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ECI recognises Vijay-led TVK as state party

Reserves 'whistle' symbol

CHENNAI: The Election Commission of India (ECI) has recognised Tamilaga Vettri Kazhagam (TVK) as a state party in Tamil Nadu and reserved the 'whistle' as its election symbol. The recognition comes after the party's performance in the Assembly election, winning 108 of the 234 seats in the State. This marks a significant milestone for the actor-turned-politician Vijay-led TVK party. In a communication dated September 9, the ECI said it had reviewed TVK's performance in the 2026 Tamil Nadu and Puducherry Assembly elections and found that the party had fulfilled the conditions prescribed under Para 6A of the Election Symbols (Reservation and Allotment) Order, 1968. Accordingly, the Commission granted TVK recognition as a state party in Tamil Nadu as well as in the Union Territory of Puducherry.

25 killed after fire breaks out on cargo ship in China port



BEIJING: At least 25 people were killed and five were missing after a cargo ship caught fire while docked in a Chinese port, Chinese state media reported on Thursday. The vessel was undergoing repairs at Beihai Ship-building Co. at the port of Qingdao, a major shipping hub on China's northeastern coast, when the fire broke out. China's Xinhua news agency released a photograph identifying the ship as the Ocean Melody. The vessel sails under a Liberian flag, according to the tracking website VesselFinder. There were 42 people aboard the ship when the incident occurred, Xinhua reported. Twelve people were safely evacuated, while five others suffered injuries and were taken to hospital. Their condition was reported to be stable.

CM TELLS CONG MLAs ASPIRING FOR 2ND TERM

CHIEF Minister A Revanth Reddy has made it clear to Congress MLAs that only the performance of every legislator will determine the success of the party and therefore their own conduct will influence the chances of their winning a second term in the next elections. The Chief Minister instructed all MLAs to attend the ongoing Assembly session and raise local issues in the House.

The Chief Minister presided over the Congress Legislature Party (CLP) meeting here on Thursday, with Ministers, government whips and Telangana Pradesh Congress Committee president in tow.

Asking all the party MLAs to attend the ongoing Assembly session regularly, CM Revanth Reddy advised them to raise local issues in the House and work hard to succeed politically in the future as well



He told the legislators that people gave a big mandate in the last elections; so, everyone has to work hard to succeed politically in the future as well. Revanth Reddy commended

the legislators for strongly countering the Opposition's conspiracy and exposing their "plot" against the government to the public. An inquiry into the incidents that took place

has already been initiated. The opposition Bharat Rashtra Samithi had "conspired" to disrupt the Assembly session, he reiterated. Even after losing power, BRS leaders had refused to shed their arrogance. The opposition leaders abused police officials and public representatives verbally. They behaved inappropriately towards officials and caused embarrassment by taking off their T-shirts in the presence of female officers. The use of highly objectionable language to abuse the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly was uncalled for. The BRS also insulted the Dalit community by "purifying" the ground where Dalits had walked at KCR's farmhouse.

TG PR Act amended

GP's get quick access to funds

THE Telangana Assembly on Thursday amended the Telangana Panchayat Raj Act, 2018 allowing the gram panchayats in the state to have separate bank accounts so that they can utilise the funds whenever they are needed. Under sub-section (3) of section 70 of the Telangana Panchayat Raj Act, 2018 (Telangana Act No. 5 of 2018), all moneys received by the gram panchayat are required to be lodged in the nearest government treasury. The proviso to that sub-section permits amounts received under central or state government schemes to be lodged in nearby nationalised banks, co-operative banks or post offices in such manner as may be prescribed.

The government had received representations seeking permission to deposit the gram panchayat general fund in nearby nationalised banks, co-operative banks or post offices, in addition to amounts received under centrally- or state-sponsored schemes.

Panchayat Raj Minister



Dhanasri Anasuya (Seethakka) said that it had been brought to their notice that delays in processing payments through the treasury system impede timely payment of salaries to gram panchayat staff and the timely discharge of other obligations. She said that while the Municipalities Act prescribes separate schedule commercial bank, there is no such provision in the Panchayat Raj.

The Minister said that it was decided to substitute sub-section (3) of section 70 of the Telangana Panchayat Raj Act, 2018 so as to provide that all moneys and funds received by a gram panchayat, including amounts received under the schemes of the central government or the state government from time to time, should be deposited in a nearby nationalised bank, co-operative bank or post office in such manner as may be prescribed. 'Get off our roads, Mr Singh'

US HOMELAND SECURITY POSTER SPARKS OUTRAGE

WASHINGTON

A social media campaign by the US Department of Homeland Security (DHS) has caused outrage after an AI-generated poster appeared to single out Indian truck drivers as part of the Trump administration's push encouraging undocumented migrants to leave the country.

The graphic, shared by the official DHS account on X, is designed like a movie poster and is titled Transformers: Age of Deportations. It shows an AI-generated robot carrying a DHS



badge facing a brown-bearded man wearing a head covering.

Across the centre of the image is the message: 'America for Americans. Get off our roads; you don't know how to drive, Mr Singh.' The post also tells undocumented commercial drivers to 'self-deport or find out' and includes a federal hotline through which people can report what DHS describes as 'illegal aliens on American roads'. The reference to 'Mr Singh' has drawn particular criticism from Sikh and Indian American organisations. Continued on Page 7

BANK unions will go ahead with their planned nationwide strike on Friday, after talks with the government over key demands, including service conditions, failed to break the deadlock.

The United Forum of Bank Unions (UFBU) has said it will not defer the strike unless there is a favourable decision or a definite timeline on its principal demand for a five-day banking week. It may noted here that banks are closed on the second Saturday (September 12), followed by Sunday (September 13) and Monday (September 14: Ganesh Chaturthi) in some states. Continued on Page 7

RECYCLED WATER FOR INDUSTRIES

THE cash-strapped Telangana government, looking for avenues to boost revenues, proposes to make the Musi river, presently under phased rejuvenation, a money-spinner.

For context, the state government has launched the Musi Riverfront Development Corporation Ltd to clean the 55-kilometer urban stretch, build sewage treatment plants, and transform the corridor into a sustain-

able public space. Right now, the government is focusing on creating a commercial demand for recycled water (grey water) from the Musi Rejuvenation Project. As the first phase of the Musi project, already grounded, is scheduled to be completed by 2027; the available water from the STPs along the Musi river would be on sale for commercial needs.

In view of mushrooming data centers and industrial estates at the Bharat Future City and in the PURE



region, the government would start selling water to meet industrial needs. It is

estimated that 1,900 MLD of recycled water from the STPs in the Musi project would be

produced every day. Since data centres required huge water for cooling and other

purposes, officials said: "Arrangements are being made to cater to their needs once the Musi - phase one project is completed next year."

Presently, the establishment of data centres with 800 megawatts capacity are in various stages of completion. Each megawatt capacity requires around 15 million litres of water a year. The government estimates that 210 crore litres would be required every year to keep the existing and upcoming data centres in and around Hyderabad cool. "IT

is impossible to meet the requirement of huge amounts of water to keep the systems at data centers cool round the clock with the available water resources in the state.

The available water in Musi during monsoon season would be enough to meet the requirements of data centres and other industrial needs. A separate water supply network needs to be developed for all data centers. Water stock points should also be created around the data centers in the summer.

Uttam announces mega job mela in Kodad tomorrow

200-250 companies expected to offer jobs to unemployed youth

IRRIGATION and Civil Supplies Minister N Uttam Kumar Reddy on Thursday announced that a Mega Job Mela will be organised at Kodad on Saturday with an ambitious plan to bring 200 to 250 companies and provide employment opportunities to unemployed youth.

The minister said unemployment among educated youth was one of the most serious challenges facing society and stressed that elected representatives and government agencies had a responsibility to create opportunities for them.

Recalling the Mega Job Mela organised at Huzurnagar in October, 2025, the minister said it had received an overwhelming response. Around 200 companies participated, nearly 40,000 unemployed youth registered,



and about 20,000 candidates appeared for interviews. Nearly 3,000 candidates either secured jobs or were shortlisted for subsequent rounds of interviews, he said.

Encouraged by its success, Uttam Kumar Reddy said he had decided to organise a

similar large-scale employment drive at Kodad. The minister said unemployed youth from Kodad, Huzurnagar, Suryapet and Thungathurthi Assembly constituencies should be extensively mobilised.

Youth from the erstwhile Nalgonda district

and neighbouring Khammam district would also be encouraged to participate. Special teams would reach out to engineering colleges, polytechnic colleges, degree colleges and ITIs, particularly final-year students, and invite them to attend the recruitment drive.

It's a Revanth govt-induced drought, fumes Harish Rao

BRS�P Deputy Leader demands full operation of Krishna lift irrigation projects to protect local farmers

BRS�P Deputy Leader T Harish Rao accused the Congress government on Thursday of failing to utilize available Krishna River water, thereby failing to protect Telangana farmers. Addressing a press conference at Telangana Bhavan, Harish Rao asserted that the current crisis is not a natural calamity but a government-induced drought resulting from Chief Minister A Revanth Reddy administrative failure. He alleged that despite claiming to be a son of Palamuru, Revanth Reddy is betraying the region by failing to lift available river water.

Harish Rao alleged that the state government remains a silent spectator while Andhra Pradesh draws water, ignoring weather agency warnings regarding potential El Nino impacts. He highlighted operational failures across major lift irrigation projects, noting that the Kalwakurthy project El-lur pump house operates only two of its five motors



intermittently. Similarly, he questioned why Bhima operates only one of three motors, Nattampadu operates one of four, and Koilsagar runs just one of three. He questioned whether the administration is aiding Andhra Pradesh in drawing water through Veligonda and Pothireddypadu. Harish Rao recalled that while Kalwakurthy irrigated only 13,000 acres for nearly 30 years, BRS governance expanded its coverage to 3.07 lakh acres.

Demanding immediate corrective action, Harish Rao urged the government to halt the diversion of Telan-

gana rightful Krishna water share to Andhra Pradesh. He called for an immediate Apex Council meeting if necessary to safeguard state water rights and demanded that all pump motors across Palamuru, Kalwakurthy, Bhima, Nattampadu, and Koilsagar projects be switched on fully without delay. Concluding his remarks, Harish Rao emphasized that state farmers require immediate water release rather than administrative excuses, urging the government to end its negligence and act swiftly to protect agricultural interests across Telangana.

Researchers combing Kothagudem forests to assess wildlife population

THE Forest department official have been conducting a month-long scientific survey to assess the wildlife population and document biodiversity in Bhadradi Kothagudem district, which is home to several rare and endangered species.

Began on August 20, the survey primarily covers the Kinnerasani Wildlife Sanctuary, spread over 64,435 hectares, and focuses on wildlife habitats, species diversity and threats to animals.

A team of 10 research students from the Forest Research Institute has undertaken the field study in coordination with Forest department officials.

The district is home to rare species such as king cobras and pangolins, besides gaur, deer, sloth bears and other wildlife.

Forest officials said more than 200 crocodiles are estimated to be present in the Kinnerasani reservoir.

The survey assumes significance as pangolins, among the most trafficked mammals globally, are



found in considerable numbers in Bhadradi Kothagudem and some neighbouring forest districts.

Officials said the study will help identify pangolin habitats and threats, including poaching and illegal wildlife trade, and assist in strengthening conservation measures.

The forests in the district are also facing threats from hunting, road accidents and attacks by stray dogs, officials said.

Recently, signs indicating the killing of a leopard by hunters were reportedly found in a forest area along the district's border. Incidents involving the hunting of deer and other wild animals have also been reported from some areas.

The findings of the scientific survey will be compiled into a report, which will include recommendations for strengthening wildlife protection and conservation measures, officials said.

Meanwhile, the Forest Department is taking steps to improve the Kinnerasani Wildlife Sanctuary as a suitable habitat for tigers, following an increase in tiger movements in the district in recent times.

District Forest Officer Siddharth Vikram Singh and Kinnerasani Wildlife Forest Division Officer Babu said efforts were under way to improve habitat conditions and strengthen protection measures. The officials said the survey findings would be reviewed after its completion and necessary measures would be taken to protect wildlife and their habitats.



Strict action would be

taken against those involved in hunting and other illegal activities threatening wildlife, they added.

Rice millers accuse govt of harasssment, arm-twisting

THE District Rice Millers Association staged a maha dharna against arm-twisting and harassment of rice millers in the name of raids by officials on the pretext of recovering CMR dues.

The dharna was held to draw the state government's attention to long-pending issues affecting the sector.

It said rice millers were facing pressure from administrative delays, rising oper-



ating costs, surprise inspections and unresolved CMR issues.

District Rice Millers Association president Perumalla Tirupati Goud and honorary president Kore Ravi urged the government to recognize actual milling losses instead of blaming rice millers.

They questioned how fair it is to portray all millers as defaulters while ignoring the real problems the industry faces. Speaking at the event,

they said that of the 9.70 crore metric tonnes of paddy allocated to millers over the past decade, the quantity in default was less than 2 percent.

They argued it is wrong to single out a small percentage of defaulters and condemn the entire rice-milling industry. With warehouse space running short and stocks piling up in mills, they demanded that the remaining paddy from the 2025-26 Rabi season be auctioned immedi-

ately to resolve the problem.

They also asked for permission to convert the additionally allocated 12 lakh metric tonnes of paddy into boiled rice. They explained that actual milling losses of 18-20 percent occur due to factors such as recovery issues, high broken rice, untimely rains, moisture loss, and natural deterioration of grain quality etc.

They said it is unjust to impose arrears and defaults on millers without record-

ing these physical losses in inspections. They demanded that the government clarify the status of the extra 12 lakh metric tonnes of paddy.

They called for an immediate stop to sudden task force raids, disclosure of the scientific basis for claimed milling losses, and publication of the milling test reports conducted by the CCI. They said rice millers cooperated in procuring 154 lakh metric tonnes of paddy in 2025-26 for the benefit of farmers and assured full support to the government in delivering PDS rice.

Instead of blaming millers, they urged the government to provide permanent solutions to the industry's problems, implement a dynamic crop policy aligned with harvest seasons, and resolve pending crop issues from 2014-25 without interest or penalties.

Association secretary Yanam Santosh, treasurer Ravinder Reddy, and district rice millers participated in the programme.

IN a major crackdown on narcotics smuggling, Nizamabad police have attached properties valued at around Rs 3.02 crore linked to an interstate Alprazolam trafficking ring.

Moving beyond routine arrests, law enforcement shifted focus toward dismantling the monetary benefits generated through drug sales in connection with Crime Number 127/2025 registered at Nizamabad Rural police station.

Out of five persons booked under the NDPS Act, four individuals were arrested alongside the recovery of 1.087 kilograms of Alprazolam, two cars, five mobile phones, and Rs 3.50 lakh in cash. Investigation stretching over a year revealed that the psychotropic substance was being transported from Rajasthan

through Maharashtra to Nizamabad and Nirmal districts in small batches. The contraband was sold locally at rates ranging between Rs 4 lakh and Rs 5 lakh per kilogram.

Properties identified as acquired through drug money include 4.20 acres of agricultural land, 667 square yards of vacant plots, two cars, a two-wheeler, and around Rs 5 lakh deposited across bank accounts belonging to key accused Gandham Srinivas Goud, Botla Katamaiah Goud, and their family members. Procedural measures

for property attachment were executed through the competent authority under Section 68F(2) of the NDPS Act following coordination with various government departments.

Nizamabad Police Commissioner P Sai Chaitanya stated that technical analysis of mobile phone records and inter-district police coordination played a crucial role in gathering evidence regarding the money trail. He emphasised that financial inquiries will continue to track the origin and utilization of drug proceeds, while encouraging the public to share information on narcotics trafficking via Dial 112 or local police stations.



Roundtable calls for caste census, greater representation of BCs

Expressing frustration over the delay, the build-

ing owner said he had approached several people regarding the pending rent but received no satisfactory response. With no other option left, he said he was compelled to lock the Tahsildar office to draw attention to the issue.

Palakeedumandal of Huzurnagar constituency of Suryapet district was newly formed in Suryapet district in 2016. As the newly established mandal did not have a government building to accommodate its offices, the authorities have been operating various government offices from rented premises. The Tahsildar office has also been functioning from a rented building since then.

AI and its integration with education: Building a future for students

India is entering a period of significant change in education as Artificial Intelligence (AI) becomes increasingly integrated into industries, governance, healthcare and other areas of society. For higher education institutions, this shift brings the responsibility of preparing students to work with AI while also understanding its limitations, ethical implications and impact on society.

According to the 2024 Advancing India's AI Skills: Interventions and Programmes Needed report by NASSCOM and Deloitte India, India's AI talent pool is projected to grow from 600,000–650,000 to more than 1.25 million between 2022 and 2027. The broader AI market, particularly software and services, is also projected to grow at a 25–35 per cent compound annual growth rate through 2027.

For universities, these developments underline the need to integrate AI education into academic programmes. Used thoughtfully, AI can support personalised learning, assist teachers, expand access to educational resources and help students develop skills relevant to emerging careers.

Supporting personalised learning

AI-based systems can analyse aspects of student performance and recommend lessons, exercises or practice material. Students who require additional support can receive further explanations and practice, while those progressing faster can be given more challenging tasks.

However, such systems should complement rather than replace teacher judgement. Educators remain important in understanding students' individual circumstances and providing academic and personal guidance.

Supporting teachers and classrooms

AI can also assist educators with tasks such as lesson planning, organising learning materials and routine assessments. By reducing some



administrative responsibilities, technology could allow teachers to devote more time to mentoring, classroom discussion and creative learning.

The role of teachers remains central because education involves more than the delivery of information. Empathy, encouragement, ethical guidance and an understanding of students' social and emotional needs cannot be reduced to automated systems.

Expanding access to learning

India's linguistic and geographical diversity presents another area where AI could contribute. Digital platforms such as DIKSHA and SWAYAM have expanded access to educational resources. AI-enabled translation, speech recognition and text-to-speech technologies could further support students who learn in regional languages or require accessibility features.

Rural and remote learners could also benefit from AI tutors, digital laboratories and career-guidance tools. However, these possibilities depend on reliable electricity, affordable devices, internet access and systems capable of functioning in low-bandwidth or offline environments.

Preparing students for an AI-enabled workplace

Universities in different parts of the world

are experimenting with interdisciplinary approaches to AI education, combining technical learning with problem-solving, projects and applications across disciplines.

For students, technical knowledge alone may not be sufficient. They will also need to understand how to evaluate AI-generated information, identify limitations, verify outputs and apply human judgement. These skills will be relevant across sectors including healthcare, agriculture, finance, manufacturing, education and public services.

India's education system must therefore approach AI as a tool that works alongside human intelligence. Investment in computing infrastructure, teacher training, regional-language technologies, ethical safeguards and inclusive access will be important to ensure that AI reduces rather than widens educational inequalities.

The future of education will not be secured by AI alone. Its value will depend on how effectively institutions combine technological capabilities with human judgement, responsible use and meaningful learning. By taking this balanced approach, education can help students become capable and ethical participants in an increasingly AI-enabled world.

As Artificial Intelligence becomes part of education and the wider economy, universities face the task of preparing students for an AI-enabled future. Thoughtful integration of AI can support personalised learning, assist teachers and expand access to educational resources. At the same time, students need skills to evaluate AI-generated information, understand its limitations and apply human judgement. The future of education will depend on balancing technology with ethical safeguards, teacher guidance and inclusive access to ensure AI supports meaningful and equitable learning



UoH Professor Rajadurai Chandrasekar elected INSA Fellow

Prof. Rajadurai Chandrasekar of the School of Chemistry, University of Hyderabad (UoH), has been elected as a Fellow of the Indian National Science Academy (INSA), with the fellowship taking effect from January 2027. The recognition acknowledges his contributions to materials science, nanoscience and photonics research.

With the fellowship, Prof. Chandrasekar will become a Fellow of all three National Science Academies of India. He is also a Fellow of the Royal Society of Chemistry (RSC), UK. His research work has received recognition through several awards, including the SERB-STAR Research Award, the Materials Research Society of India (MRSI) Medal and the YIM Boston Young Scientist Award. Prof. Chandrasekar has also been listed among the top 2% of scientists globally in the field of Nanoscience and Technology in a Stanford University-based global ranking. He has an H-index of 47 and serves on international editorial boards of journals covering materials chemistry and science.

His research group works on miniature, all-organic photonic microsystems designed to guide, modulate, split and process light. The research has potential applica-

tions in areas such as optical communication, sensing, computation, robotics and space technologies.

Prof. Chandrasekar has also contributed to the development of the field of "Mechanophotonics", which combines mechanical micromanipulation with crystal photonics. His work in this area explores the development of all-organic photonic integrated circuits and new approaches to controlling light at the microscale.

His current research includes AI-driven soft materials for programmable optical communication devices, supported by the J. C. Bose Grant. The interdisciplinary research brings together artificial intelligence, soft materials and photonics to explore optical technologies with programmable functions.

The INSA fellowship adds to Prof. Chandrasekar's academic and research recognitions and highlights the role of interdisciplinary research in areas connecting chemistry, materials science, photonics and emerging technologies. His work also reflects the growing use of advanced materials and computational approaches in developing new technologies for communication, sensing and other applications.

Spaces that inspire learning and discovery

Libraries have long been more than quiet places filled with books. They are spaces where people discover information, develop new interests and learn at their own pace. From school libraries to public and university libraries, these spaces continue to play an important role in supporting education and lifelong learning.

For students, a library can provide an environment away from everyday distractions. It offers access to textbooks, reference materials, newspapers, journals and digital resources that can support classroom learning. More importantly, spending time in a library can encourage students to explore subjects beyond their prescribed syllabus. A student researching a science project, reading about history or simply discovering a new author can begin to develop the habit of learning independently.

Libraries also help preserve knowledge. Books, manuscripts, newspapers and other records document ideas, experiences and discoveries across generations. Today, many libraries are combining traditional collections with digital archives, making information accessible in new formats while continuing to protect valuable physical resources.

Another important role of



libraries is bringing people together. Reading groups, workshops, exhibitions, lectures and community programmes can turn libraries into shared learning spaces. Such activities allow people of different ages and backgrounds to exchange ideas and learn from one another.

Technology has also changed the way libraries operate. Students can now use online catalogues, e-books, academic databases and digital archives alongside printed materials. Learning how to find reliable information, evaluate sources and use digital resources responsibly is becoming an important skill in education. Libraries can therefore contribute to more than academic performance. They can encourage curiosity, concentration, critical thinking and independent learning. They also provide an opportunity to slow down, read carefully and engage with ideas without the pressure of constant digital notifications.

Anti-Indian sentiment in US can derail trade relationship

A social media post by the US Department of Homeland Security has created a furore among Indian immigrants in the North American country. The social media post on platform X had an AI-generated poster featuring ‘Transformers’ character Optimus Prime and a brown man with a written message of “Self-deport or find out”. Just a few days back, the US Department of Labour has suspended Permanent Labour Certification Filings- widely known as PERM- of Cognizant as the US authorities investigate alleged fraud in the immigration programme. PERM is a key route for employers to get employment-based green cards for the foreign workers, whom they bring in to the US for executing project work.

Notably, Cognizant is a Nas-

daq-listed company though it was founded by people of Indian-origin. Many believe that the investigation may widen its ambit to other large Indian IT firms in coming days. These two developments in the US shows that anti-immigration sentiment in the US is at its peak.

Surprisingly, most of the hate speech and social media posts are directed at Indians as a major section of Indian immigrants are successful professionals. The MAGA supporter base of Donald Trump is actively flaring such anti-India sentiment. Since the first day of Trump as the President of the US, immigration from India has been facing huge issues.

It began with humiliating eviction of illegal Indians staying in the US. The memory is still fresh how

people were deported in planes with their hands and legs tied on chains. Then came a wave of measures restricting movement of professionals through H1B visa route. H1B- the most popular temporary work visa- has seen entry fee raised to around \$100,000.

Moreover, procedural delay has crept in. Visa appointments are being cancelled abruptly. Visa application processing is also facing undue delay. Amid such restrictive measures, the visa applications of Indian IT companies have gone down significantly. These measures by the US administration show that Indians are no longer welcome in the US.

For decades, the bright and wealthy in India aspire to work and settle in the US. Given the current measures, it seems the route

is slowly getting closed with active discouragement from the US government. Against this backdrop, it is worth evaluating the impact of such a development. For more than three decades, India and the US’ tech industry has been very closely integrated.

From unhindered flow of people to capital, India & US relationship has been built on mutual interest. The ongoing anti-India sentiment is likely to impact that relationship. When companies are no longer allowed to send professionals to the US, they have to shift much of the work back home as the US doesn't have the required STEM talent.

Moreover, rising people-to-people relationship is responsible for more Indian students opting for higher studies in the US. As restrictions pile up, slowly Indian

students are opting for other locations than the US. Though the diplomatic relationship remains strong between India and the US despite irritants, the emerging dynamics in the immigration front will show up in the policy making at some point of time. And that will not be pleasant.

Currently, the Indian startup ecosystem has close relationship with their counterparts in the US. Many leading fund houses of America have been investing billions in India. If anti-India rhetoric continues, decoupling to some extent is expected. All-in-all, derailment of relationship between India and the US may create a lose-lose situation for both nations. In this perspective, some sense of wisdom should prevail among policymakers on both sides.

‘Purification’ corrodes democratic culture

THIS refers to “Dalits up in arms over purification of road after dapuu protest at Erravalli” (Sept 10). Purification rituals after political rallies revives the old caste practice of untouchability, now reengineered as a weapon of party rivalry. Though it appears as a theatrical gesture meant to delegitimise opponents, but it drags public life back into the language of discrimination. When parties extend this symbolism into rallies by “cleansing” spaces, they are essentially staging caste-like differentiation in political form’. Moreover, in Parliament and assemblies, even the seating arrangement has become an analogy for it— ruling party on one side, opposition on the other — a physical enactment of separation. While such seating is procedural, the mindset it reinforces is adversarial rather than collaborative. Will purification rituals be enacted there as well? This is not just ritualistic excess; it corrodes democratic culture. Instead of debating ideas, parties are dramatising purity versus pollution, which questions the very notion of equal citizenship.

THE MENTAL HEALTH OF OUR SOCIETY

THERE is a mental health crisis around us that we rarely acknowledge. When we speak of mental health, we usually think of depression, anxiety, addiction, loneliness or other clinically recognised conditions. These are undoubtedly serious concerns and deserve professional attention. But there is another, less visible crisis unfolding in our homes, workplaces, friendships and communities, a deterioration in the emotional health of society itself.

I call them the social diseases of our times. They are not psychiatric diagnoses. They are patterns of behaviour, attitudes and emotional dysfunction that are becoming so widespread that they are beginning to influence the way we relate to one another. They manifest themselves in broken relationships, toxic workplaces, bitter family disputes, fractured friendships, workplace politics and an extraordinary inability to disagree without becoming disagreeable.

The paradox is striking. We have never been more connected, yet we seem increasingly incapable of connecting with one another. As someone who has spent years observing organisations, leadership and human behaviour through the lens of Emotional Intelligence, I believe that six particular social diseases deserve our urgent attention.

1. The disease of insufficient consideration

Perhaps the most fundamental social disease today is our declining ability to consider the feelings, circumstances and dignity of another person. We are becoming increasingly self-referential. What I want, what I feel, what I deserve and what I think mostly takes precedence over what another person may be experiencing.

Consideration is not weakness. It is not submission. It is the simple ability to pause before acting and ask: “How will this affect the other person?” In families, this disease appears when spouses stop considering each other’s emotional needs. In workplaces, it appears when leaders treat employees as resources rather than

people. In society, it appears when inconvenience to oneself becomes more important than the legitimate needs of others.

The tragedy is that consideration costs very little. A little patience, courtesy, listening and sensitivity can prevent enormous emotional damage. Yet our increasingly hurried, competitive and individualistic lifestyles seem to be eroding precisely these qualities.

2. Chronic jealousy and the comparison syndrome

Jealousy has always existed. What has changed is its scale, visibility and frequency. Social media has transformed life into a continuous comparison exercise. Someone else’s holiday, house, career, children, wealth, marriage, social circle or success becomes a benchmark against which we quietly measure our own lives.

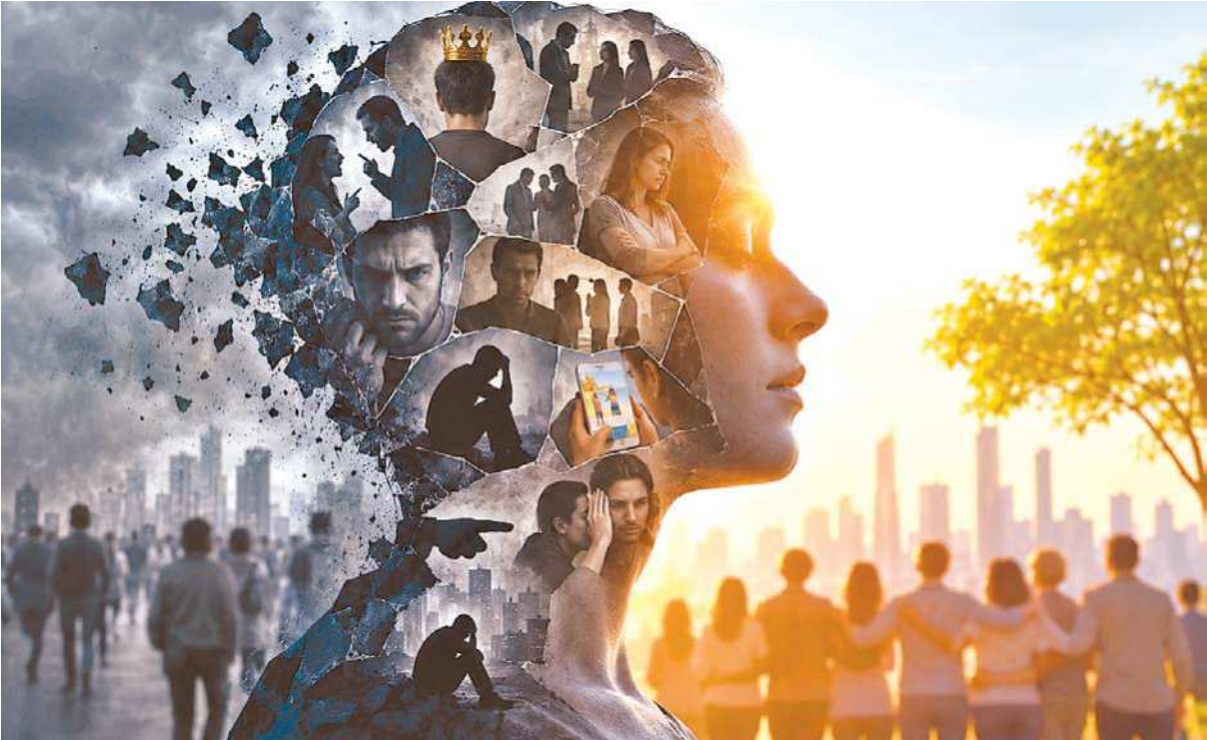
The result is a generation that is increasingly uncomfortable with another person’s success. Healthy competition can inspire us. Chronic jealousy destroys us. It makes us question the motives of successful people, diminish their achievements and sometimes even derive satisfaction from their failures. In organisations, jealousy produces unhealthy politics, withholding of information, sabotage, non-cooperation and resistance to talented colleagues. In families, it can create lifelong resentments between siblings and relatives.

The emotionally intelligent person understands a profound truth: “Another person’s success does not diminish one’s own worth”. We need to move from comparison to self-evaluation, from resentment to genuine appreciation.

3. The trust deficit

Trust is the invisible infrastructure of every healthy relationship. When trust disappears, communication becomes guarded, intentions are questioned, even innocent actions are interpreted suspiciously and relationships become exhausting.

We increasingly live in an environment of suspicion. We doubt what people say. We question motives. We assume hidden agendas. We demand proof where faith and goodwill once existed. The consequences are particularly damaging in families. When trust between spouses deteriorates, every disagreement becomes evidence of betrayal. Financial decisions become sources of suspicion. Friendships become transactional. Even professional relationships suffer when col-



leagues spend more energy protecting themselves than collaborating.

A trust deficit also has an enormous organisational cost. Organisations with low trust require more controls, more approvals, more monitoring and more bureaucracy. Decisions slow down and Innovation suffers. Employees become defensive rather than entrepreneurial. Trust, however, cannot be demanded. It has to be earned through consistency, transparency and integrity.

4. Weaponised communication - the disease of the sharp tongue

Words have always had the power to heal or hurt. Today, however, we seem to be losing our restraint. We speak impulsively, respond instantly and often use words not to communicate but to hurt and caused wounds. The sharp tongue has become a weapon. Sarcasm is mistaken for intelligence and Insults are disguised as honesty. Public humiliation is defined as “telling it like it is”. Arguments quickly become abusive and personal. And once hurtful words are spoken, apologies often arrive too late to repair the damage. Imagine this is happening across all relationships, spouses, colleagues and even between young children and their parents.

Emotional Intelligence demands something very different: the ability to regulate the emotion before expression. Not every thought needs to be spoken. Not every provocation requires a response.

5. Emotional volatility

Another disturbing feature of our times is our declining capacity to regulate emotions. Small disagreements become major confrontations. Frustration quickly becomes anger and a difference of opinion becomes a personal attack.

We increasingly react before we reflect. Emotional volatility is particularly destructive because emotions are contagious. One person’s uncontrolled anger can destabilise an entire family,

team or organisation. A volatile leader creates fear. A volatile parent creates insecurity. A volatile spouse creates an environment in which everyone learns to walk on eggshells.

Emotional regulation does not mean suppressing emotions. It means managing them intelligently.

One of the defining characteristics of emotionally intelligent people is their ability to create a small but enormously important space between what they feel and how they respond. That space is where maturity resides.

6. The disease of entitlement

Perhaps the most corrosive disease of all is entitlement, the belief that we are owed attention, respect, success, money, loyalty, recognition or preferential treatment simply because we expect it. Entitlement quietly destroys gratitude.

It makes people focus on what they have not received rather than what they have. It turns relationships into transactions: What have you done for me? What have you given me? What do I get in return?

In marriages, entitlement can turn partnership into scorekeeping. In families, it can create permanent grievances between generations. In organisations, it produces employees who demand rewards without accepting corresponding responsibility and leaders who expect loyalty without demon-

Can We Cure These Social Diseases?

The answer is yes, but there is no medication, app or government programme that can cure them. 5

The cure begins with self-awareness. We must become conscious of our own behaviour before judging the behaviour of others. We must learn to ask ourselves uncomfortable questions:

Am I sufficiently considerate? Do I become jealous of another person’s success? Do people trust me? Do my words heal or hurt? Can I control my emotions when provoked? Am I grateful or perpetually entitled? - These questions belong in our homes, schools and workplaces.

We need to teach Emotional Intelligence as seriously as we teach academic intelligence. Children should learn empathy, listening, conflict resolution, emotional regulation, gratitude and respectful disagreement as fundamental life skills.

Families must create cultures where difficult conversations can take place without humiliation. Couples must learn that winning an argument is often less important than preserving the relationship and parents must model the emotional behaviour they expect from their children.

Organisations, too, must recognise that Emotional Intelligence is not a soft corporate accessory. It is a strategic capability. Leaders who cannot regulate themselves, influenced by rumours, handle disagreement and build trust eventually become liabilities to the organisations they lead.

And perhaps most importantly, we need to rediscover the virtues that modern life is slowly pushing to the margins: kindness, patience, humility, gratitude, restraint, empathy and respect. None of these qualities is old-fashioned.

UNION Civil Aviation Minister Kinjarapu Rammohan Naidu has pitched for direct international air connectivity between Tirupati and destinations like Kuwait, a long-standing demand of people from the region and overseas devotees visiting the temple city.

Despite Tirupati airport being accorded international airport status in June 2017, the pilgrim city has so far remained without a direct international flight connection. A direct service to Kuwait is expected to particularly benefit devotees and residents from the Rayalaseema region who have been seeking easier air

access to the Gulf country.

The minister made the remarks while virtually inaugurating the first flight of regional carrier FLY91 to Tirupati. With its entry into the city, FLY91 has added Tirupati as its 13th destination and its third station in the state. The airline has introduced direct services linking Tirupati with Hyderabad, Vijayawada and Rajahmundry.

The Tirupati-Hyderabad flight will operate daily, while services to Vijayawada will run four days a week on Tuesdays, Thursdays, Saturdays and Sundays. The Rajahmundry service will be available on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. The flight arrives from Hyderabad at 07.40 hrs, departs from Tirupati at 08.05 hrs and reaches Vijayawada at 09.15 hrs and again departs

from Vijayawada at 09.45 hrs and reaches Tirupati at 10.50 hrs. Similarly, the flight arrives from Hyderabad at 7.40 hrs, departs from Tirupati at 8.05 hrs and reaches Rajahmundry at 9.30 hrs and again departs from Rajahmundry at 10.00 hrs and reaches Tirupati at 11.25 hrs. Naidu said improved air connectivity was important for Tirupati, which receives millions of pilgrims every year.

He said efforts were under way to establish direct links with international destinations, including Kuwait, to make travel more convenient for devotees coming from abroad. The Hyderabad connection will provide passengers with access to a major aviation hub and onward links to several domestic and international destinations.

PARIS SPACE SUMMIT

Be co-travellers in our space journey: Modi

NEW DELHI: Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Thursday called for greater international cooperation, sustainability and inclusion in the exploration and use of outer space, saying that the growing number of actors and technologies in space requires collective responsibility. Addressing the first International Space Summit in Paris through video conferencing, PM Modi thanked French President Emmanuel Macron for the invitation and for taking the initiative to convene the summit.

He said space, which had inspired human imagination for centuries, now plays an important role in everyday life, influencing areas ranging from climate and agriculture to oceans and communities. "As orbits become more crowded, technologies more powerful, and actors more numerous, our choices must be clear: cooperation over confrontation; sustainability over short-term gain; and inclusion over exclusion," PM Modi said.

The Prime Minister said India's approach to space cooperation is rooted in the principle of "Vasudhaiva Kutumbakam", or "One Earth, One Family, One Future", and called for the same spirit to extend beyond Earth.

‘Sexual assault’ cases against KTR, Harish Rao

According to the FIR, a 33-year-old Armed Reserve Woman Police Constable (ARWPC) of the CAR Headquarters, Hyderabad, lodged a complaint with the Saifabad Police alleging that she was posted at the Legislative Assembly for bandobast duty at Gate No. 3.

Legislators T Harish Rao, along with K Taraka Rama Rao, D Sudheer Reddy, K P Vivekanand, Gangula Kamalakara, Padi Kaushik Reddy, Naveen Reddy, several other MLCs and their followers, came to Gate No. 3. Some of the MLAs were wearing black T-shirts bearing the slogan, "Congress has failed to implement its promises."

"Harish Rao loudly shouted at the women police on duty, stating, "Are you doing cheap politics by using lady constables as a shield?" At the same time, Taraka Rama Rao also publicly insulted them and loudly shouted, "Who is doing 'Shikhandi politics' by using women as a shield? Who is the local DCP here?" The said remarks were made with the intention of insulting the dignity and self-respect of the women police and intimidating them so as to prevent them from performing their official duties. Harish Rao removed his T-shirt and threw it towards

a police officer and stood semi-naked in front of them. MLC Naveen Reddy, MLA Sudheer Reddy and others, also removed their T-shirts and stood semi-naked at a very close distance from the complainant," said Saifabad Inspector K Nageswara Rao.

The woman police constable also alleged that the legislators, in an aggressive manner and while being semi-naked, shouted, "Where do they keep the women police?" Such conduct was deliberately carried out with the intention of outraging the modesty, dignity, and honour of the women police personnel. They behaved in such a vulgar and indecent manner despite knowing that they were women and were performing official duties.

Their conduct was intended to humiliate, intimidate, and sexually harass them and to prevent them from discharging their lawful duties. The entire incident was recorded by the cameras of various media channels present at the spot. The humiliation, fear, and distress caused to the women police personnel were clearly visible on their faces in the video footage. The complainant alleged in her complaint that the BRS MLAs and MLCs indulged in physically pushing against them amounting

to physical harassment and assault upon them. They deliberately approached them in a semi-naked condition, fully knowing that they were women police personnel on duty and could not leave the place of deployment.

They further attempted to forcibly enter the Assembly premises by pushing and jostling the women police personnel. During this process, they pushed and pressed against the chest area of the women police personnel.

Following the complaint, the Saifabad Police registered cases under section 74 (criminal force against a woman with the intent to outrage her modesty), 75(1) (offence of sexual harassment), 79 (intentionally insult a woman's modesty), 121(1) (voluntarily causing hurt or grievous hurt to a public servant to deter them from performing their official duty), 130 (criminal force), 132 (criminal force used to deter a public servant from discharging their official duty), 296 (speaks obscene words in or near a public place), 351(2) (deals with the punishment for basic criminal intimidation), 352 (intentional insults made with the intent) read with 3(5) (constructive criminal liability for acts done by several persons in furtherance of a common intention) of the BNS.

PRIME LAND SOLD FOR A SONG !

KTR smells a rat in land deal struck with CM Revanth sibling's company

HYDERABAD: Suspended BRS MLAs on Thursday staged a protest at Thukkuguda, alleging that the State government had illegally allocated land to Tesseract, a company linked to Chief Minister A Revanth Reddy's brother, Anumula Kondal Reddy. BRS Working President KT Rama Rao, BRS Deputy Leader T Harish Rao, along with MLAs, MLCs and senior party leaders, visited the site to inspect the land.

KTR alleged that government land worth around Rs 250 crore was allocated to Kondal Reddy for just Rs 7 crore. He questioned how government land could be allotted at such a low price instead of its market value and demanded that the government place complete details of the allocation before the people. He questioned whether granting government land, concessions and exemptions to the Chief Minister's family members amounted to abuse of power, conflict of interest and dynastic rule.

KTR also questioned the government incentives, land and exemptions allegedly granted to a company linked to A Jagadishwar Reddy under a Rs 1,000-crore investment agreement.

S-400, BrahMos on table at Modi-Putin meet

India signed a \$5.43 billion (Rs 40,000 crore) deal with Russia in October 2018 for five S-400 Triumf regiments. Four have already been delivered and are operational. Three squadrons are deployed in Punjab, Rajasthan and the Jammu sector against Pakistan, while one is deployed in the north against China.

The S-400 was credited with a 300+ km intercept -- the longest-ever kill in Operation Sindoor in May 2025 -- taking out a Pakistani AEW&C aircraft

and helping establish air dominance. The fifth and final squadron was delayed due to the Russia-Ukraine war. It is now assured for delivery by November 2026.

Peskov also said the two countries were jointly producing BrahMos missiles and that it was time to consider upgrading them. "We are jointly producing the BrahMos missiles, and it is time to think about improving those missiles, adding some additional characteristics, making them more competitive in

the market and more effective," he said.

The BrahMos-NG (Next Generation) is a lighter 1.3-tonne missile compared with the 2.9-tonne BrahMos. It is smaller, has a speed of Mach 3.5 and a range of 400 km-plus, and can be carried by Tejas and MiG-29 fighter jets -- allowing six to seven missiles per fighter compared with one on the Su-30MKI at present.

Russia still accounts for 40% of India's arms imports for the 2021-25 period, down from 51%.

It's certain: Xi to visit India for BRICS Summit

"I have no information to provide regarding the question you raised," Guo Jiakun replied to a question on if the Chinese leader will be travelling to India this weekend to attend the BRICS leaders' meeting. The high-stakes visit marks Xi's first visit to India in seven years, following a chill in bilateral relations after the 2020 Galwan Valley border clashes that killed 20 Indians and an unknown number of Chinese soldiers. The last time Xi visited India was in 2019 for an informal summit with Prime Minister Narendra Modi in Mamallapuram near Chennai. Xi had first come to India in September 2014 when it was the first terms of both the leaders in office and had later visited Goa in 2016 to attend the BRICS summit. Bilateral ties between the two nations have improved in recent years, especially since PM Modi visited China last year and as both nations grapple with volatile relationships with the US. New Delhi has since then eased some of the restrictions on Chinese investment that it imposed following the 2020 clashes, focusing on electronics, capital goods, and solar cell sectors.

India pushes Global South priorities amid trade tensions

As global trade disputes and geopolitical realignments create economic headwinds, India is looking at addressing critical vulnerabilities in food security, energy stability and resilient supply chains, they said.

The summit in New Delhi is taking place against the backdrop of a global economy facing the adverse impacts of the Russia-Ukraine war, the West Asia crisis, especially the blockade of the Strait of Hormuz, and the Trump administration's trade and tariff policies.

With just a day left before the summit, it remains unclear whether the member nations

of the grouping have reached a consensus on a joint statement, as differences between Iran and the United Arab Emirates (UAE) over the West Asia crisis persist. The grouping operates under a framework of consensus.

BRICS, originally comprising Brazil, Russia, India, China and South Africa, expanded in 2024 to include Egypt, Ethiopia, Iran, the United Arab Emirates and Saudi Arabia, with Indonesia joining in 2025.

Belarus, Bolivia, Kazakhstan, Cuba, Malaysia, Nigeria, Thailand, Uganda, Uzbekistan and Vietnam became BRICS partner countries last year.

BRICS has emerged as an in-

fluent grouping as it brings together 11 major emerging economies of the world, representing around 49.5 per cent of the global population, around 40 per cent of the global GDP and around 26 per cent of global trade.

India's chairship of the grouping is centred on four pillars: resilience, innovation, cooperation and sustainability. In addition to these areas, the leaders will exchange views on strengthening intra-BRICS cooperation on common priorities and share perspectives on global and regional matters of mutual importance, according to the Ministry of External Affairs (MEA).

Bank strike today

The latest conciliation talks were held at the office of the chief labour commissioner (central), with representatives of the UFBU, Indian Banks' Association (IBA), Department of Financial Services (DFS) and labour authorities.

The DFS representative appealed to the bank unions to reconsider the strike call in view of the BRICS Leaders' Summit during 11-13 September in New Delhi. The unions, however, maintained that they could not defer the strike in the absence of a favourable decision or a definite timeline for implementation of the five-day work week.

"Two rounds of online meetings were held today. There has been no concrete outcome on the five-day work week. The strike stands," said Rupam Roy, general secretary, All India Bank Officers' Confederation (AIBOC).

The September 11 action is the first in a wider programme announced by the UFBU.

The unions have also called a three-day nationwide strike during September 28-30 and have announced an indefinite strike from October 26 if their demands remain unresolved.

Of these, five key projects related to Telangana, along with Andhra Pradesh, Tamil Nadu, and Karnataka, were approved with an investment of Rs. 10,021 crore. These projects will develop a total of 540 km of railway line.

The Secunderabad-Ghatkesar-Kazipet route is like the lifeblood of the Telangana railway system. Implementing multi-tracking on this route will reduce train congestion and improve passenger services. Freight transport will be faster, directly benefiting Telangana

industries, farmers, traders, and youth. This decision reflects Prime Minister Modi's vision of a developed India and a developed Telangana. These projects, designed in line with the PM Gati Shakti National Master Plan, will strengthen connectivity among road, rail, industries and markets. This will help reduce transportation costs and make supply chains more efficient.

Dr Laxman said, "The Modi government at the Centre is not limited to words, but is setting the direction for the develop-

ment of the states with huge infrastructure investments. I am grateful to the Prime Minister and the Central Railways for further strengthening railway connectivity in line with the aspirations of the people of Telangana."

The project, targeted for completion by 2029-30, will connect Telangana with national freight and industrial corridors.

Earlier, Union Minister G Kishan Reddy welcomed the decision and said freight trains will also reach their destinations faster, saving fuel and reducing freight

charges. This multi-tracking railway line can transport an additional 9.83 million tonnes of freight per year. This will enable the transport of 7.06 million tonnes of coal, 0.73 million tonnes of iron ore, 0.65 million tonnes of food grains and 0.13 million tonnes of cement. The railway line, to be made available between Secunderabad and Kazipet, will also pave the way for better rail travel on the Vijayawada and Mumbai routes.

Thanking PM Modi and Railway Minister Ashwini Vaishnaw for approving the

project, Kishan Reddy said he was happy about the approval for the construction of the multi-tracking railway line between Secunderabad and Kazipet. He said that after the formation of Telangana state, the railway budget allocations have increased 21 times over the last 12 years; with Rs. 36,286 crores being allocated to Telangana. In addition, he said Telangana currently has railway projects worth about Rs. 50,000 crores under construction, and a final location survey is underway for railway projects worth another Rs. 50,000 crores.

DGCA orders drug test for all pilots

NEW DELHI: After the captain of an Air India flight that was involved in a sudden altitude loss incident last month tested positive for drug use, aviation safety regulator Directorate General of Civil Aviation (DGCA) ordered all Indian airlines to conduct a one-time test for psychoactive substances on all their pilots by July next year, according to sources.

Indian airlines are estimated to have close to 14,000

pilots. Following the incident that involved a Phuket-Delhi flight, and before the DGCA ordered tests for all pilots across airlines, the Air India group had voluntarily initiated one-time random drug tests on the about 5,000 pilots employed by Air India and Air India Express.

Moreover, the draft of the new and likely more stringent norms on testing aviation personnel for psychoactive substance use is likely

to be related by the DGCA by month-end, according to Civil Aviation Minister K Rammohan Naidu. Last month, Naidu had said that the Ministry of Civil Aviation (MoCA) suggested to DGCA that all pilots should undergo a dope test once a year, against the current regulation that requires 10% of the pilots to undergo random testing annually.

According to sources, while the DGCA was already

in the process of revising the regulations pertaining to testing of aviation personnel for psychoactive substances, the Air India incident led to calls for more stringent drug testing protocol and stricter disciplinary action in proven instances of drug abuse.

Even as consultations for revising the rules were on, the regulator decided to put all airline pilots through a one-time drug test over the course of nearly 12 months.

Court frames charges against Lalu, family under PMLA act

While framing the charges,

the court said that Lalu Prasad Yadav, the then Railway Minister, fixed a tender of an IRCTC hotel in favour of his favourite company in lieu of a land Parcel. The Land at Patna was described as proceeds of crime by the ED. The court also said that it did not find that the investigation against Lalu Prasad Yadav was motivated by political vendetta.

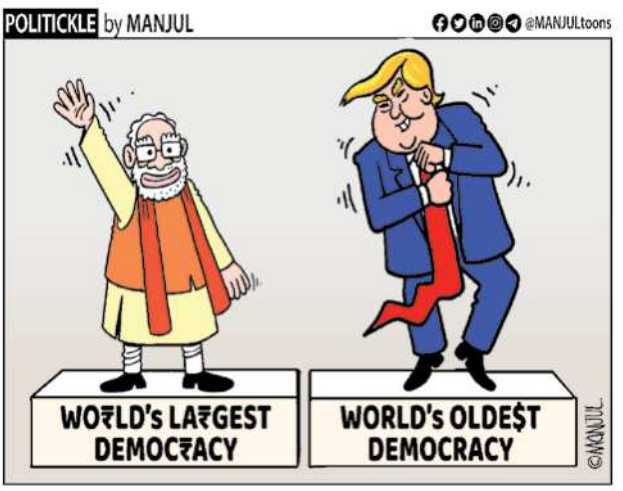

Design may attract attention, but usefulness often decides what a woman takes home.

This is especially clear among women who want to wear sarees beyond major weddings. They are buying them for office celebrations, family lunches, religious occasions, festive dinners and smaller functions.

A beautiful saree that needs constant adjusting will not serve all these settings. Its weight, fall, softness and breathability matter. Even when choosing silk, customers pay attention to how comfortably they can carry it for several hours.

The consumer is also better informed. Terms such as "pure silk" or "traditional weave" are no longer enough on their own. Shoppers want clear information about the fabric, weaving style, zari, care requirements and price. When considering a Kanchi pattu or Mysore silk saree, they want to understand what distinguishes it from others.

guishes it and why that difference matters. This does not weaken the appeal of heritage. It allows women to appreciate the craft while knowing exactly what they are paying for.

Versatility also enters the decision. Many women consider the blouse, jewellery and future occasions before finalising a saree. They want to know whether it can be styled differently for a family wedding, a festival or a formal event. Versatility does not mean choosing something plain. It means selecting a saree that leaves room for personal styling and does not become limited to a single photograph or occasion.

The way women shop has changed as well. A saree may first catch their attention on Instagram, but the decision depends on accurate colours, close-up visuals and useful product details. Inside a store, customers value someone who understands the occasion, explains the options and respects the stated budget. Good service is not about presenting the largest number of sarees. It is about helping the customer make a choice she will remain satisfied with.

Perhaps the most important shift is that more women are choosing sarees for themselves. Family traditions and recommendations still carry meaning, but the final choice is increasingly personal. One woman may choose a classic silk because it reminds her of her mother. Another may pick an unexpected colour simply because it feels right on her. The saree is not being worn only to meet an expectation. It is being used to express individual taste.

For a saree brand, these changes affect everything from product selection to customer service. Visual appeal still opens the conversation, but comfort, authenticity, rewear value, styling freedom and honest guidance complete the purchase.

The new Indian saree consumer is not moving away from tradition. She simply expects it to fit the way she lives now. When a saree feels right, wears well and is explained honestly, she has a reason to return.

Through such presentations, we hope to inspire the present generation and future generations to remain connected with our traditions, culture and Sanatana Dharma."

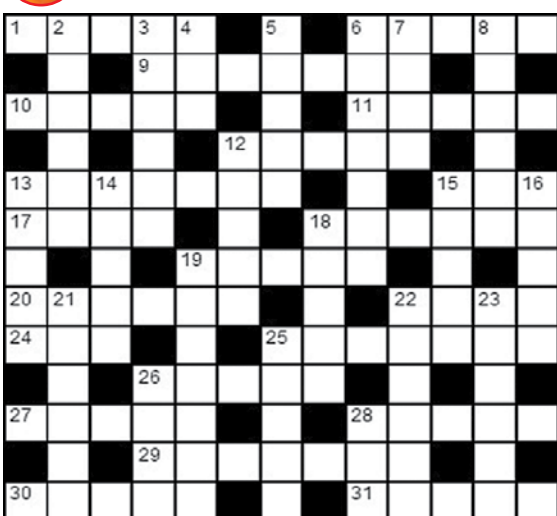

Brent crosses \$105 on Iran war, Saudi output slump

PROLONGED CONFLICT RAISES FRESH FEARS OF ENERGY-DRIVEN INFLATION

NEW DELHI

BRENT crude oil prices climbed above \$105 a barrel on Thursday, reaching their highest level since May 25, as renewed fighting between the US and Iran raised concerns over prolonged disruptions to global energy supplies. Strong Chinese buying and a sharp decline in Saudi Arabia's oil output added further momentum to the rally.

Brent crude futures were up 2.63 per cent at \$104 a barrel at 5:55 pm IST, extending a rally that pushed the global benchmark above the \$100 mark in the previous session for the first time since July. The latest surge has renewed fears that a prolonged conflict in the Middle East could fuel energy-driven inflation, with natural gas and diesel prices also rising sharply.

The conflict has intensified over the past week after



a period of relative calm, with little indication of an immediate de-escalation. A senior Iranian official said Tehran has no intention of backing down in the face of a US naval blockade and would escalate attacks if Washington continues striking Iranian territory.

US President Donald Trump has also indicated that the conflict could continue until after the November midterm elections, while warning that significant relief in gasoline prices may not come before

then. The comments have reinforced expectations that the conflict, now in its seventh month, could continue to exert pressure on energy markets.

Brent prices have risen about 30 per cent from lows recorded in early August after efforts to secure a permanent agreement between the US and Iran to halt attacks failed to materialise. Fighting resumed later in August, adding to concerns over the security of crude supplies from the Gulf region.

Rupee sinks deeper as oil shock returns

MUMBAI: The rupee depreciated 38 paise to close at 95.46 (provisional) against the US dollar on Thursday, as Brent crude breached the USD 102 threshold, mounting concerns over the country's import cost trajectory.

Forex traders said the currency is currently facing opposing forces, with downside pressure driven by a resumption of foreign portfolio outflows, following positive flows in July and August and crude oil trading above USD 102 per barrel. At the interbank foreign exchange market, the rupee opened at 95.15 against the US dollar, then lost ground to close at 95.46 (provisional) against the



American currency, registering a loss of 38 paise from its previous close. On Wednesday, the rupee slumped 34 paise to close at 95.08 against the American currency.

"The rupee has depreciated back towards 95.45, and it is important to understand that this is an oil-driven move rather than a dollar move, since the dollar itself is at multi-month lows," said Anindya Banerjee, Head of Commodity and Currency Research, Kotak Securities.

iPhones get sharply costlier in India, prices rise up to 41%

NEW DELHI

APPLE has raised the prices of its iPhone lineup in India, with increases of up to 40.6 per cent, amid rising memory costs, a weaker rupee and higher domestic production expenses.

The iPhone 17 256GB variant is now priced at Rs 99,900, up from Rs 82,900 earlier, an increase of Rs 17,000 or 20.5 per cent. The 512GB variant is priced at Rs 1,24,900, up Rs 22,000 or 21.4 per cent.

The iPhone 18 Pro starts at Rs 1,64,900, 22 per cent higher than the iPhone 17 Pro, while the iPhone 18 Pro Max starts at Rs 1,79,900, up 20 per cent.

The steepest increase is for the 1TB iPhone Air, whose price has risen 40.6 per cent to Rs 2,24,900 from Rs 1,59,900. The 256GB and 512GB iPhone Air variants have also become 25 per cent more expensive.

The iPhone 17e now starts at Rs 79,900, up 23.1 per cent, while the 128GB iPhone 16 has risen 28.6 per cent to Rs 89,900.

The price increases for Apple's Pro models are significantly higher in India than in several major markets. In the US, the iPhone 18 Pro and Pro Max prices have risen 9 per cent and 8 per cent, respectively.

According to Tarun Pathak, Research Director at Counterpoint Research, iPhone prices have increased 20-30 per cent in India, compared with a global average of 8-10 per cent. He attributed the increase to memory costs, rupee weakness and higher domestic production costs.

Pathak said the iPhone Duo could face a 20 per cent import duty because it is not locally assembled.

Prabhu Ram of CyberMedia Research said the Rs 2,99,900 iPhone Duo establishes an uber-premium tier above the Pro series and is likely to remain a halo product initially. Foldables currently account for less than 1 per cent of smartphone shipments.



Talent shortage, not funding, biggest hurdle for defence startups: Apollyon

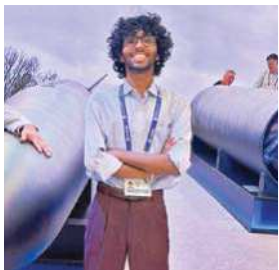
Hyderabad startup says specialised skills are harder to find than capital

INDIA'S rapidly expanding defence tech ecosystem may be attracting more capital and institutional support, but finding people capable of building highly specialised systems is emerging as a bigger challenge for young companies, according to Hyderabad-based defence startup Apollyon Dynamics.

"For us, capital has not been as big a challenge as hiring specialised talent," Apollyon Co-Founder Jayant Khatri said. "Building groundbreaking technology requires people with very specific skills, and finding that talent, especially for the defence space, is difficult because there is still a significant skill gap," he said.

The observation comes as Apollyon, founded in May 2025 by Khatri and Sourya Choudhary while they were completing their degrees at BITS Pilani Hyderabad, has moved rapidly from student



built prototypes to systems supporting the Indian Army. The startup says it secured its first deployment in Jammu within seven months of incorporation and its systems now support the Army at eight stations, including Chandimandir, Ranchi, Secunderabad and Arunachal Pradesh.

Its portfolio has also expanded from FPV drones and field support systems to more complex platforms, including the Ahuti electric interceptor and the Nightshade family of jet powered uncrewed aircraft.

That technological progression, however, has made specialised manpower increasingly critical. "Our biggest competitive edge is our team of young, hungry and ambitious builders who are willing to solve hard problems," Khatri said. But building such a workforce is not straightforward. Training engineers to work on highly specialised defence and aerospace systems takes considerable time, while the pool of people with experience across areas such as high performance propulsion, autonomous systems, embedded electronics and advanced airframes remains limited, he pointed out. "Training people to work on highly specialised systems also takes time, so building and retaining that team has been one of our biggest challenges, but also one of the most important things we have invested in early on," he said.

Khatri is currently in Poland attending MSPO, the International Defence Industry Exhibition in Kielce, one

of Europe's major defence industry events. The exhibition brings together defence companies, armed forces and technology providers from across the world, giving Indian startups an opportunity to engage with global players and study emerging technologies and potential partnerships.

For Apollyon, the international exposure comes as it looks to build capabilities beyond individual products and develop a larger technology and engineering base.

As funding and military demand improve, the ability to find, train and retain specialised engineering talent could determine how quickly startups move from promising prototypes to deployable systems.

For young companies working across drones, autonomous systems, propulsion and advanced aerospace platforms, access to specialised manpower could increasingly become as important as access to capital.

Govt cracks down on fake discounts and search manipulation

NEW DELHI

THE government has amended the Consumer Protection (E-Commerce) Rules, 2020, to tighten norms on price transparency, sponsored listings, search result manipulation and dark patterns, the Department of Consumer Affairs said on Thursday.

The Consumer Protection (E-Commerce) (Amendment) Rules, 2026, will come into force from January 1, 2027.

Under the new rules, e-commerce entities must disclose both the reduced price and "prior price" whenever a discount is announced. The prior price will be the lowest price at which the product was offered during the 30 days preceding the discount.

Platforms will be barred from manipulating search results in ways that mislead



consumers or affect the relevance of results. Sponsored listings must carry clear and prominent disclosures.

E-commerce entities will also have to comply with the Guidelines for Prevention and Regulation of Dark Patterns, 2023, conduct an annual self-audit and display a certificate of compliance.

They must become partners in the National Consumer Helpline's convergence process. The NCH received 17,71,622 grievances in 2025, with 5,11,196, or about 29 per cent, related to e-commerce. Every entity must provide complainants a copy of complaints recorded by its grievance officer.

New-age economy poised to hit \$300 bn by FY31

NEW DELHI

INDIA'S new-age economy is projected to triple to USD 300 billion in revenue by financial year 2030-31, closely approaching the scale of the country's IT services sector, according to a report by Redseer Strategy Consultants.

A new-age economy is driven by AI, knowledge capital, and digital innovation. The combined revenue of domestic new-age companies is estimated to rise from USD 33 billion in FY22 to around USD 100 billion in FY26, before growing at 25 per cent annually to touch the USD 300-billion mark by FY31, the report noted.

According to Redseer, consumption-led sectors comprising consumer goods, retail, and leisure will remain the cornerstone of this expansion, growing at 25 per cent annually to reach USD 150 billion by FY31 and accounting for nearly half of the



overall market. Meanwhile, emerging technology sectors such as technology, media, and telecom (TMT), artificial intelligence (AI), and advanced manufacturing are projected to grow at 26 per cent annually.

On operational performance, the report highlighted that the collective profit pool turned positive in FY25, staging a turnaround to USD 1.4 billion. However, profitability remains heavily concentrated. "BFSI alone is 140 per cent of the FY25 pool; take it out and every other sector put together is still loss-making," the report stated, adding that a USD 300-billion top line by FY31 implies a total profit pool of USD 5-10 billion (2 to 3 per cent margin), compared

to 12-18 per cent for listed FMCG firms and 20-25 per cent for IT services. The report also pointed out that the time required for consumer goods brands to achieve scale has significantly compressed. Owing to the rapid expansion of direct-to-consumer (D2C) channels and quick commerce, the average time taken to reach Rs 100 crore in revenue fell from 6.8 years for brands in 2016 to 3.4 years for the 2020 cohort. Similarly, the time to hit Rs 500 crore halved from 7.9 years to 4 years. Redseer expects the number of new-age consumer brands with revenues above Rs 100 crore to surge from roughly 90 in FY22 and 230 in FY26 to approximately 500 by FY31. However, scaling beyond the "Rs 500-crore wall" remains a key hurdle due to the requirement of building deep offline distribution networks, modern trade capabilities, and working capital infrastructure.

Equity MF inflows jump 19% to ₹29,329 crore

NEW DELHI

EQUITY mutual fund schemes attracted Rs 29,329 crore in August, their highest net inflow in four months, as investors continued to favour mid- and small-cap funds despite market volatility.

According to data released by the Association of Mutual Funds in India (AMFI) on Thursday, equity inflows rose nearly 19 per cent from Rs 24,697 crore in July.

Retail participation through systematic investment plans (SIPs) also remained strong, with monthly contributions touching a record Rs 32,297 crore in August, compared with Rs 31,961 crore in July and Rs 28,265 crore in August 2025. Cumulative SIP collections in the first five months of the current financial year stood at around Rs 1.6 lakh crore.

The overall mutual fund industry, however, saw net inflows fall sharply to Rs 41,353 crore in August from Rs 2.36 lakh crore in July,



mainly due to a reversal in debt-oriented schemes.

Debt schemes recorded a net outflow of Rs 8,127 crore in August against an inflow of Rs 1.88 lakh crore in July.

Assets under management of the mutual fund industry rose 1.5 per cent to about Rs 87.08 lakh crore at the end of August from Rs 85.76 lakh crore in July. Small-cap funds attracted the highest equity inflows at Rs 7,973 crore, followed by mid-cap funds at Rs 6,989 crore and flexi-cap funds at Rs 5,059 crore. Large-cap funds, however, saw a net outflow of Rs 1,147 crore. "Since the market bottomed in March, mid- and small-caps have led the rally, while large caps have remained laggards," said Santhosh Joseph, CEO, Germinate Investor Services.



AHF Junior Asia Cup 2026

Indian women demolish Pak 19-0, storm into semis

MOQI (CHINA): India produced one of the most emphatic victories of the 2026 Women's Junior Asia Cup, dismantling Pakistan 19-0 in their quarterfinal on Thursday to move within two wins of a third successive continental title.

The defending champions needed only seven minutes to break the deadlock, with Puja Sahoo finding the net. Roshni Aind doubled the advantage two minutes later, and what followed was a relentless Indian assault that left Pakistan struggling to contain the pace and frequency of attacks.

India added four more goals in the next five minutes. Tanushree Dinesh Kadu and Sukhveer Kaur struck in the 11th and 13th minutes respectively, with Sanika Chandrakant Mane also scoring in the 13th minute. Madhu Sidar and Geeta Yadav then extended the advantage before Mane returned to score her second in the 23rd minute. Tanuja Toppo and Pooja Malik completed India's first-half scoring, while Purnima Yadav's 33rd-minute goal ensured the team went into the interval with a staggering



10-0 lead. There was no let-up after the restart. Madhu Sidar scored again in the 39th minute before Supriya opened her account a minute later. Malik then took centre stage, scoring in the 49th and 51st minutes to complete her hat-trick. Krishna Sharma and Binima Dhan added further goals as India continued to pile on the pressure. Supriya struck again in the 54th minute, while Roshni capped the extraordinary performance with her second goal in the final minute of the match.

The 19-goal haul came after India had already demonstrated their strength during the group stage, finishing top after victories over Japan, Malaysia and South Korea.

India will now await the winner of the South Korea-Malay-

sia quarterfinal for their semi-final clash. The result leaves the reigning champions just two victories away from a hat-trick of Junior Women's Asia Cup crowns, having lifted the trophy in 2023 and 2024.

For Pakistan, meanwhile, the quarterfinal turned into a one-sided contest almost from the outset, with India's sustained attacking pressure producing goals across all four quarters.

NEW DELHI: The Supreme Court on Thursday sought responses from the Uttar Pradesh government and others on a plea challenging the validity of certain provisions of a 1980 Act which provide for pension and other facilities to sitting and former MLAs and MLCs of the state.

A bench of Justices Vikram Nath and Sandeep Mehta agreed to hear the plea which challenged a verdict of the Lucknow bench of the Allahabad High Court in May this year. The high court had dismissed the plea challenging the constitutional validity of certain provisions of the Uttar Pradesh State Legislature (Members' Emoluments and Pension) Act, 1980.

The high court had noted that apparently these provisions confer upon sitting and former MLAs and MLCs a range of salary, allowances and other facilities, and further extend pension, family pension, free travel, medical facilities and other amenities to their spouse, family members and companion.

The top court issued notice on the petition challenging the high court verdict and posted it for hearing after four weeks. The petitioner 'Lok Prahari' had moved the high court contending that the state legislature has, in effect, made itself the "judge in its own cause" and showered benefits upon itself and its former members in a manner that is "manifestly arbitrary" and contrary to the basic constitutional idea that a public office is meant for public service and not for personal gain. "The core grievance of the writ petitioner is that all these provisions travel far beyond the limited power conferred by Article 195 of the Constitution of India, which speaks only of 'salary and allowances' to 'members' and makes no mention of pension, post-retirement benefits, facilities to family/companion or 'other facilities,'" the high court had noted. Article 195 of the Constitution deals with salaries and allowances of members of the Legislative Assembly and Legislative Council of a state.

The high court had observed that the challenge mounted by the petitioner was essentially rooted in a policy disagreement rather than any demonstrable Constitutional infirmity.

Suicide of MPSC aspirant It's a murder by system: Dipke

DHARASHIV: Cockroach Janata Party (CJP) founder Abhijeet Dipke on Thursday termed the suicide of MPSC aspirant Prathamesh Deshmukh as a "murder done by the system", and said the government should ensure that incidents like this do not happen again.

He also said that people were demanding reservation as the government has completely failed in providing quality education and jobs to the youth.

Deshmukh (28), who was preparing for the Maharashtra Public Service Commission (MPSC) examinations allegedly died by suicide in Pune with a note left behind by him mentioning that he had a debt of around Rs 2.5 lakh. He was a native of Paranda in Dharashiv, and was staying in a rented accommodation in Navi Peth area while preparing for competitive exams.

Dipke on Thursday visited Khasapuri village in Dharashiv and met Deshmukh's grieving family members.

Talking to reporters later, Dipke said Deshmukh went to Pune with a dream to get a job and take his family out



of poverty. "He borrowed money from friends to meet his expenses. But due to paper leaks and delayed results, pressure mounted on students. This (Deshmukh's suicide) is system's fault and it is a murder done by the system," he alleged.

Deshmukh took the extreme step as he was fed up with the system, unemployment and financial condition of youth in rural areas, the CJP convenor said.

"Prathamesh stayed in Pune and used to have a meal only once a day due to his financial condition. According to his mother, Prathamesh used to say that he would come home in a government car, but unfortunately he was brought here in an ambulance yesterday. His father has already passed away,"

Dipke said.

The MPSC aspirants from the rural areas face a challenge of meeting their expenses in a city like Pune, he added.

"He (Deshmukh) had borrowed Rs 2 lakh to Rs 2.5 lakh from his friends...A youth had to end his life for this much amount. This is the condition of our youth in rural areas because there is no employment," he said.

"Prathamesh was preparing for MPSC exams and we all know what is happening in the MPSC. Exams are not conducted properly, the results are improper and paper leaks also take place. How will the youth from rural areas survive in a city like Pune? How will they pay the money required for library, food, rent and coaching? This

is a question that haunts the youth from rural areas," he said.

"Prathamesh left the village with a dream to become an officer, then how can he return without cracking the exams? For this, he did everything that he could. He stayed there (in Pune) for four years by curtailing his expenses. There are thousands of youths like him," he said.

Talking about the quota issue, Dipke claimed that since people have lost faith in the government they were asking for a constitutional remedy.

"The government cannot give good facilities. If they get good facilities, good schools and education and opportunities, why would anyone ask for reservation? People are asking for reservation because the government has completely failed in giving quality education and providing jobs. People have lost faith in the government so they are seeking constitutional remedies," he said.

Dipke also said the CJP earlier only supported the agitation by the MPSC aspirants, but now it will also get involved in the agitation.

Keralam minister calls for action to curb organ trade

'Practical decisions needed in transplant cases'

THIRUVANANTHAPURAM: Keralam Minister K Muralaeeharan on Thursday said organ trading must be strictly prevented, but stressed that appeal committees should take practical decisions to protect patients' lives when transplantation applications are rejected.

In a Facebook post, the state Health minister said legal experts on the appeal committees should pay particular attention to the issue while examining applications for organ transplantation.

He was speaking after inaugurating 'Smriti Vandhanam 2026', organised by the Kerala State Organ and Tissue Transplant Organisation to remember deceased organ donors and honour their family members.

The minister honoured the families of 39 deceased donors who donated organs between August 2025 and August 2026.

"Organ trading must be strictly prevented. At the same time, when appeal committees reject applications, legal experts should ensure that the patient's life



is not put at risk and that practical decisions are taken to save the patient's life," he said.

Muralaeeharan described the families of organ donors as an unparalleled example to society, saying they had come forward to help save other lives despite the immense grief caused by the loss of their loved ones.

"The pain of losing a loved one, especially a child, is unbearable. That families come forward to make such a sacrifice for another life even in such moments of intense grief is a noble act that must not go unrecognised by society," the minister added.

'Chhatron Ki Goonj' in Indore on Sept 19

NEW DELHI: Congress leader Rahul Gandhi on Thursday announced that his fifth edition of the Chhatron ki Goonj initiative will be held in Madhya Pradesh's Indore on September 19 and asserted that it is essential to hear the voice of every student in the country to change the system.

Gandhi has held four Chhatron ki Goonj events in Kota, Dehradun, Prayagraj and Pune. The last one in

Pune on August 22 was for girl students.

In a post in Hindi on X, Gandhi said, "My dear students, youth and India's Gen Z, the entire country is watching with you as today a broken education system has extinguished the flame of your hopes and pushed your future into darkness."

"Through Chhatron ki Goonj, I am meeting you in different cities to understand your challenges. As part of

this campaign, on September 19, I will once again be among you in Indore," the leader of opposition (LoP) in the Lok Sabha said.

But to change this system, it is essential to hear the voice of every student in the country, their pain and their opinion, he said.

"Go to the link below and tell us — what is stopping you from achieving your dreams? You can also reach us by making a video.

"Your problems. Your suggestions. Together, we will bring hope back," Gandhi said and shared the link for feedback of students.

In a video along with the post, Gandhi said the idea behind the Chhatron ki Goonj programme is to listen to what the students and the country feel and to allow students to express themselves.

"The objective of the Chhatron ki Goonj programme is to keep before



the country your thoughts, expression and fears. And also raise the issues that our students want raised," he said in the video.

He urged students to convey what needs to be done to restore hope among students in India's education system.

Jailed Hindu leader gets parole for mother's funeral

DHAKA: Bangladesh authorities on Thursday granted five-hour parole to jailed Hindu rights leader Chinmoy Krishna Das to attend his mother's funeral, local media reported.

The Hindu monk was arrested in November 2024 on sedition charges for allegedly disrespecting the national flag, which sparked protests and communal tensions.

Chattogram District Deputy Commissioner (DC) Mohammad Zahidul Islam Mia ordered the Hindu



leader's release on Thursday afternoon following an application from his family, The Daily Star newspaper reported.

Chinmoy's mother, Sandhya Rani Dhar, 70, was undergoing treatment at a hos-

pital in Hathazari and died early morning on Thursday.

"Following an application by his brother over the death of his mother, we have passed an order to release Chinmoy Krishna from jail on parole for five hours in accordance with the law," the newspaper quoted DC Zahidul Islam Mia as saying.

Swatantra Gauranga Das Brahmachari, vice-president of ISKCON's Prabartak Sri Krishna Temple, confirmed the decision, bdnews24.com news portal reported.

THE coalition government is committed to finding a permanent solution to long-pending land disputes in Andhra Pradesh and ensuring full ownership rights to landholders, revenue minister Anagani Satya Prasad said.

Addressing the Collectors' Conference at the Secretariat here on Thursday, the minister said registration would be allowed for 9 lakh acres of freehold land that had been found compliant with the prescribed rules under the

previous government. However, a decision on another 4 lakh acres, where irregularities have been identified, would be taken after a detailed inquiry, he said.

The minister said 28 lakh acres had already been removed from the prohibited 22-A list.

The government had issued GO No. 444 to simplify the process of removing land from the 22-A list. Of the 28,790 acres for which applications had been received under the new procedure, 1,100 acres had already been removed from the prohibited list, while decisions on

the remaining applications would be taken soon. Under GO No. 445, whenever private land is proposed to be included in the 22-A prohibited list, the concerned official would have to establish the nature and status of the land, he said.

The Minister warned that

strict action would be taken against officials who include private lands in the prohibited list in violation of the rules.

He said ownership rights had been restored to thousands of people in several long-pending cases, including Vatticherukuru,

Shettipalli, Pulladigunta, Kangundi, Avulapalli and Gootupalli, besides four areas in Konaseema district. In the Kaikaluru constituency, more than 2,000 acres in four villages had also been removed from the prohibited list following the initiative of the local MLA.

The minister said the government was implementing the 'Mee Bhoomi - Blockchain Technology' project to provide a permanent solution to land-related issues and directed Collectors to continuously monitor its implementation.

He also said Re-Survey 2.0 was being carried out efficiently to avoid the mistakes of the previous government.

While expressing satisfaction over growing public confidence in the Survey Department, he directed officials to ensure that the re-survey was conducted with 100 per cent accuracy.

Naidu's 'silent revolution' in irrigation: Keshav

FINANCE minister Payyavula Kesav said a 'silent revolution' was underway in the state's irrigation sector under the leadership of Chief Minister N Chandrababu Naidu, aimed at ensuring water security for every farmer and every family in the state.

Addressing the Collectors Conference on Thursday, Kesav said the Chief Minister's commitment to the irrigation sector had resulted in the launching of the Handri-Neeva project and the release



of water from the Polavaram Left Main Canal. Ministers and district Collectors gave a standing ovation to Chandrababu Naidu in recognition of his efforts towards strengthening irrigation infrastructure. Kesav said while the completion and launching of major irrigation projects were visible to everyone, the relentless efforts of the Chief Minister, who worked day and night to push forward several projects, often went unnoticed.

He said Chandrababu Naidu was the first to introduce drip irrigation in the State. The cost of drip irrigation, which was earlier around Rs 16 per metre, had now come down to Rs 1.60 per metre. This had made drip

irrigation more accessible to farmers and turned it into a major boon for horticulture in the Rayalaseema region, helping create greater wealth for farmers. The finance minister recalled that several political parties and individuals had initially opposed the Pattiseema Lift Irrigation Project. However, the project was now playing a crucial role in stabilising the Krishna delta ayacut. He said around 500 TMC ft of water had been diverted to the Krishna river through Pattiseema, equivalent to filling the Prakasam Barrage nearly 200 times.

Kesav said the Chief Minister's commitment to irrigation development had also received national recognition, with a leading English daily describing Chandrababu Naidu as a 'CEO CM' and a 'water man'. Thanking the ministers and collectors for the recognition, Chandrababu Naidu said it was the collective responsibility of everyone to ensure water security for all people and all regions of Andhra Pradesh.

State uses GST data for real-time economic tracking

- Manufacturing GVA estimated at ₹1.75 lakh cr, with 19.6% growth till July

ANDHRA Pradesh is leveraging GST and commercial taxes data to develop a real-time mechanism to assess economic activity and estimate Gross Value Added (GVA) across key sectors, commercial taxes department chief commissioner Babu A said. Addressing the 8th Collectors' Conference, Babu said the GST-based assessment of manufacturing activity indicated 19.6 per cent year-on-year growth up to July, compared with about 18 per cent growth recorded up to the first quarter. The estimated manufacturing GVA stood at around Rs 1.75 lakh crore.

He said the GST-based estimate was closely aligned with the planning department's first advance estimates, which are based on sample surveys, with a variation of only about 0.6 percentage points. The close correlation demonstrated the potential of GST data for real-time economic assessment, he said.

The commercial taxes department has developed an AI-based analytical methodology to calculate GVA

using GST data generated by manufacturing units. E-way bill data is also incorporated to improve accuracy by tracking the movement of goods into and out of the State.

The platform provides district-wise heat maps of manufacturing activity and enables collectors to drill down to individual manufacturing units, including their declared value and contribution to the sector.

Babu said GST returns, largely filed between the 18th and 20th of every month, could provide an early indication of economic activity in the preceding month, paving the way for monthly "now-casting" of economic growth. A similar methodology has been developed for the construction sector using GST data from around 65 relevant HSN categories, including cement, iron and steel. The estimated construction GVA was around Rs 1.25 lakh crore, against Rs 1.29 lakh crore estimated by the Planning Department, a variation of about 3.2 per cent.

Real-time assessments have

also been undertaken for trade, hotels and restaurants, real estate, communication and broadcasting, while work is underway to cover mining and electricity. Babu said GST and commercial taxes data would also help create a comprehensive database of MSMEs. Data relating to around 20.08 lakh MSMEs has been identified, including about 2.42 lakh in the GSTN system. To cover enterprises outside the GST network, the department is integrating GST information with electricity consumption data and NIC codes. The State Data Lake provides access to around 1.7 crore electricity connections, enabling officials to assess economic activity even among MSMEs not covered by GST turnover data.

He said around 1.21 lakh GST-linked MSMEs were currently inactive, with no reported turnover. District administrations would be able to identify such units and examine the reasons for their inactivity. The system will enable collectors to analyse activity down to the district, mandal and enterprise levels, helping identify businesses and sectors requiring intervention and potential revival. Babu said Andhra Pradesh's GST-based approach had also received appreciation at a national-level MSME coordination meeting in New Delhi.

Focus on infra projects, clear land acquisition

THE state government is focusing on completing major infrastructure projects within stipulated timelines to strengthen investment and economic growth, infrastructure and investments department secretary Kona Sasidhar said at the Collectors'



Conference on Thursday.

He directed collectors to prioritise land acquisition, land transfer, legal cases, local clearances and inter-departmental coordination to speed up project execution. Land acquisition and alienation covering 25,662 acres for ports, fishing harbours, fish landing centres and airports are

to be expedited. The government is developing greenfield ports, fishing harbours and shipbuilding facilities. The targeted completion dates are March 2027 for Ramayapatnam Port, May 2027 for Mulapeta, December 2027 for Machilipatnam and September 2028 for Kakinada Gateway.

Fishing harbours at Juvvaladinne, Uppada, Nizampatnam and Machilipatnam are targeted for completion between December 2026 and December 2027. Aviation projects are underway at Bhogapuram, Kurnool, Tirupati, Kadapa, Vijayawada and Rajamahendravaram, while proposals for several greenfield airports are at different stages. Eight water aerodrome sites and nine heliport locations have been identified. Collectors were asked to identify 5-10 acres for heliports in the remaining districts

and expedite acquisition of 670 acres for expansion of the Puttaparthi airstrip. National highway projects worth Rs 1,18,566 crore covering 1,408 km are in the pipeline. The government has also approved repairs covering 10,238 km of roads, while 78 Pushkaram works and 14 incomplete bridges are being taken up.

Sasidhar said 42 railway and multi-line projects covering 2,678 km, costing Rs 46,789 crore, were underway. Another 343 ROB or RUB projects involve Rs 13,305 crore.

Land acquisition remains pending for 91 national highway projects, 37 railway projects and 13 ROB/RUB projects. Collectors were directed to resolve these issues on priority and maintain project-wise records of pending issues, responsible officials and deadlines.

Govt sets Oct deadline to turn MoUs into projects

- 80% of PS-2025 MoUs and 75 per cent of SIPB projects targeted for grounding
- 17,469 acres of govt land pending handover to APIIC
- Data centres, IT, semiconductors and quantum technology get major push

THE state government has set an October deadline to accelerate the conversion of

investment proposals into actual projects, directing collectors to personally monitor land availability, approvals and other bottlenecks.

At the Collectors' Conference, industries and commerce department nodal secretary N Yuvaraj said the government aimed to convert at least 80 per cent of the 463 MoUs signed under PS-2025 by the end of October. So far, 198 have been converted, while 172 are pending. The remaining proposals represent about Rs 5.54 lakh crore investment and 5.4 lakh jobs.

Similarly, the government is targeting 75 per cent grounding of 359 SIPB-

approved projects by October. Of these, 160 have commenced, while 109 are yet to be grounded. The pending projects involve around Rs 6.35 lakh crore investment and nearly two lakh jobs.

Yuvaraj said 88,678 acres had been requisitioned for industrial purposes since June 2024, but only 22,533 acres had been acquired. Of 30,223 acres of government land requisitioned, 17,469 acres were still awaiting handover to APIIC.

He directed collectors to expedite land acquisition, remove eligible lands from the 22-A prohibited list and complete mutations in APIIC's

name. Though 9,933 acres have been removed from 22-A, another 59,080 acres remain pending. Mutation has been completed for only 5,184 of the 49,074 acres for which requests were initiated. Collectors were also told to hold DIEPC meetings every fortnight to resolve pending NOCs, environmental clearances, building approvals and other hurdles.

ITE&C secretary Katamneni Bhaskar said AP is targeting 6.5 GW of data-centre capacity by 2030, requiring faster land and infrastructure support in Visakhapatnam, Anakapalli and Vizianagaram. Around 1,000 acres is

proposed for an IT Park in Visakhapatnam, while 100 acres is sought for IT and GCC parks.

The government is also pushing electronics, semiconductors and quantum technology. A 250-acre Quantum Hardware Park is proposed in or around Amaravati, while the Quantum Computing Centre is being readied to host the IBM machine by October 15. The state has 23.85 lakh MSMEs, with 138 of 175 proposed MSME parks approved and 22 already operational. Collectors were asked to ensure the remaining parks and investment projects are grounded on schedule.

Jagan insists on Lokesh's resignation, CBI probe

- Alleges jobs were given to candidates who never wrote exams; demands CBI probe and Lokesh's exit
- Cites fake certificates, non-existent tournaments, and links to associations headed by Lokesh's relatives in jobs under sports quota
- Claims GOs were tweaked post-recruitment and APPSC exams stalled to hide similar irregularities

YSRCP president Y. S. Jagan Mohan Reddy on Thursday renewed his demand for the resignation of education minister Nara Lokesh and a CBI probe into the alleged irregularities in DSC 2025, asserting that the recruitment process was riddled with unprecedented violations and that jobs were handed out to candidates who did not even write the examinations.

Addressing a press conference at the YSRCP central office in Tadepalli,

Jagan questioned the "conspicuous silence" of Chief Minister N. Chandrababu Naidu and Lokesh on the issues repeatedly raised by the opposition. He said fresh irregularities in the teacher recruitment process were surfacing "day after day," indicating a deeper malaise.

Jagan alleged that the government was deliberately weakening the investigation into the DSC scam and asked why the Chief Minister was "trying to protect his son." He accused the administration of "playing with the lives

and futures of unemployed youth" by allowing questionable practices to dictate recruitment.

Raising specific concerns, he asked why the preparation and supervision of DSC examination papers were entrusted to a single individual and why the government introduced GO No. 4 and GO No. 47. He questioned the rationale behind altering these GOs after the recruitment process concluded.

Jagan said 372 posts under the sports quota were filled without conducting any examination. According to him, GO No. 4 and GO No. 47 "opened the gates for irregularities," while GO Nos. 23, 25 and 56 were brought in later "to close those gates after the work was done."

He alleged that jobs were given away in violation of norms and claimed that the coalition government stalled APPSC exams

after the DSC controversy erupted, fearing exposure of similar practices. "Jobs were given based on participation certificates for tournaments that never took place," he said, calling DSC 2025 "a gem in Chandrababu's list of scams."

Jagan accused the government of misleading the legislature and said officials were "running out of words" to defend the recruitment process. He cited case-by-case examples, including 39 sports quota appointments allegedly based on fake certificates. He claimed certificates for judo events in Khammam and softball tournaments were fabricated, and that individuals linked to Lokesh's family headed the associations issuing them.

He also pointed to alleged irregularities in Kho-Kho certificates and cited cases from Kurnool and Kadapa districts where candidates reportedly secured jobs despite not meeting TET or reservation criteria.

21 new nutrition centres to boost malnutrition care in AP

- Health minister says new NRCs will add 175 beds, taking the total to 515 across 42 centres
- Six more 10-bed centres sanctioned for 2026-27, adding another 60 beds
- NRCs recorded over 98% recovery among severely malnourished children in recent years

TWENTY-one new nutrition rehabilitation centres (NRCs) will be established across the state to provide specialised treatment and nutritional support to children suffering from severe acute malnutrition (SAM), health minister Y Satya Kumar Yadav said.

In a statement here on Thursday, he said that the new centres will add 175 beds to the existing capacity.

With these facilities becoming operational in phases, the number of NRCs in the State will increase from 21 to 42, while the total bed strength will rise from 340 to 515.

Eight 10-bed NRCs are being established at Araku, Munchingiput and Chintapalli in Alluri Sitarama Raju district, Anakapalli, Bapatla, Nandyal, Sunnipenta and Narasaraopet in Palnadu district. Works have already been completed at Araku and Nandyal and the centres are expected to become operational soon.

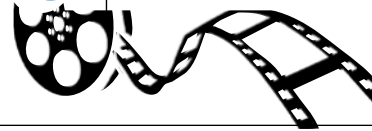
Civil works at Munchingiput are under the tender process, while construction and other works are in progress at Chintapalli and Anakapalli.

Seven five-bed Integrated NRCs are also being established in tribal areas at Addateegala and Y. Ramavaram in the Polavaram region, and Salur, Palakonda, Badagiri, Kurupam and Chinamerangi in Parvathipuram Manyam district. Addateegala and Y. Ramavaram centres are

expected to be inaugurated shortly. In addition, six new 10-bed NRCs have been sanctioned for 2026-27 at Madanapalle, Chittoor, Rajamahendravaram, Machilipatnam, Hindupur and Tanuku, adding another 60 beds.

The government has allocated Rs 4.42 crore for NRC infrastructure, staff capacity building, ASHA incentives and maintenance during 2026-27. Another Rs 12.22 crore has been sanctioned annually towards human resources.

NRCs provide specialised medical care and nutritional support to children below five years suffering from SAM and associated medical complications. In 2024-25, 5,961 children were admitted and 5,878 recovered and were discharged, recording a recovery rate of 98.60 per cent. In 2025-26, 6,195 children were admitted and 6,168 recovered. From April to August 2026, 2,492 children were admitted and 2,462 recovered, registering a recovery rate of 98.80 per cent.
