- Srisailam Devasthanam will celebrate the Dasara Mahotsavams from October 11 to 20, featuring daily Vahana Sevas, Navadurga Alankarams, and traditional rituals
- EO holds a preliminary planning meeting with chief priests, Vedic scholars, department heads, and engineering staff
- Continuous drinking water, snacks, and Anna Prasadam will be provided in queue complexes, backed by LED screens for live proceedings and round-the-clock sanitation

SRISAILAM Devasthanam is making elaborate preparations for the annual Dasara Mahotsavams, scheduled to be celebrated from October 11 to 20.

Executive Officer M Srinivasa Rao chaired a preliminary review meeting with temple priests, Vedic scholars, and department heads on Wednesday to outline

operational plans for the 10-day festival.

The discussions covered ritualistic schedules, daily Vahana Sevas, Navadurga Alankarams for Goddess Bhramaramba Devi, and major festival highlights, including the Nijaroopa Alankaram, Shami Puja, and Teppotsavam on Vijayadashami.

EO Srinivasa Rao instructed temple departments to work in total co-

ordination, ensuring strict adherence to traditional ritual timings.

Final operational blueprints will be presented at the upcoming Dharma-Karma Mandali meeting.

To handle the anticipated influx of pilgrims, the engineering wing was directed to setup LED screens at key locations and execute extensive electrical illumination across the shrine.

The gardens wing will decorate the premises traditionally with fresh flowers, while security personnel and police will enforce strict traffic and parking management to prevent bottlenecks during village processions.

For pilgrim comfort, the queue management team was instructed to maintain an uninterrupted supply of drinking water, milk, and snacks in queue lines, alongside

regular Anna Prasadam service. The sanitation wing has been tasked with continuous cleaning of public utilities and temple surroundings. Cultural programs including Harikatha, discourses, instrumental music, and traditional dances will perform at the Nitya Kala Vedika, while folk troupes featuring Kolatam and Chekka Bhajana will accompany the daily processions.

CPI demands immediate relief from soaring fuel, LPG, and food prices

PROTESTING the continuous escalation in the prices of essential commodities, cadres of the Communist Party of India (CPI) staged demonstrations across Nandyal and Yemmiganur on Wednesday, demanding immediate intervention by the Central and State governments to control inflation. Leading a rally in Nandyal from Gandhi Chowk to Kalpana Centre, CPI Nandyal District Secretary Ranganayudu criticized

both governments for shifting financial burdens onto working-class and middle-income families. Following the rally, protesters sat on a dharna at Kalpana Centre, demanding immediate price reductions on daily staples including rice, pulses, edible oil, salt, and sugar, alongside cuts in petrol, diesel, and cooking gas rates. Ranganayudu urged authorities to clamp down heavily on hoarding and black marketing to stabilize retail markets.

Meanwhile, CPI leaders in Yemmiganur organized a novel protest by carrying gas cylinders, rice sacks, and edible oil cans during a rally through major thoroughfares.

The procession culminated in a sit-in demonstration at Somappa Circle, where activ-

ists raised slogans against government economic policies.

Addressing the gatherings, CPI leaders highlighted that skyrocketing commodity prices have severely eroded household budgets while public purchasing power continues to decline.

They demanded that the state and central administrations establish efficient market intervention mechanisms, ensure adequate public distribution of essential food items, and guarantee remunerative prices for farming communities. Warning that minor palliatives would not suffice, CPI leaders cautioned that failure to provide swift relief to ordinary citizens would force the party to mobilize a massive, state-wide sustained agitation.

BCs are not weak; self-respect drives the community: Minister Satya

AFFIRMING that Backward Classes (BCs) are social pillars who never compromise on self-respect, Health Minister and Dharmavaram MLA Satyakumar Yadav hailed Prime Minister Narendra Modi for elevating India's global standing while originating from a BC background.

Addressing the BJP OBC Morcha district executive meeting at Gotluru village in Sri Sathya Sai district, Satyakumar commended Gotluru residents for achieving national "Best Village" awards twice by keeping local development above party politics. He urged party cadres to actively participate in nationwide service initiatives starting September 17 to mark PM Modi's 25-year public service journey.

He called on workers to organize "Seva Setu" outreach camps, verify central welfare



delivery, honor Anganwadi staff, and light "Ashirvada Deepam" across all villages.

Outlining major infrastructure projects in Dharmavaram constituency, the Minister highlighted ongoing Rs 650 crore highway works between Kadiri and Mudigubba, the sanctioning of an Ayurveda Medical College, establishment of a Mega Handloom Cluster, and expanded dialysis facilities.

He reiterated that coalition welfare schemes—including doorstep pension delivery of Rs 4,000, Talliki Vandanam, and Deepam—are being distributed without political

bias.

Satyakumar noted that the "Stree Shakti" free bus travel scheme has significantly improved healthcare access for women, leading to increased outpatient and inpatient registrations at government hospitals. He advised party cadres to spread awareness regarding the Ayushman Bharat scheme, which provides free medical coverage up to Rs 5 lakh for eligible families.

He promised to treat every constituent as a family member and continue driving inclusive development across the region.
