DELHI ON HIGH ALERT

NEW DELHI: Delhi has tightened security across the national capital ahead of the 18th BRICS Summit, with nearly 4,800 traffic police personnel set to manage VVIP movement and more than 35 major roads identified for traffic restrictions and diversions. The summit will be held at Bharat Mandapam in New Delhi from September 11 to 13, with foreign leaders and other dignitaries expected to attend. Around 22 diversion points will be used to regulate traffic during the movement of foreign delegations and VVIP convoys. Security has also been stepped up at around 10 major hotels where foreign delegates are expected to stay, along with 12 other important locations across the capital. India is hosting the 18th BRICS Summit as the grouping's chair for 2026. The main leaders' summit will be held on September 12 and 13, while the BRICS Business Forum is scheduled for September 11.

14 people killed in Syria blast

22 BRS MLAs suspended

KTR, Harish among legislators suspended for remainder of session

IN all, 22 Bharat Rashttra Samithi legislators, including party working president KT Rama Rao, BRSLP Deputy Leader T Harish Rao and other senior leaders, were suspended for the entire monsoon session on Wednesday, after the members demanded a discussion on slogans of "death to KCR" allegedly raised by a Congress MLA against Leader of Opposition (LoP) and former chief minister K Chandrashekar Rao.

The BRS members registered protest by coming into the well demanding immediate discussion and apologies for the slogans raised against the LoP. When the House assembled, the BRS members came into the well and raised slogans of 'we want justice'.

In the meantime, Minister Adhuri Laxman Kumar, under rule 338 raised the issue of 'shuddhikarana' by the BRS leaders after Dalits went to KCR's farmhouse a day before and sought discussion. With BRS MLAs protesting in the well of the House, some of the Congress

Govt-staff JAC talks fructify; stir move dropped

IMPLEMENTATION OF NEW PRC, RELEASE OF PENDING DAs ASSURED

HYDERABAD

THE talks between the Telangana government and the Employees' Joint Action Committee (JAC) fructified on Wednesday, with the government taking some major decisions concerning implementation of new PRC, release of pending DAs, and consideration of the demand for the cancellation of the Contributory Pension scheme (CPC) by a panel.

Consequently, the JAC called off the proposed strike from Thursday.

State Chief Secretary Sanjay Jaju instructed the head of the second Pay Revision Com-

mission (PRC) N Sivashankar to complete the report on new pay scales expeditiously and submit the same to the government. In another big announcement, the government said that a committee would be constituted to study the demand for the cancellation of the Contributory Pension Scheme (CPS) and called a meeting with the leaders of employees' unions to discuss the release of pending DAs and other bills. Employees JAC Chairman V Lachi Reddy said that the Chief Secretary assured that steps would be taken to ensure the submission of the PRC report to the government by September 18. **Cont'd on Page 7**

India, US trade pact to be signed soon: Commerce Secy

NEW DELHI: The India-US trade pact is "more or less" finalised, with the two sides discussing only a few remaining issues, and the agreement will be signed at an appropriate time, Commerce Secretary Rajesh Agarawal said on Wednesday. Agarawal said a trade agreement must provide a certain degree of preferential market access to both sides. "My minister (Commerce Minister Piyush Goyal) on record has multiple times indicated that the deal has more or less been finalised. **Continued on Page 7**

THE BJP on Wednesday announced that it will launch a month-long 'Seva Sankalp Abhiyan' on Prime Minister Narendra Modi's birthday on September 17 to mark his 25 years in public life, with a series of programmes focused on youth outreach and public participation.

Addressing a press conference at the BJP headquar-

ters here, party president Nitin Nabin said Modi's birthday will be observed as 'Seva Diwas' and blood donation camps will be or-

ganised across the country. An 'Ashirwad Ka Diya' programme will be held in the evening on September 17, under which families, particularly beneficiaries of government schemes, will light lamps as a gesture of gratitude for Modi's 25 years in public service, he said.

He said these lamps will also symbolise the resolve for 'Viksit Bharat 2047'.

Iran captures US sub after attack on 5 oil tankers

TEHRAN: The Iranian navy has claimed to have captured one of the US military's "most modern, smart" unmanned submarines at the entrance of the Strait of Hormuz. In a statement published by Sepah News, the official news outlet of the Islamic Revolutionary Guard Corps (IRGC), the navy said it captured the unmanned underwater vehicle -- identified as a Dive-LD -- in a complex intelligence operation. **Continued on Page 7**

EC now says will visit Bharat Ratna's house for verification

BENGALURU

ELECTION Commission of India (ECI) officials will visit 92-year-old Bharat Ratna awardee and eminent scientist CNR Rao's Bengaluru residence for verification after backlash over the notice issued to him as part of the Karnataka electoral roll Special Intensive Revision (SIR).



Rao was asked to appear at an SIR hearing centre to address a discrepancy in how his name was recorded during the

enumeration process. "... Rao does not have to appear before the election officials at the designated centre. Officials will visit his home and conduct the necessary verification there," said an ECI official, who did not want to be named.

The notice listed the reason as "self-name mismatch." **Continued on Page 7**

Cognizant's green card filings suspended

IT industry may face tougher scrutiny

WASHINGTON

THE US has suspended permanent labour certification filings (PERM) by Chennai-founded IT services company Cognizant and software firm Cloudera, as the Trump administration steps up its crackdown on alleged fraud and misuse of employment visa programmes.

The move could have implications for foreign workers seeking US employment-based Green Cards through Cognizant, including Indian technology professionals. The US Department of Labour has not disclosed the specific allegations against either company. Authorities have not publicly given details about the specific allegations against Cognizant or Cloudera, nor said how many PERM applications are affected or how long the suspension will last.

US Department of Labour Inspector General Anthony D'Esposito an-

nounced the suspension of the companies' PERM filings, saying, "Threats to American workers will NOT be tolerated."

D'Esposito said the investigation into the two companies was conducted in coordination with the White House Fraud Task Force and other officials.

Referring to Cognizant, he said its PERM filings



had been suspended and that the Department of Labour's Office of Inspector General was investigating. In another statement, D'Esposito said authorities were following "facts, fraud and finances".

The development comes after the Trump administration launched a major investigation in July into alleged fraud involving the H-1B and PERM employment programmes.

'AI could kill us all by end of decade'

ANTHROPIC RESEARCHER QUILTS, ISSUES DIRE WARNING

WASHINGTON

AN Anthropic researcher has resigned from the company citing fears that AI labs are building systems that could kill human life in just a few years. Jacob Coxon said in an X post on Wednesday morning that he is quitting Anthropic — as he had previously quit OpenAI — because these AI companies are gambling with lives in their rush to

improve superintelligence. "I resigned from Anthropic today. I spent the last three years doing pretraining research at both OpenAI and Anthropic. Neither company is acting responsibly," Coxon said. "They are racing straight to self-improving superintelligence and gambling with our lives."

Coxon warned against underestimating the power of AI systems — predicting that they would soon be able



to "hack anything, revolutionize any field overnight, and acquire real power and

resources". He went so far as to say that these superintelligent AI systems could end

humanity in the space of just a few years, and the people building them are aware of this. "The people building AI earnestly believe that it could kill us all by the end of the decade," the 27-year-old former Anthropic researcher warned. He claimed to have first-hand knowledge of senior AI researchers who are worried about artificial intelligence killing humanity, writing: "This is not a marketing stunt. If anything,

many executives and senior researchers will couch their phrasing in the press to sound sensible - but I hear the same people express fear privately." "No other human activity poses this level of danger," Coxon added.

The 27-year-old researcher said that Anthropic is well aware of the stakes, but wants to be the first to build an uncontrollable, self-improving AI system.

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
