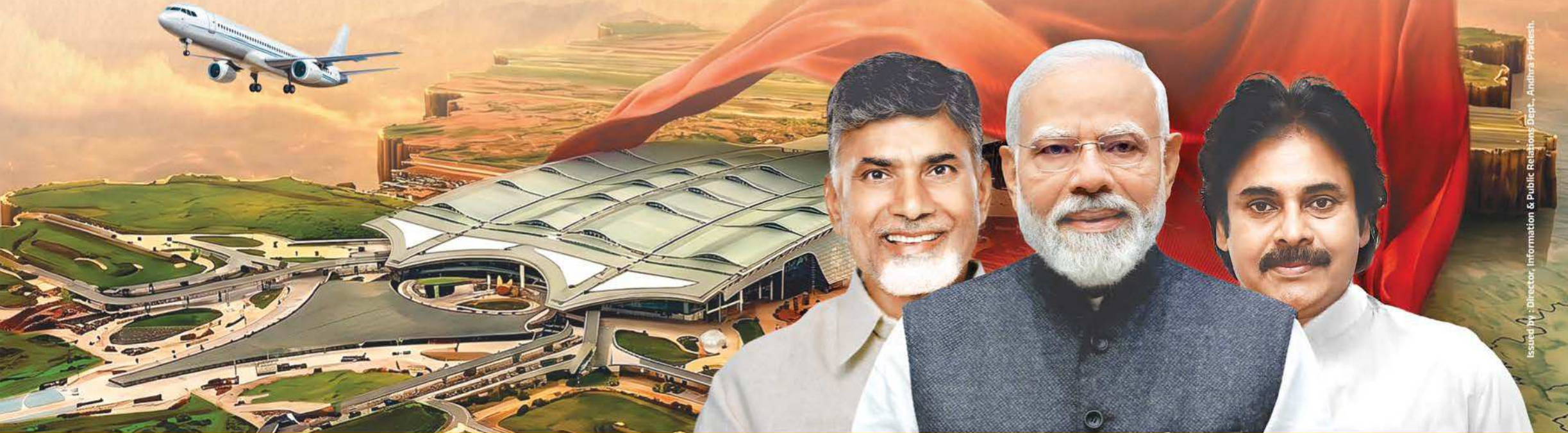

Peddi Sudarshan Reddy loses battle to illness

Senior BRS party leader and former Narsampet MLA Peddi Sudarshan Reddy passed away while undergoing treatment at Yashoda Hospital in Secunderabad in the early hours on Friday. He was 54 years old. On July 26, he fell critically ill at his residence in Hanumakonda and after receiving emergency treatment at Rohini Hospital, he was shifted to Hyderabad. He suffered cardiac arrest due to a pulmonary embolism (blood clot in the lungs). Although he recovered after nearly 45 minutes of CPR, his condition became critical due to a lack of neurological response. Despite the medical team's six-day effort to save him, they were unsuccessful.



Narsampet constituency plunges into deep grief

WHOLE WARANGAL CONVERGES TO BID FAREWELL TO THE LEADER

THE demise of Peddhi Sudarshan Reddy plunged the Narsampet constituency into deep grief. People from villages, tribal hamlets and towns turned up in large numbers to bid a final farewell to a leader who had stood by them in their times of need, walked alongside them during the Telangana movement and worked for the development of the constituency as an MLA. BRS leaders, party workers, former public representatives and Telangana activists, besides people from various sections cutting across political affiliations, participated in the final journey.

The main roads of Narsampet turned into a sea of humanity as people participated in the final procession. People lined the route and paid tearful tributes to their beloved leader. The massive

turnout disrupted vehicular movement in Narsampet for nearly six hours.

The mortal remains of Peddhi Sudarshan Reddy were taken from Hyderabad to Narsampet on Friday morning in a specially decorated vehicle. After reaching Hanumakonda, the mortal remains were brought to the Martyrs' Stupa at Adalat Junction around 8 am. Political leaders, Telangana activists, BRS leaders, party workers, journalists, followers and members of the public paid rich tributes to the former MLA, who had played a significant role in the Telangana statehood movement. The mortal remains were later taken towards Narsampet via Hunter Road. At around 9 am, when the mortal remains reached Girmibavi on the outskirts of Narsampet, a large number of people gathered to receive their beloved leader. Many broke down on see-



ing his mortal remains and paid their last respects amid slogans of "Peddhi Amar Rahe." The final procession then began through the main roads of Narsampet. Peddhi Sudarshan Reddy's wife, Sapna, broke down on seeing thousands of people arriving from across the constituency to pay their last respects to her husband. She became emotional at the

outpouring of affection and respect shown by the people. The affection displayed by the public and the emotional farewell along the route moved the family members as well. Several followers and party workers recalled their association with Peddhi Sudarshan Reddy and mourned his death.

After the final procession in Narsampet, the mortal re-

mains of Peddhi Sudarshan Reddy were taken to his native Nallabelli. Thousands of people from Nallabelli and neighbouring villages and tribal hamlets gathered to bid a final farewell to their native son. BRS working president KT Rama Rao, former minister T Harish Rao, former public representatives from the erstwhile Warangal district, party leaders, activists, Telangana movement colleagues and followers reached Nallabelli and paid their respects.

Later, the last rites were performed as per traditional customs in the presence of family members, relatives, close associates, Telangana movement colleagues, political leaders and followers. The cremation was completed around 6 pm.

Amid tearful farewell of thousands of mourners, the mortal remains of Peddhi Sudarshan Reddy were consigned to the flames.

A 10-year-old boy from Telangana has achieved an extraordinary feat by reading 101 books continuously in 10 hours, earning recognition from the America Book of Records and the Worldwide Book of Records.

Devansh, the son of Padmalatha Pasham and Srinivas Gupta Dubba, currently lives in the US state of Georgia with his family. Passionate about books from an early age, Devansh noticed that children in today's digital era are gradually moving away from reading. With a determination to promote the habit of reading, he completed a 'Reading Marathon' at the Forsyth County Library in Georgia, setting a remarkable record. His love for books has also inspired him to become an author. Devansh wrote a children's book titled "THE SEMPEROS: Will They Ever Win?" dedicated to his favourite football icon, Cristiano Ronaldo. Speaking about his achievement, Devansh said his real goal is not setting records but

encouraging children to develop a reading habit. He also dreams of building a 'Digital Superpower' that uses artificial intelligence and community resources to solve peoples' problems.

Devansh has actively participated in social services. When he was just eight years old, he volunteered for over 76 hours in food-packing drives for needy families. In recognition of his service, he received the prestigious President's Volunteer Service Award (Gold Honor) in the United States. Devansh chooses taekwondo to develop discipline, and after practicing for over 3 years, he also achieved a black belt.

His parents recalled organising a baby hygiene awareness campaign when he was just six months old by creating the world's largest diaper cake--a cake-shaped structure made using nearly 6,000 diapers--which were later donated to families in need. They said his achievements reflect not only talent but also compassion, discipline and a desire to make a meaningful difference in society.

Thalassemia, sickle cell patients to get pensions: CM

HYDERABAD: Chief Minister A Revanth Reddy has said social security pensions would be provided to all persons suffering from thalassemia and sickle cell anemia in the state.

He asked officials to initiate the process of identifying eligible beneficiaries and sanctioning the relief. Reddy, who held a meeting with officials of the Panchayat Raj department, directed them to begin the distribution of the pensions to the identified beneficiaries from August 15, an official release late on Thursday night.

Both thalassemia and sickle cell anemia are an inherited blood disorders. He told officials to ensure that all widows, single women, weavers, and toddy tappers across the state get the pensions as per the existing scheme. The CM also instructed that every single village in the state should have blacktop (tar) road and also Gram Panchayat office. He asked the officials to ensure that the 'Indiramma' free sarees distributed to 10 million women are of high quality and



feature attractive designs. He suggested taking inputs from National Institute of Fashion Technology (NIFT) students for the design of the sarees. The CM further instructed the officials to take appropriate precautions regarding drinking water supply in view of the possible deficit rainfall due to El Nino conditions. Under the 'Cheyutha' social security pension scheme, the government provides monthly pension of Rs 4,000 for eligible beneficiaries, including senior citizens, widows, single women, beedi workers and AIDS, filaria and dialysis patients. Persons with disabilities are entitled to Rs 6,000.

Sexual harassment case booked against ex-MLA Kantha Rao

A woman alleges that she was sexually exploited for over years on the false promise of marriage, cheated and blackmailed with private pictures

A sexual harassment case was registered against former MLA Rega Kantha Rao at Punjagutta Police Station. Following a complaint by a woman alleging that she was sexually exploited for over years on the false promise of marriage, cheated and blackmailed with private pictures.

According to the FIR a complaint was filed on July 26 by a 22-year old woman resident of Durga Nagar, Somajiguda and a native of Yellandu in Bhadradi Kothagudem and she works in the media sector.

In her Complaint, she alleged that she first met the former MLA in 2022 during an Interview when she was 18years old.



She alleged that he later called her to a private flat on the pretext of launching a New YouTube channel and entered into a physical relationship with her on the promise of marriage.

She claimed they lived together in a flat in Ameerpet owned by actor Sanjosh. She further alleged that he took her private photographs and blackmailed her when-

ever she refused to meet him. Their physical relationship allegedly continued until the first half of 2025.

The complainant further alleged that the former MLA took Rs 4 lakh from her in investing in real estate, promising to return double the amount, but later began avoiding her. She also alleged that in May 2024 he accessed her mobile and contacted her

friend Lakshmi Padaala.

While She was facing her health and financial difficulties in early 2026, her acquaintance Anjali introduced Rega Kantha Rao's social media handler, Guntaka Praveen. She further alleged that contractor Nookarapu Ramesh, transferred RS 5 lakh and Rs 3.5 lakh on March 16 and March 18.

The woman further alleged that she had earlier approached the SHE Teams through an online complaint. She claimed that bank transaction details were submitted before the authorities and that she was falsely portrayed as attempting to extort money.

Based on her complaint, Panjagutta Police registered a FIR under Sections 69 and 351(2) of the BNS and launched an investigation.

KTR appears before ACB court in Formula E case

BRS working president KT Rama Rao appeared before the Special ACB Court at Nampally on July 31 in connection with the ongoing probe into alleged irregularities in the Formula E race.

Before leaving to attend the funeral of senior BRS leader Peddi Sudarshan Reddy, KT Rama Rao attended the court hearing. Advocates representing the BRS working president re-

iterated that the Formula E case is politically motivated and completely bogus, emphasizing that funds were transferred strictly to promote Hyderabad's global image and urban development.

Defense counsel argued that no misappropriation of funds occurred as alleged by the government. The money was transferred from HMDA accounts directly to the company CEO, remaining intact in the account without recovery by the government.



Advocates stated that government claims regarding transfers made without cabinet approval, financial

irregularities, or misappropriation are entirely false and stem from political vendetta, noting no evidence

links KTR directly. Defense lawyers criticized the prosecution for failing to issue a charge sheet even after three years, alleging that the government prolongs the case and fabricates new charges whenever facing political opposition.

Alongside the BRS working president, senior officials including IAS officer Arvind Kumar and former chief engineer BLN Reddy appeared before the ACB court. ACB officials stated in their charge sheet that the car race

caused a financial loss of Rs 54.88 crore to HMDA.

Investigating authorities named KTR, Arvind Kumar, BLN Reddy, and the FEO Company as key accused in the case. The court formally took cognisance of the matter following the filing of the charge sheet, paving the way for trial proceedings to commence. The ACB court subsequently adjourned the hearing to August 25 while ordering KTR to furnish a personal bond of Rs 1 lakh along with two sureties.

'Jota' statue a landmark in Sircilla's handloom saga

Symbol of weavers' hard work, textile heritage takes shape at Collectorate junction

While the handloom sector has witnessed several changes over the years, the dedication, craftsmanship and skill of weavers have continued to define the town's legacy. Adding a new symbol to this heritage, a 'Jota' (traditional loom shuttle used by weavers) statue has taken shape at the Sircilla Collectorate junction.

Dy Mayor hits out at BRS leader over corruption charge

BJP State spokesperson and Karimnagar Deputy Mayor Yadagiri Sunil Rao on Friday hit out at BRS leader Ravinder Singh over his allegations of corruption in excess tenders under the Urban Development Fund (UDF), asking him to introspect over the previous BRS government's record.

Speaking at a press conference here on Friday, Sunil Rao said it was unfortunate for Ravinder Singh to target Union Minister Bandi Sanjay Kumar over the UDF scheme. He termed the allegations of Rs 30 crore to Rs 40 crore corruption baseless and demanded that Ravinder Singh substantiate his claims.

Sunil Rao said the UDF scheme for Karimnagar had received administrative sanction of Rs 180 crore, while the estimated contract value was around Rs 137 crore. Since the tendering and approval process was



handled by the State government, he questioned how the alleged corruption could have taken place.

He asked Ravinder Singh to explain the excess tenders issued during the BRS regime, particularly involving the company cited in his allegations. Sunil Rao claimed the same company had received works worth nearly Rs 6,000 crore during the previous government and referred to projects including Mid Manair, Gouravelli, Thotapalli and Mallanna Sagar.

Referring to the Rs 546-crore Maneru River

Front, he questioned the approval of its four per cent excess tender and demanded accountability for excess tenders issued during the previous regime.

Defending Bandi Sanjay Kumar, Sunil Rao said the Union Minister had no role in awarding tenders or contracts. He credited him with securing Rs 840 crore under the UDF scheme for Karimnagar's development.

He warned Ravinder Singh against making what he termed baseless allegations and demanded an apology.

BJP corporators and party leaders were present.

Sridhar Babu: Mahadevpur Hospital will be rebuilt

Inaugurates a free cancer and eye screening medical camp

IT and Industries Minister Duddilla Sridhar Babu said that the state government's aim is to provide quality medical services to people in remote areas.

He announced that the dilapidated Mahadevpur Community Hospital will be rebuilt with modern facilities, and that another free health camp will be held on August 4.

On Friday, the minister inaugurated a free cancer and eye screening medical camp conducted under the supervision of doctors from MNJ Hospital Hyderabad and Omega Hospital Karimnagar.

On the occasion, he said that a plan is being prepared to conduct special tests across the state to protect



women from cervical cancer. He said such camps are being organised with the intention of detecting the disease at an early stage and providing treatment without financial burden on the poor.

He said that through the Health ATM, it will be possible to carry out 64 types of medical tests quickly, and health cards will be

provided so that test details are securely stored for five years. He also revealed that modern equipment for ECG and eye tests has been made available.

The minister said the state government gives highest priority to health and education sectors and is continuing measures to provide better medical services even

in rural areas. He promised to modernize and rebuild Mahadevpur Government Hospital to deliver improved services to the public.

For public convenience, he said another free health camp will be held on August 4 under the aegis of MNJ Hospital. He urged everyone to make good use of this opportunity and get health checkups done, and asked officials to go door-to-door to raise awareness among people.

He revealed that under the Katam Division so far free eye operations have been performed for 680 people in Hyderabad restoring their sight, and that 45,000 people in Manthani constituency have received eye treatments.

He said such public welfare programs will be carried out on a larger scale in the future.

Japan firm explores partnership in TG for skilled driver training

JAPAN-based HanaVista Consulting Pvt Ltd is exploring a long-term partnership with the ITDR Driving Training Institute in Telangana to train skilled Indian professional drivers and create employment opportunities in Japan.

As part of the initiative, representatives of the company visited the ITDR Driving Training Institute at Bad-napally in Thangallapally mandal of Rajanna Sircilla district on Friday to assess the institute's facilities and training capabilities.

The team inspected the driving training methods, infrastructure, training equipment, operational standards and overall learning environment at the institute. Discussions were also held on developing a structured



collaboration to equip Indian drivers with skills matching international requirements.

The initiative aims to provide better overseas employment opportunities for trained drivers from Telangana, officials said. If the proposed partnership takes shape, it is expected to create new avenues for youth seeking jobs in Japan.

The visit was conducted following directions from Telangana IAS officer Hari Prasad, with HanaVista Consulting CEO Sayuri Matsuno leading the delegation.

District Transport Officer D Srinivas, Motor Vehicle Inspector Vamsidhar and ITDR Principal Dorai Murugan were among those present during the visit.

Pension for thalassemia, sickle cell patients hailed

He said the issues faced by thalassemia and sickle cell patients were brought to the attention of the State government with the support of Rajya Sabha member Vem Narendar Reddy and Warangal West MLA Naini Rajender Reddy.

Five more dialysis beds added to Govt Hospital

MLC Dande Vittal along with Sirpur MLA Palvai Harish Babu and health department officials, inaugurated five additional dialysis beds at the Government Hospital in Yellagoud Thota, Kagaznagar on Friday.

The expansion is aimed at enhancing dialysis services and ensuring better treatment for patients suffering from kidney ailments.

Speaking on the occasion, Dande Vittal said the government, under the leadership of Chief Minister A Revanth Reddy, is giving top priority to strengthening the public healthcare system. He said the objective is to provide advanced medical facilities at the local level so that people, particularly those from rural areas, need not travel to other districts for specialized treatment.

The MLC noted that dialysis is a life-saving treatment for patients with kidney diseases and that the limited number of dialysis beds had



previously resulted in long waiting periods. With the addition of five new beds, more patients will now be able to receive timely treatment, significantly improving access to essential healthcare services.

He reiterated that the government is continuously upgrading healthcare infrastructure and appealed to the public to take advantage of the improved medical facilities available at government hospitals.

CHOPPADANDI MLA and Karimnagar District Congress president Medipalli Satyam urged the district administration to take precautionary measures to prevent inconvenience to farmers and the public amid widespread rainfall across the district.

Satyam, along with Congress leaders, met District Collector Chitra Mishra at the Collectorate on Friday and sought measures to prevent seasonal diseases, ensure timely distribution of

THE Election Commission of India (ECI) extended the final deadline for the Special Intensive Revision (SIR) process on July 31, fixing August 10 as the new cut-off date for submitting enumeration forms. According to the revised schedule released by the ECI, this marks the second time the election body has pushed back the submission deadline. Initially set for July 24, the deadline was previously extended to August 3 before being further extended to August 10.

As per the revised SIR timeline, the rationalisation

and reorganising of polling stations will be completed by August 10, followed by the publication of draft electoral rolls on August 17.

The designated period for filing claims and objections will run from August 17 to September 16, while the official notice period for disposing of claims and objections spans from August 17 to October 15. The final publication of electoral rolls will take place on October 19.

The ECI was compelled to extend the schedule due to incomplete digitisation of enumeration forms across the state. Official records reveal that none of the 33 districts managed to achieve 100 per cent digitisation.



Progress in urban districts like Hyderabad, Rangareddy, and Medchal-Malkajgiri remained poor, barely crossing the 50 per cent mark. Digitisation stood at 56.31 per cent in Hyderabad, 63.43 per cent in Rangareddy, and 61.37 per cent in Medchal-Malkajgiri. Conversely, Yadadri Bhongir led the state with 94.25 per cent completion, followed closely by Janagao at 91.44 per cent.

Field officials distributed enumeration forms to all 3,38,26,448 voters across Telangana.

Out of these, digitisation has been successfully completed for 2,60,88,334 voters, representing an overall state progress rate of 77.12 per cent.

The extension provides election authorities additional time to bridge the gap and complete data entry ahead of the draft roll publication.

Rs 1L reward for PHC with highest deliveries

DISTRICT Collector Adarsh Surabhi announced that delivery records of PHCs would be reviewed monthly and Rs 1 lakh would be sanctioned to the centre conducting highest deliveries.

"Proposals for any equipment required at PHCs should be submitted," said the collector on Friday during a review meeting with Health officials and medical officers regarding seasonal diseases, TB eradication, and ANC registration. He ordered officials to ensure an increase in ANC registrations at PHCs and to see they are completed in a timely manner.

"The deliveries at PHCs needs to be increased and awareness created among poor pregnant women to opt for government hospitals, instead of private ones, for childbirth," he said.

Surabhi instructed officials to undertake proactive preventive action in areas where dengue, Malaria and Chikungunya were recorded last year; medicines be kept readily available to treat emergencies such as snake/dog-bites; to take measures to eradicate TB and to ensure that blood tests are conducted and treatment provided to anyone exhibiting symptoms of cough and fever.

Police bust ganja racket, arrest two

THE local police arrested two persons involved in ganja trafficking while another suspect remains on the run. Police seized 2 kg of ganja, a motorcycle, and a mobile phone from the accused, Kodad DSP Srinivas Reddy informed.

Addressing a media conference at the Kodad Town Police Station on Friday, the DSP stated that acting on credible intelligence, police teams conducted surveillance and inspections near Durgapuram Stage on the outskirts of the town. During the operation, two individuals were caught red-handed while allegedly selling ganja.

The DSP said that special police teams have been deployed to trace and arrest the

absconding accused. During the investigation, police found that the arrested individuals had been involved in several criminal cases in the past. Authorities are now conducting a detailed probe into their criminal history as well as the wider ganja supply network linked to the case.

Srinivas Reddy warned that the police would not

tolerate any illegal activities related to the sale, transportation, or storage of narcotic substances in the district. He said stringent action would be taken under the Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances (NDPS) Act and that the police department would continue conducting special drives to eliminate drug-related crimes.

BC student leaders attempt to lay siege to RDO Office

LEADERS of the BC Students' Association, led by Rakesh Datta, on Friday attempted to lay siege to the Revenue Divisional Officer (RDO) office in Khammam, demanding the immediate release of pending fee reimbursement funds for students across Telangana.

Dharma, BJYM District President Shasanala Sairam, Shyam, Sai Harshith, BC student leader Kaveri, and around 500 students. Police maintained security during the protest, and no untoward incidents were reported.

Slow land acquisition triggers delay in bullet trains from Hyd

Although the state administration has been directed to expedite land acquisition, officials concerned said that the government has been facing formidable challenges to complete the land acquisition due to local factors. Court directions and resistance by local people against the land acquisition could stall the process if the state government does not address the issue expeditiously.

Now, the major challenge is to realign the bullet train track and station locations

if the land acquisition is not completed in a time-bound manner. Farmers have already raised objections over land acquisition at Bahadurguda, where the government proposed to acquire 500 acres of land for a bullet train hub. State officials have been told: "The Union government will not give a clearance to the realignment of the bullet train routes unless the land acquisition is completed. The state government has to resolve the land issue to ensure the approval of the bullet train projects by the

Centre immediately".

It is learnt that environmental issues are also creating trouble for laying bullet train tracks alongside the Vikarabad forest area. The demand for realignment of the Hyderabad – Chennai bullet train has already been raised in the old Nalgonda district. Ministers and opposition leaders from BRS and BJP are demanding bullet train route in their Assembly segments. All these issues should be resolved before finalising the alignment of the bullet train between Hyderabad and Chennai.

Cabinet okays extension of PM-KISAN scheme

This will enhance farmers' capacity to invest in agriculture

NEW DELHI

THE government on Friday extended the PM-KISAN scheme for the next five years till 2030-31 with a total outlay of over Rs 3.15 lakh crore, a decision aimed at providing financial support to farmers. Under the Pradhan Mantri Kisan Samman Nidhi (PM-KISAN) scheme, launched in February 2019, eligible land-holding farmer families get financial assistance of Rs 6,000 per year. The amount is transferred directly into their bank accounts in three equal instalments. Nearly Rs 4.5 lakh crore have been disbursed so far under this scheme. The Union Cabinet, chaired by Prime Minister Narendra Modi, approved continuation of the PM-KISAN scheme from 2026-27 to 2030-31, I&B Minister Ashwini Vaishnaw told reporters here. A total financial outlay of Rs 3,15,614 crore has been approved for the Scheme during this period, he added. "The approval reiterates the government's commitment that the prosperity of farmers forms the foundation of the nation's prosperity," the government said in a statement.

The extension of the scheme will enhance farmers' capacity to invest in agriculture, improve productivity, help reduce agricultural risks and strengthen the rural economy, it added. Through this scheme, timely and transparent income support is being provided to eligible farmer families through the Direct Benefit Transfer (DBT) system. Talking about the successful implementation of this programme, the government said it has



so far disbursed more than Rs 4.47 lakh crore directly into farmers' bank accounts through 23 instalments under the scheme. Under the 23rd instalment, more than 9.49 crore farmers benefited, with over Rs 18,984 crore released. "Women farmers have received more than Rs 1.06 lakh crore under PM-KISAN, and nearly one out of every four beneficiaries is a woman farmer," the statement said. The government highlighted that the assistance provided under PM-KISAN has enabled farmers to make timely investments in seeds, fertilisers, irrigation, agricultural machinery and other agricultural requirements. "This has enhanced farmers' productive capacity, reduced their dependence on informal credit and strengthened the financial stability of rural households," it added. Further, the government said that the impact of the PM-KISAN Scheme has been assessed by various independent institutions. According to the evaluation conducted by the Development Monitoring and Evaluation Office (DMEO) of NITI Aayog, more than 92 per cent of beneficiaries reported that the amount was used for agricultural activities and agricultural investment. Around 85 per cent of beneficiaries confirmed an improvement in agricultural income and a reduction in dependence on informal credit.

2020 DELHI RIOTS Ex-AAP leader gets lifer for killing IB officer Ankit Sharma

NEW DELHI: A Delhi court on Friday sentenced former AAP councillor Tahir Hussain and four co-convicts to life imprisonment for the murder of Intelligence Bureau officer Ankit Sharma during the 2020 Delhi riots, saying the case did not fall within the "rarest of rare" category warranting the death penalty. The judgement was pronounced by Additional Sessions Judge Praveen Singh in the presence of Hussain and others amid tight security. The judge awarded the sentence after hearing arguments on the quantum of sentence and denied the state contention to award death penalty to the convicts, saying the prosecution was not able to prove that they were beyond reformation.

The courtroom was packed with lawyers and senior Delhi Police officials including Crime Branch's Joint Commissioner and DCP. The family of Hussain was so present in the court. In its order, the court said, "I find myself unable to agree based on the SPP that the convicts are beyond reformation or have such a fiendish character that their continued existence, even in prison, will be a menace to society. For the other offences the convicts have been found guilty of, they must face the full force of the law." It said that the state has not bought anything on record to establish that any of the convicts has any violent disposition or propensity to crime. "The final test that law requires me to undertake before I conclude that this case invites capital punishment is whether the convicts are beyond redemption and there being no chance of reformation, it is now firmly established in our criminal jurisprudence that death penalty is of the last absorption," the judge said. On being asked about his sentence, Hussain said the high court will serve him justice.

Average rainfall during 2nd half of monsoon to be below-normal: IMD

NEW DELHI: India as a whole is most likely to witness below-normal rainfall during the second half of the southwest monsoon from August to September, the India Meteorological Department (IMD) said in its monthly forecast issued on Friday.

The rainfall is expected to be less than 94 per cent of the Long Period Average (LPA). The LPA of rainfall over the country as a whole during the August to September period, based on historical data of 1971 to 2020, is 422.8 mm. LPA refers to the rainfall recorded over a particular region in a given period, such as a month or a season, averaged over a long period, typically 30 to 50 years.

ATCs, Skills University to offer EV, drone tech courses: CM

A portion of the Kohinoor Building in the Balaji Nagar area of the powerloom town, around 50km from Mumbai, came crashing down at 11.20 pm on Thursday. Rescue workers from the National Disaster Response Force (NDRF), Thane Disaster Response Force (TDRF), and the municipal fire brigade pulled out ten bodies as heavy machinery and sniffer dogs were deployed to look for survivors under the debris of the four-storey structure, said the officials of the district disaster management cell.

The structure comprised 48 rooms, 12 on each floor. Around 9 pm on Thursday, residents heard "loud cracking sounds" emanating from the building, an official said. Fearing the worst, locals immediately helped evacuate many families to other locations. However, while some occupants were still making their way out, the 'B' wing of the building caved in, he said. The officials said five of the deceased were identified as Shamim Shaikh (32), Ranjeet Singh (45), Miraj Rasul Shaikh (34), Santosh Kumar Pandey (42) and Shamim Ansari

(30). The Bhiwandi Nizampur City Municipal Corporation (BNCMC) said it had identified the building as "dangerous" in September 2020, and finally issued eviction notices on June 5 this year, subsequently disconnecting electricity and water supply.

But despite that, the property owners initiated structural repair works without obtaining any permission from the civic body. Hours before the crash, on July 30, 2026, a civic team led by an Assistant Municipal Commissioner visited the site and noticed structural instability.

The OPT program is one of the primary attractions for international students choosing to study in the US.

Without OPT, most international students would be forced to leave the US immediately after graduation, taking the skills they gained at American universities to foreign markets.

Govt, CJP must have meaningful engagement

The Bharatiya Janata Party-led Delhi state government's announcement against pursuing any further adverse legal action against the NEET (UG) examination irregularities' protestors is some progress, and it can possibly cool tempers on both sides. Still, it is not a very reasonable decision. It doesn't provide immunity to those with criminal antecedents. It may be recalled that the Delhi police filed cases against those who were allegedly involved in the violence that broke out during Cockroach Janta Party's (CJP's) July 20 'Chalo Sansad' march from Jantar Mantar to the Parliament. Police personnel also reportedly identified 2,873 people through CCTV footage who allegedly attacked them and van-

dalised vehicles during the march. Almost a 1000 among them are said to have criminal records. The reasonableness of this decision is questionable. Who decides whether the behaviour of a protestor is lawless? The police and other official agencies have proved to be partisan; they have done everything to kill or curtail the stir; they shut down 16 Metro stations in central Delhi and blocked the internet in the area. Worse, there are reports that the protestors, even minors, are being detained or arrested in different parts of the country.

The Supreme Court had to step in; on Tuesday, it ordered the release of all under-18 protestors, who were arrested during the agitation. Chief Justice of India Surya Kant, whose

cockroach remark led to the launch of CJP, directed the authorities to preserve the digital and personal data of the agitators. This is not to say that no agitator did anything wrong; a small section of them attacked cops, injuring many. The guilty should face the consequences, but the government's attitude has stiffened since the resignation of Dharmendra Pradhan as the union education minister. This reflects the repressive measures adopted by the Narendra Modi government in the aftermath of the end of the stir. In such a situation, it is difficult to determine the truth about the violence that was unleashed. What both sides, the government and the CJP, need to do is lower the temperature so that meaning-

ful dialogue can be furthered in the interests of students. Prolonged confrontation, mutual distrust, and increasingly hostile rhetoric are unlikely to produce durable solutions. Instead, they risk deepening political polarisation while diverting attention from the substantive issues that originally brought thousands of students onto the streets. A democratic society must be able to distinguish between legitimate dissent and criminal conduct.

Peaceful protest is an essential constitutional right, and its exercise should not automatically invite punitive action. At the same time, acts of violence, vandalism, or assault cannot be justified under the guise of public protest and should be addressed through fair, trans-

parent, and evidence-based legal processes. For the government, rebuilding public confidence requires more than announcing limited legal relief. It demands credible assurances that investigations into alleged offences will be impartial, that no innocent protester will be harassed, and that due process will be followed without political bias. Equally, organisations leading the agitation have a responsibility to ensure that demonstrations remain peaceful and disciplined, preventing fringe elements from hijacking a movement centred on students' concerns. Responsible leadership on both sides is essential to prevent further escalation. Only by replacing confrontation with communication can both sides contribute to an outcome that protects democratic values while addressing the genuine anxieties of the country's youth.

Want to feel depressed? Watch Parliament sessions



DO you want to slip into a state of depression? The easiest way is to switch on your television and watch how increasingly unaccountable and irresponsible many of our public representatives have become. Follow it up by watching prime-time television debates and the descent into despair will be even faster.

It is indeed a sad story. They do not allow Parliament to function, and the party spokespersons repeat the same, often illogical, arguments on television night after night. Ironically, leaders who constantly demand accountability from the government seem to forget that accountability is expected of everyone. No opposition or ruling party can dictate how Parliament should function or how television anchors should conduct debates. Politics cannot become a daily exercise in shifting the goalposts.

Barring the discussion on reforms to plug examination paper leaks, particularly NEET—which itself was hardly productive—and the bill on Vande Mataram, there has been virtually no meaningful legislative business during the monsoon session so far.

Having covered Parliament for long, I have never witnessed any Opposition behaving in this manner. There were always sharp confrontations, heated exchanges, protests and even walk-

outs. Proceedings were occasionally stalled for a day or two. But there was also a willingness on both sides to negotiate. After consultations with the Speaker, a workable understanding would emerge, and Parliament would get back to business.

Today, however, disruption has become the objective rather than the means.

The Opposition insists that the Prime Minister and the Home Minister must be physically present before any discussion can begin. That would have been understandable had they used this demand to compel the government to agree to discussion on law and order and the alleged police excesses during the student protests. Instead of cornering the government through a structured debate backed by facts, pointed questions and supplementary interventions, they prefer to stall proceedings altogether. Parliament cannot be treated this way.

Question Hour is among the most effective parliamentary instruments available to Members of Parliament. It enables them to raise issues about the state and their constituency, seek answers from ministers and hold the government accountable. This is followed by Special Mentions, through which MPs draw attention to pressing public concerns. Both have been sacrificed at the altar of political confrontation.

The decorum of Parliament is steadily eroding because of the "my way or the highway" approach. Whenever the Opposition is questioned about repeated disruptions, the standard response is that running



Parliament is the government's responsibility. Does that absolve the Opposition of all responsibility? Is it not equally their duty to question, challenge and expose the government through informed debate? Why prefer posting comments on X rather than confronting ministers inside Parliament?

Unfortunately, this has become a familiar pattern not just in Parliament but also in several State Assemblies. Between 2014 and 2019, Andhra Pradesh witnessed repeated disruptions by the YSRCP, accompanied by daily theatrics outside the Assembly. In Telangana, during the BRS regime, the Assembly adopted the practice of suspending members even for minor disruptions, and now they themselves protested on several occasions. Contrast that with what is happening in Parliament today, where disruptions continue for days with virtually no consequences. Perhaps Parliament should seriously consider a "no work, no pay" policy and recover the day's expenditure from all parties, including the ruling party, whenever applicable.

For the past two weeks, taxpayers' money has been wasted while Parliament has remained largely dysfunctional. Ironically, the biggest loser is the Opposition itself. Instead of cornering the government over its omissions and commissions, it is allowing the government to escape scrutiny because debates are simply not taking place.

Even when discussions are held, they rarely remain focused. The debate on NEET reforms was a classic example. Much of the Opposition's intervention revolved around rhetoric rather than presenting a credible roadmap for reforming the examination system. This only makes the government's job easier.

Priyanka Gandhi Vadra resorted to an unnecessary personal remark when she referred to IIT Madras Director Dr V Kamakoti as a "gaumutra expert." Rahul Gandhi, while strongly criticising the government, neither endorsed nor specifically challenged the provisions of the proposed reforms, nor did he place a concrete alternative before the House. Instead, the debate descended into

exchanges involving words such as "idiots." Such language may generate headlines, but it contributes little to parliamentary discourse.

It was equally unfortunate to hear the Leader of the Opposition in the Rajya Sabha, Mallikarjun Kharge, invoke Manusmriti in a debate where it had little relevance and remark that the Home Minister would be "dragged out" of his room. Although he later clarified that he was referring to public anger, such language was unbecoming of a leader of his stature. The Rajya Sabha is often described as the House of Elders. Its members should set standards of parliamentary conduct, not lower them. Equally disturbing were the comments made by Cockroach Janata Party (CJP) spokesperson Saurav Das, who argued that there was nothing wrong with the filthy remarks made against the Prime Minister by one of the protesting girls. According to him, anyone aggrieved could seek legal recourse by filing a defamation case. Such responses only encourage the normalisation of abusive political discourse. God save the country if such Gen Z comes to power in future.

What was even more disappointing was the complete absence of empathy for the policemen injured during the June 20 protests. Nearly 250 policemen were reportedly injured. When questioned by the media, Rahul Gandhi responded by asking whether the journalist was from the BJP while one of his party spokespersons remarked that policemen were merely doing the job they were paid for. Does it mean they don't deserve sym-

pathy? What kind of attitude is this?

The Opposition also appears obsessed with pellet guns while ignoring the larger challenge of maintaining law and order. Even the Supreme Court has observed that there cannot be a blanket ban on their use. Did Congress governments never authorise their use in Jammu and Kashmir? Were crowd-control measures not employed during protests at JNU and elsewhere?

Parliament cannot be reduced to a stage for political theatre. The Congress, in particular, appears to have drifted away from parliamentary traditions established by leaders such as Indira Gandhi and several other stalwarts who combined sharp criticism with substantive debate. They fought governments fiercely, but they also recognised the sanctity of Parliament.

The ordinary citizen is left wondering whether the nation's representatives are interested in solving problems or merely producing political spectacle. In the process, the genuine concerns of students are getting buried beneath a battle for political credit.

If the Opposition believes that disruption alone will propel it to power, it is making a serious miscalculation. Public confidence is earned not through slogans, social media posts or daily headlines, but through constructive engagement, informed debate, credible alternatives and a clear long-term vision for the country. Parliament was created to hold governments accountable, not to make accountability itself a casualty.

Fraud on court: Judges, advocates and the fiduciary crisis

INDIA'S courts are experiencing a crisis of institutional confidence — not from judicial malfeasance, but from structural vulnerabilities that permit conduct appearing to compromise impartiality. A lawyer defends one side, then appears against it. A judge's child receives hundreds of government cases through prosecutors appearing before the same judge. No rules forbid it. No mechanism stops it. This is not merely a governance failure but a betrayal of the foundational compact between courts and citizens — one playing out in quiet procedural rooms, far removed from grand courtroom drama.

The Kakinada Episode-Fraud named:

Advocate S Pranathi represents landowners from Kakinada in a property dispute. Months later, as the State's Special Government Pleader, she switches sides and opposes them. Her husband, Meka Rahul Chowdary, steps in to argue her abandoned brief. The Kakinada Municipal Corporation simultaneously reverses its own legal position without explanation. The Andhra Pradesh High Court on July 28 — in Review Petition No. 2 of 2026 in WP Nos. 11254 of 2013 and 13428 of 2015 — examined the docket orders, vakalatnamas, and the conduct of the counsels involved, and found evidence of collusion, professional misconduct, conflict of interest, and "a deliberate attempt to commit fraud on this court."

The court was unsparing: "The Counsel appearing for the State and its instrumentalities have failed in discharging their fiduciary duty." It ordered a criminal probe by the Anti-Corruption Bureau (ACB), calling for a report within twelve weeks. This case is a symptom — not an exception. It illuminates four interconnected failures: the collapse of professional ethics among advocates; unspoken nepotism in government counsel appointments; absence of meaningful recusal standards for judges, and inadequacy of the Bar Council disciplinary machinery.

The oath forgotten:

The Advocates Act, 1961, and Bar Council of India Rules prescribe unambiguous standards.

They demand respect for courts, impose fiduciary duty — loyalty, confidentiality, undivided allegiance. An advocate who switches sides, or whose spouse argues the opposite brief, violates this core compact. Under Section 35, State Bar Councils can punish misconduct with reprimand, suspension, or permanent removal from the roll.

Yet disciplinary action remains slow and inconsistent. In March last year, the Bar Council of India issued a directive against advocates advertising through social media influencers — a development that would have been inconceivable a generation ago, and one that speaks to how far institutional drift has gone. When the Bar Council is issuing social media advisories instead of conducting disciplinary proceedings against ethical violations, the profession's moral compass has drifted dangerously off course.

When family becomes the conflict:

Beyond individual misconduct lies a systemic question: whether children of sitting judges receiving government counsel appointments creates an appearance of institutional conflict that a democracy cannot afford to ignore. Last December, the Delhi High Court heard public interest litigations by the First Generation Lawyers' Association, challenging preferential allotment of lawyers' chambers to relatives of retiring advocates — a practice the court found prima facie violative of Article 14. In the same month, the government was asked to explain its empanelment of over 650 advocates as Central Government counsel in the Supreme Court, several reportedly enrolled only in 2024–2025, many yet to clear the All India Bar Examination.

In August 2025, the Allahabad High Court in Jubeda Begum v. UPSRTC decried an "entitlement culture" in state counsel appointments, recalling the Supreme Court's 1991 ruling in Kumari Shreilekha Vidyarthi v. State of U P that mandated transparent, merit-based procedures. Justice Ajay Bhanot observed that "modes of appointment which accord weight to accidents of inheritance and neglect achievements of merit cannot be countenanced." the doors of patronage remain closed while they swing open for the well-connected.

The recusal question-Justice must be seen:

No episode illustrates the tension between judicial privilege and public confidence more sharply than the Delhi High Court recusal controversy of 2026. Former Delhi Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal, appearing in person in the CBI's revision petition against his discharge in the excuse policy case, sought recusal of Justice Swarana Kanta Sharma on the ground that both her children were empanelled as Central Government counsel — work allocated through the same senior law officers appearing against him in her court.

In April, Justice Sharma dismissed the recusal applications, holding that her children's professional engagements created no financial or personal stake in the outcome, and that accepting such grounds would require "a large part of the judiciary" to recuse in similar cases.

The observation, while judicially defensible, sits uneasily alongside principle. The Restatement of Values of Judicial Life, adopted by all Supreme Court judges in 1997 under Chief Justice J S Verma, urges that where close relatives of a judge may gain undue advantage, the judge should — in the interests of the appearance of justice — opt for transfer. This is a voluntary ethical code with no

enforcement mechanism. The asymmetry is stark: Rule 6 of the Bar Council Rules prohibits advocates from practising before courts where a close relative serves as a judge — but that obligation binds the advocate, not the judge.

In Rajasthan, the government amended its eligibility criteria to accommodate the son of a senior official as Additional Advocate General, notwithstanding the mandatory ten-year practice requirement. When the nepotism allegation surfaced publicly — ahead of Prime Minister Narendra Modi's visit to Jodhpur in August 2024 — the appointee resigned. The system responded not to principle, but to political pressure.

Contrast this with Justice Sujoy Paul, who in early 2024 voluntarily sought transfer from the Madhya Pradesh High Court to the Telangana High Court because his son practised in the same court. That act of quiet integrity, barely reported, is precisely the standard the system needs — and rarely demands.

The way forward:

None of these amount to an indictment of the judiciary or the Bar. The overwhelming majority of advocates serve with dedication, and most judges discharge their duties with independence. The system is not broken — but its foundations are being tested in ways that demand structural response, not merely individual virtue.

India needs a binding, transparent, and institutionally reviewable judicial recusal framework. It needs merit-based, publicly disclosed criteria for government counsel empanelment. It needs the Bar Council's disciplinary machinery to function with the urgency this moment demands. And it needs ordinary litigants — carrying nothing but faith in the court's impartiality — to have that faith restored. The Andhra Pradesh High Court's order is, in one sense, proof that the system can work: a judge saw fraud, named it, and acted. That is reason enough for measured hope. The question now is whether the institutions around that judge will do the same.

UoH fills 92% of Ph.D. seats through entrance-based admissions

The University of Hyderabad (UoH) has completed admissions to its Ph.D. programmes through the university entrance examination and interview process for the 2026-27 academic year, filling nearly 92 per cent of the available seats. According to the university, 170 of the 185 Ph.D. seats offered across 27 subjects were filled, resulting in an admission rate of 91.89 per cent. The admission process concluded on July 30 following a multi-stage selection procedure comprising a written entrance examination and interviews. The university conducted the Ph.D. entrance examination on June 6 and 7 at seven centres across the country. Candidates shortlisted on the basis of their written examina-



tion were interviewed between July 9 and 11. Admissions were finalised by inviting candidates in a 1:3 ratio, based on their combined performance in the written test and interview. The university said admissions for Ph.D. programmes in another 17 subjects will be conducted separately through UGC-NET and CSIR-UGC-NET scores after the National Testing Agency (NTA) an-

nounces the results. Earlier this month, the University of Hyderabad also completed admissions to its postgraduate programmes across 42 disciplines. Between July 13 and 17, a total of 1,201 students were admitted against 1,463 available seats, recording an admission rate of 82.09 per cent. Admissions to the postgraduate courses were based on candidates' performance in the CUET-PG 2026 examina-

tion. Eligible candidates were invited for counselling in a 1:10 ratio, with wait-listed candidates being considered subsequently to fill category-wise vacancies in various departments. The university is now preparing for admissions to its undergraduate and integrated master's programmes. Counselling for 17 programmes is scheduled to be held on August 13 and 14, 2026. Candidates shortlisted on the basis of their performance in the CUET-UG 2026 examination will be notified through the university website on August 3. The admissions process forms part of the university's annual intake across undergraduate, postgraduate and doctoral programmes for the 2026-27 academic session.

100 smart vision glasses distributed by UoH for visually impaired

The University of Hyderabad (UoH) distributed 100 Smart Vision Glasses (Ultra Version) to visually impaired beneficiaries as part of a Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) initiative aimed at improving accessibility and independent living through assistive technology. Organised by the University's Empowered Committee for Differently Abled Persons (ECDAP), the programme brought together beneficiaries from diverse socio-economic backgrounds. In addition to participants from across Telangana, the recipients included students studying at higher education institutions in Hyderabad who had travelled from states such as Haryana, Odisha and West



Bengal. Each Smart Vision Glasses device, valued at approximately Rs 48,000, is equipped with features that enable users to read printed text in major Indian languages and English, identify people and objects, recognise currency notes, and detect obstacles while walking, supporting greater independence in everyday activities.

The initiative was supported by the National Payments Corporation of India (NPCI) under its CSR programme and implemented by the Blind Vision Foundation, Bengaluru. The devices were developed by SHG Technology Private Limited. Speaking at the event, Prof. Pammi Pavan Kumar, Coordinator of ECDAP,

highlighted the university's continued efforts to promote accessibility and inclusion for persons with disabilities, particularly students pursuing higher education and career opportunities. Prof. Sai Prasad, Co-coordinator of ECDAP, said advances in assistive technologies are creating new opportunities for inclusive education and independent living. ECDAP member Sri N. Annavaram noted that innovations such as smart vision devices are transforming mobility and day-to-day navigation for visually impaired individuals. demonstrated the capabilities of the Smart Vision Glasses, while Project Manager Navneet Kumar explained how user feedback continues to shape improvements in the technology. A swim on the weekend. What you choose matters less than whether you return to it. So pick the thing you will actually keep doing, and let it be enough.

3. Keep your close relationships warm. Loneliness arrives

quietly. A new city at 25. A house full of small children with no time to think. A quiet home at 60 after they have gone. One honest conversation with someone who truly knows you can do more than a week of holding it together alone. Send the message first. Make the call you keep putting off.

4. Learn to say no. So much of a woman's stress comes from carrying more than she ever agreed to. Saying no is not selfish. It is how you



stay steady enough for the things that actually matter to you. Turn down one extra obligation and you protect your time, your energy, and your peace. It feels hard at first. It gets easier every time you do it.

5. Notice when you are not okay, and reach out early. Pretending you are fine is not strength. The braver thing is to catch the low sooner and do something while it is still small. Name what you are feeling. Write it down. Talk to a friend, or someone trained to help, before it grows heavier. The goal was

never to carry it forever. It is to work through it and come out the other side.

None of this asks you to change your whole life. It asks for a few small returns to yourself on an ordinary day. Do that often enough, at any age, and you build a steadiness that no single fix can give you.

Manushi Chhillar recalls emotional toll of retaking medical entrance exam after 2015 paper leak

Actress and former doctor Manushi Chhillar opened up about the emotional and mental challenges of retaking the medical entrance examination after the 2015 paper leak.

The actress in a heartfelt conversation with Soha Ali Khan during the latest episode of the latter's YouTube talk show, All About Her, opened up about the emotional turmoil she had to go through and also explained how tough the entrance exam is.

The episode, featuring Manushi alongside renowned psychiatrist Dr. Anjali Chhabria, explored the immense pressure surrounding India's competitive entrance examinations, academic burnout, anxiety, and emotional resilience.

During the conversation, Soha asked Manushi, "I want to take you back to 2015, if I may. You had prepared for months, secured a good rank, and done well in the exam. What was it like to be told that the exam had been cancelled and that you had to prepare all over again?"

Reflecting on the experience, Manushi said, "There are two aspects to this, one is my personal experience, and the other is understanding the reality that most students in the country face. I had parents who had gone through the same journey years



ago, so I was mentally prepared for the process. But it was still incredibly difficult because I had to sacrifice everything that brought me joy. I was a Kuchipudi dancer, I loved painting, and I had to put all of that aside for a year to focus entirely on my entrance exam." She added, "While it was one of the toughest phases of my life, I realised it wasn't the hardest compared to what many other students were going through. I met students whose parents had borrowed beyond their means to send them to coaching centres. Many had moved cities, lived in cramped PG accommodations, and spent every single day preparing for one exam."

Speaking about the aftermath of the paper leak, the actress shared,

"When you're told that after months of preparation you have to continue for another 45 days, you wonder how much more you have left to give. But I also recognise that I had immense privilege and support."

Manushi credited her parents for helping her maintain balance during the preparation period.

"One thing my parents insisted on was an hour of exercise every day, no matter what. Whether it was basketball or going to the gym, it gave me an outlet, helped me stay connected to people outside the exam bubble, and protected my mental health. Many of my peers didn't have that luxury. Some had already returned to their hometowns after their accommodation leases ended, losing the

environment they needed to continue preparing," she said.

Later in the conversation, Soha asked Manushi whether there came a point when she realised medicine was no longer the path she wanted to pursue. Responding to the question, Manushi said, "It was gradual. It wasn't as though I woke up one day and decided I didn't want to do it anymore. I genuinely loved studying medicine. But by the time we entered college, most of us were completely exhausted."

She further reflected, "Our seniors used to joke that you would only be happy during the first two days and the last two days of medical college. Looking back, I think it was burnout. We believed clearing the entrance exam was the finish line, only to realise there was an even bigger mountain waiting for us."

For the uninitiated, Manushi Chhillar, who was crowned Miss World 2017, holds a medical MBBS degree. Though she pursued medicine after clearing the medical entrance examination, Manushi later ventured into films and made her Bollywood debut opposite Akshay Kumar in Samrat Prithviraj in 2022. She has been a part of movies like The Great Indian Family, Bade Miyan Chote Miyan, and Operation Valentine.

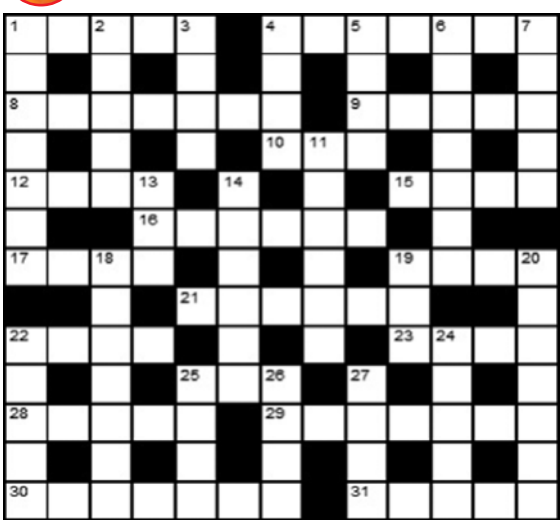

GCCs, tech power office leasing to record high in H1

Six major cities clock 41.6 mn sft absorption, up 7% year-on-year

NEW DELHI

OFFICE space absorption across India's six major cities reached a record 41.6 million sq. ft in H1 2026, up 7 per cent YoY, a report said.

The report from international real estate advisory firm Savills India said that new supply remained stable at 23.7 million sq. ft. in the first half, easing 5 per cent YoY.

Consequently, India's total Grade A office stock now stands at 872.7 million sq. ft as of Q2 2026. However, the



overall vacancy rate at June-end declined to 13.2 per cent from 14.7 per cent the corresponding period last year.

"India's office absorption is projected to remain close to last year's record levels, supported by steady occupier activity," the report noted.

"The office market experienced a period of moderation in H1 2026 as occupiers adopted a more measured approach amid geopolitical uncertainties and evolving global economic conditions," said Naveen Nandwani, MD, Commercial Advisory and Transactions, Savills India.

"While this slowdown is real and reflects cautious decision-making, it should be viewed as a strategic pause rather than a structural shift. India's office market continues to be underpinned by strong GCC expansion, a deep talent pool and sustained corporate confidence," Nandwani said.

As businesses rethink their real estate strategies, the firm expects demand to become

more selective and quality-driven, paving the way for the next phase of growth, he added.

Bengaluru reinforced its position as India's leading office market, capturing 32 per cent of the total office space absorption in the first half of 2026. Pune followed with a 15.4 per cent share, while Delhi-NCR contributed 15 per cent to the total leasing.

Technology continued to dominate office leasing activity, accounting for 35 per cent of total absorption, while flexible workspaces and BFSI followed with 18 per cent and 15 per cent share, respectively. Large-sized office transactions accounted for 53 per cent of the total leasing volume. GCCs leased 20 million sq. ft., accounting for 48 per cent of India's total office absorption.

While Hyderabad city recorded the highest GCC share, accounting for 73 per cent of total leasing by GCC firms, Bengaluru stood at the second position with 65 per cent share.

Institutional bets on warehousing rise 53%

Investments touch \$49 mn as leasing activity remains resilient

NEW DELHI: INSTITUTIONAL Investments in warehousing and industrial segment of Indian real estate rose 53 per cent in January-June to \$49 million, according to Vestian.



US-based real estate consultant Vestian on Tuesday said in a statement that the leasing of warehousing and industrial space rose 16 per cent annually to 22 million sq ft in the first half of 2026 across seven major cities -- Mumbai, Delhi-NCR, Chennai, Kolkata, Pune, Hyderabad and Bengaluru. The consultant stated that the leasing activity remained resilient during the first half of 2026, indicating healthy occupier demand.

Manufacturing expansion, robust domestic consumption and ongoing infrastructure upgrades.

Institutional investments in warehousing reached \$49 million during the first half of this year, up from \$32 million in the year-ago period. Despite the increase, Vestian pointed out that the sector continued to account for just 1 per cent of the total institutional investments during H1 2026. This reflects a cautious investment environment. Shrinivas Rao, CEO of Vestian, said, "India's warehousing sector is undergoing a structural transformation, evolving beyond

traditional priorities such as supply chain optimisation, operational efficiency, and proximity to demand centres." He noted that sustainability has emerged as a key differentiator, with occupiers increasingly seeking Grade-A green warehouses that align with their ESG commitments and long-term business objectives. "Backed by supportive government policies and sustained infrastructure development, this transition is expected to accelerate further, reinforcing the sector's appeal to both global occupiers and long-term institutional investors," Rao said.

Hyderabad's housing supply rises 2.9% in Q1

HYDERABAD'S residential market recorded a mixed performance in the April-June 2026 quarter, with buyer demand declining 6 per cent quarter-on-quarter (QoQ) even as new housing supply expanded by 2.9 per cent and the rate index rose a further 2.4 per cent, among the strongest price

gains recorded across major Indian cities this quarter, according to the Magicbricks PropIndex AMJ 2026 report. Buyers remained strongly oriented toward larger housing configurations. 3 BHK homes accounted for 53 per cent of total buyer demand during the quarter, the highest share recorded among major cities in the report, and 57 per cent of available inventory, well above the national average,

where 3 BHK homes make up 46 per cent of active supply. Prasun Kumar, CMO, Magicbricks, said, "Hyderabad continues to distinguish itself as one of India's most mature and future-ready residential markets. While demand saw a temporary moderation this quarter, buyer preferences clearly point to a structural shift toward larger homes and premium living."

Mall space shortage deepens as fresh supply falls 57%

NEW DELHI

FRESH supply of retail spaces in shopping malls declined 57 per cent to 0.9 million sq ft during January-March across seven major cities due to delays in construction activities, according to Anarock. Real estate

consultant Anarock reported that gross leasing of retail spaces in malls stood at about 4.1 million sq ft in the first half of the year as against just 0.9 million sq ft of new completions of retail spaces. The seven major cities are -- Mumbai, Delhi-NCR, Bengaluru, Pune, Hyderabad,

Chennai and Kolkata. Anuj Kejriwal, CEO - Retail & CEO - Europe, Middle East & Africa at Anarock Group, said, "The supply problem is cumulative and escalating - data of India's top seven cities over the past 16 years shows a persistent mismatch between Grade A retail supply and leasing demand."

While new mall completions fluctuated sharply on a year-on-year basis, he noted that the leasing demand has steadily absorbed available Grade A space, pushing vacancy rates lower.

"We now have a chronically supply-constrained

market where retailers' biggest challenge is not drawing shoppers but finding the right spaces to serve them in," Kejriwal said. In 2023, the top seven cities added 5.3 million sq ft of new Grade A retail supply against gross leasing of 6.5 million sq ft.

PRIME Minister Narendra Modi and his British counterpart Andy Burnham on Friday vowed to take the India-UK comprehensive strategic partnership to "new heights" and fully harness the trade and investment opportunities presented by the recently-operationalised bilateral trade deal. Modi and Burnham discussed key aspects of the two-way ties during a phone conversation. In a social media post, Modi said he congratulated Burnham on assuming the charge of the top office and conveyed his best wishes for a successful tenure. "We



agreed to work together across sectors such as technology, innovation, defence, security, clean energy, education and people-to-people ties and take the India-UK Comprehensive Strategic Partnership to new heights," he said. "We will also collaborate closely to fully harness

the trade and investment opportunities presented by the recently operationalized India-UK Comprehensive Economic and Trade Agreement, for the shared prosperity and well-being of both our people," Modi said. A British readout said Burnham began the conversation by reflecting on the strength of the UK-India partnership and the significant impact it has had on local communities across the UK. "The prime minister set out his ambitions to further enhance the UK-India relationship, including through the UK-India Vision 2035 framework and strong people-to-people links," it said.

Burnham praised the contribution Indian communities in the UK make to the fabric of UK society, with Modi noting the links between the two leaders' own home cities of Manchester and Ahmedabad, in Gujarat, which he called the "Manchester of India", it said.

RBI data shows bank credit to industry surged 19.2% in June

MUMBAI

BANK credit to industry recorded a robust growth of 19.2 per cent in June compared to 6.3 per cent in the year-ago period as large companies as well as MSMEs displayed broad-based expansion, according to RBI data released on Friday.



On a year-on-year basis, non-food bank credit grew by 18.3 per cent as on the fortnight ended June 30, 2026, compared to 9.3 per cent during the corresponding fortnight of the previous year (June 27, 2025), the central bank said.

It has released data on sectoral deployment of bank credit for June 2026, collected from 41 select scheduled commercial banks which together account for about 95 per cent of the total non-food credit. Advances to agriculture and allied activities registered a year-on-year growth of 16.8 per cent compared to 6.8 per cent in the corresponding fortnight of the previous year. "Credit to industry recorded a robust y-o-y growth of 19.2 per cent (6.3 per cent in the corresponding fortnight of last year)," RBI said. All sub-sectors -- 'Micro and Small', 'Medium' and 'Large industries' displayed a broad-based expansion.

Among major industries, credit to infrastructure, all engineering, food processing, textiles, construction, basic metal and metal products, petroleum, 'coal products and nuclear fuels' and 'chemical and chemical

products' marked buoyant year-on-year (y-o-y) growth. However, 'rubber, plastic and their products' and 'wood and wood products' segments witnessed marginally subdued growth. According to the data, loans to the services sector registered a growth rate of 21.4 per cent y-o-y (8.8 per cent in the corresponding fortnight of the previous year), supported by accelerated growth in segments such as non-banking financial companies (NBFCs), commercial real estate, and trade.

Also, credit to the personal loans segment recorded a growth of 15.8 per cent, as compared with 11.7 per cent a year ago. While segments such as vehicle loans and housing grew steadily in double digits, credit card outstanding registered a decelerated growth, the RBI said.

Cost of materials consumed in the first quarter shot up to Rs 32,013.2 crore from Rs 21,936.8 crore in the corresponding period last fiscal, it added.

"Material costs had started to increase in the quarter and were seriously aggravated during the war..." the company said, adding that it had an impact on its bottomline.

THE country's largest carmaker Maruti Suzuki India (MSI) on Friday reported a 9.11 per cent decline in its consolidated net profit at Rs 3,446.9 crore in the first quarter ended June 2026, hit by high material costs, despite posting record quarterly vehicle sales.

The auto major, which had posted a net profit of Rs 3,792.4 crore in the same quarter of the previous fiscal, said its board also approved four CBG (compressed biogas) projects in the first phase with a budget of Rs 561 crore.

Total revenue from operations was up 35.9 per cent at Rs 52,469.8 crore in the first quarter as against Rs 38,605.2 crore in the same period of 2025-26 fiscal, Maruti Suzuki

Govt to question Meta's global team over algorithmic bias

NEW DELHI: The government will question Meta's global team - summoned after the social media company briefly restricted Prime Minister Narendra Modi's Facebook post - on issues relating to algorithmic bias, the platform's algorithmic processes and their role in public order, sources said on Friday.



The questioning next week comes against the backdrop of the government's summons to Meta's top executives after Prime Minister Modi's recent Facebook post addressing India's youth and promising stringent action against paper leaks was briefly restricted on the platform. While the US-headquartered social media giant had attributed the incident to a technical glitch and apologised, the Ministry of

Electronics and Information Technology (MeitY) had found the explanation "inadequate". The company had said that the content was removed "in error" and was restored on the platform. Government sources on Friday pointed out that the matter is not just about technical aspects, but about "national security and public order".

Sources said that Meta's global team - expected in Delhi sometime in the middle of next week - will be "categorically" asked to clarify on issues around algorithmic bias, how their algorithm operates, and the company's role in public order.

Seema bags discus bronze; Neeraj, Rohit, Yashvir in javelin final

GLASGOW

WEIGHTLIFTER Lovepreet Singh's Commonwealth Games record-breaking silver medal headlined an eventful day for India, while discus thrower Seema Kaliramna bagged a bronze medal and Olympic champion Neeraj Chopra, along with two compatriots, advanced to the men's javelin throw final. Lovepreet produced the performance of his career, setting a Games record of 176kg in snatch before finishing with a total of 388kg (176kg+212kg), just one kilogram behind New Zealand's David Andrew Liti (389kg).

The Punjab lifter carried a commanding 10kg lead into the clean and jerk but Liti overturned the deficit with a Games record lift of 223kg in his final attempt after Lovepreet failed to complete a courageous 217kg lift that

would have secured gold.

"I thought I would win gold after snatch but it was up to God. A little disappointed that I couldn't lift in my final attempt in clean and jerk. I have lifted more in training," said Lovepreet.

The silver improved Lovepreet's bronze winning effort from the previous Games in Birmingham and completed India's weightlifting campaign with eight medals -- one gold, six silver and one bronze.

India added another athletics medal through Seema Kaliramna, who committed three successive fouls but clinched bronze in the women's discus throw with a

best effort of 58.65m.

The 27-year-old, who made a successful return to competition after motherhood last year and is also pursuing a PhD, produced her medal-winning throw in the third round before fouling her final three attempts.

Fellow Indian Nidhi Rani finished fourth with a best effort of 55.67m. Jamaica's Samantha Hall won gold with a Games-leading throw of 61.66m, while Canada's Julia Tunks claimed silver with 60.67m.

Neeraj Chopra, Rohit Yadav and Yashvir Singh all progressed to men's javelin throw final despite difficult, gusty conditions that prevented any athlete from breaching the automatic qualifying mark of 84m. Chopra finished fifth with 79.61m, while Rohit (78.37m) and Yashvir (78.36m) placed ninth and 10th respectively as all three Indians advanced. "The conditions were not the best for javelin throwers. It was not only cold but also windy... nobody was able to decode the wind," Chopra said after qualification.

Arundhati beat her Wales opponent 4-0 in a messy and ill-tempered women's 70kg category semifinal as the Indian held on to her good show in the first two rounds, forcing Rosie to receive a standing count during that time.

Jaismine was so dominant in her 57kg semifinal bout that she won in a Referee

Stops Contest (RSC) decision after the Lesotho boxer received her third standing count in the closing seconds of the second round.

Jadumani Singh also entered the men's 55kg final after beating P P M Haoseb of Namibia in a unanimous 5-0 decision in the semifinals. Meanwhile, Preeti out-punched Zambia's Catherine Mwape 5-0 while Ankush Brushed aside Joshua Ofori

by a similar margin.

The 22-year-old from Bhiwani, Preeti, who is an Asian Games bronze medalist, powered to a 5-0 win to set up a clash with Canada's Scarlett Delgado.

Ankush was equally dominant against Ofori, who resorted to repeated clinching after being comprehensively outboxed in the opening two rounds sealed a one-sided 5-0 verdict.

Triple jump: Chithravel, Prabhu pounce into final

GLASGOW

THERE was better news in the men's triple jump as national record holders Chithravel (16.41m) and Prabhu (16.26m) advanced to Saturday's final after finishing second and third in qualification. Tejaswin Shankar also remained in medal contention in the men's decathlon, ending the opening day in second place with 4,339 points after five events, just 14 points behind Canada's Damian Warner (4,353).

The Indian's standout per-



formance came in his pet high jump event, where he cleared 2.15m for 944 points, while his 7.82m effort in long jump earned him 1,015 points.

However, Animesh Kujur missed the men's 200m final after clocking 20.65 seconds to finish sixth in his semifinal, while Vishal TK also bowed out after placing sixth in his 400m semifinal with a time of 46.33 seconds.

Indian pair stays unbeaten in lawn bowls

The Indian men's pair of Navneet Singh and Dinesh Kumar registered their third successive win, edging Botswana in a tie-break after the teams split the opening two sets.

The Indians dominated the first set 9-2 before Botswana levelled the contest by winning the second set 4-3.

Navneet and Dinesh, however, held their nerve in the tie-break to preserve their unbeaten record and strengthen their hopes of reaching the knockout stage.

Unnati, Tanvi enter semis of Taipei Open

TAIPEI: India's Unnati Hooda and Tanvi Sharma won their respective women's singles matches to enter the semifinals of the Taipei Open badminton tournament here on Friday.

Kiran George, however, lost his men's singles quarterfinal match against Japan's fourth seeded Yudai Okimoto 21-12 21-10 in 33 minutes. Hooda clinched a straight-game 23-21 21-16 victory over compatriot Devika Sihag to reach the last four stage, while Tanvi got the better of Thailand's Supanida Katethong 21-15 18-21 21-14 in a gruelling 54-minute quarterfinal clash.

Earlier in

the day, the all-Indian quarterfinal contest between Hooda and Sihag started with a fiercely contested first game, where the former held her nerve to win it 23-21. Hooda was off to a great start, racing to an 11-3 lead before Sihag staged a spirited comeback to level the scores at 21-21. However, Hooda held her composure in the closing stages, winning the next two points to clinch the opening game. In the second game, the third seeded Hooda maintained her momentum and capitalised on her leads to wrap up the match 21-16 against eighth seed Sihag in 42 minutes.

The 18-year-old Hooda will next face the winner of the quarterfinal between Chinese Taipei's Chiu Pin-chian and Vietnam's Nguyen Thuy Linh.

Bumrah to play in Lanka Test series

NEW DELHI: India pace spearhead Jasprit Bumrah has been cleared to play next month's two-Test series against Sri Lanka by the BCCI's Centre of Excellence in Bengaluru.

Bumrah was picked subject to fitness as he had suffered an impact injury during the recent ODI series against England. He had to sit out of the third ODI at Lord's due to the injury.

"Jasprit Bumrah has recovered from his impact injury. He has cleared the fitness Tests mandated by the COE. Hopefully he will be available for both games as he is integral to the team's plans," a senior BCCI official told PTI on con-



ditions of anonymity.

The two-Test series against the islanders will get underway on August 15 in Galle, and the second match will be played in Colombo from August 23.

India need to win seven of their remaining nine Tests of this World Test Championship cycle in order to remain in contention for a summit clash berth.

'Delhi protesters identified via fingerprints on stones'

Will suggest CM Fadnavis to recommend Patil's name for the Nobel Prize in the field of scientific research: Raut; Uddhav speaks to Abhijeet Dipke, assures him of Opposition's backing

MAHARASHTRA Bharatiya Janata Party minister Chandrakant Patil has claimed the Delhi Police have collected the fingerprints of protesters from even the smallest stones allegedly used during the CJP agitation in the national capital, which will be linked to the Aadhaar numbers for their identification.

The remark made by the Higher and Technical Education Minister at a Press conference in western Maharashtra's Kolhapur, drew



mocking comments from Shiv Sena (UBT) leader Sanjay Raut, who said he would suggest Chief Minister Devendra Fadnavis to recommend Patil's name for the Nobel Prize in the field of scientific research.

The Cockroach Janta Party (CJP) led a month-long protest at Jantar Mantar in Delhi over examination pa-

per leaks. The demonstration escalated into clashes, barricade breaches, and stone-pelting.

The most intense violence broke out on July 20, when thousands of protesters attempted a 'Sansad Chalo' march to Parliament, leading to clashes in which demonstrators as well as security personnel were injured.

Shiv Sena-UBT chief Uddhav Thackeray on Friday spoke with Cockroach Janta Party founder Abhijeet Dipke over phone, and assured him of the Opposition's support.

Thackeray also asked Abhijeet's mother about his marriage plans. A video of the conversation was shared on social media.

Sena (UBT) leader Chandrakant Khaire visited Dipke's residence here, and facilitated a conversation between him and Thackeray, a former Maharashtra Chief Minister, over a video call.

"I was there for an hour at his place. Uddhav Thackeray assured that the entire Opposition stands unitedly with Abhijeet Dipke," Khaire told reporters.

The CJP leader told Thackeray that he will keep fighting for students till their demands are fulfilled.

Major dead, 2 Lieutenants injured as SUV hits camel

JAISALMER: An Army officer of Major rank was killed and two Lieutenant-rank officers were injured after their private SUV collided with a camel and overturned near the Jaisalmer Military Station late Thursday night.

The deceased has been identified as 30-year-old Major Hamza Arif, a resident of Indore, Madhya Pradesh. According to officials, the officer had been married only a month ago.

The accident occurred approximately 6 km from the district headquarters when a camel suddenly appeared in front of the officers' private SUV as they were returning to the military station from Jaisalmer city. The impact caused the vehicle to overturn five times and drag for nearly 100 meters before crashing near the military boundary wall. The camel also died on the spot.



Upon receiving news of the crash, Army personnel and officers rushed to the scene to rescue the three trapped officers from the mangled remains of the vehicle. They were rushed to the military station, where Major Hamza Arif succumbed to his injuries during treatment. The two other officers, identified as Lieutenant Abhinav Rathore and Lieutenant Ayushman Gusain, sustained injuries and are currently undergoing treatment at the Military Hospital.

According to ASI Jagdish Charan of the Sadar Police Station, the police received a late-night report that a vehicle had overturned after colliding with a camel on the road past the War Museum. Upon reaching the site, they found a dead camel by the roadside, which was subsequently moved. A private SUV was also found severely damaged near the military boundary wall.

Kerala govt to withdraw cases against NEET protestors

KOCHI: The Kerala government has decided to withdraw all cases registered in connection with protests held across the state in support of the NEET agitation in Delhi, Home Minister Ramesh Chennithala said on Friday. Speaking to reporters in Thiruvananthapuram, Chennithala said the decision was taken following requests received from Leader of the Opposition in the Lok Sabha Rahul Gandhi and Chief Minister V D Satheesan. He said several youth organisations and political parties had organised demonstrations across Kerala expressing solidarity with the protests over alleged irregularities in the NEET examination. "Several cases were registered in connection with those protests. We received many requests seeking withdrawal of these cases. The chief minister forwarded all those representations to me, and I have directed the DGP not to proceed further with any of these cases," Chennithala said.

Suvendu alleges Rs 15K cr revenue leak under Mamata

BIRBHUM

WEST BENGAL Chief Minister Suvendu Adhikari on Friday alleged an around Rs 15,000 crore revenue leak in Birbhum district over the past 15 years, and said it would not have been possible without the support of the previous dispensation.

Multiple government departments were either complicit or remained silent under directions from the "highest level", he alleged during a press conference.

His allegations came against the backdrop of police recovering Rs 28.5 crore in cash and 15 kg of gold from absconding stone trad-



er Tullu Mondal's residence in West Bengal's Birbhum as part of a wider crackdown on alleged illegal mining and revenue leakages in the district.

Police suspect a substantial portion of the cash rep-

resented revenue allegedly siphoned off. The district has for long been under the scanner over allegations of illegal quarrying and organised crime linked to stone trade.

Targeting his predecessor Mamata Banerjee, Adhikari said, "An organised racket siphoning off revenue for years... cannot function without the concurrence of the head of the institution."

"Without the support of former chief minister Mamata Banerjee, it is impossible for such a large racket to have operated for so long. Institutional corruption happens only when the head of the institution encourages corruption."

Fadnavis calls for evacuation of dangerous buildings

NEW DELHI

MAHARASHTRA Chief Minister Devendra Fadnavis on Friday said authorities should evacuate "dangerous" buildings with greater persuasion and, if necessary, use force to save lives, following the collapse of a dilapidated structure in Bhiwandi that killed nine.

Speaking to reporters, Fadnavis said the Bhiwandi building had been classified as a C1 structure, which means it was unsafe for habitation.

"It is very unfortunate. It was a C1-category building. The local municipal commissioner informed me that around 25 people had already been evacuated. Despite this, the contractor continued the repair work, after



which the incident occurred," he said. Fadnavis expressed condolences

to the families of those who lost their lives and said the state government

would provide financial assistance to the next of kin of the deceased.

He said he had directed the municipal commissioner to initiate legal action against the contractor.

Explaining the classification, the chief minister said a C1-category building is considered dangerous and unfit for occupation.

"Life is important. Saving lives is equally important. People living in C1-category buildings should be evacuated with greater persuasion and insistence.

If required, some force can also be used to evacuate them from such dilapidated structures. However, there are some restrictions as per the court orders. Still, I feel saving life is also important," he said.

Yeleru lifeline secured amid drought: Nimmala

DESPITE the looming impact of Super El Nino and severe drought conditions, the government is ensuring irrigation water to the Yeleru ayacut, water resources minister Nimmala Ramanaidu said on Friday.

During his tour in Kakinada district, the minister inspected water levels in canals under the Yeleru ayacut. Jaggampeta MLA Jyothula Nehru and Prathipadu MLA Varupula Satya Prabha accompanied him.

Ramanaidu directed irrigation officials to immediately utilise operation and maintenance funds for de-

silting and urgent repairs to the Yeleru Project Main Canal. He said the reservoir was originally designed to depend on local water sources, but prevailing drought conditions have made irrigation through Yeleru waters alone impossible.

To address the situation, the government will divert Godavari waters into the Yeleru reservoir through the Pushkara Lift Irrigation Scheme and the left canal. He said Yeleru would not have received even a drop of water without the Pushkara scheme and credited its conception to Chief Minister N Chandrababu Naidu.

The minister said Chief Minister Chandrababu

Naidu and Deputy Chief Minister Pawan Kalyan had directed officials to give special attention to farmers in the Yeleru and Pithapuram Branch Canal ayacuts. He urged farmers to cultivate less water-intensive crops, adopt water conservation measures, prioritise drinking water and insure their crops.

Later, the minister inspected bridge construction works at NH crossings near Bendapudi in Tondangi mandal and Arempudi in Sankhavar mandal under Tuni constituency.

Ramanaidu said the government is accelerating Polavaram Left Canal works to fulfil the long-pending dream of north Andhra.

villages to safer locations and rehabilitation centres as a precautionary measure. "The situation is being monitored round the clock. People should avoid crossing flooded roads, streams, culverts and causeways, and stay away from the river for bathing, swimming or fishing," he said.

The DMA also forecast light to moderate rainfall in isolated parts of Manyam, Alluri, Polavaram, Anakapalli, Kakinada, Konaseema, East Godavari, West Godavari, Eluru and Tirupati districts on Saturday.

HC orders removal of barricades at Venkatayapalem toll exit

JUSTICE Ravi Cheemalapati of the Andhra Pradesh High Court has directed the National Highways Authority of India (NHAI) and the toll management to remove barricades erected at the exit point connecting the Vijayawada West Bypass National Highway to the Seed Access Road near the Venkatayapalem toll plaza, providing relief to commuters, including advocates, court staff and local residents.

The issue arose after the toll operator installed barricades at the exit leading to the Seed Access Road, preventing vehicles from directly accessing it. Commuters alleged that they were being forced to pass through the toll plaza, make a U-turn on the highway and cross the toll gate again before reaching the service road. When motorists questioned the arrangement, police personnel deployed at the site allegedly diverted vehicles through the toll plaza. Aggrieved by the restrictions, advocate Sriram Jaswanth of

• Court found a prima facie case against the restrictions, rejecting the proposal to allow access only during specified time slots

Gollapudi filed a writ petition before the High Court. Senior counsel Y V Raviprasad, appearing for the petitioner and instructed by Mangena Sri Ramarao, argued that the Venkatayapalem toll plaza had been established only about 17 km from the Kaza toll plaza, contrary to Rule 8 of the National Highways Fee (Determination of Rates and Collection) Rules, 2008, which generally prescribes a minimum distance of 60 kilometres between toll plazas. He further contended that Venkatayapalem falls within the notified capital region and that erecting a toll plaza in such an area was legally questionable.

now, neither the makers nor the team have confirmed the report yet.

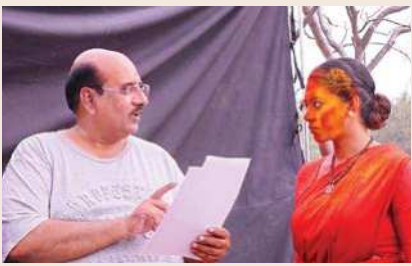
