Bhu Bharati will permanently resolve farmers' land issues, says Ponguleti

Its implementation will be referendum on our government's performance, he asserts

REVENUE Minister Ponguleti Srinivas Reddy on Thursday said implementation of the State government's Bhu Bharati land legislation would serve as a referendum on its performance in the next elections.

Addressing a meeting of farmers on the sidelines of a land re-survey at Bethupalli revenue village in Sathupalli Assembly constituency, the Minister said the government was committed to providing permanent solutions to land-related problems and preventing irregularities in land records.

"The implementation of Bhu Bharati will be the referendum for our government's performance in the coming elections. We said this when the law was introduced and we stand by the same com-



mitment even today," he said.

He said the Bhu Bharati Act was aimed at providing a permanent solution to land-related problems of farmers and ensuring protection of genuine land rights.

The Minister said nearly 6,000 acres had already been re-surveyed in Bethupalli revenue village, which has a total extent of 12,047 acres.

He said the re-survey was being conducted using modern technology, with precise coordinates and maps being prepared for each land parcel. Farmers would be given 30 days to raise objections after completion of the survey and final rights would be recorded only after resolving the grievances.

Bhudhaar cards, similar to Aadhaar cards, would subsequently be issued to landholders, he said.

Reddy directed officials to protect access roads to agricultural fields and ensure that such roads were not recorded as private land. He also ordered protection of ponds by clearly demarcating their boundaries and taking necessary measures to pre-

vent encroachments.

The government has selected 70 villages in each district in the first phase of the re-survey and aims to complete the survey of agricultural and abadi properties across Telangana within the next 18 months, he said.

The minister warned of strict action against attempts to illegally regularise 22-A lands and said the government would not permit land grabbers to use poor people as a front to regularise illegally acquired properties.

Reddy said land was an emotional issue for farmers and not a political one, adding that protecting the interests of genuine farmers was the government's responsibility. District Collector Divakara TS said the revenue machinery would work at the field level to examine and resolve land-related grievances in accordance with rules.

Congress cracks whip on leaders defying party line

TPCC chief Mahesh Kumar Goud says notices issued over controversial remarks; candidate selection rests with central leadership

TELANGANA Pradesh Congress Committee (TPCC) president Mahesh Kumar Goud on Thursday warned that strict disciplinary action would be taken against anyone crossing the party line. Addressing the media, he said the remarks made by Konda Susmitha against Chief Minister Revanth Reddy and Minister Ponguleti Srinivasa Reddy had caused concern within the party. A show-cause notice was issued to Minister KondaSurekha, seeking an



explanation, while clarification was also sought from senior leader Chinna Reddy over his recent comments.

On the Parkal constituency issue, Mahesh Kumar Goud said the Congress central leadership, Central

Election Committee and CWC alone have the authority to select candidates. He dismissed claims of internal groups such as "Green Congress", asserting that every member belongs only to the Congress party.

Errabelli leads 10 km protest walk over irrigation crisis

FORMER minister and BRS leader Errabelli Dayakar Rao on Thursday led a 10-km walk along a canal in Jangaon district, demanding immediate release of irrigation water to farmers in Devaruppula and Kodakandla mandals.

The walk began at Dhara-



vat Thanda and concluded at Banjara village, where Errabelli inspected dried paddy fields and interacted with farmers. He later staged a dharna at Singarajupalli, alleging that despite sufficient water in the Devadula reservoir, canals remained dry.

Questioning claims that 57,000 acres had received irrigation water, Errabelli asked the government to explain where the water had gone. During an attempt to arrest him, a scuffle broke out between BRS workers and police, in which Errabelli sustained a head injury. He continued the protest before being taken into custody. Farmer Kunsothu Venkanna broke down, saying his four-acre crop had dried up despite drilling 16 borewells without finding water. Errabelli demanded Rs 30,000 per acre as compensation and vowed to continue the agitation until farmers receive relief and irrigation water.
